### APPOINTMENTS TO FILL VACANCIES IN SUBSIDIARY ORGANS AND OTHER APPOINTMENTS: MEMBERS OF THE INTERNATIONAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

#### Note by the Secretary-General

1. In his note of 16 January 1992 (A/46/234), the Secretary-General informed the General Assembly that he had received notification of the resignation of two members of the International Civil Service Commission (ICSC) and that, accordingly, the Assembly should include in the agenda of its forty-sixth session an additional sub-item reading as follows:

"Appointment of members of the International Civil Service Commission".

2. At its 80th plenary meeting, on 4 February 1992, the General Assembly decided to add the sub-item proposed by the Secretary-General and to allocate it to the Fifth Committee.

3. It will accordingly be necessary for the General Assembly at its current session to appoint two persons to fill the unexpired portion of the terms of office of Mr. Michel Jean Bardoux (France), and Ms. Claudia Cooley (United States of America), that is, until 31 December 1993.

4. The Governments of France and the United States have nominated, respectively, Mr. Mario Bettati and Ms. Lucretia Myers to fill these vacancies.

5. The appointment of the members of ICSC is governed by the provisions of articles 4 and 5 of the Commission's statute. Pursuant to these provisions, the Secretary-General has undertaken consultations with Member States, through the Chairmen of the various regional groups, with the executive heads of the other organizations, with staff representatives through the Federation of International Civil Servants' Associations (FICSA) and the Coordinating

Committee for Independent Staff Unions and Associations (CCISUA) and the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (ACABQ).

6. On the basis of these consultations, the Secretary-General, in his capacity as Chairman of the Administrative Committee on Coordination, is now in the position to suggest that the Fifth Committee recommend to the General Assembly the appointment of the following persons for two-year terms of office beginning 1 January 1992 to replace Mr. Bardoux and Ms. Cooley on the Commission:

Lucretia F. MYERS

Experience

Lucretia F. Myers was appointed Executive Director of the United States Merit Systems Protection Board in 1987 and manages the operations of the Board and 11 regional offices. As the successor to the United States Civil Service Commission, the Board is an independent quasijudicial agency designed to protect the integrity of the Federal merit systems. It conducts studies of the merit systems and adjudicates appeals from personnel actions taken by the United States Government.

Prior to her appointment at the Board, Ms. Myers served in a variety of positions at the United States Government's central personnel agency, the United States Office of Personnel Management.

1986-1987: Deputy Associate Director for Administration with responsibility for the Agency's fiscal, administrative, electronic data-processing and human resources management functions.

1985-1986: Deputy Associate Director for Compliance and Investigations with responsibility for the federal government's personnel investigations, personnel management oversight, workforce information and classification appeals programmes.

1984-1985: Assistant Director for Pay and Benefits Policy with responsibility for development of legislative and regulatory policy for the United States Government's pay and leave systems, retirement system and health and life insurance programmes.

1982-1984: Assistant Director for Retirement Programs with responsibility for administering the United States Government's civil service retirement and disability programmes. With a staff of approximately 1,000, paid over \$21 billion in benefits annually to more than 1.8 million people.

1979-1982: Director of Personnel and Equal Employment Officer with responsibility for position classification, examination development and staffing, affirmative employment planning and complaints processing, employee and labour relations and personnel management evaluation for the central personnel agency of approximately 6,000 employees nationwide. Served briefly as Chief, Workforce Management Division, during this period.

Before joining the Government's central personnel agency, Ms. Myers held a variety of management and technical positions in human resources management with the United States Department of the Air Force.

1978-1979: Chief, Resource Development and Training Division, Office of Civilian Personnel Operations, with responsibility for developing policy for career management and education, training and development programmes for 230,000 civilian employees working worldwide.

1978: Chief, Evaluation and Resource Management Division, Headquarters Air Training Command, with responsibility for personnel management oversight, drug and alcohol abuse programmes, and human resource management information systems. Managed a budget of approximately \$230 million for pay and benefits to support 17,000 civilian employees at 14 field sites.

1976-1978: As a member of the faculty at the Air University in Montgomery, Alabama, Ms. Myers developed curriculum and taught courses in staffing, employee management relations, position classification and wage administration, labour contract negotiations and applied labour relations.

1968-1976: Served as a technical specialist, then as a supervisor with responsibility for planning, implementing and directing a personnel programme comprised of classification and wage, staffing and employee management relations for civilian employees engaged in research and development and systems acquisition.

#### Education and honours

Ms. Myers is a 1983 graduate of the Senior Executive Fellows Program at Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government and a 1990 graduate of the Federal Executive Institute.

In 1988, the President of the United States awarded her the Presidential Rank Award of Distinguished Executive. In 1989, she won the merit board's top award, the Theodore Roosevelt Award, for her leadership abilities. Ms. Myers represented the United States at the International Personnel Management Association's International Conference in London in 1988. She has received numerous awards for outstanding performance, including eight performance awards for excellence as a member of the Senior Executive Service.
