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ORGANIZATION OF THE FORTY-EIGHTH REGULAR SESSION OF THE GENERAL
ASSEMBLY, ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA AND ALLOCATION OF ITEMSFirst report of the General Committee

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I. INTRODUCTION

1. At its 1st and 2nd meetings, on 22 September 1993, the General Committee considered a memorandum by the Secretary-General relating to the organization of the forty-eighth regular session and future sessions of the General Assembly, the adoption of the agenda and the allocation of items (A/BUR/48/1 and Add.1). A summary of the discussion will appear in the summary records of the meetings (A/BUR/48/SR.1 and 2).

2. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General in paragraph 3 of his memorandum (A/BUR/48/1), the General Committee draws the attention of the General Assembly to the provisions reproduced in annexes V, VI, VII and VIII of its rules of procedure.

3. The General Committee took note of General Assembly resolution 47/233 of 17 August 1993, whereby the Assembly, *inter alia*, established a new Special Political and Decolonization Committee and recommended that, pending further consideration of the revitalization process, the agenda items previously allocated to the former Special Political Committee and the former Fourth Committee be allocated to the new Special Political and Decolonization Committee (*ibid.*, para. 4).

4. The General Committee also took note of the statement made by the Secretary-General to the Fifth Committee on 26 August 1993 (see A/C.5/47/SR.71), regarding the current financial situation of the United Nations and the need to introduce certain measures affecting conference services (A/BUR/48/1, para. 5). In this connection, the Committee took note of a letter dated 20 September 1993 from the Chairman of the Committee on Conferences to the President of the General Assembly (A/48/416).

II. ORGANIZATION OF THE SESSION

A. General Committee

5. The General Committee took note of the General Assembly decisions relevant to its work which were brought to the Committee's attention by the Secretary-General in paragraph 6 of his memorandum (A/BUR/48/1).

B. Rationalization of work

6. The General Committee took note (*ibid.*, paras. 7 and 8) of the measures undertaken by the Secretary-General in pursuance of the goal of renewal and reform, in particular to recommendations 2, 3 and 7 of the Group of High-level Intergovernmental Experts to Review the Efficiency of the Administrative and Financial Functioning of the United Nations ^{1/} as reflected in his progress

reports on the implementation of General Assembly resolution 41/213 (A/42/234, A/43/286, A/44/222) as well as a supplementary report submitted to the forty-fifth session of the Assembly (A/45/226). The Committee also took note of Assembly resolution 46/232 of 2 March 1992 on the revitalization of the United Nations Secretariat, resolution 46/235 of 13 April 1992 on the restructuring and revitalization of the United Nations in the economic, social and related fields and resolution 47/233 of 17 August 1993 on the revitalization of the work of the General Assembly. The Committee furthermore took note of the statement of the Secretary-General to the Fifth Committee on 26 August 1993.

7. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/48/1, para. 9), the General Committee draws the attention of the General Assembly to the fact that meetings requiring services to be held at Headquarters will be limited to those that can be serviced within the regular personnel establishment. This will allow no more than 63 meetings a week with services; 10 meetings per week will be kept for the Security Council and 53 meetings for the General Assembly. There will be little possibility of servicing informal consultations or working groups, or meetings of regional or other groups of Member States. It is essential that available conference services should be utilized to the full.

8. The General Committee took note of the fact that measures introduced to reduce costs relating to overtime will be strictly enforced.

C. Closing date of the session

9. In accordance with the provisions of rule 2 of the rules of procedure, the General Committee recommends to the General Assembly that the forty-eighth session should recess not later than Tuesday, 21 December 1993, and close on Monday, 19 September 1994. The Committee also recommends to the Assembly that all the Main Committees should start their work as soon as possible and make every effort to complete their work by Friday, 3 December 1993.

D. Schedule of meetings

10. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/48/1, para. 12), the General Committee recommends to the General Assembly that morning meetings should start at 10 a.m. promptly for all plenary meetings and meetings of the Main Committees during the forty-eighth session.

11. Also at the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid.), the General Committee draws the attention of the General Assembly to the fact that services will not be available beyond 6 p.m. for week-day meetings of the Assembly - plenary meetings and Main Committees - as well as for meetings on week-ends. These measures will not apply to plenary meetings during the general debate.

12. Also at the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 13), the General Committee recommends that, in order to avoid the late start of meetings, the General Assembly should waive the requirement of the presence of at least one third of the members to declare a plenary meeting open and permit the debate to proceed and one quarter of the members to declare a meeting of the Main Committee open and permit the debate to proceed. This recommendation is made on

the understanding that such a waiver would not imply any permanent change in the provisions of rules 67 and 108 of the rules of procedure and that the requirement of the presence of a majority of the members for any decision to be taken would be maintained.

13. In this connection, the General Committee also recommends to the General Assembly that delegations should be reminded of the utmost importance of punctuality in the interest of ensuring an effective and orderly organization of work and achieving economies for the United Nations.

E. General debate

14. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., paras. 15 and 16), the General Committee recommends that:

(a) The general debate should begin on Monday, 27 September and end on Thursday, 14 October 1993;

(b) The list of speakers in the general debate should be closed on Wednesday, 29 September, at 6 p.m.

15. On the proposal of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 17), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to the decision taken by the Assembly at previous sessions, namely that the practice of expressing congratulations inside the General Assembly Hall after a speech had been delivered was prohibited. The Committee recommends to the Assembly that the provision should also apply at the forty-eighth session. In this connection, the Committee also recommends to the Assembly that speakers in the general debate, after delivering their statements, should leave the Assembly Hall through room GA-200 located behind the podium before returning to their seats.

F. Explanations of vote, right of reply, points of order and length of statements

16. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 18), the General Committee draws the attention of the General Assembly to paragraphs 6, 7 and 8 of its decision 34/401 (A/520/Rev.15, annex VI), which read as follows:

"6. Explanations of vote should be limited to ten minutes.

"7. When the same draft resolution is considered in a Main Committee and in plenary meeting, a delegation should, as far as possible, explain its vote only once, i.e., either in the Committee or in plenary meeting, unless that delegation's vote in plenary meeting is different from its vote in the Committee.

"8. Delegations should exercise their right of reply at the end of the day whenever two meetings have been scheduled for that day and whenever such meetings are devoted to the consideration of the same item."

17. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/48/1, para. 19), the General Committee, in line with time-limits for explanations of vote and right of reply, recommends to the General Assembly that points of order should be limited to five minutes.

18. Furthermore, in connection with the length of statements, with a view to streamlining the procedures of the General Assembly and as a cost-saving measure, the General Committee draws the attention of the Assembly, as it did at recent sessions, to rules 72 and 114 of the rules of procedure and paragraph 22 of annex VI thereto for appropriate action in plenary meeting and the Main Committees.

G. Records of meetings

19. The General Committee took note of the fact that verbatim records will be provided during the forty-eighth session for the plenary meetings of the General Assembly and summary records will be provided for the meetings of the General Committee and the Main Committees of the Assembly (ibid., para. 21).

20. In this connection, the General Committee recommends to the General Assembly that the practice not to reproduce in extenso statements made in a Main Committee should be maintained for the forty-eighth session (ibid., para. 22).

H. Concluding statements

21. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 24), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to paragraph 17 of its decision 34/401, which reads as follows:

"17. To save time at the end of the session, the practice of making concluding statements in the General Assembly and its Main Committees should be dispensed with except for statements by the presiding officers."

I. Resolutions

22. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 25), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to paragraph 32 of its decision 34/401, which reads as follows:

"32. Whenever possible, resolutions requesting the discussion of a question at a subsequent session should not call for the inclusion of a separate new item and such discussion should be held under the item under which the resolution was adopted."

23. Furthermore, at the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., paras. 26 and 27), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to recommendation 3 (f) of the Group of High-level Intergovernmental Experts, which reads as follows:

"(f) Efforts should be made to reduce the number of resolutions adopted by the General Assembly. Resolutions should request reports of the Secretary-General only in cases where that would be indispensable for facilitating the implementation of these resolutions or the continued examination of the question."

The Committee also draws the attention of the General Assembly to paragraphs 1 and 10 of the annex to resolution 45/45 (A/520/Rev.15 and Amend.1, annex VIII).

24. In this connection, the General Committee recommends to the General Assembly that the Assembly should exercise maximum restraint in making requests or proposals that may incur additional expenditure for the Organization.

J. Documentation

25. On the proposal of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/48/1, para. 29), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to paragraph 28 of its decision 34/401, which reads as follows:

"28. The General Assembly, including its Main Committees, should merely take note of those reports of the Secretary-General or subsidiary organs which do not require a decision by the Assembly and should neither debate nor adopt resolutions on them, unless specifically requested to do so by the Secretary-General or the organ concerned."

26. The General Committee took note of the fact that, despite the provisions adopted by the General Assembly to control and limit documentation, the volume of pre-session documentation has consistently increased in recent years, without any strengthening of resources, thus contributing to serious delays in the issuance of documentation (ibid., para. 30).

27. The General Committee also took note of the fact that, in view of the current grave financial crisis facing the United Nations, only two copies of official documents will be distributed to permanent missions and that the practice of simultaneous distribution of documents in all languages will be modified. As working languages of the Secretariat, the English and French versions of pre-session documents will be issued simultaneously. Documents in the other language versions will be issued later, if they are not ready at the same time. Draft resolutions and decisions and the reports of the Main Committees will continue to be distributed simultaneously in all languages (ibid., para. 31). In this connection, the General Committee draws the attention of the Assembly to the fact that, following statements by several delegations expressing concern regarding these measures, the President of the General Assembly undertook to discuss the matter with the Secretary-General in order to find a solution.

K. Questions related to the programme budget

28. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., paras. 32 and 33), who referred to rule 153 of the rules of procedure, the General Committee draws the

General Assembly's attention to paragraphs 12 and 13 of its decision 34/401, which read as follows:

"12. It is imperative that Main Committees should allow sufficient time for the preparation of the estimate of expenditures by the Secretariat and for its consideration by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions and the Fifth Committee and that they should take this requirement into account when they adopt their programme of work.

"13. Furthermore:

"(a) A mandatory deadline, not later than 1 December, should be established for the submission to the Fifth Committee of all draft resolutions with financial implications;

"(b) The Fifth Committee should, as a general practice, consider accepting without debate the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions on the financial implications of draft resolutions up to a prescribed limit, namely, \$25,000 on any one item;

"(c) Firm deadlines should be set for the early submission of the reports of subsidiary organs which require consideration by the Fifth Committee;

"(d) A minimum period of forty-eight hours should be allowed between the submission and the voting of a proposal involving expenditure in order to allow the Secretary-General to prepare and present the related statement of administrative and financial implications."

The General Committee also draws the attention of the Assembly to paragraph 6 of its resolution 35/10 A of 3 November 1980, which reads as follows:

"6. Decides that all proposals affecting the schedule of conferences and meetings made at sessions of the General Assembly shall be reviewed by the Committee on Conferences when administrative implications are being considered under the requirements of rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the Assembly."

29. Also at the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 32), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to regulation 4.9 of the Regulations Governing Programme Planning, the Programme Aspects of the Budget, the Monitoring of Implementation and the Methods of Evaluation (resolution 37/234, annex), which reads as follows:

"Regulation 4.9. No Council, Commission or other competent body shall take a decision involving either a change in the programme budget approved by the General Assembly or the possible requirement of expenditure unless it has received and taken account of a report from the Secretary-General on the programme budget implications of the proposal."

30. In connection with subparagraph 13 (d) of decision 34/401 quoted above, the General Committee wishes to draw the attention of the General Assembly to the

observations of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/48/1, paras. 34 and 35), regarding the fact that, depending on the type and complexity of proposals involving changes in the work-programme and additional expenditures, the preparation of a statement of programme budget implications by the Secretary-General may take a few days. In addition, the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions and the Fifth Committee need adequate time to review the programme budget implications of a draft resolution before the latter can be acted on by the Assembly. The Secretary-General thus considers it desirable that Member States submit proposals involving statements of programme budget implications sufficiently in advance to avoid the cancellation of meetings and the postponement of consideration of items.

L. Observances and commemorative meetings

31. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 36), the General Committee recommends to the General Assembly that, allowing for the necessary flexibility and with the exception of the anniversary of the United Nations, the Assembly adopt the following format for commemorative meetings: statements by the President of the General Assembly and the Secretary-General, statements by the chairmen of the five regional groups and by the representative of the host country. The Committee also recommends that consideration be given to limiting each statement to 15 minutes.

32. The General Committee further recommends, at the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 37), that observances and commemorative meetings should take place, as far as possible, immediately following the general debate. The advantage of such a procedure is that it may facilitate the participation of dignitaries attending the general debate. This procedure would also allow advance planning of the Assembly's work.

M. Special conferences

33. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/48/1, para. 38), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to recommendation 6 of the Committee on Conferences, adopted by the Assembly in paragraph (b) of its decision 34/405, which reads as follows:

"(b) The Committee, taking into account difficulties encountered in ensuring adequate preparation of meetings, including timely distribution of documentation, as well as the ability of Member States to participate fully, recommends that the General Assembly should instruct the Main Committees to review the number of special conferences of the United Nations already proposed and scheduled in their respective fields of activity prior to deciding upon the scheduling of new and additional special conferences, thus bearing in mind the relevant portions of General Assembly resolution 33/55."

The General Committee also draws the Assembly's attention to recommendation 2 (d) of the Group of High-level Intergovernmental Experts, which reads as follows:

/...

"Until 1978, a number of resolutions had requested that only one major conference be scheduled annually. The decision of the General Assembly that no more than five special conferences should take place in a given year and that no more than one special conference should be convened at the same time should be strictly implemented."

34. Furthermore, at the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 39), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to the relevant provisions of recommendation 4 of the Group of High-level Intergovernmental Experts which reads as follows:

"The existing principle that United Nations bodies should meet at their respective established headquarters, as provided for in General Assembly resolution 40/243 of 18 December 1985, should be strictly enforced. Whenever the Assembly accepts an invitation from the Government of a Member State to hold a conference or meeting away from established headquarters, the additional cost should be borne in full by that Government. The methods of budgeting these costs should be improved so as to ensure that all additional costs are accounted for."

N. Meetings of subsidiary organs

35. The General Committee, in the light of recommendations submitted by the Committee on Conferences (A/48/417), recommends to the General Assembly, on the strict understanding that meetings would have to be accommodated within available facilities and services, that the following subsidiary organs should be authorized to meet during the forty-eighth session:

- (a) Advisory Committee on the United Nations Educational and Training Programme for Southern Africa;
- (b) Committee for Programme and Coordination;
- (c) Committee of Trustees of the United Nations Trust Fund for South Africa;
- (d) Committee on Conferences;
- (e) Committee on Relations with the Host Country;
- (f) Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People;
- (g) Executive Board of the United Nations Children's Fund;
- (h) Intergovernmental Group to Monitor the Supply and Shipping of Oil and Petroleum Products to South Africa;
- (i) Preparatory Committee for the Fiftieth Anniversary of the United Nations;
- (j) Special Committee against Apartheid;

(k) Special Committee to Select the Winners of the United Nations Human Rights Prize;

(l) Working Group on the Financing of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East.

III. OBSERVATIONS AND PROPOSALS ON THE ORGANIZATION OF FUTURE SESSIONS

36. The General Committee took note of the views of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/48/1, paras. 40 and 41). The agenda of the General Assembly reflects the concern of Member States with a myriad of issues spanning political, economic, social and financial fields. The growing complexity of many global issues and their increasingly interdisciplinary nature pose a challenge to the Organization's ability to respond swiftly. The Assembly is faced with many items that require timely and purposeful consideration, often under stringent deadlines. It is therefore imperative that it continue to improve its operating procedures so as to organize its work effectively and make optimum use of the time available.

37. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (ibid., para. 42), the General Committee recommends to the General Assembly that it consider whether the rationalization of its meetings between January and August is possible to allow advance planning for delegations and the Secretariat. During the past few years, the Assembly has met frequently between January and August. Most recently, during the forty-seventh session, it met every month from January to September. These meetings, with the exception of those related to items of the First Committee, were not envisaged in the calendar of meetings and therefore ad hoc arrangements had to be made to continue to provide adequate Secretariat services at the expense of other requirements.

IV. ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

38. The General Committee considered the draft agenda of the forty-eighth session submitted by the Secretary-General in his memorandum (A/BUR/48/1 and Add.1). All the items contained in the draft agenda formed part of the following documents:

- (a) Provisional agenda of the forty-eighth session (A/48/150 and Corr.1);
- (b) Supplementary list (A/48/200);
- (c) Requests for the inclusion of additional items (A/48/231, A/48/232).

39. The General Committee decided to recommend, as suggested by the Secretary-General (A/BUR/48/1, para. 44), that the General Assembly direct its Main Committees to review their agenda with a view to streamlining their programme of work. In particular, the Main Committees should consider:

- (a) The grouping of related items under a single heading;

(b) The staggering of items over two or more years.

40. With regard to item 38 of the draft agenda (Policies of apartheid of the Government of South Africa), the General Committee decided to recommend that the wording of the item should be changed to read "Elimination of apartheid and establishment of a united, democratic and non-racial South Africa".

41. In connection with item 41 of the draft agenda (Emergency international assistance for the reconstruction of war-stricken Afghanistan), the General Committee decided to recommend that the wording of the item should be modified to read "Emergency international assistance for peace, normalcy and reconstruction of war-stricken Afghanistan".

42. With regard to item 89 of the draft agenda (Question of the Malagasy islands of Glorieuses, Juan de Nova, Europa and Bassas da India), the General Committee decided to recommend that the consideration of the item should be deferred to the forty-ninth session and that the item should be included in the provisional agenda of that session.

43. In connection with item 121 of the draft agenda (Question of East Timor), the General Committee decided to recommend that the consideration of the item should be deferred to the forty-ninth session and that the item should be included in the provisional agenda of that session.

44. With regard to item 157 of the draft agenda (Effective realization of the right of self-determination through autonomy), the General Committee decided to recommend its inclusion as a sub-item of item 109 of the draft agenda (Right of peoples to self-determination).

45. With regard to item 158 of the draft agenda (Consideration of the exceptional situation of the Republic of China in Taiwan in the international context, based on the principle of universality and in accordance with the established model of parallel representation of divided countries at the United Nations), the General Committee decided not to recommend its inclusion.

46. Taking into account paragraphs 38 to 45 above, the General Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following agenda: 2/

V. ALLOCATION OF ITEMS

47. At the suggestion of the Secretary-General (A/BUR/48/1, para. 46), the General Committee draws the General Assembly's attention to paragraph 4 of its decision 34/401 (A/520/Rev.15, annex VI), which reads as follows:

"4. Substantive items should normally be discussed initially in a Main Committee and, therefore, items previously allocated to plenary meetings should henceforth be referred to a Main Committee unless there are compelling circumstances requiring their continued consideration in plenary meeting."

The General Committee also draws the attention of the Assembly to the relevant paragraphs of resolution 39/88 B and resolution 45/45 (A/520/Rev.15 and Amend.1, annexes VII and VIII). Paragraph 5 of the annex to resolution 39/88 B reads as follows:

"5. The Chairmen of the Main Committees should take the initiative, in the light of past experience, to propose the grouping of similar or related items and the holding of a single general debate on them."

Paragraph 6 of the annex to resolution 45/45 reads as follows:

"6. In making recommendations as to how agenda items should be allocated to the Main Committees and the plenary of the General Assembly,

/...

the General Committee should ensure the best use of the expertise of the Committees."

48. Taking into account the recommendations in section IV above regarding the inclusion of items in the agenda, the General Committee approved the allocation of items contained in paragraph 58 of the Secretary-General's memorandum (A/BUR/48/1 and Add.1) with the following modifications:

(a) Plenary meetings

The General Committee decided to recommend that the General Assembly allocate the item at an appropriate time during the session.
