- 26.1 The secretariat of the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) was created on 25 February 1948. Its terms of reference were established by Economic and Social Council resolution 106 (VI) and subsequent amendments. Its activities are carried out at ECLAC headquarters at Santiago, the subregional headquarters for Mexico and Central America, in Mexico City, and the subregional headquarters for the Caribbean, in Port of Spain; in addition, offices are maintained in Bogotá, Brasilia, Buenos Aires, Montevideo and Washington, D.C., the activities of which are included under the Santiago duty station.
- 26.2 The proposed programme of work in the present section is derived from Programme 33 of the medium-term plan for the period 1992-1997 (A/45/6/Rev.1). Eleven of the 13 subprogrammes are carried out at Santiago, and one in each of the two subregional headquarters. Consistent with the approved medium-term plan for the period 1992-1997, the proposed activities to be undertaken in Mexico and in Port of Spain are presented in two separate subprogrammes, and the following areas have been consolidated: industrial development and science and technology; natural resources and energy, environment and human settlements; and statistics and economic projections. Activities relating to development issues and policies will be undertaken under the subprogrammes, Economic development, Economic and social planning, and Statistics and economic projections. The regrouping of activities required corresponding consolidation of some administrative units and the redeployment of resources within the budget section.
- 26.3 During the biennium 1992-1993, ECLAC will undertake sectoral and multidisciplinary applied research, training and the dissemination of information through the production of technical documentation, specialized periodicals and technical cooperation activities. ECLAC will continue to conduct advisory assistance activities, including the formulation and execution of operational projects, as well as activities to support Member States for negotiations in international forums.
- 26.4 In implementing the programme, ECLAC will continue to coordinate and cooperate with relevant specialized agencies and United Nations offices. In order to avoid duplication, as well as to enhance the effectiveness of its efforts, ECLAC will continue its joint programmes with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), the United Nations Centre for Human Settlements (Habitat) and the Centre on Transnational Corporations. It will also maintain close coordination with non-governmental and intergovernmental institutions concerned with economic integration of the region and with the subregional and regional organizations working in fields related to its programme.
- 26.5 The Commission provides overall direction to the work of the secretariat. It meets biennially (1992) for a period of two weeks and receives substantive services from the secretariat. The Commission, which has five subsidiary bodies to assist it in carrying out its responsibilities, reports to the Economic and Social Council.

26.8 The Office of the Executive Secretary provides overall direction, supervision and management of the Centre in the implementation of its legislative mandates and its approved work programme. In addition, it continues to be responsible for the preparation of a biennial inter-divisional report on the main topic to be discussed at the session of the Commission, as well as the publication of six issues of the CEPAL Review.* The resources requested relate to the Office of the Executive Secretary at Santiago.

Resource requirements (at revised 1991 rates)

Redeployment of posts

26.9 It is proposed to redeploy one D-1 post from subprogramme 6, Natural resources and energy, (see para. 26.34 below) for the post of Secretary of the Commission, a function which has been reclassified, at the D-1 level. A P-5 post is proposed for redeployment to subprogramme 3, Economic and social planning, where its reclassification to D-1 is also proposed to provide an appropriate post for the Director of the Latin American Institute for Economic and Social Planning (ILPES) (see para. 26.21 below).

Consultants

26.10 The estimated requirement (\$14,000) relates to obtaining specialized inputs for the periodical <u>CEPAL Review</u>.

Travel of staff

26.11 The requirements (\$141,400) would provide for attendance at meetings within and outside of the region, including meetings of the Committee for Programme and Coordination, for consultations with Governments, intergovernmental and non-governmental institutions, and for coordination with other United Nations offices by the Executive Secretary and his immediate staff.

26.12 The present subprogramme on food and agriculture is jointly implemented by ECLAC and FAO. During the biennium 1992-1993, emphasis will continue to be placed on the analysis of the consistency and compatibility of agricultural policies with economic policies in general, in order to achieve a more balanced growth between urban and rural areas. Emphasis will also be placed on cooperation with Governments in improving their export earnings, with special attention to the export of agricultural products, in which countries can be competitive in the long run.

Activities:

1. Published material

Four non-recurrent publications: general economic policies and their consistency and compatibility with the predominant agricultural policy; changing conditions in the world market for agricultural and agro-industrial products and changes in agricultural productive structures;* food policies adopted by countries of the region to aid vulnerable urban and rural groups;** and the role of national agricultural planning systems** extrabudgetary (XB).

2. Operational activities

Advisory services on formulation of policies for the transformation of agricultural production in Latin America and the Caribbean (XB).

Resource requirements (at revised 1991 rates)

26.13 No resources from the regular budget are proposed for this subprogramme, except for three Professional and two Local level staff.

- 26.14 The subprogramme on economic development will be carried out by the Economic Development Division and the Latin American Centre for Economic and Social Documentation (CLADES).
- 26.15 Work in economic development analysis will emphasize the relationship between short-term processes and medium- and long-term goals. Basic annual publications will continue to provide systematic analyses of overall economic trends in the region. Support will be given by CLADES to national programmes in the field of bibliographic information management for economic and social development, while operational activities will support Governments in their efforts to introduce fiscal reforms.

Activities:

1. Published materials

- (a) Eighteen issues of recurrent publications: annual: <u>Economic Survey of Latin America and the Caribbean;</u> * <u>Economic Panorama of Latin America, Preliminary Overview of the Latin American Economy</u>, PLANINDEX and INFOPLAN; biannual: "Informativo Terminológico", and "Informativo INFOPLAN".

26.19 The estimated requirements (\$84,300) relate to attendance at meetings of the Committee on Development Planning, preparation of the <u>Economic Survey of Latin America</u> and the <u>Caribbean</u>, the <u>Economic Panorama of Latin America</u>, and several studies.

26.20 Subprogramme 3, Economic and social planning, will be implemented by ILPES. During the biennium 1992-1993, its efforts will be directed towards (a) developing and disseminating methods and techniques for refining the process of formulating economic and social development strategies; (b) strengthening public policy planning and coordination systems and processes; and (c) promoting the exchange of experience and mutual cooperation among the planning bodies of the region. Within this framework, the development of new concepts and methodologies for planning and coordination of public policies will be emphasized. Substantive support and services will be provided to the Eighth and Ninth Conference of Ministers and Heads of Planning of Latin America and the Caribbean, as well as to meetings of the Regional Council for Planning.

Activities:

1. Published material

Sixteen non-recurrent publications: two country experiences in the area of planning; ** assessment, administration and management of social projects; decentralization and deconcentration of social policies; the formulation, management and financing of social policies; social aspects of the planning of local development; macroeconomic planning experiences and techniques based on models prepared by ILPES (XB); coordination of development policies, planning and the strategic management of public and private enterprises (XB); new quidelines for the planning and coordination of public policies in the 1990s; approaches and experiences with respect to the links between planning and strategic public management (XB); techniques and experiences with respect to the mobilization and allocation of resources (XB); techniques and experiences with respect to programming, organization and strategic management of public enterprises and their interaction with the private sector (XB); an operational manual on regional analysis techniques using microcomputers; the regional impact of technical development (XB); preparation and evaluation of projects within the framework of regional planning (XB); and a comparative analysis of experiences in the formulation and implementation of regional development strategies and plans (XB).

- (a) Advisory services on strengthening of planning systems and processes, strategic management, projects and public policy coordination (XB);

(c) Technical support: technical support to the System for Cooperation and Co-ordination among Planning Bodies in Latin America and the Caribbean (SCCOPALC) in development of the Planning Information System for Latin America and the Caribbean (INFOPLAN), establishment of a system of cooperation in data processing for planning, and promotion of social and regional cooperation mechanisms.

Resource requirements (at revised 1991 rates)

Redeployment and reclassification of posts

26.21 As mentioned in paragraph 26.9 above, it is proposed to redeploy to the subprogramme one P-5 post from Executive direction and management. Furthermore, it is proposed that this post be reclassified to the D-1 level in order to provide an appropriate post for the Director of ILPES. This would permit the incorporation of a key position at ECLAC into the regular budget without requesting a new post. A P-4 post is proposed to be redeployed to subprogramme 6, Natural resources and energy.

Travel of staff

26.22 The provision (\$16,300) will cover requirements for travel in connection with the preparation of two background reports for the Ninth Conference of Ministers and Heads of Planning of Latin America and the Caribbean, and the preparation of publications.

26.23 Subprogramme 4, Industrial, scientific and technological development, will be implemented by the Joint ECLAC/UNIDO Industry and Technology Division. Its efforts will centre on a systematic analysis of the national and regional evolution of industrial, scientific and technological activities, and on designing methodologies adapted to specific regional and country situations to be used in developing national or sectoral strategies and policies. Emphasis will be placed on follow-up, analysis and dissemination of successful experiences at the policy, institutional and entrepreneurial levels.

Activities:

1. Published materials

- (a) Four issues of recurrent publication: <u>Industrialization and technological development</u>;
- (b) Ten non-recurrent publications: successful experiences in technological innovation and international competitiveness; the evolution of industrialization in Latin America;* two studies on the evolution of the capital goods sector and on development policies and regional cooperation in this field (XB); two case studies concerning technological innovation and international competitiveness in capital goods (XB); and two studies on policies, institutional machinery and specific actions in support of small- and medium-scale industries, and extraregional industrial cooperation in this field (XB); the transformation of production on industrialization policies (XB); and the effect of policies on performance and behaviour of industrial enterprises (XB);

26.27 The requested provision under this heading (\$39,400) relates to the preparation of various studies.

26.28 In the implementation of subprogramme 5, International trade and development finance, emphasis will be placed on identifying and formulating specific proposals for consolidating the region's capacity for joint action in respect of trade in commodities, manufactures and services, and at assessing the adverse effects on countries of the region of protectionist trends in the industrialized countries. Activities in development finance will emphasize analysis of (a) economic and institutional aspects of problems in financing, (b) ways of facilitating the implementation of policies to strengthen the borrowing capacity of member countries and (c) ways of achieving more effective use of domestic and external financial resources. Member States will be helped in formulating international and regional strategies to solve problems stemming from external indebtedness. These activities will be undertaken primarily under the Joint ECLAC/United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) Programme.

Activities:

Eighteen non-recurrent publications: a comprehensive evaluation of the results of the joint participation of the Latin American and Caribbean countries in multilateral international trade negotiations; * multilateral economic negotiations, current negotiations of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) and progress following the completion of the Uruguay Round of GATT; market structuring, local processing of commodities and channels for marketing these products in the world economy; the current Latin American situation with regard to export promotion mechanisms; two studies on trade in services and the adoption of regional criteria for international trade negotiations; certain aspects of international economic relations and cooperation between Latin America and the Caribbean and the member countries of the European Economic Community (EEC); certain aspects of international economic relations and cooperation between Latin America and the Caribbean and Japan and the United States; two issues of "The U.S. Economy"; the formulation of guidelines for expanding and intensifying trade and economic relations between the countries of the region and the member countries of the Council for Mutual Economic Assistance (CMEA); ** study on possible ways of combining bilateral and subregional agreements in order to achieve a greater degree of multilateralism in the region; economic cooperation between the developing countries of Latin America and those of Africa and Asia; the effects of the behaviour of the world economy, the management of trade and the protectionism of developed countries on the export opportunities of the Latin American and Caribbean economies; the evolution of integration processes in Latin America and the Caribbean; two studies on policies aimed at improving the efficiency of financial and savings institutions in generating and allocating domestic financial resources (XB); strategies to facilitate the insertion of Latin American and Caribbean countries in the international financial market (XB); and possible aspects and forms of cooperation in the intraregional production and marketing of services among the countries of Latin America** (XB).

Consultants

26.30 The requested provisions (\$28,000) will cover the costs of providing specialized inputs to four studies on the effects of the behaviour of the world economy, the management of trade and the protectionism of developed countries on the export opportunities of the Latin American and Caribbean economies; the evaluation of the results of the joint participation of the Latin America and Caribbean countries in multilateral international trade negotiations; and the current Latin American situation with regard to export promotion mechanisms.

Ad hoc expert groups

26.31 The estimated requirements (\$22,200) relates to securing collective expert advice on the effects of the behaviour of the world economy, the management of trade and the protectionism of developed countries on the export opportunities of the Latin America and Caribbean economies and the evolution of integration processes in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Travel of staff

26.32 The estimates (\$59,500) will cover travel costs relating to attendance at various meetings and the preparation of publications.

26.33 During the biennium 1992-1993, in subprogramme 6, Natural resources and energy, emphasis will be placed on facilitating intraregional trade of mining products and machinery. In the field of energy, efforts will be directed towards forecasting of energy demand. Energy-related activities will be carried out in close cooperation with relevant regional institutions, particularly the Latin American Energy Organization (OLADE).

Activities:

26.36 The provision of \$13,900 under this heading will provide for the convening of an ad hoc expert group meeting in relation to the study on a strategy for forestalling the possible impact of climatic changes on water resource use.

Travel of staff

26.37 The estimated requirements of \$34,400 under this heading will provide for attendance at meetings of the Committee on Natural Resources and travel in connection with the preparation of publications.

26.38 Subprogramme 7, Environment and human settlements, will be implemented by the Joint ECLAC/United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) Development and Environment Unit and the Joint ECLAC/Habitat Unit on Human Settlements. In the area of environment, emphasis will be placed on incorporating the environmental dimension into policies of municipal and agricultural development, as well as on analysing the link between environmental management and economic policies. Activities in human settlements will aim at supporting Governments in the operation, administration and development of urban centres and increasing and disseminating knowledge on appropriate technology for construction and improvement of housing, infrastructure and services, particularly in precarious settlements.

Activities:

1. Published material

Eight non-recurrent publications: development and environment in Latin America and the Caribbean; environmental strategies for municipal management; the design and implementation of environmentally sound industrial development policies; the incorporation of the environmental dimension in changing production patterns in agriculture; environmental strategies for the design and implementation of agricultural development policies;* the evolution of the conditions of housing and human settlements in the region** (XB); the evolution and conditions of the management of metropolitan areas in the region (XB); and the urbanization process as it relates to the economic and social development strategies of the countries** (XB).

Meeting of governmental experts to exchange views on ways and means to design environmentally sound policies for changes and improvements in production patterns.



Ad hoc expert groups

26.42 The estimates (\$24,600) relate to the convening of an expert group to examine the results of the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, and an expert group to exchange views on ways and means to design environmentally sound policies for changes and improvements in production pattern.

Travel of staff

26.43 The provision (\$27,400) requested under this heading will provide for travel in connection with the preparation of publications.

26.44 Subprogramme 8, Population, will be implemented by the Latin American Demographic Centre of CELADE, in close coordination with other substantive divisions of ECLAC, ILPES and CLADES. Activities aim at providing assistance in (a) the dissemination of latest knowledge in population dynamics and their determinants and consequences, (b) the integration of population variables into public policies, (c) use of population information in areas of special interest for development, (d) strengthening the capacity of national institutions to use population data and series in a multidisciplinary context, and (e) training of national personnel to undertake population studies and to incorporate demographic factors into development programmes and policies.

Activities:

26.46 Work in subprogramme 9, Social development, will focus on examining some of the main social aspects of the socio-economic crisis of the 1980s with a view to proposing strategies, policies and programmes aimed at tackling its structural causes. Particular attention will be given to the integration of women into the development process. Substantive services will be provided to the meetings of presiding officers of the regional Conference on the Integration of Women into the Economic and Social Development of Latin America and the Caribbean and to the regional Preparatory Meeting for the World Conference on Women.

26.50 In implementation of subprogramme 10, Statistics and economic projections, special attention will be given to organizing, evaluating and disseminating reliable and comparable statistics on the following topics: national accounts, foreign trade and external financing, prices, industry, energy, agriculture, services in the public and private sectors and social and demographic development. The expansion of the statistical databases on external debt, industry, agriculture, mining, population, employment and income distribution will also be undertaken. Work in economic projections will centre on preparation of studies to provide the bases for the deliberations of the Commission, particularly of the Committee of High-Level Government Experts (CEGAN), and for the Committee for Development Planning. Substantive services will be provided to the meetings of the Directors of Statistics of the Americas and of the Permanent Executive Committee of the Inter-American Statistical Conference.

Activities:

1. Parliamentary services

Parliamentary documentation: CEGAN: annual reports on various aspects of economic and social trends in the Latin American and Caribbean countries.

26.57 Subprogramme 12, Subregional activities in Mexico and Central America, has been designed to achieve the aims defined at the regional level and, at the same time, to meet the specific needs of countries of the subregion. Thus, many of the activities to be undertaken will be concerned with supporting the consolidation of the integration of the Central American countries and the governmental efforts to reactivate and restructure their economies. Work will include systematic annual analyses of the overall economic trends and policies of countries in the subregion, as well as activities in the specific sectors, food and agriculture, industrial development and energy. Special efforts will be devoted to the promotion of subregional cooperation in the search for new sources of energy and the development of energy resources, particularly for electricity.

Activities:

1. Published materials

Twenty-seven non-recurrent publications: analysis of the present situation and a projection of the future of interconnected electrical systems in Central America; the history of the process of integration of the Central American countries; approaches to the implementation of strategies for dealing with the problem of critical poverty in selected countries of the subregion; medium-term prospects for selected farm commodities traditionally grown by Central American countries for export, identification of problems and suggested solutions; identification of lines of agriculturally oriented exports new to Central American countries, with an emphasis on marketing analysis; the impact of reactivation policies on recent economic development in some countries of the subregion; the process of public investment in some countries of the subregion; and ways of increasing the supply of hydrocarbons in the subregion; the role of women in Central America; environmental aspects of agricultural activities in Central American countries; national industrialization processes and policies adopted for purposes of restructuring and reactivating manufacturing in certain sectors and countries; ** international cooperation from which Central America has benefited since the mid-1980s, especially that resulting from the cooperation agreement between the countries of the Isthmus and the EEC; the characteristics and dynamics of social groups in some countries of the subregion with special attention given to lower income strata; ** global strategic criteria for capital formation in Central America (XB); critical areas for consideration in the process of investment in Central America and sectoral strategies corresponding to those areas (XB); a portfolio of projects identified as being medium-term projects (XB); Central American programmes in industrial policy, external economic relations, social policy and structural adjustment plans (three) (XB); the approach to regional integration taken in the Economic Action Plan for Central America (PAECA) (XB); social development policies and programmes currently under way (XB); public sector bodies providing services for the identification and assessment of projects involving investment in social organizations (XB); a training and information programme for technicians and professionals concerning the formation of social development enterprises (XB); the feasibility of production of bleached kenaf pulp (XB); financial instruments suitable for increasing the productivity of savings and credit federations in Central America (XB): basic financial parameters

to be observed by cooperatives in their savings and credit operations (XB); and certain commercial aspects of the relations maintained by the Central American countries with Mexico and other Latin American countries by virtue of financial and commercial agreements (XB);

(b) Technical material: 20 <u>Notes</u> on the economic evolution of the countries of the subregion;* two studies on the economic situation in Central America; two studies on the <u>Economic Panorama of Mexico</u>; data bank on economic and social statistics; data bank on manufacturing in the countries of the subregion; and statistical base on the electricity sector in Central America.

2. Ad hoc expert group and related preparatory work

Meeting on policies concerning the growth and behaviour of the economies of the region.

3. Operational activities

- (a) Advisory services: the design of a global economic policy, policy evaluation, and reactivation and development programmes; and electric power companies in Central American countries (XB);
- (b) Group training: workshops on availability of hydrocarbons; social development policies and programmes currently under way; public sector bodies providing services for the identification and assessment of projects involving investment in social organizations; a training and information programme for technicians and professionals concerning the formation of social development enterprises; financial instruments suitable for increasing the productivity of savings and credit federations in Central America; and basic financial parameters to be observed by cooperatives in their savings and credit operations (XB).

Resource requirements (at revised 1991 rates)

Consultants

26.58 The requested provision under this heading (\$42,200) relates to the need for specialized inputs for the preparation of publications on approaches to the implementation of strategies for dealing with the problem of critical poverty; medium-term prospects for selected farm commodities; the impact of reactivation policies on recent economic development; the role of women in Central America; environmental aspects of agricultural activities in Central American countries; and international cooperation from which Central America has benefited since the mid-1980s.

Ad hoc expert groups

26.59 The requirement under this heading (\$38,700) will provide for the convening of ad hoc expert groups on policies on growth and behaviour of the economies of the subregion and in connection with the publications on the history of the process of

integration, approaches to the implementation of strategies for dealing with the problem of critical poverty; medium-term prospects for selected farm commodities, identification of lines of agriculturally oriented exports; and the impact of reactivation policies on recent economic development.

Travel of staff

26.60 The estimates (\$127,400) relate to the servicing of ad hoc expert groups, the preparation of publications and the collection of data and other material for the preparation of contributions to the <u>Economic Survey of Latin America and the Caribbean</u> and the <u>Economic Panorama of Latin America</u>.

26.61 Work under subprogramme 13, Subregional activities in the Caribbean, will be directed towards issues of special relevance to the economic and social development of the member countries of the Caribbean Development and Cooperation Committee (CDCC). Research will be undertaken and studies published on social and economic problems of the subregion, including formulation of policies concerning the integration of women into development. Technical assistance activities will be carried out to strengthen economic and social information systems and to encourage the formulation of policies aimed at diversifying subregional national economies, raising productivity, and enhancing adaptability to rapid technological change. Substantive services will also be provided to annual sessions of CDCC and to its intersessional committee, to the annual meetings of the Caribbean Council for Science and Technology (CCST) and its Executive Committee, and to the Caribbean Consultative Committee on Regional Information Systems.

Activities:

- 1. Published materials
- (a) Four issues of recurrent publication: CARISPLAN Abstracts;
- (b) Fourteen non-recurrent publications: measures to achieve harmonious interaction between the private and public sectors; time series of major economic indicators of Caribbean countries (two); Agricultural Statistics of Caribbean Countries; Trade Procedures Guide; the impact of the Lomé Convention on Caribbean countries and prospects for their traditional exports consequent upon the creation of the European Community consolidated market; evaluation of savings and investment performance in the 1980s and policy proposals on their determinants; selected basic indicators for constructing databases on women engaged in selected activities in the Caribbean; export trends and performance for selected CDCC member countries;** developments in the European Community and the external sector in general and the potential for new Caribbean exports; evaluation of the growth of trade within the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) and prospects for expansion in the wider Caribbean region; population policy implementation in the Caribbean (two); human resource development and structural transformation; and review of CCST activities for the period 1985-1990 (XB);
- (c) Technical material: yearly summaries of economic performance of CDCC countries relative to selected sectors or issues;* computerized update of the <u>Bibliography on Women</u>; maintenance and development of a computerized database on information and documentation; development of a data bank on aspects of Caribbean migration; and expansion and maintenance of the socio-demographic database.

2. Ad hoc expert groups and related preparatory work

Meetings on: the integration of women into development; preparations for the 1995 World Conference on Women; representatives of science and technology institutions in the region for programme and project coordination; and planners to examine an evaluation of ongoing activities and proposals for further action on economic and technical cooperation with the Pacific Rim countries.

- (b) Dissemination of the REDATAM (Retrieval of Census Data for Small Areas by Microcomputers) software, printouts, photocopies and other information, upon request by Governments, and interested institutions and organizations.

4. Operational activities

- (c) Assistance in the implementation of projects in collaboration with the United Nations Fund for Drug Abuse Control (UNFDAC).

Resource requirements (at revised 1991 rates)

Consultants

26.62 The requirements under this heading (\$44,000) relate to the cost of providing specialized inputs for publications on the impact of the Lomé Convention on Caribbean countries, basic indicators for constructing databases on women; export trends and performance for selected CDCC countries; and the growth of trade within CARICOM.

Ad hoc expert groups

26.63 The estimates under this heading of \$38,400 will provide for the convening of a meeting in preparation for the 1995 World Conference on Women, meetings of the Executive Committee of the CCST, an expert group on the integration of women into development, and in connection with the publications on measures to achieve harmonious interaction between the public and private sectors.

Travel of staff

26.64 The estimated requirements under this heading (\$65,600) will provide for travel for: consultation with government authorities, on-site data gathering, and groundwork required for the preparation of publications.

26.65 This subsection encompasses information services, conference and library services, management of technical cooperation and administration and common services.

Activities:

1. Information services

Services to be provided relate to ECLAC activities, as well as those undertaken jointly with the Department of Public Information, including issuance of: a weekly news summary "Micronoticias"; a monthly newsletter "Notas sobre la Economia y el Desarrollo"; a fortnightly feature "ECLAC Chronicle"; and press releases. Other activities that will be continued are liaison with the news media (including press conferences and interviews), governmental and non-governmental organizations, educational institutions, libraries and other local redisseminators of information; photo coverage of ECLAC meetings and other activities, exhibits and other display of material relating to ECLAC and other United Nations events and special observances; and radio and video tapes of interviews and news dispatches for inclusion in regular world-wide United Nations programmes and regional media channels.

2. Conference and library services

- (a) Activities will include the provision of conference services to meetings of the policy-making bodies of ECLAC, their subsidiary bodies, and other intergovernmental meetings to be held under ECLAC auspices; the editing, translation, and printing of documents and publications; and the provision of library services;
- (b) The following policy-making organs and their subsidiary bodies will receive services: twenty-fourth session of the Commission (1992); Committee of the Whole (1993); CEGAN (1992, 1993); CDCC (1992, 1993); CCE: Committee for Economic Cooperation (1993); and Conference on Women in Development (1993).

3. Management of technical cooperation activities

- (a) Services to be provided include the formulation and management of projects financed from extrabudgetary sources, promotion of horizontal cooperation activities among member countries (economic cooperation among developing countries/technical cooperation among developing countries (ECDC/TCDC)), and coordination of relevant interregional activities, supervision of a UNDP/ECLAC project on support of Foreign Affairs Offices in the region, and coordination of all activities relating to natural disasters;
- (b) The following publications will be issued: six issues of TCDC/ECDC Bulletin "Cooperation and Development", a report on institutional arrangements for TCDC activities existing in developing member countries in the region; and a joint report with other regional commissions on activities carried out to promote interregional cooperation;
- (c) Advisory services will be provided on the identification of TCDC opportunities and preparation of project proposals for promoting regional cooperation, assessment of damage caused by natural disasters, formulation of projects in flood forecasting and damage mitigation, and in rehabilitation and reconstruction.

4. Administration and common services

The Division of Administration and the Computer Centre provide services in connection with human resources management, financial administration and resource planning, and use of common services to support the implementation of the work programme. Activities will include: (i) recruitment, placement, career development, staff training and staff administration; (ii) financial management, control and treasury services; (iii) programme planning, budgeting and monitoring; (iv) general services, including security and safety, communications, procurement, transportation etc.; and (v) electronic data processing.

Resource requirements (at revised 1991 rates)

Redeployment of posts

26.66 As mentioned in paragraphs 26.16 and 26.40 above, it is proposed to redeploy one P-3 and two Local level posts to subprogramme 2, Economic development, and one P-3 post to subprogramme 7, Environment and human settlements.

Temporary assistance for meetings

26.67 The provision under this heading (\$310,000) will be required for the servicing of intergovernmental meetings, namely, the twenty-fourth session of ECLAC, the Committee of the Whole, CEGAN, CDCC, CCE and the Conference on Women in Development.

General temporary assistance

26.68 The estimates under this heading (\$483,400) relate to the whole of ECLAC and will provide for replacement of staff on extended leave and for additional assistance during peak workload periods.

Consultants

26.69 The requested provision under this heading (\$8,400) will cover the cost of obtaining outside expertise to teach specialized drafting courses for staff at the three main duty stations.

Overtime and night differential

26.70 The amount requested under this heading (\$212,200) relates to work in connection with the servicing of intergovernmental meetings, as well as additional requirements during peak workload periods.

Travel of staff

26.71 The requested provision under this heading (\$307,800) relates to the substantive servicing of intergovernmental meetings and to travel of administrative staff within and outside of the region for coordination and consultations.

Training

26.72 The estimate under this heading (\$98,100) relates to the provision of language training for the staff.

Contractual services

26.73 The requirement under this heading (\$122,300) will cover the cost of translation and revision of three issues per year of the periodical "Revistas de la CEPAL", and of other documentation for various intergovernmental meetings.

External printing and binding

26.74 The provision under this heading (\$162,000) will cover the publications programme of ECLAC as a whole.

Public information services

26.75 The estimate under this heading (\$31,700) relates to the subscription to two news agency wire services and miscellaneous requirements for the production of public information material.

Data-processing services

26.76 The provision under this heading (\$297,900) will cover the cost of databases and proprietary software for ECLAC as a whole.

Rental and maintenance of premises

26.77 The estimated requirement under this heading (\$2,225,000) will provide for the rental and maintenance of premises at the main duty stations at Santiago, Mexico City and Port of Spain, as well as offices at Buenos Aires, Montevideo, Brasilia, Bogotá and Washington, D.C. It includes provisions for the rental of conference facilities for the twenty-fourth session of the Commission, which is scheduled to be held in 1992.

Utilities

26.78 The requested provision under this heading (\$444,600) will cover the cost of all utilities, including water and electricity.

Rental and maintenance of furniture and equipment

26.79 The requirement under this heading (\$1,310,000) will provide for rental and maintenance of EDP equipment and maintenance of other office furniture and equipment, such as internal reproduction and communications equipment.

Communications

26.80 The estimates under this heading (\$1,744,300) will cover the costs of telephone, cables, telex, postage and diplomatic pouch for ECLAC as a whole.

Official functions

26.81 The requested provision under this heading (\$23,000) relates to group hospitality extended to participants in intergovernmental meetings.

Miscellaneous services

26.82 The requirement under this heading (\$329,000) will cover the cost of insurance of United Nations-owned buildings and other property freight and related charges, bank charges and other miscellaneous charges.

Supplies and materials

26.83 The estimate under this heading (\$920,100) will provide for the purchase of stationery and other expendable and non-expendable office supplies and materials for computer operations, internal reproduction, public information and training. It will also provide for library books and supplies and subscriptions to publications and technical periodicals.

Furniture and equipment

26.84 The estimated requirements under this heading (\$1,032,500) will provide for replacements for existing furniture and equipment in accordance with the normal replacement schedule (\$433,500), a non-recurrent amount of \$190,000 for the purchase of a portable satellite kit for emergency communications and radio equipment at Santiago, air purifiers and cafeteria equipment and furnishings in Mexico City and communications equipment and an offset printer in Port of Spain; and an amount of \$409,000 for the acquisition of data-processing equipment, including an increase of \$279,000.

Improvements to premises

26.85 The requested provision under this heading (\$113,400) relate to regular alterations and improvement projects in various offices. A non-recurrent provision of \$90,000 is included for the refurbishing of the offices in Mexico City.
