#### ITALY

The Permanent Representative of Italy to the United Nations presents his compliments to the Secretary-General of the United Nations and, with reference to part I, section A, paragraph 1 (b), of the report of the Special Committee on Technical Assistance to Promote the Teaching, Study, Dissemination and Wider Appreciation of International Law, has the honour to submit the following information concerning scholarships awarded by the Italian Ministry for Foreign Affairs for the study of international law at Italian universities:

- 1. Study of international law at a post-graduate level: no scholarship has been awarded for this type of study in 1963-64 and in 1964-65.
- 2. Study of international law at a university level (information is herewith furnished concerning scholarships for Law and Political Science Faculties, in which the study of International Law is compulsory):

#### Academic year 1963-64:

Faculty of Political Science: 49 scholarship students, of whom 46 from developing countries and 3 Europeans.

Faculty of Law: 54 scholarship students, of whom 46 from developing countries, 1 Canadian, 1 American, 1 Japanese and 5 Europeans.

## Academic year 1964-65:

Faculty of Political Science: 43 scholarship students, of whom 41 from developing countries, 1 Canadian, 1 British.

Faculty of Law: 53 scholarship students, of whom 51 from developing countries and 2 Europeans.

It should be borne in mind that international law is also taught in the Faculty of Economy and Trade.

Both for studies at a university level and for studies at a post-graduate level it can be pointed out that there are no specific funds set aside for scholarships in international law. Each Embassy distributed its share of scholarships allocated by the Ministry amongst the various faculties and
