## CHEMICAL AND BACTERIOLOGICAL (BIOLOGICAL) WEAPONS

Programme budget implications of the draft resolution contained  
in document A/C.1/42/L.67/Rev.1 and Corr.1

Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with  
rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

A. Request contained in the draft resolution

1. Under the terms of operative paragraph 5 of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.1/42/L.67/Rev.1 and Corr.1, the General Assembly would request the Secretary-General, with the assistance of qualified experts provided by interested Member States, to develop further technical guidelines and procedures available to him for the timely and efficient investigation of reports that may be brought to his attention by any Member State concerning the possible use of Chemical and bacteriological (biological) or toxin weapons.

B. Relationship of proposed request to approved  
programme of work

2. The above requests are related to activities referred to under chapter 1, Political and Security Council Affairs, programme 2, Activities of the Department for Disarmament Affairs, subprogramme 1, Deliberation and negotiation, of the medium-term plan for the period 1984-1989, 1/ and in section 2B, Department for Disarmament Affairs, of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989, 2/ subprogramme 1, Deliberation and negotiation, programme element 1.6, Follow-up and implementation of the resolutions and decisions of the General Assembly and other legislative bodies.

**C. Activities by which the proposed request should be implemented**

3. Should the General Assembly adopt the draft resolution, the Secretary-General would engage three qualified consultant experts to prepare papers which would cover the scientific, technical and legal issues related to the development of the guidelines and procedures referred to in operative paragraph 5. Upon completion of that work, the consultant experts would be expected to attend a one-week meeting in New York in 1988 to exchange views and draft a consolidated report for the Secretary-General. It is envisaged that the meeting would not require conference services. Appropriate secretariat assistance and support would be provided by the Department for Disarmament Affairs.

4. The Secretary-General would authorize payment of fees to the consultant experts. In addition to travel costs and subsistence allowance for the meeting in New York.

**D. Modifications required in the approved programme of work**

5. The activities to be thus undertaken by the Secretariat fall under programme element 1.6 of subprogramme 1 of section 2A of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989. Accordingly, no modifications to that programme element are required.

**E. Additional requirements at full cost**

6. The additional requirements to implement the draft resolution are estimated as follows:

(a) Fees

(Three consultant experts, for a total of three work-months)

(b) Travel and subsistence allowance for the New York meeting

**F. Potential for absorption**

7. No programme element under any subprogramme within section 25 (Department for Disarmament Affairs) of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989 is proposed for curtailment, postponement or termination to implement the draft resolution.

**G. Request for additional appropriation**

8. Should the General Assembly adopt the draft resolution contained in document A/C.1/42/L.67/Rev.1 and Corr.1, an additional appropriation of \$24,400 would be required under section 2B at the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989.
