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REPORT OF THE NEGOTIATING COMMITTEE FOR EXTRA-BUDGETARY FUNDS

1. The General Assembly at its fourteenth session (resolution 1440 B (XIV) of 5 December 1959) requested the President to appoint a Negotiating Committee for Extra-Budgetary Funds, with the same terms of reference as those laid down in resolution 693 (VII) of 25 October 1952, to serve until the close of the fifteenth session of the Assembly. The President of the Assembly appointed a Committee composed of representatives of the following nine Member States: Argentina, Brazil, Canada, France, Lebanon, New Zealand, Pakistan, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the United States of America. The Committee elected Mr. Derek C. Arnould (Canada) as Chairman and, on his departure from New York, the Committee, in May 1960, elected Mr. Raul A.J. Quijano (Argentina) to succeed him.
2. The Negotiating Committee was established to assist in obtaining voluntary contributions from Member and non-Member States for the financing of programmes approved by the General Assembly and for which funds are not available through the regular budget of the United Nations. These programmes include the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East, the programmes of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, the United Nations Children's Fund, the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and the United Nations Special Fund.
3. In this report, the Negotiating Committee will review the results obtained in terms of contributions paid or pledged for the current year to the programmes with which it is concerned. It will also give the results of the two Pledging

Conferences held during the fifteenth session of the General Assembly for the announcements of pledges of contributions for 1961 to: (a) the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and the United Nations Special Fund, and (b) the programmes of UNRWA and of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees.

4. Although the Negotiating Committee did not deal directly with the World Refugee Year, it has followed its activities with the closest interest. The Special Representative of the Secretary-General for the World Refugee Year has, at meetings of the Negotiating Committee, reported personally on the Year's progress and has kept the Committee informed of developments. The interest which WRY has engendered in the problems of refugees and the tangible results achieved have, and may continue to have, an important effect on the financial situation of the two United Nations refugee organs. The refugee programmes have been the particular concern of the Committee over the past few years, and it was mainly to assist in obtaining additional financial support for these programmes that the General Assembly decided to re-establish the Committee for another year. The results of the World Refugee Year, particularly to the extent that they affect UNRWA and the programmes of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, are therefore also included in this report.

5. During the past year, the Negotiating Committee has continued in various ways to deal with the questions of contributions to the activities with which it is concerned. In the name of the Committee, the Chairman has addressed letters to the Governments of Member and non-Member States on the financial situation and requirements of the agencies. The Committee has also continued the series of visits to permanent delegations, which were initiated last year, and which had proved helpful in stimulating the interest in and financial support for the refugee programmes. During these visits, the Chairman and members of the Committee had the opportunity to discuss with delegations the financial situation of the agencies and the particular problems with which they were faced. The Committee would wish to record its appreciation of the courteous reception accorded to them by the delegations, the interest shown by them in the questions discussed, and their co-operation in bringing these matters to the attention of their Governments.

6. A summary of the present financial situation of the voluntary programmes is given in the following paragraphs. An annex showing as at 30 November 1960 the

contributions pledged and the total payments received for 1960 in respect of these programmes is attached (annex I). The contributions for 1961 announced at the two Pledging Conferences for (a) the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and the Special Fund and (b) the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East and the programmes of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees are listed in annexes II and III.

United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF)

7. The Negotiating Committee has continued its co-operation with UNICEF and has been regularly informed of the status of contributions. By the end of November 1960, approximately \$20.9 million had been paid and pledged by ninety Governments. There are indications that the total number of contributors to UNICEF will this year be about ninety-five, as compared with eighty-seven in 1959, and that the total of governmental contributions will amount to about \$21.6 million as against \$20.5 million in 1959. Taking into account income from other sources, it is expected that the total income for 1960 will reach \$25.7 million as compared with \$23.8 million in 1959.

Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and the United Nations Special Fund

8. At the 1960 United Nations Pledging Conference on the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and the Special Fund held on 13 October 1960, seventy-eight Governments pledged contributions totalling \$88.9 million to the two programmes for 1961. This total includes the United States pledge of \$40 million, which is subject to the condition that the contribution must not exceed 40 per cent of the total contributions to the two programmes. Following the Conference, a number of new pledges have been announced bringing the total to \$89.5 million, and several Governments have indicated that their pledges or increases in pledges will be made known later. In view of the fact that a number of Governments have pledged a total for the two programmes, and the proportion to be allocated to each programme is not yet determined, separate totals cannot be given at present. It is estimated, however, that the contribution to the two programmes, including the pledges and increases in pledges that are still expected,

will amount to approximately \$41.8 million for the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and \$48.5 million for the Special Fund.

9. As these figures show, the present estimate of resources for the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and the Special Fund for 1961 are considerably higher than the total of contributions to the two programmes for the current year. As at 30 November 1960, eighty-four Governments had pledged \$33.7 million to the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance for 1960, and at the same date the contributions pledged by seventy-seven Governments to the United Nations Special Fund amounted to \$37.9 million.

United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East

10. The General Assembly at its fourteenth session decided to extend the mandate of UNRWA for a period of three years from 30 June 1960. For the year 1960, the Director of UNRWA had submitted to the General Assembly budget estimates amounting to \$38.7 million, of which \$34 million would be needed for the normal programmes of relief and general education, while the balance would be used for expansion of the self-support programmes. As against these requirements, the contributions pledged total \$33.7 million, while the payments received amount to \$21.6 million.

11. In his annual report to the General Assembly at its fifteenth session,^{1/} the Director of UNRWA has submitted a three-year programme of activity. The cumulative financial requirements for this three-year programme would entail: (a) some \$34 million per year for present relief and education programmes, (b) an additional total of \$16.2 million during the three-year period, of which \$8.1 million would be used to expand technical training, \$3.7 million to improve and expand elementary and secondary education, and \$4.4 million to meet inevitable increases in the regular relief services and rising costs. Of the total of \$16.2 million, the Agency is hoping to obtain some \$4 million from World Refugee Year contributions, of which \$2.3 million has already been received.

12. At the meeting of the ad hoc Committee of the whole Assembly for the announcement of pledges of contributions to UNRWA, which was held on

20 October 1960, a total of \$29.5 million was pledged by twenty-nine Governments. Of that amount, approximately \$17.9 million were for the 1961 programmes, as against the total estimated requirements for that year of \$40.6 million. The Director of UNRWA estimates, on the assumption that countries which at the time of the Conference were not able to pledge for 1961 or for the last half of 1961 will ultimately do so at the same rates they have in the past, that UNRWA's income from normal governmental sources for 1961 will be about the same level as in previous years, namely, about \$34 million. While the financing of the expansion of the programmes of vocational training and education is not yet assured, the Director was encouraged by the fact that the three principal contributors to the Agency - the United States, the United Kingdom and Canada - in their announcements at the Conference clearly indicated their full support of these programmes.

Programmes of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees

13. The financial target approved for the budgetary requirements of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees for 1960 by the Executive Committee of the High Commissioner's Programme was \$12 million, including \$7.3 million for special World Refugee Year allocations. By 30 November 1960, the total of governmental pledges, promises and payments in respect of the programmes amounted to \$6 million. While the target for 1960 has not been fully achieved, the High Commissioner has expressed his confidence that, taking into account all governmental and non-governmental contributions, it will be reached by the end of the year. During 1960, the Camp Clearance Programme, which was given first priority, has been nearly completed and, largely through the effect of World Refugee Year contributions, the funds for completing the programmes are assured. The additional WRY contributions have also made it possible for the High Commissioner to attack one of the other outstanding problems of non-settled refugees: the problem of those living outside camps.

14. The programme approved for 1961 by the Executive Committee of the High Commissioner's Programme requires \$6 million from international sources. These funds will be directed mainly to handicapped cases among non-settled refugees living outside camps. At the meetings of the ad hoc Committee of the whole

Assembly for the announcement of pledges of contributions to UNHCR, which was held on 20 October 1960, a total of \$2.9 million was pledged by twenty-nine Governments for the 1961 programmes.

15. Since it cannot be expected that private contributions for 1961 will be at the same high level as in the past year when on the occasion of World Refugee Year they far exceeded governmental contributions, the High Commissioner has urged Governments to support his 1961 programmes at a level which he hoped would not be lower than in the past.

World Refugee Year

16. The General Assembly at its thirteenth session endorsed the proposal for a World Refugee Year to begin in June 1959 (resolution 1285 (XIII)). The aims of the World Refugee Year were: (1) to focus interest on the refugee problems, (2) to encourage additional financial contributions from Governments, voluntary agencies and the general public, and (3) to encourage additional opportunities for permanent solution.

17. In his report to the General Assembly on the World Refugee Year (A/4546), the Secretary-General has given a detailed account of the activities and the results of World Refugee Year as they were known by 30 September 1960. According to reports received up to that date, the total sum raised or pledged to World Refugee Year, in addition to the regular annual contributions of Governments and voluntary agencies, was more than \$US 80 million, and has subsequently increased to \$83 million. Of that amount, approximately \$14 million has been directly contributed to the United Nations organs concerned with refugees, UNHCR and UNRWA, and for the transportation of refugees within the mandate of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees. The effect of the additional WRY contributions on the programmes of UNRWA and of the High Commissioner are referred to in the paragraphs of this report dealing with the two programmes.

18. The report of the Secretary-General further indicated that more than \$20 million of the WRY contributions appeared still to be unallocated, and that considerable funds raised during World Refugee Year with the help of the voluntary

agencies will remain at the disposal of the agencies to be used for refugees who are within the United Nations mandate. In this connexion, the Secretary-General has expressed the hope "that this situation will lead the agencies concerned to consider assuming a greater financial share in the essential programmes undertaken by the High Commissioner and UNRWA, thus enabling the two United Nations organizations to turn their attention to other pressing needs" (A/4546, para. 91).

19. The remarkable success of World Refugee Year is not limited to the financial results achieved. By the publicity given to the World Refugee Year in all the participating countries, it has succeeded in creating a world-wide interest in the problems of refugees and has shown a way to a new approach to these problems. As an example, some organizations created for World Refugee Year have decided to continue to work on behalf of refugees on a permanent basis, so that, as stated by the Secretary-General, "the official end of World Refugee Year now can be considered not as an end but as a beginning".

20. The Negotiating Committee would wish to pay tribute to the Secretary-General and to his Personal Representative for World Refugee Year for the work they have done in promoting the World Refugee Year, and to record its appreciation of their close co-operation with the Committee.

Ad Hoc Committee of the whole Assembly

21. The General Assembly at its twelfth session introduced the procedure of convening an ad hoc Committee of the whole Assembly for the announcement of pledges of voluntary contributions to the two United Nations refugee programmes. This procedure, which has been repeated annually, was adopted at the suggestion of the Negotiating Committee in an attempt, through the increased publicity thereby given to the refugee programmes, to focus attention on the problems of refugees and thus bring about an improvement in the financial support of these agencies.

22. The meetings of the ad hoc Committee of the whole Assembly to be convened in accordance with General Assembly resolution 1440 A (XIV) during the fifteenth session of the General Assembly were held on 20 October 1960. At these meetings, contributions totalling \$29.5 million were pledged to the programmes of UNRWA and \$2.9 million to the programmes of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees. The results of the conference in terms of contributions pledged have

been reviewed in the preceding paragraphs dealing with these programmes, and a statement of the contributions announced is annexed to this report.

23. Although the contributions pledged at the conference were insufficient to meet the estimated requirements of the two agencies for 1961, the Negotiating Committee is of the opinion that the procedure of holding an annual pledging conference for these programmes has proved its usefulness. An important aspect of this procedure is that the Assembly will have an indication of the financial support that it may be expected will be forthcoming for the next financial year before considering the reports on these programmes. In deciding on the future scope of these programmes, the Assembly would therefore be in a position to make a realistic appraisal of the funds that will be available for their implementation.

24. The Negotiating Committee recommends therefore that the procedure of holding an annual pledging conference for the two refugee programmes be continued and that the following rules for the conference be reaffirmed: (1) that the meetings be held as soon as practicable in the session, (2) that in order to ensure maximum attendance as much advance publicity as possible be given to them and (3) that they be so scheduled that no other meetings are held at the same time.

Conclusion

25. The present mandate of the Negotiating Committee expires at the close of the fifteenth session of the General Assembly. The Committee's main concern during the past year has been the two refugee programmes, which have experienced the greatest financial difficulties. Since, as mentioned earlier in this report, the funds that have so far been pledged or promised for the programmes of UNRWA and of the High Commissioner for Refugees for 1961 will be insufficient to meet the target figures set for these programmes, it will be essential to obtain in the course of the coming year additional financial support for these programmes. The General Assembly may wish therefore to re-establish the Negotiating Committee, or a similar committee, to assist in raising the funds required and, in general, to deal with the question of contributions to activities with which it is concerned.

26. The Committee would wish to record its appreciation to the heads of the agencies involved who, in addition to their own fund-raising efforts, have co-operated so fully with the Committee, and to the many Governments that have responded to the appeals for financial support of the voluntary programmes with which it is concerned.

27. In the light of this report, the Negotiating Committee recommends the adoption by the General Assembly of the following draft resolutions:

A

The General Assembly,

Having considered the report of the Negotiating Committee for Extra-Budgetary Funds appointed at the fourteenth session of the General Assembly,

Decides that:

1. An ad hoc of the whole Assembly, under the chairmanship of the President of the session, shall be convened as soon as practicable after the opening of the sixteenth session, where pledges of voluntary contributions for the refugee programmes for the following year would be announced;

2. States not Members of the United Nations, but members of one or more of the specialized agencies, shall be invited to attend the meetings of the ad hoc Committee for the purpose of announcing their pledges to the refugee programmes;

3. In order to ensure maximum attendance, as great advance publicity as possible shall be given to the meetings of the ad hoc Committee and they shall be so scheduled that no other meetings are held at the same time.

B

The General Assembly

1. Requests the President of the General Assembly to appoint a Negotiating Committee for Extra-Budgetary Funds consisting of not more than ten members, with the same terms of reference as those laid down

in Assembly resolution 693 (VII) of 25 October 1952, to serve from the close of the fifteenth session to the close of the sixteenth session of the Assembly;

Decides to include in the provisional agenda of its sixteenth session the item entitled "Report of the Negotiating Committee for Extra-Budgetary Funds".
