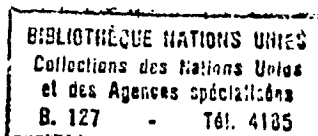




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FURTHER REPORT OF THE SECRETARY-GENERAL PURSUANT TO
SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTIONS 757 (1992), 758 (1992)
AND 761 (1992)Addendum

1. In my report to the Security Council (S/24263), I recommended in paragraph 12 that the strength of the United Nations Protection Force (UNPROFOR) be increased by some 1,600 personnel and indicated that the revised estimate of financial implications arising from this recommendation would be issued separately as an addendum.
2. An appropriation has been provided to UNPROFOR by General Assembly resolution 46/233 of 19 March 1992 for the period ending mid-October 1992. Should the Security Council agree to the proposed increase in the strength of UNPROFOR, it is estimated that the revised cost of the enlargement, for a four-month period from mid-June to mid-October 1992, would amount to some \$22.7 million instead of the \$20.1 million indicated in the original estimate (S/24075/Add.1). Thereafter, it is estimated that the monthly cost relating to these activities would amount to approximately \$3.8 million. A breakdown of the estimated cost by main categories of expenditure is provided for information purposes in the annex to the present addendum.
3. It would be my recommendation to the General Assembly, should the Security Council decide to enlarge the strength of UNPROFOR, that the additional cost relating thereto should be considered an expense of the Organization to be borne by Member States in accordance with Article 17, paragraph 2, of the Charter of the United Nations and that the assessments to be levied on Member States be credited to the UNPROFOR Special Account.
