### REPORT OF THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL COUNCIL

#### Report of the Second Committee

Rapporteur: Mr. Ahmed Yousif MOHAMED (Sudan)

#### I. INTRODUCTION

1. At its 3rd plenary meeting, on 23 September 1994, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee, decided to include in the agenda of its forty-ninth session the item entitled "Report of the Economic and Social Council" and to allocate to the Second Committee chapters of the Council's report (A/49/3) 1/ that were considered under the relevant items of the agenda (see A/C.2/49/1).

2. The Second Committee considered the item at its 17th to 19th, 21st, 22nd, 25th, 28th, 29th, 32nd, 34th and 35th meetings, on 31 October, 2, 8, 10, 15, 16 and 23 November and 7 and 13 December 1994. An account of the Committee's general discussion of the item is contained in the relevant summary records (A/C.2/49/SR.17-19, 21, 22, 25, 28, 29, 32, 34 and 35). ## II. CONSIDERATION OF PROPOSALS

### A. Draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.2

5. At its 29th meeting, on 23 November, the Committee had before it a draft resolution entitled "Commemoration of the millennium of the Kyrgyz national epic, Manas" (A/C.2/49/L.2), recommended by the Economic and Social Council, in its resolution 1994/49 of 29 July 1994, to the General Assembly for adoption.

6. At the same meeting, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Raiko Raichev (Bulgaria), informed the Committee of the results of the informal consultations held on the draft resolution.

7. Before the adoption of the draft resolution, the representative of Kyrgyzstan made a statement (see A/C.2/49/SR.29).

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8. Also at the same meeting, the Committee decided to recommend to the General Assembly the adoption of draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.2 (see para. 49, draft resolution I).

B. Draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.3

9. At its 32nd meeting, on 7 December, the Committee had before it a draft resolution entitled "Integration of the Commission on Transnational Corporations into the institutional machinery of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development" (A/C.2/49/L.3), recommended by the Economic and Social Council, in its resolution 1994/1 of 14 July 1994, to the General Assembly for adoption.

10. At the same meeting, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Raiko Raichev (Bulgaria), informed the Committee of the results of the informal consultations held on the draft resolution.

11. Also at the same meeting, the Committee decided to recommend to the General Assembly the adoption of draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.3 (see para. 49, draft resolution II).

12. 13. At the 29th meeting, on 23 November, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Raiko Raichev (Bulgaria), informed the Committee of the results of the informal consultations held on the draft resolution.

14. Before the adoption of the draft resolution, the representative of Portugal made a statement (see A/C.2/49/SR.29).

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15. At the same meeting, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.11 (see para. 49, draft resolution III).

D. Draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.14

16. At the 29th meeting, on 23 November, the representative of the United States of America, on behalf of Belarus, the Czech Republic, Finland, Romania, the Russian Federation and Slovenia, introduced a draft resolution entitled "Modalities of reporting in the economic, social and related fields" (A/C.2/49/L.14).

17. At the 34th meeting, on 13 December, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Raiko Raichev (Bulgaria), informed the Committee of the results of the informal consultations held on the draft resolution.

18. At the same meeting, statements were made by the Director of the Division for Policy Coordination and Economic and Social Council Affairs, Department for Policy Coordination and Sustainable Development, and the representative of Algeria (see A/C.2/49/SR.34).

19. Also at the same meeting, the Committee decided to ask its Chairman to transmit the draft text to the Chairman of the Fifth Committee in order for it to be considered in the context of the question of the rationalization of documentation.

E. Draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.15

20. At the 22nd meeting, on 10 November, the representative of Egypt, on behalf of Algeria, Djibouti, Egypt, Jordan, Mauritania, Tunisia and Yemen, subsequently joined by Malaysia, Saudi Arabia and Bahrain, introduced a draft resolution entitled "Economic and social repercussions of the Israeli settlements on the Palestinian people in the Palestinian territory, including Jerusalem, occupied since 1967, and on the Arab population of the Syrian Golan" (A/C.2/49/L.15).

21. At the 34th meeting, on 13 December, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Raiko Raichev (Bulgaria), informed the Committee of the results of the informal consultations held on the draft resolution.

22. Before the adoption of the draft resolution, statements were made by the representatives of Egypt, the United States of America and Israel (see A/C.2/49/SR.34).

23. At its 34th meeting, on 13 December, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.15 by a recorded vote of 112 to 2, with 23 abstentions (see para. 49, draft resolution IV). The voting was as follows: 2/

24. After the adoption of the draft resolution, statements were made by the representatives of the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, Iran (Islamic Republic of), Iraq and Ukraine, as well as by the observer for Palestine (see A/C.2/49/SR.34).

#### F. Draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.16

25. At the 25th meeting, on 15 November, the representative of Algeria, on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China, introduced a draft resolution entitled "Report of the Committee

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for Development Planning: general review of the list of the least developed countries" (A/C.2/49/L.16).

26. At the 29th meeting, on 23 November, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Raiko Raichev (Bulgaria), informed the Committee of the following oral revision to the draft resolution as a result of the informal consultations: preambular paragraph 3, which read:

"Noting with concern that the international economic environment has not been conducive to the growth and development of developing countries, which has led to an increase in the number of least developed countries, especially in Africa"

was replaced with the following:

"Noting with concern the increase in the number of least developed countries, particularly in Africa, and underlining the importance of the creation of a conducive international economic environment for the growth and development of the developing countries, particularly the least developed countries".

27. A statement of the programme budget implications of draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.16, submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly, was contained in document A/C.2/49/L.21.

28. At its 29th meeting, on 23 November, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.16, as orally revised (see para. 49, draft resolution V).

29. After the adoption of the draft resolution, a statement was made by the representative of Algeria, on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China (see A/C.2/49/SR.29).

#### G. Draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.22

30. At the 28th meeting, on 16 November, the representative of Ghana, on behalf of the African States, introduced a draft resolution entitled "Strengthening information systems for Africa's recovery and sustainable development" (A/C.2/49/L.22).

31. At the 34th meeting, on 13 December, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Raiko Raichev (Bulgaria), informed the Committee of the results of the informal consultations held on the draft resolution, and orally revised it as follows: the operative paragraph, which read:

"Decides to endorse resolution 789 (XXIX) of 4 May 1994 of the Conference of Ministers of the Economic Commission for Africa, in which the Ministers call for the creation of three Professional posts at appropriate levels in the Commission's subprogramme on statistical and information systems development, so as to permit the delivery of activities on information systems development"

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was replaced with the following:

"Endorses resolution 789 (XXIX) of 4 May 1994 of the Conference of Ministers of the Economic Commission for Africa and requests the Secretary-General fully to implement the resolution within existing United Nations resources".

32. At the same meeting, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.22, as orally revised, without a vote (see para. 49, draft resolution VI).

H. Draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.26 and Rev.1

33. At the 29th meeting, on 23 November, the representative of Algeria, on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China, introduced a draft resolution entitled "Preventive action and intensification of the struggle against malaria in developing countries, particularly in Africa" (A/C.2/49/L.26). The draft resolution read as follows:

"Preventive action and intensification of the struggle  
against malaria in developing countries, particularly  
in Africa

"The General Assembly,

"Reaffirming the agreed conclusions on the coordination segment of the substantive session of 1993 of the Economic and Social Council on the coordination of the policies and activities of the specialized agencies and other bodies of the United Nations system in the fields of preventive action and intensification of the struggle against malaria and diarrhoeal diseases, in particular cholera, 3/

"Recalling Economic and Social Council resolution 1994/34 of 29 July 1994, including preventive action and intensification of the struggle against malaria in developing countries, particularly in Africa,

"Acknowledging the importance for endemically affected countries of having a modern strategy to control this most deadly of all tropical diseases which annually causes more than one million deaths world wide and nine hundred thousand deaths in Africa,

"Deeply concerned by the development of more than three hundred million new cases of malaria annually and by the emergence of a new type of drug-resistant malaria,

"Noting with concern that a major problem complicating malaria treatment and thereby contributing to malaria-related mortality is the

continuous intensification and spread of parasite resistance to anti-malarial drugs,

"Noting with regret that chloroquine, which traditionally has been prescribed both for prophylaxis and for curative purposes, can no longer be totally relied upon,

"Recognizing that malaria-related deaths in the world could be prevented, if appropriate health services were made available in endemically affected countries,

"1. Endorses the new Global Malaria Control Strategy of the World Health Organization, endorsed in 1992 by the Ministerial Conference on Malaria, held in Amsterdam, the Netherlands, which aims to prevent mortality and reduce morbidity as well as social and economic losses due to malaria;

"2. Recognizes that, where the disease is most prevalent, malaria-related problems vary enormously from situation to situation owing to epidemiological, social, economic and operational factors;

"3. Stresses that to achieve the objectives of the Strategy will require the progressive improvement and strengthening of local, national, regional and international capabilities, especially with the aim of enhancing partnership and coordination efforts, involving sectors like education, agriculture and the environment, as well as integrating activities with those on related diseases;

"4. Notes with appreciation the continued efforts undertaken by Governments to control the disease, in spite of their meagre resources, including the actions they have taken to stop its outbreak through the widespread spraying of insecticide and by making available appropriate anti-malarial products;

"5. Welcomes the fact that the World Health Organization has recently increased its commitment to malaria control, especially in Africa, where the overwhelming majority both of cases and of deaths occur;

"6. Also welcomes the fact that Dr. Manuel Elkin Patarroyo of Colombia generously offered to donate the full licence rights of his vaccine SPF-66 to the World Health Organization in June 1993;

"7. Notes that there is still a great need to increase resources despite a concerted international effort launched by the World Health Organization and other relevant regional and international bodies to mobilize the necessary resources to control malaria world wide;

"8. Appeals to the international community, international organizations, multilateral financial institutions, specialized agencies, organs and programmes of the United Nations system and non-governmental organizations as well as all interested groups to provide developing countries, in particular African countries, with technical, medical and

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financial assistance commensurate with the efforts needed to control this endemic disease;

"9. Requests the Director-General of the World Health Organization, as the lead agency in this field, to mobilize organizations, agencies, organs and programmes of the United Nations system in order to provide technical, medical and financial assistance for preventive action and intensification of the struggle against malaria, and also requests him to coordinate all activities in the field;

"10. Requests the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its fiftieth session the report of the Director-General of the World Health Organization, to be prepared in collaboration with other relevant organizations, agencies, organs and programmes of the United Nations system, on the implementation of the present resolution, including, inter alia, answers to the many questions that still need to be addressed, as well as the utilization of an effective malaria vaccine in an integrated approach, together with other malaria-control tools, including drugs and insecticide-impregnated bed nets."

34. At the 31st meeting, on 1 December, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Raiko Raichev (Bulgaria), informed the Committee of the results of informal consultations held on draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.26, and drew the Committee's attention to a revised draft resolution contained in document A/C.2/49/L.26/Rev.1.

35. At the same meeting, the representative of Algeria, on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China, informed the Committee that Belgium, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Luxembourg, Portugal, Spain, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the United States of America had joined in sponsoring the revised draft resolution.

36. Before the adoption of the revised draft resolution, a statement was made by the representative of the Division for Policy Coordination and Economic and Social Council Affairs, Department for Policy Coordination and Sustainable Development.

37. At its 31st meeting, on 1 December, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.26/Rev.1 without a vote (see para. 49, draft resolution VII).

38. After the adoption of the revised draft resolution, statements were made by the representatives of the Sudan and Colombia (see A/C.2/49/SR.31).

#### I. Draft resolutions A/C.2/49/L.35 and L.78

39. At the 29th meeting, on 23 November, the representative of Morocco, on behalf of Argentina, Benin, Cameroon, the Comoros, the Congo, Djibouti, Lesotho, Morocco, Mozambique, Senegal, South Africa, Togo, Tunisia and Zaire, subsequently joined by Gabon, Israel, Jordan, Kenya, Malawi and Mongolia,

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introduced a draft resolution entitled "World Conference on Public Administration and Development" (A/C.2/49/L.35), which read as follows:

"World Conference on Public Administration  
and Development"

"The General Assembly,

"Considering that the political and economic upheavals of recent years place new responsibilities on public administrations, especially to develop basic infrastructural facilities, promote social development, combat socio-economic disparities, and prepare appropriate conditions by expanding the private sector,

"Recognizing the need to modernize public administrative structures in order to ensure a civil service that is close to the citizens and to provide quality services,

"Considering that any sustainable economic and social development must be backed by an efficient, competent, and responsible administration,

"Considering also that investment in human resources constitutes the essential basis for sustainable development and a principal factor for progress and welfare,

"Considering further that initiatives to reform their public administrations taken by the developing countries in the context of structural adjustment programmes have not always been based on a policy conceived and defined for the long term,

"Realizing that it is necessary for countries to initiate concrete policies for the civil service in order to meet the challenges posed by sustainable development at the national level,

"Recognizing the crucial importance of a proper balance and a complementarity between the public and private sectors,

"Considering finally that a strategy should be defined at the international level with regard to the role of public administrations in development,

"1. Registers its satisfaction at the Tangier Declaration, 4/ adopted by the Pan-African Conference of Ministers of the Civil Service held in Morocco on 20 and 21 June 1994;

"2. Decides to convene in 1997 a World Conference on Administration and Development for one week and at the highest possible level;

"3. Decides also to establish a General Assembly Preparatory Committee for the World Conference on Administration and Development, open to all States Members of the United Nations and members of the specialized agencies, and to authorize observers to participate in its work, in accordance with established practice;

"4. Decides that the Preparatory Committee shall hold two sessions of one week each at United Nations Headquarters in New York in 1995 and 1996;

"5. Decides also that the Preparatory Committee shall elect a chairman, three vice-chairmen and a rapporteur;

"6. Requests the Secretary-General to prepare a report to the Preparatory Committee giving recommendations on measures to be taken as part of the preparations for the World Conference on Administration and Development, bearing in mind the provisions of this resolution;

"7. Decides that the Preparatory Committee is to draw up the provisional agenda for the Conference and prepare draft decisions for submission to the Conference for consideration and adoption;

"8. Invites all States to take an active part in the preparations for the Conference;

"9. Requests interested non-governmental organizations in consultative status with the Economic and Social Council to contribute, as appropriate, to the work of the Preparatory Committee for the Conference and to the work of the Conference;

"10. Decides that the preparations for the Conference and the Conference itself shall be financed from the regular budget of the United Nations, without prejudice to ongoing activities and without excluding the possibility of obtaining funds from extrabudgetary sources;

"11. Requests the Secretary-General and the Chairman of the Preparatory Committee to make a progress report on the work of the Preparatory Committee to the General Assembly at its fiftieth and fifty-first sessions;

"12. Decides to place on the provisional agenda of its fiftieth and fifty-first sessions an item entitled 'World Conference on Public Administration and Development'."

40. At its 35th meeting, on 13 December, the Committee had before it draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.78 entitled "Public administration and development", submitted by the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Raiko Raichev (Bulgaria), on the basis of informal consultations held on draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.35, and orally revised the text as follows: in the second line of the eighth preambular paragraph, the phrase "to the appropriate authorities within the national context" was deleted.

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41. Before the adoption of the draft resolution, statements were made by the representatives of Morocco and France (see A/C.2/49/SR.35).

42. At its 35th meeting, on 13 December, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.78, as orally revised, without a vote (see para. 49, draft resolution VIII).

43. After the adoption of the draft resolution, statements were made by the representatives of China and Malaysia (A/C.2/49/SR.35).

44. In the light of the adoption of draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.78, draft resolution A/C.2/49/L.35 was withdrawn by its sponsors.

J. Documents relating to the report of the Economic and Social Council

45. At its 35th meeting, on 13 December, on the proposal of the Chairman, the Committee decided to recommend to the General Assembly that it take note of the reports under the item on which no draft proposals had been submitted (see para. 50, draft decision I).

K. Consideration of the draft biennial programme of work of the Second Committee for 1995-1996

46. At the 35th meeting, on 13 December, the representative of the Secretariat introduced and read out corrections to the draft biennial programme of work of the Second Committee for 1995-1996 (A/C.2/49/L.63, annex).

47. During consideration of the draft programme of work, statements were made and questions raised by the representatives of Algeria (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China), Ukraine, Tunisia and Benin (see A/C.2/49/SR.35). The representative of the Secretariat responded to questions.

48. At its 35th meeting, on 13 December, the Committee approved the draft biennial programme of work of the Second Committee for 1995-1996, as orally corrected, and decided to recommend it to the General Assembly for adoption (see para. 50, draft decision II).

III. RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SECOND COMMITTEE

49. The Second Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following draft resolutions:

DRAFT RESOLUTION I

Commemoration of the millennium of the Kyrgyz  
national epic, Manas

The General Assembly,

Considering that 1995 is the year that marks the millennium of the Kyrgyz national epic, Manas, which corresponds to the principles of the World Decade for Cultural Development, 1988-1997, 5/

Recalling resolution 27 C/13.22 of the General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, concerning the commemoration of anniversaries during the biennium 1994-1995,

Taking into consideration that the Manas epic has been a vital link in sustaining and unifying the peoples of the Central Asian region throughout their long history,

Recognizing that the epic is not only the source of the Kyrgyz language and literature but also the foundation of the cultural, moral, historical, social and religious traditions of the Kyrgyz people,

Bearing in mind that the epic promotes widely shared ideals and values of humanity,

Mindful of the contribution that the commemoration of the millennium of the Manas epic can make to the cultural and human heritage and to the furtherance of international cooperation and understanding,

Noting the freedom-loving legacy of the epic for the nations of the region,

Noting also the ideals and principles contained in the "Memory of the World" programme of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization,

1. Recognizes 1995 as the year commemorating the millennium of the Kyrgyz national epic, Manas;

2. Welcomes the fact that the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization has assumed the role of lead organization for the commemoration of the millennium of the Manas epic;

3. Encourages the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, in cooperation with the Government of Kyrgyzstan and other interested international organizations, to take all appropriate measures to observe 1995 as the year commemorating the millennium of the Manas epic;

4. Takes note with satisfaction of the international activities undertaken by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization in collaboration with the Government of the Kyrgyz Republic to spread international knowledge of the legacy of the Manas epic.

## DRAFT RESOLUTION II

### Integration of the Commission on Transnational Corporations into the institutional machinery of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development

The General Assembly,

Reaffirming its resolution 47/212 B of 6 May 1993, adopted in the context of the ongoing restructuring of the United Nations in the economic and social fields, and endorsing the Secretary-General's decision to consolidate all activities related to transnational corporations within the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development,

Recognizing the key role of international investment, as well as the role of other international market-driven capital flows, in the promotion of global economic growth and development,

Affirming the unique value to the international community of the United Nations intergovernmental deliberations on such issues,

Recognizing the need for improved efficiency and effectiveness within the United Nations system in addressing international investment issues, and recognizing that such improvements are attainable through improved rationalization of both United Nations intergovernmental meetings and Secretariat resources,

Considering the relocation in 1993 of the Transnational Corporations and Management Division of the former Department of Economic and Social Development of the United Nations Secretariat to the secretariat of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development as the Division on Transnational Corporations and Investment,

Bearing in mind the work of the Commission on Transnational Corporations over its past twenty sessions and that, in recent years, the activities of the Commission have placed greater emphasis on the contribution of transnational corporations to economic growth and development, strengthening cooperation between host developing countries and transnational corporations, facilitating flows of foreign direct investment, and exploring linkages among capital flows, technology dissemination and acquisitions, and trade in goods and services, as

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well as the fact that this shift has resulted in an increase in the number of elements common to the Commission's activities and those of the Trade and Development Board and its subsidiary bodies,

Mindful of the need to avoid unnecessary duplication of work among United Nations bodies,

Bearing in mind Economic and Social Council resolution 1913 (LVII) of 5 December 1974, in particular paragraphs 3 and 4 thereof, the document entitled "A New Partnership for Development: The Cartagena Commitment", 6/ adopted by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development at its eighth session, held at Cartagena de Indias, Colombia, from 8 to 25 February 1992, and General Assembly resolution 47/183 of 22 December 1993, in which the Assembly reaffirmed the important role of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, inter alia, as the most appropriate focal point within the United Nations for the integrated treatment of development and interrelated issues in key areas, including trade, commodities, finance, investment, services and technology, in the interests of all countries, particularly those of developing countries,

1. Decides that the Commission on Transnational Corporations should become a commission of the Trade and Development Board and be renamed the Commission on International Investment and Transnational Corporations;

2. Requests the Trade and Development Board to address urgently the question of orienting the programme of work of the Commission on International Investment and Transnational Corporations on the basis of recommendations made by the Commission on Transnational Corporations at its twentieth session that the Board should orient the work in such a way as to attract the attendance of relevant senior public sector officials, whenever possible, as well as private sector representatives, and that the work should include:

(a) Promoting the exchange of views and experience among interested Governments, businesses, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations, trade unions and experts on issues relating to international investment, transnational corporations and the creation of an enabling environment for private sector and enterprise development;

(b) Reviewing and providing guidance to the Secretariat with regard to its research activities and the provision of information on policies, programmes and developments related to international investment and transnational corporations and the creation of an enabling environment for private sector and enterprise development;

(c) Reviewing and providing guidance to the Secretariat on technical assistance to Governments interested in developing investment regimes and enabling environments so as to attract more foreign investment and support for

enterprise developments, thereby contributing to economic growth and development of host countries;

3. Requests the Secretary-General to restore in full the resources of the programme on transnational corporations as originally allocated in the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1994-1995 and in accordance with General Assembly resolution 48/228 A of 23 December 1993;

4. Invites Member States and interested parties to increase financial support for technical cooperation, consultative and advisory services, training, research and information activities in the field of foreign investment;

5. Decides that the Commission will keep under review the work of the Intergovernmental Working Group of Experts on International Standards of Accounting and Reporting, whose next session is to be held at Geneva in the first half of 1995;

6. Also decides that the next session of the Commission should be held at Geneva in the first half of 1995.

#### DRAFT RESOLUTION III

##### Question of declaring 1998 International Year of the Ocean

The General Assembly,

Recalling Economic and Social Council resolution 1994/48 of 29 July 1994,

Proclaims 1998 International Year of the Ocean.

#### DRAFT RESOLUTION IV

##### Economic and social repercussions of the Israeli settlements on the Palestinian people in the Palestinian territory, including Jerusalem, occupied since 1967, and on the Arab population of the Syrian Golan

The General Assembly,

Recalling Economic and Social Council resolution 1994/45 of 29 July 1994,

Reaffirming the principle of the permanent sovereignty of people under foreign occupation over their national resources,

Guided by the principles of the Charter of the United Nations, affirming the inadmissibility of the acquisition of territory by force and recalling Security Council resolutions 242 (1967) of 22 November 1967 and 497 (1981) of 17 December 1981,

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Recalling Security Council resolution 465 (1980) of 1 March 1980 and other resolutions affirming the applicability of the Geneva Convention relative to the Protection of Civilian Persons in Time of War, of 12 August 1949, 7/ to the occupied Palestinian territory, including Jerusalem, and other Arab territories occupied by Israel since 1967,

Recalling also Security Council resolution 904 (1994) of 18 March 1994, in which, among other things, the Council called upon Israel, the occupying Power, to continue to take and implement measures, including, inter alia, confiscation of arms, with the aim of preventing illegal acts of violence by Israeli settlers and called for measures to be taken to guarantee the safety and protection of the Palestinian civilians in the occupied territory,

Aware of the negative and grave economic and social repercussions of the Israeli settlements on the Palestinian people in the Palestinian territory, occupied since 1967, including Jerusalem, and on the Arab population of the Syrian Golan,

Welcoming the ongoing Middle East peace process started at Madrid, in particular the signing of the first implementation agreement of the Declaration of Principles, on the Gaza Strip and Jericho area, in Cairo on 4 May 1994, between the Government of Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization, the representative of the Palestinian people, 8/

1. Takes note of the note by the Secretary-General; 9/
2. Reaffirms that Israeli settlements in the Palestinian territory, including Jerusalem, and other Arab territories occupied since 1967, are illegal and an obstacle to economic and social development;
3. Recognizes the economic and social repercussions of the Israeli settlements on the Palestinian people in the Palestinian territory occupied by Israel since 1967, including Jerusalem, and on the Arab population of the Syrian Golan;
4. Reaffirms the inalienable right of the Palestinian people and the population of the Syrian Golan to their natural and all other economic resources, and regards any infringement thereof as being illegal;
5. Requests the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its fiftieth session, through the Economic and Social Council, a report on the progress made in the implementation of the present resolution.

DRAFT RESOLUTION V

Report of the Committee for Development Planning: general  
review of the list of the least developed countries

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolutions 45/206 of 21 December 1990 and 46/206 of 20 December 1991,

Noting Economic and Social Council decision 1994/225 of 14 July 1994 on the report of the Committee for Development Planning on its twenty-ninth session, 10/ in which the Council decided to transmit the recommendations contained in chapter V, section B, of that report to the General Assembly at its forty-ninth session for approval,

Noting with concern the increase in the number of least developed countries, particularly in Africa, and underlining the importance of the creation of a conducive international economic environment for the growth and development of developing countries, particularly the least developed countries,

Recognizing that the decision to include any country in the group of least developed countries should be made with that country's due consent,

1. Takes note of the general review of the list of the least developed countries carried out by the Committee for Development Planning, 11/ with a view to identifying which countries should be included in or graduated from the group of least developed countries;

2. Endorses the recommendations of the Committee to add Angola and Eritrea to the list of the least developed countries and to graduate Botswana from the list with immediate effect. 12/

DRAFT RESOLUTION VI

Strengthening information systems for Africa's  
recovery and sustainable development

The General Assembly,

Aware of the importance of information systems and technology for Africa's recovery and sustainable development,

Recalling Economic and Social Council resolution 1994/42 of 29 July 1994, in which the Council invited the General Assembly to review the programme budget for the biennium 1994-1995 13/ with a view to permitting the delivery of the activities of the subprogramme of the Economic Commission for Africa on statistical and information systems development, and also recalling General Assembly decision 48/453 of 21 December 1993, in which the Assembly agreed to ensure the provision of adequate staffing and resources in the subprogramme,

Endorses resolution 789 (XXIX) of 4 May 1994 of the Conference of Ministers of the Economic Commission for Africa, 14/ and requests the Secretary-General fully to implement the resolution within existing United Nations resources.

#### DRAFT RESOLUTION VII

##### Preventive action and intensification of the struggle against malaria in developing countries, particularly in Africa

The General Assembly,

Reaffirming the agreed conclusions of the coordination segment of the substantive session of 1993 of the Economic and Social Council on the coordination of the policies and activities of the specialized agencies and other bodies of the United Nations system in the fields of preventive action and intensification of the struggle against malaria and diarrhoeal diseases, in particular cholera, 15/

Recalling Economic and Social Council resolution 1994/34 of 29 July 1994, including preventive action and intensification of the struggle against malaria in developing countries, particularly in Africa,

Acknowledging the importance for endemically affected countries of having a modern strategy to control this most deadly of all tropical diseases, which annually causes more than one million deaths world wide and nine hundred thousand deaths in Africa,

Deeply concerned by the development of more than three hundred million new cases of malaria annually and by the emergence of a new type of drug-resistant malaria,

Noting with concern that a major problem complicating malaria treatment and thereby contributing to malaria-related mortality is the continuous intensification and spread of parasite resistance to anti-malarial drugs,

Noting with regret that chloroquine, which traditionally has been prescribed both for prophylaxis and for curative purposes, can no longer be totally relied upon,

Recognizing that malaria-related deaths in the world could be prevented, if appropriate health services were made available in endemically affected countries,

1. Endorses the new Global Malaria Control Strategy of the World Health Organization, endorsed in 1992 by the Ministerial Conference on Malaria, held in Amsterdam, the Netherlands, which aims to prevent mortality and reduce morbidity as well as social and economic losses due to malaria;

2. Recognizes that, where the disease is most prevalent, malaria-related problems vary enormously from situation to situation owing to epidemiological, social, economic and operational factors;

3. Stresses that to achieve the objectives of the Strategy will require the progressive improvement and strengthening of local, national, regional and international capabilities, especially with the aim of enhancing partnership and coordination efforts, involving sectors like education, agriculture and the environment, as well as integrating activities with those on related diseases;

4. Notes with appreciation the continued efforts undertaken by Governments to control the disease, in spite of their meagre resources, including the actions they have taken to stop its outbreak through the widespread spraying of insecticide and by making available appropriate anti-malarial products;

5. Welcomes the fact that the World Health Organization has recently increased its commitment to malaria control, especially in Africa, where the overwhelming majority both of cases and of deaths occur;

6. Also welcomes the fact that Dr. Manuel Elkin Patarroyo of Colombia generously offered to donate the full licence rights of his vaccine SPF-66 to the World Health Organization in June 1993;

7. Notes that there is still a great need to increase resources despite a concerted international effort launched by the World Health Organization and other relevant regional and international bodies to mobilize the necessary resources to control malaria world wide;

8. Calls for continued support, in particular for the United Nations Development Programme/World Bank/World Health Organization special programme for research and training in tropical diseases and to the Division of Control of Tropical Diseases of the World Health Organization;

9. Appeals to the international community, international organizations, multilateral financial institutions, specialized agencies, organs and programmes of the United Nations system and non-governmental organizations as well as all interested groups to provide developing countries, in particular African countries, with technical, medical and financial assistance commensurate with the efforts needed to control this endemic disease;

10. Invites the Director-General of the World Health Organization, as the lead agency in this field, to promote the mobilization of organizations, agencies, organs and programmes of the United Nations system in order to provide technical, medical and financial assistance for preventive action and intensification of the struggle against malaria, and to elaborate a plan of action detailing the coordination of all related activities in this field;

11. Requests the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its fiftieth session the report of the Director-General of the World Health Organization, to be prepared in collaboration with other relevant organizations, agencies, organs and programmes of the United Nations system, on the implementation of the present resolution, including, inter alia, answers to the many questions that still need to be addressed, as well as the utilization of an effective malaria vaccine in an integrated approach, together with other malaria-control tools, including the incorporation of appropriate technologies for malaria control, with specific attention to the results of scientific investigations concerning the latest developments in this field.

#### DRAFT RESOLUTION VIII

##### Public administration and development

The General Assembly,

Recognizing the important role that Governments and public administrations can play in addressing new responsibilities arising from the pursuit of sustained economic growth and sustainable development in all countries, including, inter alia, developing basic infrastructural facilities, promoting social development, combating socio-economic disparities and poverty, preparing, as appropriate, conditions for the private sector and protecting the environment,

Recognizing also the need for strengthened public administrative capacities in order to ensure a civil service that is responsive to the needs of the people and that provides quality services,

Affirming that States have the sovereign right and responsibility to decide, in accordance with their own development strategies, needs and priorities, on their public administration,

Considering that efficient and competent national administrations, responsible to their own people, should support sustained economic growth and sustainable development,

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Considering also that the development of human resources constitutes an essential basis for sustained economic growth and sustainable development and a principal factor of progress and welfare,

Considering further that some initiatives to reform their public administrations taken by certain countries in the context of structural adjustment programmes have not always been based on a policy conceived and defined for the long term,

Recognizing the important and mutually complementary roles that can be played by the public and private sectors in sustained economic growth and sustained development,

Recognizing also the importance of efficient and competent public administration, responsible to its own people, for the successful implementation of economic reforms in all countries, in particular in the countries with economies in transition,

Emphasizing the importance of international cooperation in supporting the national efforts of developing countries in capacity-building in public administration for development,

Acknowledging the importance of the activities in the framework of the United Nations programme in public administration and finance for enhancing efficiency of public administration, in particular in developing countries and countries with economies in transition,

Acknowledging also the importance of exchanging views and experiences in order to promote a better understanding of the role of public administration in development and to enhance international cooperation in this field,

1. Takes note of the Tangier Declaration, 16/ adopted by the Pan-African Conference of Ministers of the Civil Service, held in Morocco on 20 and 21 June 1994;

2. Decides to resume in March-April 1996 its fiftieth session in order to examine the question "Public administration and development", exchange experiences, review the activities of the United Nations in this field and make recommendations, as appropriate;

3. Invites all States to participate actively in the resumed session and to be represented at the highest possible level;

4. Requests the Group of Experts on Public Administration and Finance to contribute, through the Economic and Social Council, to the work of its resumed session, based on the experience gained in assisting developing countries and countries with economies in transition in capacity-building in public administration for development;

5. Requests the United Nations Development Programme and other relevant United Nations organizations to contribute, through the Economic and Social Council, to the work of its resumed session;

6. Invites interested non-governmental organizations to contribute, as appropriate, to the work of its resumed session;

7. Requests the Secretary-General to submit a consolidated report, through the Economic and Social Council, to the General Assembly at its resumed session, containing an analysis of the role of public administration in development and recommendations for strengthening the role of the United Nations in public administration and development for the benefit of interested developing countries and countries with economies in transition;

8. Invites the regional commissions of the United Nations to consider in 1995 the role of public administration in development and to report, through the Economic and Social Council, to the General Assembly at its resumed session;

9. Decides to recommend to the Economic and Social Council at its organizational session to include in the provisional agenda of its substantive session of 1995 a sub-item entitled "Public administration and development", under the item "Programme activities";

10. Also decides to include in the provisional agenda of its fiftieth session a sub-item entitled "Public administration and development", under the item "Report of the Economic and Social Council".
