THE POLICIES OF APARTHEID OF THE GOVERNMENT OF THE
REPUBLIC OF SOUTH AFRICA

Report of the Secretary-General

1. On 22 January and 24 June 1965, the Secretary-General reported to the nineteenth session of the General Assembly on the implementation of resolution 1978 B (XVIII) of 16 December 1963, by which the General Assembly requested him to seek ways and means of providing relief and assistance, through the appropriate international agencies, to the families of all persons persecuted by the Government of the Republic of South Africa for their opposition to the policies of apartheid, invited Member States and organizations to contribute generously to such relief and assistance, and invited him to report to the General Assembly at its nineteenth session on the implementation of the resolution.^{1/}
2. The Secretary-General stated that, after consultation with him, the Special Committee on the Policies of Apartheid of the Government of the Republic of South Africa had made an appeal to Member States on 26 October 1964,^{2/} through the Secretary-General, to contribute urgently and generously to existing organizations, pending the conclusion of other appropriate arrangements. In response to that appeal, the following contributions or pledges had been reported by 24 June 1965:

India	25,000 rupees (\$5,250)
Sweden	\$200,000
Netherlands	100,000 Dutch guilders (\$27,760)
Pakistan	23,800 rupees (\$5,000)
Denmark	250,000 Danish kroner (\$37,000)

3. Since 24 June 1965, the Secretary-General has been informed of three additional contributions.

4. By a note dated 13 July 1965,^{3/} the Permanent Representative of Greece informed the Secretary-General that his Government had decided to make a contribution of \$1,000 and that a cheque for that amount had been forwarded to the World Council of Churches.

5. By letters dated 6 August^{4/} and 25 August 1965,^{5/} the Permanent Representative of the Philippines informed the Secretary-General that his Government had decided to make a contribution of \$2,500, and that it had remitted the amount of \$1,250 each to the Defence and Aid International Fund for Southern Africa and to Amnesty International.

6. By a letter dated 8 September 1965,^{6/} the Permanent Representative of Iraq informed the Secretary-General that his Government had decided to contribute \$2,800. The contribution has been sent to the Defence and Aid International Fund for Southern Africa.
