APPENDIX

Letter dated 25 March 1998 from Mr. Rauf R. Denktas  
addressed to the Secretary-General

Further to my letter dated 25 January 1998 concerning the Paphos military airbase which has been taken over by the Greek Cypriot administration on 24 January for use by the Greek air force, I would like to bring to your kind attention a new disturbing development regarding the plans of the Greek Cypriot administration to establish an air force which, if pursued, would constitute a serious destabilizing factor both in the island and the region.

In a recent interview published in the Greek newspaper, Eksusia on 18 March 1998, the Greek Cypriot Defence Minister, Mr. Yannakis Omiru, stated, inter alia, that he favoured the creation of a Greek Cypriot air force and that it was now being seriously considered. It is also noteworthy in this context that, according to various sources, including the Greek Cypriot press, the permanent deployment of Greek combat aircraft which will bear the official symbol of the so-called "Republic of Cyprus" as a precaution in the face of possible international reaction, is included in the plans.

In view of the fact that such provocative steps by the Greek Cypriot side, namely, the decision to deploy S-300 missile systems in South Cyprus and the construction of the Paphos military airbase itself for the use and deployment of Greek combat aircraft, have brought the parties concerned to the threshold of new crises in the past one and a half years, recent revelations prove beyond doubt that the Greek-Greek Cypriot military moves are aimed at disturbing the existing military balance in the island the eastern Mediterranean in their favour, at all costs, and in complete violation of the international treaties governing Cyprus.

It will be appreciated that this provocative and highly adventurous stance of the Greek-Greek Cypriot front does not augur well for their intentions and is further poisoning the political atmosphere of the island at a time when goodwill and mutual trust are most needed as we are trying to establish a new basis for dialogue.

The Turkish Cypriot side is well aware of the fact that the efforts of the Greek Cypriot side, both at the military and the political front, is aimed at destroying the internal and the external balances created by the 1960 treaties between the two constituent peoples and the two motherlands respectively, and is determined to stand in the way of this Greek-Greek Cypriot aspiration.

We hope that you will do your utmost in impressing upon the Greek Cypriot leadership to abandon their current confrontational stance and refrain from taking irresponsible steps in the interest of peace and stability at this crucial juncture in the Cyprus question.
