## PETITIONS RECEIVED BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WHICH WERE CONSIDERED MANIFESTLY INCONSEQUENTIAL

(Rule 85, paragraph 4, of the Rules of Procedure  
of the Trusteeship Council)

In accordance with rule 85, paragraph 4 of the rules of procedure of the Trusteeship Council, the Secretary-General communicates herewith to the Members of the Council a list of petitions received by him during the period February to June 1955 which were considered manifestly inconsequential.<sup>1/</sup> The original documents are available to the Trusteeship Council for final disposition.

### Tanganyika

1. Letter of 25 February 1955 from Dr. Heinz Langguth, Hamburg, concerning the compensation paid to his client, Mr. Gustav von Heyer, by the Custodian of Enemy Property for assets in Tanganyika. This matter was the subject of T/PET.2/161 (Resolution 653 (XII)) and of T/COM.2/L:20 to which the Council decided that the established petitions procedure should not be applied.
2. Three letters dated 26 February and letters dated 15 March and 5 April 1955 from the Tanganyika Government Trade Union, Dar-es-Salaam, written in Swahili containing vague complaints about permission to hold a meeting and the general administration of the Territory.

Ruanda-Urundi

3. Letter of 3 March 1955 from Mr. C. Mazis, Athens, enclosing a newspaper clipping in Greek.
4. Letter of 6 March 1955 from M. Kabondo, Kigali, requesting the reconsideration of his case which was the subject of T/PET.3/46 (Resolution 444 (X)) and T/COM.3/L.3 and L.16 to which the Council decided that the established petitions procedure should not be applied.

Cameroons under French administration

5. Undated letter received 28 February 1955 from M. Nya Jean Kid-Noir, Douala, requesting financial assistance from the United Nations in view of his long and sincere friendship for its president.

Togoland under British administration

6. Copy of a letter of 18 February 1955 from Chief Abanu, Kpandu, inviting suspended Chief Opeku IV to a meeting to discuss the resolution of 2 January 1955 (circulated to the members of the Trusteeship Council as T/COM.6/L.53).
7. Copy of a letter of 23 February 1955 from Chief Opeku IV to the Chiefs of Gbodome, Kpandu, declining the invitation described in item 6.

Somaliland under Italian administration

8. Cable dated 19 May 1955 from Salad Goroho, Galcaio (Advisory Council COM/981) containing one Somali word repeated five times and perhaps meaning "he said" and one Italian word repeated five times meaning "help".

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
