in the meetings at the regional and international levels. The aim of the Conferming is not to discuss country documents but to propose action aimed at giving impetue to the development and implementation of new and renewable sources of energy of the basis of national and regional positions. The countries have the option of submitting national documents by 31 December at the latest, pursuant to decision 4 (II) of the Preparatory Committee at its second meeting.

4. Programme of Preparatory Work

It is suggested to all Governments that their interinstitutional working groups should prepare a detailed work programme for the process of preparation, aimed at formulating these national positions. The diagram on the next page gives a suggested outline for this work programme. The following sections briefly describe each stage.

5. <u>Preliminary view of resources</u>

The aim of this stage is to assess knowledge existing in the country on the resources which may be new and renewable sources of energy. Some are natural resources and others are refuse from human activities. The preliminary view should indicate whether the resource exists or not, where it is to be found, what its physical characteristics are, and what its order of magnitude is. This information can be used to compile a preliminary inventory or preliminary "resource map". This stage also makes it possible to tentatively identify the sources and geographical areas for which resource assessment projects should be implemented in the furute.

6. <u>Preliminary view of requirements</u>

It is not sufficient for a resource to exist. In order to be usable there must be an existing or forseeable demand for its utilization. The
