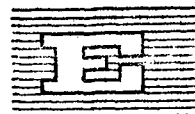

Addendum

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INTRODUCTION

The present addendum to the Analysis of replies of Member States prepared by the Secretary-General in accordance with Commission resolution 10 (XXX) - document E/CN.4/1168 - contains the replies of the Governments of Denmark and of the People's Republic of Hungary, which were received after the main document had been issued.

II. SUGGESTIONS OF FUNCTIONAL OR PROCEDURAL NATURE

2. The Government of Denmark deems it advisable that, in the preparation of the long-term programme of the Commission, attention should be paid to the problem of co-ordinating the work of the Commission with the relevant work, in the field of human rights, which is being planned or carried out within other international or regional organizations.

III. SUBJECTS SUGGESTED FOR THE PROGRAMME OF WORK OF THE COMMISSION

3. The Danish Government proposes that the question of conscientious objection to compulsory military service as a question involving fundamental human rights be included in the long-term programme of work of the Commission.

4. The Government of the Hungarian People's Republic suggests that the Commission should deal with the important problems relating to the protection of fundamental freedoms and human rights and that in this context it should pay special attention to the practical implementation of General Assembly resolution 3057 (XXVIII) concerning the Decade for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination.

5. In its study of the effects of scientific and technological developments on human rights the Commission should concentrate on questions affecting great numbers of the population from the viewpoint of social justice, e.g., the guarantee of appropriate employment possibilities, the proper solution of nutrition problems, the provision of health services and the promotion of better education. Proper consideration should be given to ways and means of making available the achievements of scientific and technological development to developing countries for the stabilization of their national and economic independence.

6. The Commission should continue to examine national measures aimed at promoting cultural development and international co-operation and study the use which can be made of national experiences at the international level. In this connexion, reference should be made to the principles contained in the Declaration of Principles of International Cultural Co-operation adopted by UNESCO in November 1966.

7. The Commission should also pay attention to the establishment of an international policy on youth. While there is no need to elaborate new and separate human rights instruments applicable to youth, since recognized human rights principles apply to all, irrespective of age, attention should be given to promoting the participation of youth in the process of implementation of existing instruments and in the related social, cultural and economic activities.
