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Programme budget for the biennium 2014-2015

Report of the Fifth Committee

Rapporteur: Mr. Matthias **Dettling** (Switzerland)

I. Introduction

1. The previous recommendation made by the Fifth Committee to the General Assembly under agenda item 132 is set out in the report of the Committee contained in document [A/69/422](#).
2. The Fifth Committee resumed its consideration of the item at its 4th, 5th, 6th, 9th, 10th, 12th, 13th, 16th, 17th, 19th, and 21st to 25th, and resumed 27th meetings, on 9, 14, 16 and 30 October, 6, 10, 14, and 21 November and 1, 10, 15 to 18 and 29 December 2014. Statements and observations made in the course of the Committee's consideration of the item are reflected in the relevant summary records ([A/C.5/69/SR.4-6](#), 9, 10, 12, 13, 16, 17, 19, 21-25 and 27/Add.1).
3. Section II of the present report contains a summary of the recommendations made by the Fifth Committee during the sixty-ninth session of the General Assembly on the revised estimates submitted by the Secretary-General and on the programme budget implications of resolutions adopted by the Assembly, either on the recommendation of its Main Committees or in respect of items considered in plenary meeting.
4. Section III contains a summary of the questions, in particular those relating to the programme budget for the biennium 2014-2015, considered by the Fifth Committee that led to the adoption of specific decisions to be recommended for adoption by the General Assembly.
5. Section IV contains the recommendations of the Fifth Committee.

II. Programme budget for the biennium 2014-2015

6. In its resolutions 68/248 A to C, the General Assembly approved budget appropriations for the biennium 2014-2015 in the amount of \$5,530,349,800 and

income estimates in the amount of \$523,145,000. By its resolutions 68/247 B, 68/268 and 68/279, the Assembly approved the amount of \$8,201,600 and additional income estimates in the amount of \$780,200.

7. Recommendations of the Fifth Committee during the current session of the General Assembly on revised estimates submitted by the Secretary-General, as well as on the programme budget implications of resolutions adopted by the Assembly under items considered by other Main Committees or in respect of items considered in plenary meeting, have resulted in a net increase in the approved level of appropriations in the amount of \$115,271,900 and a net increase in the approved income estimates in the amount of \$11,320,700.

8. The revised estimates of expenditure and income approved by the Fifth Committee and the financial implications of resolutions recommended by other Main Committees and subsequently by the General Assembly are indicated, by expenditure and income section, in the following table:

9. The Committee also recommended authorization of a commitment authority of \$104,582,400 for the Office of the Special Envoy on Ebola and the United Nations Mission for Ebola Emergency Response, to be apportioned among Member States in accordance with the scale of assessment as set out in its resolution 67/238, including income estimates of \$2,176,000 that shall be credited to the Tax Equalization Fund in accordance with the provisions of General Assembly resolution 973 (X) of 15 December 1955.

10. At its resumed 27th meeting, on 29 December 2014, the Committee considered the revised estimates of expenditure and income to be recommended for approval by the General Assembly for the biennium 2014-2015, as well as the financing of the appropriations for the year 2015. The Committee took the following actions in that regard:

(a) Approved the revised budget appropriations for the biennium 2014-2015 (see para. 46, draft resolution II A);

(b) Approved the revised income estimates for the biennium 2014-2015 (see para. 46, draft resolution II B);

(c) Approved the commitment authority and related income estimates for the Office of the Special Envoy on Ebola and the United Nations Mission for Ebola Emergency Response (see para. 46, draft resolutions II A and B);

(d) Approved the draft resolution on the financing of the appropriations and commitment authority for the year 2015 (see para. 46, draft resolution II C).

III. Consideration of questions relating to the programme budget for the biennium 2014-2015

11. At the resumed 27th meeting, on 29 December 2014, the representative of the Plurinational State of Bolivia, on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China, made a statement withdrawing draft resolution [A/C.5/69/L.11](#).

12. Also at its resumed 27th meeting, on 29 December, the Chair of the Committee introduced draft resolution [A/C.5/69/L.26](#), entitled “Questions relating to the programme budget for the biennium 2014-2015”. The Committee’s consideration of sections I to XIII of the draft resolution are described in the following paragraphs under their respective section titles.

Seventh progress report on the adoption of the International Public Sector Accounting Standards by the United Nations

13. The Committee considered this question at its 4th meeting, on 9 October 2014. It had before it the seventh progress report of the Secretary-General on the adoption of the International Public Sector Accounting Standards by the United Nations ([A/69/367](#)), the fourth progress report of the Board of Auditors on the implementation of the International Public Sector Accounting Standards ([A/69/155](#)) and the related report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions ([A/69/414](#)).

14. At its resumed 27th meeting, on 29 December 2014, the Committee considered section I of draft resolution [A/C.5/69/L.26](#), entitled “International Public Sector Accounting Standards”, following informal consultations coordinated by the representative of Japan. At the same meeting the Committee adopted section I of the draft resolution (see para. 46, draft resolution I, sect. I) without a vote.

Information and communications technology in the United Nations

15. The Committee considered this question at its 17th meeting, on 1 December 2014. It had before it the report of the Secretary-General on information and communications technology in the United Nations ([A/69/517](#)) and the related report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions ([A/69/610](#)).

16. At its resumed 27th meeting, on 29 December 2014, the Committee considered section II of draft resolution [A/C.5/69/L.26](#), entitled “Information and communications technology”, following informal consultations coordinated by the representative of Malaysia. At the same meeting the Committee adopted section II of the draft resolution (see para. 46, draft resolution I, sect. II) without a vote.

Strategic heritage plan of the United Nations Office at Geneva

17. The Committee considered this question at its 16th meeting, on 21 November 2014. It had before it the report of the Secretary-General on the strategic heritage plan of the United Nations Office at Geneva ([A/69/417](#) and Corr.1), and the related report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions ([A/69/580](#)).

18. At its resumed 27th meeting, on 29 December 2014, the Committee considered section III of draft resolution [A/C.5/69/L.26](#), entitled “Strategic heritage plan of the United Nations Office at Geneva”, following informal consultations coordinated by the representative of Guatemala. At the same meeting the Committee adopted section III of the draft resolution (see para. 46, draft resolution I, sect. III) without a vote.

Estimates in respect of special political missions, good offices and other political initiatives authorized by the General Assembly and/or the Security Council

19. The Committee considered this question at its 23rd meeting, on 17 December 2014. It had before it the reports of the Secretary-General on the Estimates in respect of special political missions, good offices and other political initiatives authorized by the General Assembly and/or the Security Council ([A/69/363](#) and Corr.1-3, [A/69/363/Add.1](#), Add.2, Add.3 and Corr.1, Add.4 and Add.5) and the related report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions ([A/69/628](#)).

20. At its resumed 27th meeting, on 29 December 2014, the Committee considered section IV of draft resolution [A/C.5/69/L.26](#), entitled “Estimates in respect of special political missions, good offices and other political initiatives authorized by the General Assembly and/or the Security Council”, following informal consultations coordinated by the representative of Norway.

21. At the same meeting, the representative of Cuba, on behalf of Bolivia (Plurinational State of), Cuba, Ecuador, Nicaragua and Venezuela (Bolivarian Republic of), orally proposed an amendment to the draft resolution by which two new preambular paragraphs and two new operative paragraphs would be inserted in section IV, to read:

“*Recalling* that the General Assembly has not decided on the concept of responsibility to protect, its scope, implications and possible ways of implementation,

“*Noting* that the estimates of thematic cluster I comprise narratives, functions, expected accomplishments, indicators of achievements, outputs and other information related to the Special Adviser of the Secretary-General on the Responsibility to Protect,

“*Decides* to delete all references to the activities and outputs related to the responsibility to protect, as contained in the strategic framework and the related narratives of the Office of the Special Adviser to the Secretary-General on the Prevention of Genocide (see [A/69/363/Add.1](#));

“*Requests* the Secretary-General to issue a corrigendum to his report ([A/69/363/Add.1](#));”

22. Also at the resumed 27th meeting, the representative of the Netherlands requested a recorded vote on the oral amendment proposed by the representative of Cuba. The representative of Italy, on behalf of the European Union, and the representative of Rwanda made statements in explanation of vote before the vote (see [A/C.5/69/SR.27/Add.1](#)).

23. At the same meeting, the representatives of the Islamic Republic of Iran and Nicaragua made statements in support of the proposed oral amendment (see [A/C.5/69/SR.27/Add.1](#)).

24. Also at the same meeting, the Committee rejected the proposed amendment to section IV of draft resolution [A/C.5/69/L.26](#) by a recorded vote of 80 to 15, with 60 abstentions. The voting was as follows:

In favour:

Bolivia (Plurinational State of), Cuba, Democratic People's Republic of Korea, Ecuador, Iran (Islamic Republic of), Lao People's Democratic Republic, Namibia, Nicaragua, Saint Vincent and the Grenadines, Sri Lanka, Sudan, Syrian Arab Republic, Venezuela (Bolivarian Republic of), Zambia, Zimbabwe.

1. *Takes note* of the seventh progress report of the Secretary-General on the adoption of International Public Sector Accounting Standards by the United Nations¹ and the note by the Secretary-General transmitting the fourth progress report of the Board of Auditors on the implementation of the International Public Sector Accounting Standards;²
2. *Endorses* the conclusions and recommendations contained in the report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions;³
3. *Accepts* the fourth progress report of the Board of Auditors;
4. *Approves* the recommendations of the Board of Auditors contained in its report;
5. *Welcomes* the progress made in the development of the benefit realization plan, and in this regard requests the Secretary-General, in the context of future progress reports, to include information related to capturing the quantitative and qualitative benefits across fifteen key categories relating to the five key strategic benefits originally envisaged as resulting from the adoption of the International Public Sector Accounting Standards;

II

Information and communications technology in the United Nations

Recalling section II of its resolution 60/283, its resolutions 63/262, 63/269 of 7 April 2009 and 64/243, section XVII of its resolution 65/259, its resolution 66/246 and section I of its resolution 67/254 A of 12 April 2013,

Having considered the report of the Secretary-General on information and communications technology in the United Nations⁴ and the related report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions,⁵

Stressing the need to harness the potential of information and communications technology to support the work of the United Nations in the areas of peace and security, development, human rights and international law,

1. *Takes note* of the report of the Secretary-General;⁴
2. *Endorses* the conclusions and recommendations contained in the report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions,⁵ subject to the conclusions and recommendations contained in the present resolution;
3. *Underlines* the importance of information and communications technology in meeting the growing demands of the Organization as it becomes increasingly reliant on its information and communications technology infrastructure;
4. *Also underlines* the importance of information and communications technology in strengthening oversight and accountability and in increasing the availability of accurate and timely information to support decision-making;
5. *Recognizes* the important role played by information and communications technology in facilitating efficient and effective deliberations within intergovernmental bodies, and in this regard requests the Secretary-General to entrust to the Office of Information and Communications Technology collaboration with the Department for General Assembly and Conference Management in order that they may continue their efforts to address relevant issues, as appropriate;
6. *Welcomes* the new information and communications technology strategy in the United Nations, as contained in the report of the Secretary-General;
7. *Recalls* paragraphs 22 and 64 of the report of the Advisory Committee, endorses all the elements of the proposed information and communications technology strategy, and requests the Secretary-General to ensure its implementation, taking into account the comments, observations and recommendations of the Board of Auditors and of the Advisory Committee, subject to future decisions of the General Assembly;
8. *Requests* the Secretary-General to provide, at its seventieth session, detailed information on the implementation of all the elements of the proposed new strategy, including an implementation plan, with clear timeline, a list of strategic information and communications technology goals linked to the overall goals of the Organization, a list of ongoing and future strategic information and communications

technology initiatives supporting those goals and their costs, benchmarks and deliverables to measure their performance, expected benefits and risks as well as an indicative five-year overall information and communications technology budget projection for the Secretariat;

9. *Recalls* paragraph 34 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and in this regard requests the Secretary-General to continue his efforts to reduce the level of fragmentation of the current information and communications technology environment across the Secretariat and at all duty stations and field missions;

10. *Notes* the ongoing reform and initiatives by the Office of Information and Communications Technology that aim to support the work of the Organization, and in this regard emphasizes the need for the Office to continue its efforts, with the aim of facilitating the work of the Organization and its support to Member States, including through the provision of relevant services to delegates at all main duty stations, as appropriate;

11. *Requests* the Secretary-General, in his capacity as chairman of the United Nations Chief Executives Board for Coordination, to invite heads of United Nations entities to consider the possible harmonization and sharing of services as well as the related costs of information and communications technology, as appropriate, in particular at field locations, and to report thereon in the context of future progress reports;

12. *Underlines* the importance of strong and accountable management of information security, and recognizes the need to ensure central control of information security, and the Chief Information Technology Officer as the central authority for information security;

13. *Recalls* paragraph 23 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and requests the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its seventieth session a progress report on the status of the ten-point action plan to strengthen information security, as well as the actions taken to fully address the mandates specified in its resolution 68/247 A;

14. *Acknowledges* that the lack of effective governance and leadership in the area of information and communications technology has resulted in a high level of duplication and fragmentation of the information and communications technology functions within the Secretariat;

15. *Encourages* the Secretary-General to continue to foster deeper coordination and collaboration within the Organization, and emphasizes that the full support and commitment of senior management, as well as close and continuous engagement with all stakeholders, keeping in mind the need to address all operational requirements, is integral to the successful implementation of the information and communications technology strategy;

16. *Recalls* its resolution 63/262, and acknowledges the responsibilities and the importance of the strong central leadership of the Chief Information Technology Officer for the overall direction and performance of information and communications technology activities within the Organization, and in this regard emphasizes the need for appropriate delegation of authority and procedures for ensuring compliance with the revised information and communications technology

strategy guidelines on, inter alia, operations, security, investment and oversight at United Nations offices, in particular those related to the field;

17. *Requests* the Advisory Committee to request the Board of Auditors to expand coverage of its audit of the information and communications technology expenditures of all entities of the Secretariat, main duty stations, peacekeeping operations and other field-based offices and to report thereon in the context of future reports of the Board;

18. *Recalls* paragraph 43 of the report of the Advisory Committee, requests the Secretary-General to ensure that all entities of the Secretariat report to the Chief Information Technology Officer on all issues relating to information and communications technology activities, resource management, standards, security, architecture, policies and guidance, and also requests the Secretary-General to provide, at its seventieth session, a progress report on lessons learned in this regard, for its consideration;

Strategic heritage plan of the United Nations Office at Geneva

Recalling section XI of its resolution 64/243, section VII of its resolution 66/247 and section V of its resolution 68/247 A,

Having considered the report of the Secretary-General on the strategic heritage plan of the United Nations Office at Geneva⁶ and the related report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions,⁷

1. *Takes note* of the report of the Secretary-General;⁶
2. *Endorses* the conclusions and recommendations contained in the report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions,⁷ subject to the provisions of the present resolution;
3. *Welcomes* the continued support of the Government of Switzerland for the construction project in Geneva;
4. *Recalls* paragraph 12 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and requests the Secretary-General to provide detailed information on measures to expedite the commencement of construction work related to the strategic heritage plan to the General Assembly at its seventieth session;
5. *Reiterates* paragraph 8, section V, of its resolution 68/247 A;
6. *Recalls* paragraph 13 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and reaffirms paragraphs 5 and 6 of section V of its resolution 68/247 A;
7. *Welcomes* the loan package offered by the Government of Switzerland, and notes that both the loan package and other alternative funding mechanisms will be discussed in the context of the financing scheme at the main part of its seventieth session;
8. *Recalls* paragraph 29 of section V of its resolution 68/247 A and paragraph 63 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and requests the Secretary-General to continue to negotiate with the host country on the most preferential terms

and modalities for the loan arrangements for both the renovation and the construction portions of the strategic heritage plan and to report thereon at the main part of its seventieth session;

9. *Also recalls* paragraph 69 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and in this regard requests the Secretary-General to continue to explore all possible alternative funding mechanisms in order to reduce the overall assessment on Member States and to report on concrete steps taken in this regard at the main part of its seventieth session;

10. *Requests* the Secretary-General to explore the possibility of attracting additional United Nations entities to be accommodated at the renovated Palais des Nations and to report thereon in his next progress report;

11. *Recalls* paragraph 78 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and requests the Secretary-General to explore the feasibility and ways of factoring future rental income into a comprehensive plan for the financing of the strategic heritage plan;

12. *Stresses* the importance of ensuring effective governance and oversight with respect to the implementation of the strategic heritage plan at the earliest stages of the project;

13. *Requests* the Secretary-General to present revised proposals with regard to the governance and oversight framework, with a view to ensuring effective oversight at the earliest stages of the project, and to include more detailed information on the scope, composition, technical expertise and decision-making mechanisms as well as the functional arrangements of the Steering Committee and the Advisory Board in the context of his next progress report;

14. *Emphasizes* that the Advisory Board shall be independent and impartial, with its membership reflecting a wide geographical representation while ensuring that the required expertise is ensured;

15. *Also emphasizes* the importance of ensuring integrated and independent project assurance for the strategic heritage plan;

16. *Requests* the Secretary-General to present a proposal for the donation policy for the consideration of the General Assembly no later than at the main part of its seventieth session;

17. *Stresses* that the proposal for the donation policy should not be restrictive and that it should be in full conformity with the international and intergovernmental character of the Organization, as well as with the Financial Regulations and Rules of the United Nations⁸ and without prejudice to the scope, specifications and design of the project;

4. *Recalls* paragraph 10 of section III of its resolution 67/254 A, and requests the Secretary-General to present, at the main part of its seventieth session, comprehensive information on all aspects pertinent to option 3, which, subject to additional information to be provided, appears to be a very feasible and serious option;

5. *Urges* the Secretary-General to ensure equal treatment of all viable options identified in the present resolution and to work towards securing the most favourable terms for the Organization in addressing its long-term accommodation needs;

6. *Regrets* that the proposed staffing structure appears to be large, with a number of positions at high levels, and requests the Secretary-General to review, in the context of the next budget proposal, the staffing requirements of both the Mission and the Office of the Special Envoy on Ebola, with a view to ensuring that the staffing structure is commensurate with their mandates and that the financial resources are concentrated on operational activities;

7. *Takes note* of paragraphs 60, 61, 62 and 68 of the report of the Advisory Committee;

8. *Recalls* paragraph 36 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and requests the Secretary-General to provide detailed information on the coordination role of the Mission with regard to the United Nations system-wide Ebola response effort in the context of his next budget report;

9. *Also recalls* paragraph 64 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and in this regard requests the Secretary-General to provide the requested information in the context of his next budget report;

10. *Authorizes* the Secretary-General to enter into commitments in the amount of 104,582,400 dollars, inclusive of the amount of 49,943,600 dollars authorized by its resolution 69/3 of 9 October 2014 for the biennium 2014-2015, to provide for the requirements of the Office of the Special Envoy on Ebola and the United Nations Mission for Ebola Emergency Response for the period from 19 September 2014 to 30 June 2015, pending the submission of a detailed budget at the second part of the resumed sixty-ninth session of the General Assembly, and decides to assess the amount of 104,582,400 dollars;

Financial implications relating to the administration of justice at the United Nations

Recalling its resolution 69/203 of 18 December 2014 on the administration of justice at the United Nations,

Decides to approve an additional amount of 2,591,400 dollars gross, 2,461,100 dollars net, before recosting, reflecting an increase under section 1, Overall policymaking, direction and coordination, of 2,413,400 dollars, under section 29D, Office of Central Support Services, of 47,700 dollars, and of 130,300 dollars under section 36, Staff assessment, to be offset by a corresponding amount under income section 1, Income from staff assessment, of the programme budget for the biennium 2014-2015;

Recalling its resolutions 68/248 A and B of 27 December 2013, 68/247 B 2014 and 68/280,

1. *Reaffirms* the budgetary process as approved in its resolutions 41/213 and 42/211 of 21 December 1987 and reaffirmed in subsequent resolutions;

2. *Takes note* of the first performance report of the Secretary-General;²⁵

3. *Endorses* the conclusions and recommendations contained in the report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions;²⁶

4. *Reaffirms* that the Fifth Committee is the appropriate Main Committee of the General Assembly entrusted with responsibilities for administrative and budgetary matters, and urges the Secretary-General to ensure that information is provided in a timely manner and as required, with regard to potential programme budget implications arising from resolutions of the Main Committees or the plenary of the General Assembly, as well as from initiatives discussed in subsidiary organs, in order to enable a fully informed decision-making process;

5. *Urges* the Secretary-General to ensure that oral statements detailing resource requirements are presented to the General Assembly in a timely manner before the adoption of substantive resolutions, in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the Assembly, and to provide information on the full scope of additional resources needed;

6. *Recalls* paragraph 18 of the report of the Advisory Committee, and requests that the Secretary-General provide a comprehensive assessment of the experience of forward purchasing of foreign currencies in the context of the second performance report on the programme budget for the biennium 2014-2015;

7. *Requests* the Secretary-General to review the recent experience of the utilization of the contingency fund in all its relevant aspects and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its seventieth session;

8. *Affirms its commitment* to consider and decide on the independent study on recosting and options for the Organization in dealing with fluctuations in exchange rates and inflation²⁷ and its recommendations at the first part of its resumed sixty-ninth session, without precluding other options;

9. *Approves* a net increase of 34,715,300 dollars in the appropriation approved for the biennium 2014-2015 and a net increase of 9,103,200 dollars in the estimates of income for the biennium, to be apportioned among expenditure and income sections as indicated in the report of the Secretary-General;

(d) 3,816,800 dollars, being the increase in income from staff assessment for the biennium 2012-2013, compared with the revised estimates approved by the Assembly in its resolution 68/245 B of 27 December 2013.
