- 18A.1 The overall objective of the programme is to assist African countries in formulating and implementing the policies and programmes that will lead to sustainable economic growth and social development, with particular emphasis on poverty reduction, as envisaged in the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD) and in the internationally agreed development goals, including those contained in the United Nations Millennium Declaration, and in the outcomes of other major United Nations conferences and international agreements.
- 18A.2 The mandate for the programme derives from Economic and Social Council resolution 671 A (XXV), by which the Council established the Economic Commission for Africa (ECA). This mandate has been further elaborated in a number of resolutions of the General Assembly and the Council as well as in resolutions 718 (XXVI), 726 (XXVII), 779 (XXIX), 809 (XXXI) and 844 (XXXIX) of ECA. Further mandates and guidance have emanated from the African Union and the outcomes and decisions of global conferences, including the 2005 World Summit Outcome.
- 18A.3 Poverty reduction remains the overriding development challenge in Africa. The majority of African countries continues to face deep and widespread poverty despite the significant economic and social progress made in recent years. The global financial crisis has hampered growth in the region, with dire consequences for African countries to reduce poverty. The financial crisis has also compounded the impact of the recent food and fuel crises, placing the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals at risk and jeopardizing Africa's long-term economic and social development. At current rates of growth, Africa remains the only continent not on track to meet Goal 1, on eradicating extreme poverty and hunger by 2015. The situation is made worse by conflicts, natural disasters resulting from climate change, and the HIV/AIDS pandemic, which continue to undermine economic growth in many African countries.

- 18A.4 In order to address these and other emerging development challenges, African countries need to formulate and implement appropriate policies and programmes to achieve and sustain economic growth for poverty reduction and equitable development. In line with its mandate of promoting the economic and social development of Africa, ECA will respond to those challenges by scaling up efforts in support of achieving the internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals and the priorities of NEPAD.
- 18A.5 The overall strategy of the ECA programme will continue to be organized around two main pillars: (a) promoting regional integration in support of the African Union vision and priorities; and (b) meeting Africa's special needs and emerging global challenges. ECA will conduct its work through 10 subprogrammes arranged to avoid duplication of functions, promote complementarities, eliminate inconsistencies and sharpen the focus in areas that have acquired new urgency. The subprogrammes are focused on the following themes: macroeconomic analysis, finance and economic development; food security and sustainable development; governance and public administration; information and science and technology for development; trade, economic cooperation and regional integration; gender and women in development; subregional activities for development; development planning and administration; statistics; and social development.
- 18A.6 In order to facilitate further convergence of thematic issues and sectoral priorities in support of attainment of the internationally agreed development goals, including the Millennium Development Goals and the NEPAD objectives, the ECA repositioning (in line with lessons learned thus far) has been appropriately fine-tuned through clustering of the related areas of work and developing enhanced synergies, coherence and complementarities between the respective units. Accordingly, focus has been increased on important sectors such as climate change; intra-African and international trade and globalization; financing for development; and social development. Furthermore, the areas in which complementarities exist between current programme 9, United Nations support for the New Partnership for Africa's Development, and programme 14, Economic and social development in Africa have been clearly identified in order to enhance future programme performance reporting and budgeting. This resulting realignment is fully in line with the overall mandate of ECA to promote the economic and social development of Africa and also responds well to other relevant mandates at the global and regional levels, such as the Copenhagen Accord, the Outcome of the Conference on the World Financial and Economic Crisis and Its Impact on Development, and the outcomes of the 2009 ECA Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development.
- 18A.7 The modalities for implementation will include a combination of knowledge-generation, sharing and networking; advocacy and consensus-building; and advisory services and technical cooperation. ECA delivers these services through economic and social analyses and the preparation of reports to monitor and track the progress of Africa on global and regional commitments; the formulation of policy recommendations, guidelines and standards to support policy dialogue; the organization of policy dialogue to facilitate consensus-building and the adoption of common regional positions on key issues; and capacity-building (technical assistance, group training/workshops/seminars and field projects) to disseminate best practices. A gender perspective will also continue to be mainstreamed across all the subprogrammes as reflected in the programme plan.
- 18A.8 In implementing the programme, ECA will leverage its comparative strengths to engage a wide range of partners from within and outside the United Nations system in order to maximize the impact of its work. To that end, the Commission will continue to be involved in the work of the Executive Committee on Economic and Social Affairs, as the main vehicle for ensuring policy and operational coherence in United Nations development activities, as well as enhancing collaboration with United Nations Development Group entities. ECA will also continue to build on its existing

partnerships with the African Union, AfDB and other regional organizations, as well as with African civil society and private sector organizations. Inter-agency coordination and collaboration among United Nations system agencies working in Africa will be strengthened through the regional consultation meetings of those agencies convened by ECA in support of the priorities of NEPAD.

- 18A.9 The programme is under the responsibility of ECA and its five subregional offices, as well as the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning. At the end of the plan period, it is expected that the programme will have contributed to strengthening capacity in member States individually and collectively for effective policy formulation and implementation to address the development challenges that they confront, with particular emphasis on poverty reduction.
- 18A.10 ECA continues to make notable progress in achieving the objectives of its repositioning exercise, which began in 2006. In particular, ECA subregional offices have been strengthened, and partnerships with other key development organizations operating in Africa improved, notably with the African Union Commission, AfDB and major regional economic communities. After nearly five years of implementing the reform programme, lessons drawn from various reviews and assessments have identified a number of factors that continue to prevent ECA from realizing its full potential as a leading development organization in Africa, including inadequate linkages between analytical and operational activities; inadequate internal collaboration in delivering flagship outputs; and the non-optimal utilization of the skill mix and broad range of experience — sectoral and subregional — available in the Commission. All of the 19 posts (2 P-5, 2 P-4, 2 P-3 and 13 National Officer posts) approved under the terms of General Assembly resolution 63/260 for development-related activities are currently filled.
- 18A.11 Although attempts to address the above challenges, notably by enhancing collaboration among divisions and subregional offices, have yielded some positive results, the executive management of ECA decided to introduce in October 2010 the concept of “Delivering as One ECA”. The concept refers to the collective or joint delivery of flagship outputs (products or services) that are best produced with the intervention of several units (various subprogrammes) of the Commission and that can have high impact on the beneficiaries, notably member States and regional economic communities. To this end, the executive management identified the “big ticket” items, which are cross-cutting issues that lend themselves to contributions from different divisions and subregional offices/African Institute for Economic Development and Planning.
- 18A.12 The translation of the Delivering as One ECA approach into the ECA proposed programme budget for the biennium 2012-2013 has, understandably, resulted in a substantial increase commission-wide of the number of outputs in the ECA programme of work for the biennium 2012-2013 as compared with that of the 2010-2011 biennium. The increase from a total of 599 legislative outputs for the biennium 2010-2011 to about 700 legislative outputs for 2012-2013 was mainly due to the outcome of the work of the Programme Support Group established by the Executive Secretary with the mandate to retrofit the ECA business plan for 2010-2012 and the “big ticket” issues in the ECA budget submission across the various subprogrammes. The mandate of the programme was also recently elaborated by ECA in its resolution 873 (XLIII).
- 18A.13 An in-depth review of publications as a part of the programme of work was undertaken in the context of each subprogramme. It is anticipated that recurrent and non-recurrent publications will be issued as summarized in table 18A.3 and as described in the output information for each subprogramme.

18A.14 The overall resources under this section amount to \$118,951,100 before recosting, reflecting a net decrease of \$2,815,800, or 2.3 per cent, compared with the revised appropriation for the biennium 2010-2011. The net decrease is as summarized below:

- (a) A decrease of \$100,000 under policymaking organs, consisting of decreases in non-post resources, relating to other staff costs (\$30,000), communications (\$50,000), and supplies and materials (\$20,000);
- (b) A net increase of \$15,400 under executive direction and management, consisting of (i) a decrease of \$847,500 under post resources due to the outward redeployment of one P-4 post to the ECA Conference Services Section (\$328,600) and one P-4 post, four Local level posts and one National Officer post to the Division of Administration, Common Services and Programme Support, which were formerly under the Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management (\$518,900); and (ii) an increase of \$862,900 in non-post resources, relating to other staff costs (\$29,400), consultants (\$43,500), travel of staff (\$33,900), contractual services (\$100,200), general operating expenses (\$159,800), supplies and materials (\$96,500), and furniture and equipment (\$399,600);
- (c) A net decrease of \$1,207,200, under programme of work, consisting of a net decrease of \$657,200 under post resources due to the outward redeployment of one P-4 post from subprogramme 4, Information and science and technology for development, to the Facilities Management Service, under programme support, and a net decrease of \$550,000 in non-post requirements, relating largely to decreases for other staff costs, contractual services, supplies and materials and furniture and equipment, offset by increases for consultants, experts, travel of staff, general operating expenses and grants and contributions;
- (d) A net decrease of \$1,524,000 under programme support, consisting of (a) an increase of \$1,588,000 under post resources due to (i) the inward redeployments of one P-4, one National Officer and four Local level posts from the Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management (OPM); one P-4, from the Office of the Executive Secretary to the Conference Services Section; one P-4, Language Officer post from the subregional office for North Africa and one P-4, from subprogramme 4; (ii) the reclassification of one post in the Field Service category at the FS-6 level to a P-4 post to head the ECA Telecommunications Services Unit, and the reclassification of one Local level post to a National Officer post for a Facilities Management Officer; and (b) a net decrease of \$3,112,000 under non-post resources, consisting of decreases largely for contractual services, general operating expenses, supplies and materials and furniture and equipment, partly offset by increases under other staff costs and travel of staff.

18A.15 The redeployment above is a result of the fine-tuning exercise of the ECA organizational structure carried out at the end of 2009.

- 18A.16 In the biennium 2012-2013, the projected extrabudgetary resources of \$44,773,600, which represent 26.4 per cent of the overall requirements for section 18A, are mobilized mostly from bilateral sources under agreements between ECA and global and regional institutions and organizations concerned with development in Africa. The resources will complement resources from the regular budget to finance technical cooperation activities in the broad priority areas, including building capacity to meet the Millennium Development Goals, integrated water resources management, improving good governance systems, harnessing information and communications technology for socio-economic development, strengthening capacity in relation to trade negotiations, integrating gender concerns into development policies and programmes and providing support to member States and the regional economic communities in the implementation of NEPAD. The projected increase of \$8,770,800 in extrabudgetary resources compared with the 2010-2011 biennium is based on results expected from the ECA repositioning exercise and the institution of an appropriate strategy for the mobilization of extrabudgetary resources. The number of posts to be financed from extrabudgetary resources in the 2012-2013 biennium is estimated at 114, as reflected in table 18A.6, which is 15 fewer than the posts financed in the 2010-2011 biennium. Increases for the biennium 2012-2013 are projected under non-post resources, relating largely to enhancing the capacity of member States in various areas; strengthening the position and participation of Africa in international trade negotiations; intensifying analytical work in priority areas; enhancing the development and dissemination of knowledge tools; and generating common positions in order to accelerate the implementation of priority commitments identified under NEPAD and by the World Summit on Sustainable Development, among others. The outputs in support of the proposed programme of work are described under the various subprogrammes.
- 18A.17 Pursuant to General Assembly resolution 58/269, resources identified for the conduct of monitoring and evaluation are estimated at \$3,250,300, representing 268.8 work months estimated at \$2,397,500 for staff and \$852,800 for non-post requirements. This amount consists of \$2,536,300 from the regular budget and \$714,000 financed from extrabudgetary resources.
- 18A.18 The percentage distribution of total resources under this section for the biennium 2012-2013 is shown in table 18A.4.

A. Policymaking organs

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$633,200

- 18A.19 By its resolution 826 (XXXII), the Commission established the structure and functioning of its intergovernmental machinery, comprising the Conference of African Ministers responsible for Economic and Social Development and Planning and its Technical Committee of the Whole, as well as the Conference of African Ministers of Finance, convened biennially in alternate years, and the seven functional and sectoral subsidiary organs of the Commission. At its thirty-fourth session, in 2001, the Commission decided that the Conferences should be merged and henceforth meet annually. With the repositioning exercise of ECA which began in 2006, the subsequent institutional changes involved a review of the Commission's intergovernmental machinery which resulted in the elimination of overlapping bodies, creation of new organs and greater congruence between the intergovernmental bodies of ECA and those of the African Union. Consequently, the intergovernmental machinery of ECA now consists of organs focused on overall development issues at the subregional and regional levels and several subsidiary organs composed of experts. The approved organs are enumerated in the two broad clusters below.

1. Organs dealing with overall development issues

Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development and its Committee of Experts

- 18A.20 The Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development provides the legislative mandate and policy guidance to the work of the Commission, considers and endorses the work programme of the ECA secretariat, serves as a forum for articulating the

position of Africa on development issues on the agenda of the United Nations and decides on the recommendations of its subsidiary bodies and of the Executive Secretary.

- 18A.21 Since 2001, the Conference of Ministers has met on an annual basis. Its Committee of Experts meets prior to the Conference and provides it with technical support. The Bureaux of both bodies comprise a representative of each of the five subregions of the continent, namely, North Africa, East Africa, Southern Africa, West Africa and Central Africa, and consist of a chairman, three vice-chairmen and a rapporteur.

Intergovernmental Committee of Experts of subregional offices of the Economic Commission for Africa

- 18A.22 The Intergovernmental Committee of Experts of each of the five ECA subregional offices meets annually prior to, and reports to, the Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development. Each Committee oversees the overall formulation and implementation of the programme of work and priorities of the respective subregional office and makes recommendations on issues concerning economic and social development in the subregion concerned and on the promotion and strengthening of subregional economic cooperation and integration. Whenever the need arises, meetings are held back-to-back with major ministerial conferences of the regional economic communities in order to provide a platform for subregional ministerial caucuses to address specific subregional development challenges. The outcomes of such meetings are brought to the attention of the Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development.

2. Functional and sectoral subsidiary organs of the Commission

Committee on Women and Development

- 18A.23 The role of the Committee on Women and Development as an advisory forum of experts and policymakers is to provide guidance to the Commission in its work on the importance of gender equality and the role of women in development. It also provides a platform for advocacy and for assessing follow-up and implementation by the African Governments of the global and regional platforms for action for the advancement of women. In particular, it addresses issues relating to the economic empowerment of women, protection of their legal and human rights and their increased access to education and health. It meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Development Information, Science and Technology

- 18A.24 The Committee on Development Information, Science and Technology aims to strengthen the role of the Commission in assisting its member States to develop their national information and communication infrastructure and to integrate science and technology in their development programmes and strategies by bringing together experts and policymakers to provide it with advice in that regard. The Committee is composed of experts in such fields as planning, information and communications technology, geoinformation systems and science and technology. The Committee meets biennially.

Committee on Food Security and Sustainable Development

- 18A.25 The Committee on Food Security and Sustainable Development serves as a forum of experts that provides advice to the Commission in the interlinked areas of food security and environment. In this regard, it provides a platform for advocacy and assessment of follow-up activities by the Governments of African countries to regional and global plans of action, such as relevant decisions

and outcomes of the World Summit on Sustainable Development. The Committee meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Human and Social Development

- 18A.26 The mission of the Committee on Human and Social Development is to promote human and social development in African countries. The Committee conducts development and follow-up activities pertaining to global conferences and regional action programmes. It reviews major trends and issues of regional interest regarding human and social development. The Committee meets biennially.

Committee on Trade, Regional Cooperation and Integration

- 18A.27 The Committee on Trade, Regional Cooperation and Integration promotes the implementation of measures designed to strengthen economic cooperation and integration among African countries. It coordinates and harmonizes economic policies among African countries as a prerequisite for accelerating regional economic integration. In view of the importance of trade in regional cooperation and integration, the Committee also focuses on intra-African and international trade. It comprises experts in the field of international trade and integration drawn from Governments and the private sector. The Committee meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Governance and Popular Participation

- 18A.28 The objective of the Committee on Governance and Popular Participation is to provide guidance on the establishment of an enabling environment for sound economic and corporate governance in Africa. The Committee focuses on interventions needed to enhance democratic governance practices, promote the adoption of human rights international standards, improve post-conflict management, mainstream the role of civil society and encourage the private sector development. The Committee meets on a biennial basis.

Committee on Statistics

- 18A.29 The Committee on Statistics, composed of experts and policymakers in the field of statistics, is responsible for providing strategic direction to the work of the Commission on statistical development in Africa. The Committee meets on a biennial basis.
- 18A.30 With the exception of the Commission, which meets in a seven-day annual session, all intergovernmental organs of the Commission meet for a duration of from three to six days.

- 18A.31 The resource requirements in the amount of \$633,200 provide for temporary assistance for the meetings, overtime, communications and supplies and materials required for servicing the sessions of the Commission and its subsidiary bodies. The provision is based on a recent expenditure trend resulting in a decrease of \$100,000.

B. Executive direction and management

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$10,981,700

- 18A.32 Executive direction and management comprises the Office of the Executive Secretary, the Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management and the Information and Communication Service.
- 18A.33 The Office of the Executive Secretary provides overall strategic direction and leadership for the efficient management and effective implementation of the ECA programme of work while ensuring the optimal use of resources. The Executive Secretary and the Deputy Executive Secretary work together to provide strategic direction, policy guidance and leadership to the formulation of regional strategies and programmes in line with the priorities of NEPAD, the Millennium Development Goals and other regional and international development commitments.
- 18A.34 The Office maintains and manages effective partnerships and collaboration with major African continental organizations, in particular the African Union and AfDB, the regional economic communities and other key stakeholders in order to promote synergies in policies and activities in respect of major regional development issues and concerns for Africa. It fosters African ownership and policy consensus-building on emerging and urgent development issues facing the continent, and promotes policy advocacy on Africa in the international community. The Office promotes the effective coordination of the role of the United Nations in Africa by holding regular consultations with organizations of the United Nations system working in Africa to promote concerted action on activities of the United Nations system in the region. It also strengthens collaboration with the other regional commissions with a view to sharing experiences and coordinating and harmonizing actions on issues of mutual and collective interest.
- 18A.35 Furthermore, the Office will introduce a new initiative, the senior research fellowship scheme, the primary objective of which is to establish and promote an interface between the work of the Commission and policymakers and academics working in the same areas. The programme will develop a network of fellows whose work will contribute to ECA knowledge management activities whereby material and inputs will be used for policy analysis and decision-making.
- 18A.36 The Office of the Executive Secretary also provides policy direction in regard to the organization of the annual session of the Commission and ensures effective action on the resolutions and decisions of the Commission, the Economic and Social Council and other intergovernmental organizations, with particular emphasis on the priorities set out in NEPAD and the Millennium Development Goals. It provides policy guidance to the five ECA subregional offices to ensure that they are responsive to the needs of member States and their major intergovernmental institutions, including the regional economic communities. In addition, it ensures that there are effective synergies between them and the substantive divisions at ECA headquarters, to deliver as one. The Office also oversees and coordinates the contribution of the Commission to the effective functioning of the tripartite Joint Secretariat partnership between ECA, AfDB and the African Union under the aegis of the tripartite Joint Secretariat Support Office. Through the Joint Secretariat Support Office, the Office of the Executive Secretary works closely with its leading regional institutional partners (AfDB and the African Union Commission) on the implementation of a number of special initiatives, such as the African Development Forum, the Coalition for Dialogue on Africa, the Strategic Partners Forum, the mutual accountability process and the high-level policy forums designed to reinforce the work of ECA and thus provide further impetus to Africa's development agenda. At the same time, the Office of the Executive Secretary assists in servicing the meetings of the Joint Secretariat and its related working groups and in enhancing liaisons and processes of institutional cooperation, as well as in monitoring progress being made in the implementation of the Joint Secretariat programmes and special initiatives. It also plays a critical leadership and oversight role in terms of ECA support to the African Peer Review

Mechanism and the overall NEPAD process. It leads the resource mobilization efforts of ECA in the context of the ECA partnership agenda and ensures that the resources mobilized are put to effective use in advancing the development of Africa.

- 18A.37 The Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management supports and advises the Executive Secretary on overall strategic issues, priorities and policies in the areas of programme planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of the subprogrammes' activities, and reporting on the implementation of the programme of work of the Commission. The Office promotes the culture of results-based management and quality assurance through the issuance of operational guidelines and the provision of programme-related training activities. In particular, the Office ensures timely and evidence-based reporting through an online reporting system, the Integrated Monitoring and Documentation Information System, as a basis for its coordination of ECA (a) programme performance and management review meetings; (b) programme performance reports; (c) inputs to the annual report of the Secretary-General on the work of the Organization; and (d) reports to intergovernmental and oversight bodies. The Office also guides and coordinates the planning of the programme of work of the Commission, including preparation of the strategic framework and the programme budget. As part of its strategic role, the Office coordinates the preparation and servicing of the annual session of ECA and its Committee of Experts and ensures follow-up to the decisions of the Commission. The Office also serves as a coordination and liaison node on programmatic issues with the other Secretariat departments (in particular the regional commissions) through the Regional Commissions New York Office. Furthermore, the Quality Assurance Section of the Office of the Executive Secretary provides leadership to ECA in that area through the introduction and harmonization of quality-assurance task processing guidelines across ECA, building on existing as well as novel practices, procedures and processes. More specifically, the Office works towards enhancing the impact of ECA analytical and advisory activities on its fundamental objective to foster the economic and social development of African countries by assuring that the activities are of the highest quality and reflect best practices at the time of delivery. The scope of the activities of the Office in that respect covers the two main types of analytical and advisory activities carried out by ECA, namely, normative and analytical research activities, and technical assistance or operational activities, including advocacy and consensus-building. The Office disseminates knowledge on quality-assurance practices at ECA through biannual hearings on quality and an annual report on the issue.
- 18A.38 The Information and Communication Service provides drafting, editing, dissemination and communication advice and services for the activities of ECA corporate, divisional and subregional offices; facilitates communications between ECA and its key constituents and regional and international partners as well as the media; raises awareness of ECA policy positions on Africa's core development challenges and the steps needed to address them; and disseminates and ensures visibility of ECA work to stakeholders and partners.
- 18A.39 The Partnership and Technical Cooperation Office coordinates the ECA partnerships and technical cooperation programme. The Office also manages technical cooperation projects and funds; builds and maintains partnerships between ECA and its development partners and mobilizes extrabudgetary resources; provides guidance and support to the substantive divisions and subregional offices in developing higher quality demand-driven technical cooperation projects that are clearly linked to the Commission's normative and analytical work and that clearly feed into the achievement of the Commission's expected accomplishments; and handles project appraisal, monitoring and evaluation of technical cooperation projects. Other activities include support in the mobilization of technical assistance and financial resources for technical cooperation projects; development and implementation of a fund-raising strategy to broaden the funding base for technical cooperation; organization of consultative meetings with partners and donors; review and finalization of project documents; and preparation of specific grant agreements in line with donor specifications.

- 18A.40 Resources to strengthen ECA business continuity management of its critical operations at all times, including when ECA faces risks, such as the threat of a pandemic, the localized, sudden onset of disaster, technological failures, or military or terrorist-related incidents, are included under this heading. ECA is working on strengthening both its pandemic and business continuity plans.

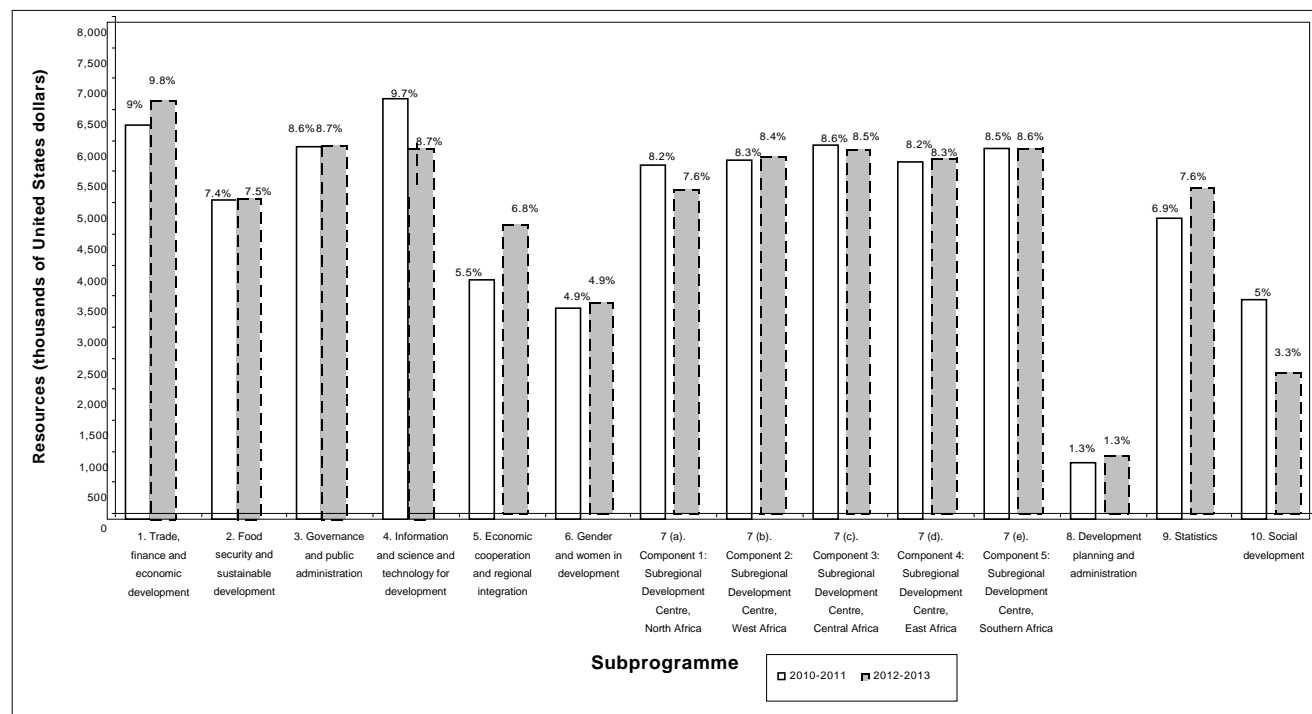
- 18A.43 The resource requirements under posts estimated at \$8,715,000, provide for 38 posts (1 USG, 1 D-2, 2 D-1, 5 P-5, 8 P-4, 6 P-3 and 15 LL). The decrease of \$847,500 is due to outward redeployment to programme support of (a) one P-4 post, from the Office of the Executive Secretary to the Conference Services Section (\$328,600); and (b) one P-4 post, four Local level posts and one National Officer post from the Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management to the Division of Administration, Common Services and Programme Support, resulting from the fine-tuning of the ECA organizational restructuring, with a view to strengthening the overall substantive and administrative work programme of ECA, thereby fully incorporating the budget management functions that were formerly under the Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management (\$518,900).
- 18A.44 The amount of \$2,266,700 for non-post requirements, relates to other staff costs, consultants, travel of staff, contractual services, general operating expenses, supplies and materials and furniture and equipment. The increase of \$862,900 is due largely to requirements for the ECA business continuity programme and provides, inter alia, for additional requirements under other staff costs for general temporary assistance for one P-3 position for business continuity and overtime, resulting from the increment in the General Service category salary scales, consultants, travel of staff, contractual services, general operating expenses, supplies and materials, and furniture and equipment.
- 18A.45 The extrabudgetary resources of \$2,235,500, to be provided through bilateral agreements and programme support to be earned, will be used, inter alia, to provide support services for substantive programmes and projects in the areas of conceptualization, formulation, monitoring and evaluation, as well as for the preparation of periodic progress reports on the African Union Commission, and to monitor progress of each of the initiatives and the implementation of efficient monitoring and management tools for effective control and utilization of extrabudgetary resources. They will most specifically be used to implement related training on monitoring and evaluation and to organize meetings of the Partners Forum to ensure that donors and partners, both current and potential, are able to appraise fully the efficiency and transparency of ECA in delivering agreed programmes and project outputs. Utilization of extrabudgetary resources will also provide for organization of the Joint Financing Agreement Forum to review performance of the implementation of the agreed programmes and projects, implementation of the training plan on results-based management; implementation of quality-assurance activities; and communications support to substantive thematic areas of the work programme and extrabudgetary projects, including the African Development Forum.

The subprogramme will be implemented in accordance with the strategy detailed under subprogramme 1 of programme 14 of the strategic framework for the period 2012-2013.

18A.47 The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objectives and expected accomplishments on the assumption that: (a) member States and national policymakers will be supportive of the ECA efforts and will extend full cooperation to ECA for the incorporation of growth-enhancing policies in their national policies; (b) the development partners will honour their commitments contained, inter alia, in the Group of Eight (G-8) plan of action, the Monterrey Consensus and the United Nations Millennium Declaration; and (c) the global macroeconomic and political environment will not deteriorate.

Outputs

18A.48 During the biennium 2012-2013, the following outputs will be delivered:

- (a) Servicing of intergovernmental and expert bodies (regular budget):
 - (i) ECA Conference of African Ministers of Finance, Planning and Economic Development: parliamentary documentation, including reports to the Conference of Ministers on assessing progress in Africa towards the Millennium Development Goals (2); recent economic and social developments in Africa (2) and the implementation of the Monterrey Consensus on financing for development in Africa (2);

18A.49 The resource requirements of \$6,117,300 provides for 27 posts (1 D-1, 4 P-5, 4 P-4, 6 P-3, 4 P-2 and 8 Local level). The net increase of \$381,800 results from redeployments, as follows: (a) inward redeployments relating to: (i) one P-5 post and three P-3 posts for the Millennium Development Goals/least developed countries section to carry out functions on social development previously placed under subprogramme 10; and (ii) one P-4 post and one Local level post, from subprogramme 5, to carry out activities related to NEPAD which were previously under subprogramme 5; and (b) outward redeployments relating to one P-5, two P-3, one P-2 and one Local level posts to subprogramme 5 to carry out functions related to the trade component of the former subprogramme 1, which has been moved to the reconfigured subprogramme 5. The amount of \$613,700 for non-post requirements will provide for other staff costs, consultants and experts, travel of staff and contractual services. The net increase of \$15,300 is associated with the inward redeployment of post requirements for overtime, consultants and travel of staff offset by reduced requirements for external printing resulting from more efficient use of resources.

18A.50 The extrabudgetary resources of \$2,023,000, which are to be funded from bilateral sources, are for operational activities designed to: (a) enhance the capacity of member States in the design, implementation and monitoring of sound macroeconomic and sectoral policies; and (b) increase the capacity of member States to mobilize domestic and external resources for development. Those resources will finance the production of key outputs, such as the Economic Report on Africa

(1 report each in 2012 and 2013), and of input papers for African Economic Outlook, which are important elements of the work programme. The estimated extrabudgetary resources will ensure the provision by ECA of advisory services to member States; the utilization of expertise and consultancy services to ensure maximum efficiency in reaching and addressing the concerns expressed by African countries in such areas as finance and investment in Africa, capital market development for productive investment in Africa and policies for promoting the green economy in Africa; the holding of ad hoc expert group meetings; the undertaking of country assessment studies; the production of several publications; the substantive servicing of inter-agency meetings; and the organization of the annual conferences of African economists and of training workshops.

Subprogramme 2

Food security and sustainable development

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$5,161,000

- 18A.51 The activities under this subprogramme are under the responsibility of the Food Security and Sustainable Development Division. In response to the sustainable development challenges in Africa identified in the 2005 World Summit Outcome, the Plan of Implementation of the World Summit on Sustainable Development (“Johannesburg Plan of Implementation”) and the NEPAD framework, the strategy of the subprogramme will continue to emphasize policies and strategies for structural agricultural transformation and food security within a perspective of regional cooperation and integration, with a particular focus on land, water, forests, urban-rural linkages and human settlements and climate change. The subprogramme will be implemented in accordance with the strategy detailed under subprogramme 2 of programme 14 of the strategic framework for the period 2012-2013.

18A.54 The resource requirements of \$4,822,300 provide for continuation of 23 posts (1 D-1, 3 P-5, 5 P-4, 3 P-3, 2 P-2 and 9 Local level). Non-post requirements estimated at \$338,700 will provide for other staff costs, consultants and experts, travel of staff and contractual services. The net increase of \$11,900 results from additional requirements for consultants and travel of staff, offset by reduced requirements for contractual services relating to the design and outreach services of publications under the subprogramme.

18A.55 The extrabudgetary resources of \$12,993,100, to be provided through bilateral agreements, include provision for one D-1, four P-5, four P-4, three P-3 and seven Local level posts. The resources are essential for improving analytical work in priority areas, enhancing the development and dissemination of knowledge tools and generating consensus and policy commitment for implementation of priority policy options for achieving food security and sustainable development in Africa. They will be used for the implementation of the field projects on strengthening the capacity of member States and regional and subregional entities: (a) to develop and implement policies and programmes on climate change and development through the African Climate Policy Centre; and (b) for land policy formulation and implementation in Africa during the 2012-2013 biennium. They will also be utilized to: (a) maintain and manage the regional agricultural market information systems in Africa; (b) develop state-of-the-art analytical tools for improved decision-making and informed debate on agriculture and rural transformation in Africa; (c) prepare, produce and disseminate the recurrent publication Sustainable Development Report on Africa and four non-recurrent publications on subregional assessments of selected strategic agricultural commodities value chains, Africa's agricultural and rural transformation in the new global context, including challenges, opportunities and policy options, and a compendium of five regional review reports to the Africa Regional Implementation Meeting in preparation for the twentieth and twenty-first sessions of the Commission on Sustainable Development; (d) preparation of joint outputs in the context of regional preparations for Rio+20; and (e) support to member countries in the establishment of knowledge management platforms on trade.

- 18A.59 The resource requirements of \$5,604,800 will provide for continuation of 27 posts (1 D-1, 4 P-5, 5 P-4, 5 P-3, 1 P-2 and 11 Local level). An amount of \$416,300 for non-post requirements will provide for other staff costs, consultants, experts, travel of staff and contractual services. The net increase of \$23,100 relates to additional requirements for the holding of expert group meetings (\$38,100), offset by reduced requirements for contractual editing printing and translation (\$15,000).
- 18A.60 The extrabudgetary resources of \$3,385,300, which are to be provided through bilateral agreements, include provision for one P-4, one P-3 and one Local level posts. The resources will be used to continue to provide assistance to member States through the revised scope of work of the subprogramme, which extends to conceptual, analytical and methodological challenges and will require consultancy services to meet expected accomplishments and build internal capacity. The activities to be undertaken will include (a) policy and analytical work to be produced and disseminated widely as non-recurrent publications; (b) study tours organized for African businesses to improve their exposure and facilitate knowledge-sharing on business development within the context of South-South cooperation; (c) fellowships to support of the work of ECA on governance issues; (d) launching of the African Centre for Civil Society web portal and maintaining and managing the database on African non-governmental organizations; (e) holding of special events on the pan-African forum on investment and private sector development and launching and validating of the Mutual Review of Development Effectiveness publications in collaboration with the African Union; and (f) other activities, such as ad hoc expert group meetings, field projects and group training.

- 18A.64 The resource requirements of \$4,846,600, which include a decrease of \$747,700, will provide for 37 posts (1 D-1, 2 P-5, 3 P-4, 5 P-3, 2 P-2 and 24 Local level), as reflected in the table 18A.18. The decrease of \$747,700 results from outward redeployment of: (a) one P-5 post, and one Local level post, arising from the movement of geoinformation activities to subprogramme 9 in order to coordinate and supervise ECA activities through the regrouping of focus areas for enhanced coherence and consistency in the context of changes to the organizational structure of ECA, which the Commission endorsed in March 2010; and (b) one P-4 post to the Facilities Management Section, aimed at strengthening capacity in order to fully discharge the additional tasks resulting from the operationalization of the new office facilities in early 2012. Non-post resources of \$1,126,700 will cover requirements for overtime, consultants, experts, travel of staff, contractual services and supplies and materials. The decrease of \$48,700 results from economies exercised in the use of supplies and materials.
- 18A.65 The extrabudgetary resources of \$3,402,300 are to be provided through bilateral agreements. They will be used to finance five posts (1 P-3, 1 P-2 and 3 Local level) and activities that will focus on increasing the adaptation and application of appropriate and integrated information, geoinformation, and science, technology and innovation in order to enable Africa's integration into the knowledge economy. Activities in this area will enhance capacity of African countries to formulate, implement and evaluate inclusive and gender-sensitive national and sectoral policies and strategies for development based on geoinformation, communication, and science, technology and innovation, and will improve the availability and use of science, technology and innovation for development at the national, subregional and regional levels. They will provide for and support, inter alia, the following outputs: (a) training courses, seminars and workshops; (b) fellowships and grants; (c) field projects; and (d) other substantive activities such as technical materials and non-recurrent publications.

Trade, economic cooperation and regional integration

- 18A.69 The resource requirements of \$4,149,700, including a net increase of \$830,700, provide for 19 posts (1 D-1, 3 P-5, 3 P-4, 4 P-3, 1 P-2 and 7 Local level). The net increase of \$830,700 results from redeployments, as follows: (a) inward redeployments of one P-5, two P-3 one P-2 and one Local level posts, from subprogramme 1, relating to the movement of the trade component from the former subprogramme 1, to the reconfigured subprogramme 5, which is expected to assist in overcoming the fragmentation of the trade sector across two divisions; and (b) outward redeployments of one P-4 post and one Local level post to subprogramme 1, relating to the movement of NEPAD-related activities to subprogramme 1. The amount of \$512,500 for non-post requirements will provide for overtime, consultants, experts, travel of staff and contractual services. The net decrease of \$26,200 relates to reduced requirements for consultants due to the work programme envisaged (\$35,600), offset in part by increased requirements for an additional expert group meeting in the biennium 2012-2013 compared with the 2010-2011 biennium (\$9,400).
- 18A.70 The extrabudgetary resources of \$4,597,700, which are to be provided through bilateral agreements, include provision for one D-1, one P-4, two P-3 and two Local level posts and are intended to enhance the capacity of member States: (a) to harmonize and implement policies and programmes in the areas of trade and market integration, physical integration and free movement of people and goods between and across regional economic communities; (b) to facilitate harmonization and convergence of policies and programmes in the areas of monetary and financial integration across the regional economic communities; and (c) to mainstream and integrate trade policies in national and regional development strategies for effective participation in bilateral, regional and multilateral

18A.74 The resource requirements of \$2,948,600 for posts will provide for the continuation of 13 posts (1 D-1, 1 P-5, 2 P-4, 4 P-3, 1 P-2 and 4 Local level). Non-post requirements of \$442,800 will cover overtime, consultants and experts, travel of staff and contractual services. The net decrease of \$8,200 relates to reduced requirements for contractual services (\$10,000) and external printing (\$7,500), offset by additional requirements for travel of staff due to travel to be undertaken for advisory services upon request (\$9,300).

18A.75 The extrabudgetary resources of \$4,480,400 includes provision for one P-5, one P-4, one P-3 and three Local level posts, which are to be provided through bilateral agreements and will complement the regular budget in the effective delivery of programmed outputs. The activities to be financed will include development of operational toolkits for mainstreaming gender and social dimensions in national policies, programmes and strategies; collection of time-use surveys and undertaking gender-aware macroeconomic modelling; expansion of the African Gender and Development Index; implementation and monitoring of global and regional commitments; collection of data and information for the recurrent publications compendium on best practices in gender mainstreaming; *African Women's Report*; and capacity-building of member States and regional economic communities to monitor and report progress on the African Women's Rights Observatory and e-network. Resources will also be used to augment regular budget resources for the organization of expert group meetings; for recruiting consultants to support areas where expertise does not exist in the Section, as well as for data collection at the national level; for covering staff travel to provide technical services to member States; and for recruiting visiting scholars and fellows to provide in-depth analysis to the outputs of the subprogramme.

- 18A.80 The resource requirements of \$3,777,600 for posts will provide for 22 posts (1 D-1, 1 P-5, 3 P-4, 4 P-3, 2 P-2, 2 National Officer and 9 Local level). The decrease of \$328,600 relates to the outward redeployment of one P-4 language post to ECA, Conference Services, Division of Administration, Common Services and Programme Support, in line with the fine-tuning exercise.
- 18A.81 Non-post requirements of \$1,452,000 will provide for other staff costs, consultants, experts, travel of staff, contractual services, general operating expenses, supplies and materials and furniture and equipment. A net decrease of \$152,900 is mainly attributable to a decrease in the number of ad hoc expert group meetings, reduced requirements for contractual services, supplies and materials and furniture and equipment, offset by additional resources for consultants and general operating expenses.
- 18A.82 The extrabudgetary resources of \$590,800, which are to be provided from bilateral sources (\$551,700) and programme support to be earned (\$39,100), will be instrumental in ensuring an adequate response and follow-up to recommendations of the meetings of the Intergovernmental Committee of Experts on the need to organize wider consultative processes to help in raising awareness and building consensus on major development issues of great relevance to all North Africa countries and will contribute to strengthening the capacities of member States in emerging issues. 18A.93 The resource requirements of \$4,286,700 for posts will provide for 22 posts (1 D-1, 2 P-5, 5 P-4, 3 P-3, 1 P-2, 2 National Officer and 8 Local level). The amount of \$1,432,800 for non-post requirements will provide for other staff costs, consultants, experts, travel of staff and for general operational requirements. The net decrease of \$43,600 is mainly attributable to reduced requirements for contractual services, supplies and materials and furniture and equipment due to more efficient use of resources, offset by additional requirements for consultants and expert group meetings due to the increase in activities to be carried out under the subprogramme and for general operating expenses due to the increased cost of maintenance of facilities and communications.

18A.94 The estimated \$590,100 in extrabudgetary resources, which are to be met from bilateral sources (\$551,000) and programme support to be earned (\$39,100), will help to ensure the quality and timely delivery of the programmed outputs of the subprogramme, which will serve to enhance the capacity of member States and the regional economic communities to design and implement sound policies and programmes for accelerated poverty reduction in the subregion and to improve the quality, depth and impact of the assistance provided to their main client, the Government of Rwanda. The resources will be used to finance a forum on energy security and expanded access in East Africa, group training and field projects.

18A.98 The extrabudgetary resources of \$100,100, which are to be provided from bilateral sources (\$61,000) and programme support to be earned (\$39,100), will be used to ensure undertaking of planned activities relating to capacity-building to support the SADC and COMESA secretariats, especially in strengthening their monitoring and evaluation systems in order to monitor the tripartite free trade area undertaking between SADC, EAC and COMESA. - 18A.106 The resource requirements in the amount of \$4,706,000, which reflect an increase of \$419,100, will provide for 25 posts (1 D-1, 4 P-5, 3 P-4, 4 P-3, 1 P-2 and 12 Local level). The increase of \$419,100 is the result of the redeployment of: (a) one P-5 post for the Data Management Coordinator from subprogramme 4 to subprogramme 9, guided primarily by the need for ECA to develop more programmatic linkages Commission-wide between the various statistical subsystems (the Data Management Coordinator will enhance the statistical information and geographic data

management component of subprogramme 9, while subprogramme 4 will continue to focus on ICT and science and technology (innovations)), and (b) one Local level post for an Information System Assistant (data management), redeployed from subprogramme 4 to respond to the emerging data needs. Six of the posts (2 P-5, 2 P-4 and 2 P-3 posts) were established under General Assembly resolution 63/260 in relation to development-related activities. Non-post resources of \$532,600 will provide for other staff costs, consultants, experts, travel of staff and contractual services. The decrease of \$19,000 relates to reduced requirements for consultants since all of the approved staff positions are filled and for contractual services resulting from a decreased need for contractual translation and editing of technical material.

- 18A.107 The extrabudgetary resources of \$919,600, which are to be provided from bilateral sources, will contribute to: ongoing efforts by countries and development partners to scale up statistical operations in support of the results agenda and addressing the improvement in civil registration and vital statistics systems in support of the Millennium Development Goals, data discrepancies between national and international sources in development monitoring, and strengthening data management, including proper dissemination and use by policymakers. The activities to be financed from extrabudgetary resources will include: advisory services in areas such as national accounts, with special emphasis on the implementation of the 2008 System of National Accounts and the production of purchasing power parities in the framework of the International Comparison Programme for Africa, production and use of gender statistics, census data processing for countries that have already conducted their censuses, statistical training covering both initial training and on-the-job training, and the production and use of data on the informal sector and informal employment.

- 18A.108 The activities under this subprogramme are the responsibility of the African Centre for Gender and Social Development. Under this subprogramme, provisions have been foreseen for the United Nations African Institute for the Prevention of Crime and the Treatment of Offenders. The subprogramme aims to strengthen synergy and linkages between the two subprogrammes, Gender and women in development and Social development, and to establish more linkages with other ECA divisions and subregional offices as part of the Delivering as One ECA process of joint planning, resource mobilization and programme delivery, and will initiate, analyse, strengthen, scale up and monitor policies in social and human development. The subprogramme will be implemented in accordance with the strategy detailed under subprogramme 10 of programme 14 of the strategic framework for the period 2012-2013 (A/65/6/Rev.1).

- 18A.109 The subprogramme is expected to achieve its objectives and expected accomplishments on the assumption that: (a) member States are committed to the implementation of regional and international policy frameworks on social development, especially the 15-year review of the implementation of the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development in Africa; (b) measures will be undertaken by member States to avail the subprogramme with data and reports in a timely manner; and (c) partners will be willing to collaborate and harmonize ECA efforts to support ECA, member States and regional economic communities.

Outputs

- 18A.110 During the biennium 2012-2013, the following outputs will be delivered:

- (a) Servicing of intergovernmental and expert bodies (regular budget):
 - (i) Substantive servicing of meetings: third session of the Committee on Human and Social Development (4);
 - (ii) Parliamentary documentation: Africa regional review progress report for the 20-year review of the implementation of the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development (1); progress report on the second review of the Madrid International Plan of Action on Ageing (1); report to the Committee on Human and Social Development (1);
 - (iii) Ad hoc expert groups: external review of the African Social Development Report (1); review of the African Youth Report (1); review of the International Migration Report (1);

18A.111 The resource requirements in the amount of \$1,643,500 provide for 8 posts (1 P-5, 2 P-4, 1 P-3, 1 P-2 and 3 Local level). The decrease of \$1,212,500 results from the outward redeployment of 4 posts (1 P-5 and 3 P-3) due to the movement of the Millennium Development Goals/least

developed countries section and its activities from subprogramme 10, Social development, to subprogramme 1, Macroeconomic analysis, finance and economic development, in order to facilitate further convergence of thematic issues and sectoral priorities, through linking the related areas of work and developing enhanced synergies, coherence and complementarities between the respective units. Non-post resources of \$624,500 will provide for other staff costs, consultants, experts, travel of staff, contractual services and grants and contributions to the United Nations African Institute for the Prevention of Crime and the Treatment of Offenders. The decrease of \$40,000 relates to reduced requirements for experts and contractual services due to recent expenditure history.

- 18A.112 The extrabudgetary resources of \$1,355,400, which are to be provided from bilateral sources, will cover operational activities designed to support national institutions and intergovernmental bodies in the incorporation of social and human development in development strategies, the implementation of the International Conference on Population and Development Programme of Action and the promotion of social integration which will include the following activities: undertaking analytical work to advance social development to address the linkages between population, gender equality, the Millennium Development Goals, HIV/AIDS and development; enhancing the capacity of countries to generate and process social development statistics and support standardized data-collection practices; strengthening and expanding existing information-sharing and peer-learning between countries; and employing an effective communication strategy to ensure wide dissemination of the knowledge outputs of the subprogramme. The outputs benefiting from extrabudgetary resources include the recurrent publication, the African Social Development Report, as well as two non-recurrent publications, a chart and information kit, technical material, fellowships for two visiting scholars; travel of representatives to high-level meetings; travel of staff to provide technical assistance; and two capacity-building workshops. The subprogramme will include research work and studies, field trips, training seminars and workshops, and a regional technical review of the International Conference on Population and Development Programme of Action.

D. Programme support

Resource requirements (before recosting): \$38,520,800

- 18A.113 Programme support services under the Head of Administration, Common Services and Programme Support encompass the functions and structures relating to: management and development of human resources; financial management and budget operations; publications, translation and conference management of the United Nations Conference Centre in Addis Ababa; documentation, archives and records management; finance and accounts; management of central support services, including general services and facilities management; information technology services; the management of IMIS operations; management of the United Nations Health-Care Centre; renovation and construction; management of the new office facilities; and management of common services.
- 18A.114 During the biennium 2012-2013, the Office of the Head of Administration, Common Services and Programme Support will continue to coordinate provision of the services mentioned above to ensure adequate support for the functions and services of the ECA secretariat, its five subregional offices and the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning. The Office will also coordinate with United Nations agencies based in Ethiopia in regard to support under the United Nations common services framework. Key areas of focus in the programme of work of the Office during the biennium 2012-2013 will be in the following areas: completion of the construction of the additional office facilities by 2012; completion of the access control system under the PACT II

project; upgrading of the current ICT infrastructure in the subregional offices to ensure resilience and reliability, including making use of the disaster recovery sites expected to be available at the United Nations Logistics Base at Brindisi, Italy, and the United Nations Support Base at Valencia, Spain; recruitment drive to achieve the required 5 per cent vacancy rate; implementation and support for the International Public Sector Accounting Standards and roll-out of Umoja; effective management of ECA financial operations; and the improved management of the archiving and records management system. Archiving and records management deserves special mention owing to the current situation where everything is managed using manual systems, a cause for concern because some records span a 35-year period.

- 18A.115 Some of the major challenges currently envisioned for the Office during the biennium 2012-2013 include: ensuring timely completion of construction of the new office facilities; possible delay in the planned major renovation of the old office building, currently occupied by the United Nations agencies that are expected to move to the new office facilities; the challenge of managing/administering the new office facilities, including with respect to financial, contractual, technical and human resources; adequate support for business continuity and disaster recovery at ECA; provision of adequate administrative and other central support services to the new United Nations agencies that have started operations in Addis Ababa; increased demand for administrative support provided to the subregional offices; implementation of an effective, relevant and modern system for the management of archives and records at ECA; and the increased level of representational activities required to be undertaken by the Director of Administration.

Outputs

- 18A.116 During the biennium 2012-2013, the following outputs will be delivered:
- (a) Administrative support services include: provision of authoritative interpretation of financial policy and procedures, financial reporting and accounting policies and systems; modernization and integration of financial systems; improvement of financial reporting; and strengthening of accountability within the Commission. The activities to be undertaken will include: provision of overall financial management, guidance and advice on the proper utilization of resources, and accurate recording of financial transactions in compliance with the financial and staff rules and regulations; preparation of monthly, yearly and biennial financial statements; preparation of bank reconciliation, verification and approval of payments; recording of accounting transactions and provision of guidance and advice to the subregional offices; processing, review and approval of all payments, including salaries and staff benefits; and provision of information technology support for financial control and reporting;
 - (b) Human resources mobilization and management: planning, recruitment and mobility; staff administration in relation to conditions of service of ECA staff, including the staff of the five ECA subregional offices; staff services, including reviewing and processing a range of entitlements and benefits; career development activities designed to strengthen the skills and competency of the staff; and staff/management relations. The activities to be undertaken will include: staff selection decisions; administration of staff entitlements in accordance with the conditions of service as specified in the relevant Staff Rules and Regulations; maintenance of human resources databases, establishment of a skills and competency inventory, and introduction of automated services to improve service delivery, reduce transaction costs and enhance client orientation; providing managers with relevant data and information to forecast skills requirements based on the programme delivery needs; guaranteeing appropriate classification of posts and timely circulation of vacancies; ensuring that selection decisions are made on the basis of objective and job-related criteria, taking into account cross-cutting

issues such as geographical representation, gender balance, and core and managerial competencies; provision of training for managers, assessment panel members, members of central review bodies and staff to equip them with the required level of knowledge of their responsibilities and Inspira-related processes; undertaking aggressive outreach efforts to promote the benefits of employment with ECA; planning and implementation of substantive and technical skills upgrading programmes, managing centrally coordinated programmes mainly on United Nations core values, core competencies, managerial competencies and other essential soft skills; guidance for staff and management on performance appraisal rebuttals, grievances and disciplinary and other administrative reviews; provision of training to upgrade staff skills to meet new demands and enhance cross-occupational mobility in order to attain the vision of the Secretary-General to develop a versatile, multi-skilled, mobile and experienced workforce; conduct of programmes to support an organizational culture that ensures high standards of conduct and working relationships; and ensuring an equitable and effective mechanism for staff-management relations at ECA;

- (c) Conference services: in the repositioned ECA, priority has been given to improving conference facilities, language services, publications, documentation and reproduction, which are grouped under one umbrella, the Publications and Conference Management Section, as well as marketing and public relations activities. The Section will provide meetings, interpretation and verbatim reporting services; translation and editorial services; and documentation and publication services, including text processing; and continue to provide services to the subregional offices. The major areas of focus of the Section in the biennium 2012-2013 will be to: (a) develop commercial management strategies to promote the use of the United Nations Conference Centre in Addis Ababa by boosting marketing strategies and activities; (b) continue to benefit from the best practices developed by documentation and language services (e-Meets and the Documents, Conference and Production Management System, etc.) already in place; (c) develop realistic charge rates, update the utilization policy for the United Nations Conference Centre and ensure full recovery of costs of non-calendar meetings and services; (d) continue to improve the quality of ECA publications and other documents, including the quality and timeliness of translation and editing; (e) strengthen coordination with the African Union Commission and AfDB in identifying future areas of collaboration in the areas of conference services; (f) play a key role in the integration of emerging publishing technologies across all aspects of operations, including through the launch of paperless distribution and web-to-print services to reduce the cost of hard copy dissemination, and identify new technologies and equipment to improve efficiency and enhance operations; and (g) assume a leading role to provide a cost-effective, secure and simple solution to all aspects of archives and records management;
- (d) Budgeting functions can be broadly grouped under two headings, namely, the coordination and substantive preparation of the programme budget, and its management and administration. The following major activities will be undertaken: preparation of the biennial proposed programme budgets and the annual overhead budget; providing guidelines and support to programme managers on budget preparation in compliance with the Secretary-General's directives; monitoring and controlling the use of resources; verification and certification of expenditure documents; appointment and administering of the certifying officers' panel; and issuance of allotments;
- (e) The United Nations Health-Care Centre will continue to provide curative services to United Nations staff members and their dependants, promote preventive activities to reduce the burden of diseases and workplace-related illnesses and stress. It will also ensure emergency preparedness for both its personnel and United Nations staff to respond to any disaster;

- (f) Information technology services: provision of computing, telecommunications and office automation and support for the information and communications technology infrastructure; provision of software and hardware support and services that will fully satisfy the evolving requirements of ECA, its five subregional offices and the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning; and provision of information and communications technology services to co-located United Nations organizations and of support for their information and communications technology operational requirements, in accordance with the United Nations common services agreement. The domains of knowledge management and telecommunications have become highly critical to support the growing need for acquiring and maintaining reliable, robust and secure data storage to improve information management and communications with United Nations Headquarters in New York, the five subregional offices, the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning, the regional economic communities and other development partners and stakeholders globally. The highest priority of the Information Technology Services Section will be to support the work of the repositioned ECA and its outreach programme, including by enhancing information and knowledge management and dissemination activities, as outlined in the 2010/12 business plan. During the 2012-2013 biennium, the Section will focus on tangible returns in four core areas of ECA activity: (a) continuing support for strengthening the information and communications technology capacity of its subregional offices; (b) increasing the quality and quantity of services to enhance the programme of work of substantive divisions and the subregional offices; (c) enhancing administrative and programme support management; and (d) facilitating the sharing, dissemination and utilization of data, applications and institutional knowledge capital;
- (g) Integrated Management Information System: the timely preparation for the migration of IMIS to an enterprise resource planning system involves building dedicated hardware and software platforms able to accommodate data cleaning, consistency checks and data preparation for the migration. IMIS remains essential until its planned phase-out. There are a number of ongoing tasks to be carried out in the 2012-2013 biennium: maintenance, operation and support of the IMIS infrastructure at ECA headquarters and the subregional offices; provision of functional and technical support for IMIS users at ECA, including at the subregional offices; enhancement, upgrade and maintenance of data security, including contingency planning, disaster recovery and business continuity; development and enhancement of competencies in the enterprise resource planning system, with a key focus on technologies, information management skills and practices; and analysis, design, development, delivery, maintenance and support of the ECA workflow and document management systems. New technologies and initiatives, inter alia, will also be included, so that advantage may be taken of new technologies such as virtualization, faster servers, better load balancing and more secure applications, including operating system, database and communication applications, etc;
- (h) Central support services: coordinate the preparation of the ECA procurement plan and manage the implementation of the procurement process in a transparent and cost-effective manner; travel, logistics and transportation services, including the management of all ECA travel activities as they relate to official travel of staff, dependants, participants and all others with official travel status; property management and management of ECA inventory and central stores through acquisition of items, receiving and inspection of items, and maintaining property records; facilities management (including maintenance) — provision of operation and maintenance services and continued improved management of major construction projects that are ongoing and planned for 2012-2013 relating to the new office facilities and PACT; facilities management; construction and commercial activities in the

ECA compound, including the travel agency, catering services, fuelling station, wastepaper disposal, car wash and disposal of United Nations property.

- 18A.117 The resource requirements of \$21,603,800 for posts, reflecting an increase of \$1,588,000, will provide for 223 posts (1 D-1, 7 P-5, 16 P-4, 19 P-3, 8 P-2, 168 Local level, 1 Field Service and 3 National Officer). The increase of \$1,588,000 is the result of: (a) the inward redeployments of: (i) one P-4, one National Officer and four Local level posts from the Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management to the Division of Administration, Common Services and Programme Support, stemming from the fine-tuning of the organizational restructuring recently carried out with a view to strengthening the overall substantive and administrative programme of work of the Commission, which resulted in the Division of Administration, Common Services and Programme Support fully incorporating the budget management functions that were formerly under the Office of Strategic Planning and Programme Management; (ii) one P-4, from the Office of the Executive Secretary to the Conference Services Section; (iii) one P-4 Language Officer post from the Subregional Office for North Africa; and (iv) one P-4, from subprogramme 4; (b) reclassification of one FS-6 post to a P-4 post to head the ECA Telecommunications Services Unit, whose functions will be, inter alia, to plan and direct major telecommunications projects of significant importance to the Commission, provide professional leadership to the telecommunications team, ensure effective coordination with other United Nations agencies in order to maximize possibilities of inter-agency collaboration in the field of telecommunications, liaise with external service providers, and propose connectivity solutions, including satellite-based solutions, for emergency deployment; and (c) reclassification of one Local level post to a National Officer post for a Facilities Management Officer to carry out the following functions, inter alia: provide technical documentation, comprehensively review the design of the ECA new office facilities and provide the required value engineering for the lighting and its control, the heating, ventilating and air conditioning and the architectural-related installations to ensure their sustainability and energy efficiency; assist in the preparation of designs and technical documentation, and provide administrative support in the envisaged renovation of the ECA old office building, United Nations Conference Centre and Africa Hall projects; and coordinate with the host country, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and African Union on facilities projects. The amount of \$16,917,000 for non-post requirements will provide for other staff costs, travel of staff, contractual services, general operating expenses, supplies and materials, furniture and equipment and grants and contributions. The net decrease of \$3,112,000 is due primarily to recent expenditure relating to decreases for operating requirements, partly offset by increases under other staff costs, travel of staff and contractual services.

- 18A.118 The extrabudgetary resources of \$6,826,700 for programme support, earned from United Nations organizations and from extrabudgetary activities carried out by ECA, and contributions to the United Nations Trust Fund for African Development and from bilateral sources will provide for 5 Professional, 1 National Officer and 52 Local level posts as well as non-post resources. The Division of Administration will continue to provide support services for substantive programmes and projects in various areas of their programmes of work during the biennium 2012-2013.

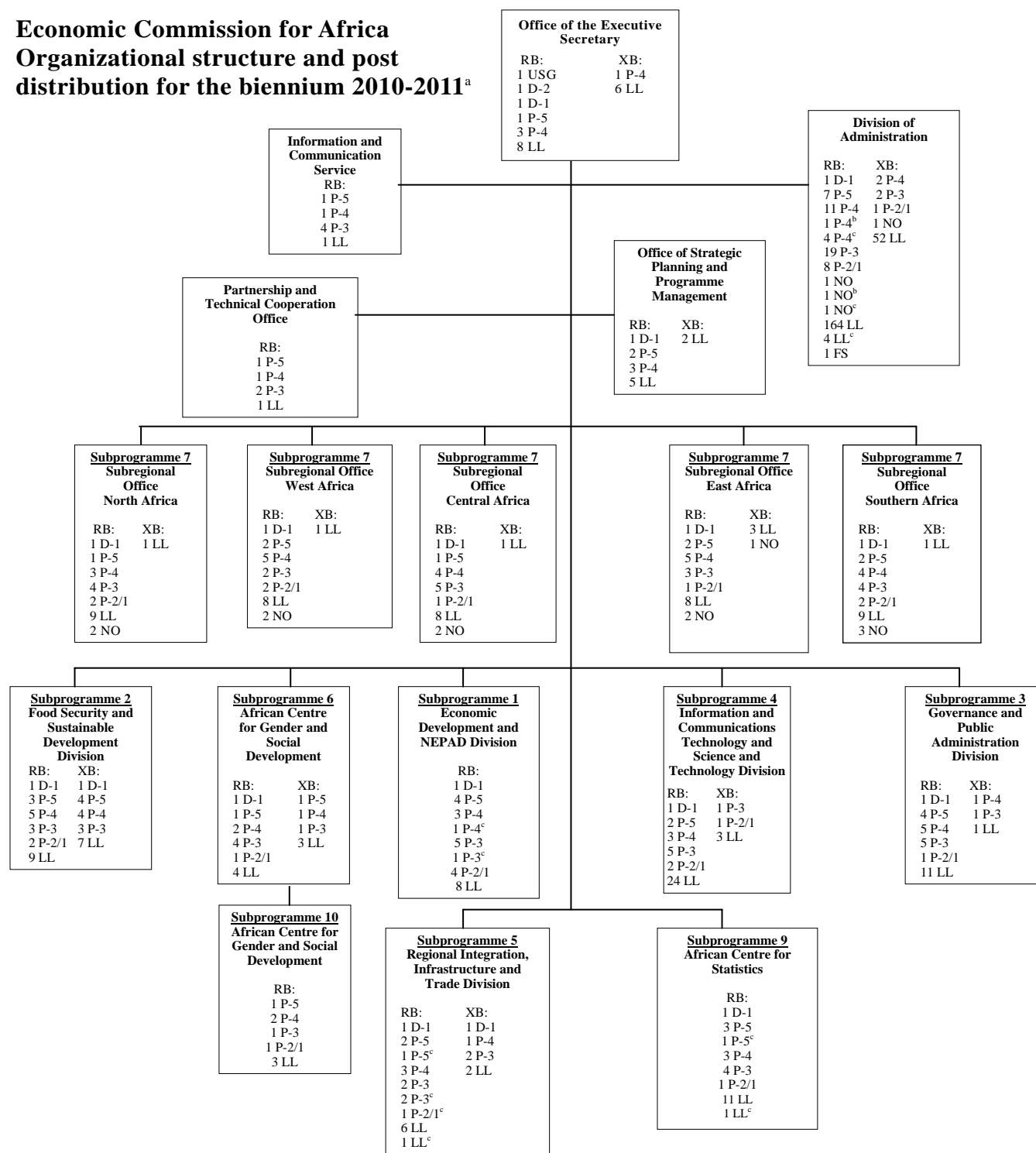
The findings confirmed that the strengthening of the subregional offices initiated in 2006 had largely succeeded. However, to ensure that the recent improvements and achievements of those offices were sustained in the various subregions, it was recommended that ECA should revisit the possibility of expanding its regular and extrabudgetary resources, especially in the context of operationalizing the multi-year programmes that the subregional offices had signed with major regional economic communities and intergovernmental organizations responsible for implementing NEPAD, as well as within the framework of the new mandate of the subregional offices as strategy coordinators of the subregional coordination mechanism on the United Nations system support for NEPAD. Accordingly, Commission resolution 874 (XLII) on strengthening the subregional offices of the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa calls on donors and ECA partners to scale up efforts to provide adequate financial resources, and commends the Secretary-General for the efforts made to strengthen the subregional offices and requests his continued support for the Commission's programme of work and priorities.

Considering that United Nations support for NEPAD is provided under both sections 11 and 17A of the proposed programme budget, the Advisory Committee recommends that the areas in which complementarities exist

Regional Commissions New York Office

- 18B.1 The Regional Commissions New York Office serves as the focal point for all aspects of the substantive and operational activities of the five regional commissions with departments, offices, funds and programmes at United Nations Headquarters. As part of its outreach role on behalf of the regional commissions, it maintains regular contact with permanent missions of Member States of the United Nations, relevant intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations, liaison offices of organizations of the United Nations system and the public in New York. The Office provides substantive and representational activities to the General Assembly and the Economic and Social Council under agenda items relevant to the work of the regional commissions. Through its participation in these global intergovernmental meetings, the Office ensures that the mandates and activities of the regional commissions, which address a wide range of economic and social issues, are taken into account in the deliberations and recommendations of the General Assembly and the Economic and Social Council and their subsidiary bodies. It participates in inter-agency and intersecretariat meetings, such as the United Nations System Chief Executives Board for Coordination (notably its policy and operational pillars through the High-level Committee on Programmes) and the United Nations Development Group and their subsidiary bodies, as well as the Executive Committee on Economic and Social Affairs, to ensure coherent, efficient and cost-effective representation of all regional commissions as well as improved harmonization and cooperation between the regional commissions and relevant United Nations organizations, including the funds and programmes and the specialized agencies. It provides the commissions with an analysis and synthesis of developments as they occur during intergovernmental and inter-agency meetings held at Headquarters, as well as policy recommendations relating to these developments. The Office assists in identifying global trends, challenges and opportunities that have a bearing on the work and positioning of the regional commissions and provides strategic advice in this regard. It acts as the global coordinating secretariat for cooperation and interregional activities among the regional commissions, services the meetings of the Executive Secretaries and provides support for the functions of the current Coordinator of the regional commissions.
