ANNEX

Statement by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Mongolian
People's Republic issued at Ulan-Bator on 22 April 1985

The United States Administration has recently been making dangerous moves by way of escalating its interventionist policy against the independent Republic of Nicaragua and is creating a direct threat to the sovereignty and security of that country.

With greater intensity, Washington is financing, training and equipping with the most modern means of subversion the Somozan bands carrying out counter-revolutionary attacks and subjecting the peaceful population of Nicaragua to terror and violence. The United States Administration is seeking its next multi-million-dollar appropriation for the terrorist activities of these counter-revolutionary groups to continue. In neighbouring Honduras, which has been turned into an American military spring-board, preparations for direct armed intervention in Nicaragua are proceeding at full speed.

In the recent so-called peace plan for Central America, Washington openly demands of the Sandinist Government that it should enter into a "dialogue" with the counter-revolutionary mercenaries being maintained by the CIA and hold "new elections" under American supervision in the country. This is tantamount to a direct demand that the existing State structure in Nicaragua should be changed in line with the wishes of the United States; in other words, the White House's "new peace initiative" has the vain goal of wiping out the revolutionary achievements of the Nicaraguan people. This bare-faced act of flagrant diktat is, at the same time, intended to serve as a justification for Washington's subversion of peace efforts to settle the problem of Central America and its breaking off of talks with the Government of the Republic of Nicaragua in Manzanillo.

If the United States is really interested in establishing peace in Central America, it should first refrain from attempts to strangle the Sandinist people's revolution, cease its policy of State terrorism against Nicaragua, and resume the talks with that country which it broke off.

The Mongolian People's Republic fully and whole-heartedly supports both the just struggle of the Nicaraguan people, who are defending their freedom, independence and revolutionary achievements from the encroachments of imperialism and reaction, and the peace initiatives of the Government of Nicaragua aimed at finding a peaceful solution to the problem of Central America.

The Mongolian People's Republic firmly demands that the United States Administration should stop its criminal activities, which amount in effect to an undeclared war against the Republic of Nicaragua.
