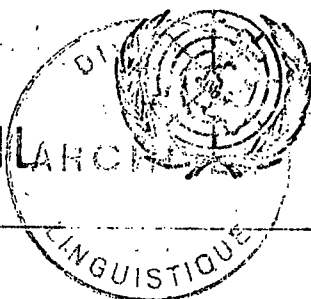

CORRIGENDUM

Page 34

Delete paragraph 64 and substitute the following:

"64. The first inter-governmental body dealing with the lower or maritime part of the Danube was the European Commission of the Danube, established by the Treaty of Peace signed at Paris in 1856. After the First World War, a Conference held in Paris adopted, on 23 July 1921, a Convention instituting the Definitive Statute of the Danube continuing the European Danube Commission in existence and establishing an International Danube Commission, composed of representatives of the Riparian States and of France, Great Britain and Italy, whose jurisdiction was to extend over the navigable fluvial Danube. Mention may also be made of the Permanent Technical Hydraulic System Commission of the Danube, established by the Treaty of Trianon of 1920; its composition and functions were the subject of a Convention signed at Paris in 1923. The Commission was charged with maintaining and improving the uniform character of the hydraulic system, with special reference to deforestation and afforestation, and also with the maintenance of the hydrometric service and the service of information on floods. After the Second World War, a Convention regarding the regime of navigation on the Danube was signed, on 18 August 1948, at a Conference in Belgrade, by the representatives of Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Roumania,
