PROGRESS REPORT ON PROGRAMME FOR NEW HUNGARIAN REFUGEES

(Submitted by the High Commissioner)

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INTRODUCTION

General Remarks

1. This Report describes progress achieved during the nine months from 1 October 1958 to 30 June 1959. During this period the problem of Hungarian Refugees has been brought nearer to a complete solution. Out of more than 200,000 new Hungarian refugees, some 171,000 were resettled in second countries of asylum, while another 17,700 have voluntarily returned to Hungary. Of the remainder 11,500 remained in Austria, a number of whom still wish to emigrate to other countries, and 500 refugees were granted permanent asylum in Yugoslavia.

Hungarian Refugees in Yugoslavia

2. There is no longer a Hungarian refugee problem in Yugoslavia. As previously reported, however, the Government of Yugoslavia has still been left with a deficit of approximately 3.6 million dollars spent on care and maintenance for refugees who were granted first asylum in Yugoslavia. Efforts of the High Commissioner towards reducing further this deficit have resulted, since the date of the last report, in a gift in kind made by the Government of Japan to the value of approximately \$9,000. Negotiations are in progress with another government for a possible contribution.

Hungarian Refugees in Austria

3. The movement of Hungarian refugees into and out of Austria is described in Section I. Of the estimated 11,500 Hungarian refugees in Austria on 30 June 1959, well over three-quarters have expressed the wish to remain in that country. As will be seen from Section I, mass migration schemes continue to offer resettlement opportunities, and together with new schemes to be implemented during the World Refugee Year, the remaining migration needs may be covered.

4. By 30 June 1959 nearly 1,000 Hungarian refugees had been firmly settled in Austria under the Permanent Solutions programme.

Hungarian Refugees in Italy

5. As of 30 June 1959, 250 new Hungarian refugees remained in Italy. A total of 398 emigrated to other countries during the period under review and 4 have been voluntarily repatriated.

6. The United States scheme for the admission of 300 new Hungarian refugees from Italy has been completed. On the other hand, the quota of 100 fixed by Australia for the fiscal year ending 30 June 1959 was not filled: only 28 new Hungarian refugees had departed for Australia by 30 June.

Statistical Annexes

7. There are three annexes to this report. Annex I shows the movement of Hungarian refugees into and from countries of asylum and of resettlement. Annex II shows the status of contributions paid or promised to the Secretary-General or the High Commissioner till 30 June 1959. Annex III shows expenditures on UNHCR projects till 30 June 1959.

SECTION I. HUNGARIAN REFUGEES IN AUSTRIAMovement into and out of Austria

8. During the period under review, 3,455 Hungarian refugees emigrated from Austria, and 201 were repatriated. Arrivals from Hungary during the same period totalled 80 persons.

9. Taking these movements as well as the natural increase into account, the number of Hungarian refugees remaining in Austria fell from 15,900 on 1 October 1958 to 11,500 on 30 June 1959.

10. Between the date that the refugee influx began on 23 October 1956 and 30 June 1959, some 159,900 Hungarian refugees had been resettled from Austria, and 8,200 had been voluntarily repatriated. In addition an estimated 1,000 refugees have departed to unknown destinations over the past three years.

11. During the period under review there was a slight increase in the number of Hungarian refugees resettled from Austria. This is largely attributable to emigration to the United States under Public Law 85/316, particularly to the provisions under this law for the special Three Thousand Scheme enacted in favour of the Hungarian refugees. A total of 2,595 were resettled in the United States during the nine months ending 30 June 1959. Under Australia's special scheme for 1,000 new Hungarian refugees, 410 have been resettled in that country during the same period. Canada received 85, Belgium and Norway 40 each, many of them handicapped, and the United Kingdom 35.

12. In addition, 99 refugees were resettled in Sweden and 42 in New Zealand, most of whom were suffering from tuberculosis and other handicaps. Opportunities still exist for Hungarian refugees complying with normal immigration criteria to migrate to Australia and Canada.

13. Of the Hungarian refugees reported to be in Austria on 30 June 1959, 3,040 were living in federal camps and institutions, and 1,178 in accommodation provided by voluntary agencies. During the period under review, the number of

refugees so accommodated was thus reduced by 3,682 persons. This decrease is attributable to resettlement abroad and to the completion of housing provided under the special UNHCR programme for Hungarian refugees in Austria.

Handicapped refugees

14. Institutional care for Hungarian refugees is available in the home established by the Austrian authorities at Bad Kreuzen and there are at present a number of refugees accommodated in the home. Handicapped refugees who were resettled abroad under UNHCR sponsored schemes for difficult cases are usually eligible for assistance under the United States Escape Programme and, where necessary, resettlement grants are forthcoming from that source.

SECTION II. PROGRAMME IN AUSTRIA

General Remarks

15. The registration of the Hungarian refugees remaining in Austria, referred to in paragraphs 39 and 40 of document A/AC.96/6 has been started in May 1959, by which time it was considered that large-scale resettlement operations were either completed or well on their way. Holders of resettlement visas are not being registered.

16. On the basis of this registration it will be possible to assess the needs of the Hungarian refugees still remaining in Austria. It is expected that a re-appraisal of the UNHCR programme for these refugees will be submitted to the next session of the Executive Committee.

17. As mentioned in paragraph 16 of document A/AC.96/6, long-term and permanent solution projects have been merged for the purpose of coherent presentation. Table 1 of Annex III shows expenditures as of 30 June 1959 on all projects belonging to these two groups.

18. Progress made in the implementation of the programme has been affected by the constant movement of the refugee population within the country and technical factors in the implementation of housing projects similar to those reported in document A/AC.96/35 in respect of housing projects in the UNREF programme and 1959 programme.

19. For the first time it is possible to present a table giving a consolidated analysis of actual beneficiaries by stage of settlement. With the completion of considerable numbers of housing units, the number of refugees firmly settled under the Programme is likely to increase within the next six months, and a

further impact on the caseload will become possible when new projects can be implemented which have been adapted to the needs revealed by the registration now in progress.

20. During the period under review new projects were implemented only where it was necessary to continue previous services. The information given in the following paragraphs is therefore restricted to projects in the implementation of which progress has been made during the period 30 September 1958 to 30 June 1959.

21. Table A shows a consolidated analysis of the number of actual beneficiaries under the UNHCR Programme for Hungarian refugees in Austria on 30 June 1959, by stage of settlement.

22. Tables B and C give a summary of beneficiaries of long-term projects and of projects under the Programme for Permanent Solutions on 30 June 1959 by type of solution.

A. Financial situation of the programme in Austria

23. The following table shows the revised breakdown of the combined long-term and permanent solution programmes, and their financial position on 30 June 1959. For comparison the position is also given for 30 September 1958.

24. As will be seen, the allocation for small loans was reduced in favour of the allocations for housing and counselling projects. A further portion of the allocation for small loans was, however, committed. Funds totalling \$264,723 have been committed for housing projects during the period under review.

B. Description of Progress

Small loans

25. The demand for loans under the different projects seems to indicate that the funds allocated for these projects will soon be exhausted. Since the inception of project HUN/PS/50/AUS, 91 loans totalling nearly \$85,000 have been approved, 42 of them during the nine months ending 30 June 1959. So far 71 loans totalling nearly \$65,000 have been paid out, 46 of them during the period under review.

26. Repayments in capital and interest have been made on 37 loans. Arrears in repayment totalling some \$1,700 have been reported in only 15 cases.

Installation loans for new Hungarian refugees

27. Under project HUN/AUS/E.1/59 loans are granted for the purchase of furniture and equipment required by families moving into new housing provided under the UNEHCR programme. So far 11 loans have been approved, affecting 28 persons. Arrangements are being made by the Austrian Federal Government for the provision of furniture to those refugees who are moving into dwellings made available under housing projects HUN/PS/58/AUS (a) and (b).

Establishment in agriculture

28. The number of applications for assistance under project HUN/PS/54/AUS remains small. While many new Hungarian refugees are employed in agriculture, few of them feel ready to establish themselves as independent farmers.

29. Three loans totalling some \$7,500 have been paid out so far, 2 of them for purchase and the other for lease of a small farm. Two additional loans have been approved but not yet paid.

Housing

30. A total of 159 housing units have been completed and all but one occupied, thus providing accommodation for 158 families comprising 460 persons. A major role in the construction of these units was played by the housing secretariat attached to the Vienna Branch Office, which is responsible for the planning, implementation and technical control of the housing projects under this Programme.

31. A further 105 units will be completed and occupied during the rest of the 1959 building season.

32. Allowing for the cancellation of one project for two housing units, a total of 906 units are now under construction. However, owing to the departure of prospective beneficiaries, 5 units under project HUN/PS/68/AUS are to be utilised for the UNEHCR Camp Clearance programme, so that 901 units will finally be available.

Individual housing loans

33. Under project HUN/PS/55/AUS, for individual housing, 88 families, comprising 186 persons, are being given accommodation.
34. So far 83 loans totalling over \$75,000 have been paid out, 77 of them during the period 1 October 1958 to 30 June 1959.
35. It has been found necessary to increase the maximum loan under this project to over \$1,500 for each case, as the previous ceiling of \$1,150 proved insufficient in certain urban areas for many suitable candidates.
36. Loan applications under this project are approved before the refugees have found accommodation, as acquisition of such accommodation generally requires immediate cash payments. The implementing agency makes payment as soon as the refugee applicant is about to present a lease agreement or comparable document in respect of the accommodation found.

New Housing

37. The following table illustrates the progress made under each project:

Aid to intellectuals

38. Project HUN/PS/43/AUS was amended to enable certain graduates at Austrian universities to have their Hungarian university degree recognized. Scholarships have been given for a maximum of three months to refugees who would obtain professional employment once their degrees had been recognized.

39. Project HUN/PS/106/AUS was extended without extra cost to UNHCR to allow for the use of a rest home by intellectuals to be continued for a certain period of time.

40. The agreement for project HUN/PS/107/AUS, providing counselling and emergency cash assistance, was amended to allow the agency to prolong its operation and to approve slightly higher grants than originally foreseen.

41. Part of the cultural centre provided for under project HUN/PS/105/AUS is now completed, but owing to technical difficulties the rest of the building will become available only towards the end of 1959.

Rehabilitation of handicapped refugees

42. Since the beginning of project HUN/PS/96/AUS, for Hungarian youth, 35 refugees have been admitted into a home for the re-education of juvenile delinquents. The project has proved useful, but the young refugees have had to spend more time than anticipated in the home before they could be placed in employment and accommodated elsewhere.

Care of unmarried mothers

43. Under project HUN/PS/110/AUS 31 cases comprising 65 persons had benefited till 30 June 1959, 12 of the cases, comprising 25 persons, since 1 October 1958. This project continues to provide much needed assistance to the special cases for which it has been established.

Casework and counselling

44. With regard to the projects for integration counselling, full use is now being made of the existing agency network throughout Austria, thereby ensuring that all refugees living outside camps can be reached. Projects HUN/PS/51, 52, 53, 83, 84/AUS began on 1 October 1958, and a further project, HUN/PS/12, has been continued from the previous period. Counselling had mostly been concentrated on the possibilities of providing housing and credit facilities, but efforts are now being made to extend it to other needs, particularly of the refugees in camps.

45. Casework projects HUN/PS/11/AUS and HUN/PS/98/AUS, previously described are being continued under project HUN/AUS/Y.1/59. Assistance is being provided to the Austrian authorities and voluntary agencies with regard to the possibilities of repatriation, resettlement and integration for this group of refugees.

CONCLUSION

46. The registration of new Hungarian refugees in Austria, which has been financed from a special United States contribution, will provide detailed information on the situation of these refugees and on their needs for further material assistance. This registration began in Vienna on 19 May 1959 and is being carried out in close co-operation with the Austrian authorities, the voluntary agencies and the Inter-governmental Committee for European Migration. By 15 July 1959, over 60% of the estimated caseload had been registered. Of the data so far collected, the following may be of interest:

- (a) Of 2,885 households representing 5,302 persons, 1,716 households, or 60%, consist of one person, 495 households, or 17%, consist of two persons, and 674 households, or 23%, contain three or more persons.
- (b) Of the 5,302 persons registered, 1,049 are living in camps and 4,253 outside camps. Of this latter group 395 are living in voluntary agency or government sponsored homes in or near Vienna.
- (c) A test survey of 700 households revealed that over 60% intended to acquire Austrian citizenship, but only 3% had begun the necessary formalities, no doubt because of fear of losing benefits under the programme. This has a delaying effect on final integration, and measures to remedy this situation in the light of paragraph 8 (c) of the Statute of UNHCR are under consideration.
- (d) Out of a number of 507 households living outside camps in the Vienna area 118 households, or 23%, were considered as settled on the day of the registration.

ANNEX I

STATISTICS OF REFUGEE MOVEMENTS

Introductory Note

1. The following tables show movements of new Hungarian refugees into and from countries of asylum and resettlement, from October 1956 to the end of June 1959. Data are based on communications from a number of governments concerned and from the Intergovernmental Committee for European Migration (ICEM).
2. Movements of new Hungarian refugees into and from Austria are not precisely known owing to unrecorded arrivals and departures for emigration or repatriation. Estimates to cover these unknown movements have been included.
3. As UNHCR receives only incomplete data on movements between countries of second asylum, statistics on new Hungarian refugees now in those countries cannot be compiled.
4. According to their relative size and importance, figures have been rounded to the nearest ten or hundred. Apparent discrepancies between components and totals are due to this rounding.
