Elections, nominations, confirmations and appointments

Election of 14 members of the Executive Board of the United Nations Children's Fund

Note by the Secretary-General

1. The Executive Board of the United Nations Children's Fund has 36 members, elected with due regard to equitable geographical representation and other relevant factors, with a view to ensuring the most effective and broadest representation.
2. In accordance with General Assembly resolution 48/162 of 20 December 1993, the Council is to elect, at its resumed organizational session for 2003, 14 members of the Executive Board from among States Members of the United Nations or members of the specialized agencies or of the International Atomic Energy Agency, for a three-year term beginning on 1 January 2004, to fill the vacancies that will occur on 31 December 2003 upon the expiration of the terms of the following members: Armenia, Colombia, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Denmark, Gabon, Gambia, Indonesia, Japan, Lao People's Democratic Republic, Madagascar, Morocco, Portugal, Sweden, Yemen.
3. The 14 members will be elected on the following basis:
 - Five members from African States;
 - Three members from Asian States;
 - One member from Eastern European States;
 - One member from Latin American and Caribbean States;
 - Four members from Western European and other States.
