Report of the Fourth Committee

Rapporteur: Mr. S.H.O. IBE (Nigeria)

1. At its 1129th meeting on 29 September 1962, the General Assembly allocated to the Fourth Committee the following items on its agenda:

"49. Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories transmitted under Article 73 e of the Charter of the United Nations: reports of the Secretary-General 1/ and of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories: 2/

(a) Political and constitutional information on Non-Self-Governing Territories;

(b) Information on educational, economic and social advancement;

(c) General questions relating to the transmission and examination of information;

50. Dissemination of information on the United Nations in the Non-Self-Governing Territories: report of the Secretary-General; 3/
51. Offers by Member States of study and training facilities for inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories: report of the Secretary-General; 4/
52. Preparation and training of indigenous civil and technical cadres in Non-Self-Governing Territories: report of the Secretary-General; 5/
53. Racial discrimination in Non-Self-Governing Territories: report of the Secretary-General; 6/
54. Election to fill vacancies in the membership of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories."

2. At its 1329th meeting, the Fourth Committee decided to take up item 53 as the fourth item on its agenda (A/C.4/566/Rev.1) and to take up other items on Non-Self-Governing Territories after that. However, at the 1406th meeting, on the proposal of the representative of Burma the Committee decided to discuss all the items on its agenda relating to Non-Self-Governing Territories (A/C.4/566/Rev.1, items 4, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12) together.

3. In connexion with these items the Committee received requests for hearings from petitioners from Basutoland, Swaziland and Spanish Guinea. At the 1403rd meeting, the Committee granted a request for a hearing from Mr. Atanasio Edong of the Mouvement National de Liberation de la Guinée Equatoriale (A/C.4/591), and at the 1406th meeting from Mr. Bonifacio Ondo, Mr. Jesus Oyone and Mr. Raymond Stanguino of the same party (A/C.4/591/Add.1). At the 1406th meeting the Committee also granted requests for hearings from Mr. G.M. Kolisang and Mr. K.S. Chakela of the Basutoland Congress Party (A/C.4/563); Mr. J.J. Nguku of the Swaziland Progressive Party (A/C.4/567); Mr. Louis Joseph Naho of the Mouvement pour l'Indépendance de la Guinée

Equatoriale (A/C.4/562) and five petitioners, including Mr. José Perea Epota of the Partido Política Idea Popular de la Guinea Ecuatorial (A/C.4/562/Add.1).

4. At the 1329th and 1403rd meetings, the representative of Spain reserved the position of his Government concerning the hearing of petitioners from Spanish Guinea.

5. At its 1409th to its 1412th meetings the Committee heard the petitioners from the Swaziland Progressive Party, the Basutoland Congress Party and from the Mouvement National de Liberation de la Guinée Equatoriale. At the 1420th meeting the Committee heard the petitioners from the Mouvement pour l'Indépendance de la Guinée Equatoriale and one of the five petitioners from the Partido Política Idea Popular de la Guinea Ecuatorial. At the 1413th meeting, the representative of the United Kingdom and at the 1423rd meeting the representative of Spain made statements regarding matters relating to the hearings of petitioners from Territories under their respective administrations.

6. The Committee considered the items relating to Non-Self-Governing Territories from the 1409th to 1417th and from the 1420th to 1425th meetings. At the 1409th meeting, the Chairman and the Rapporteur of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories introduced the report of that Committee.

7. At the 1414th meeting, in connexion with the transmission of information under Article 73 e of the Charter, the representative of Argentina reserved the position of his Government with regard to sovereignty over, and the transmission of information by the Government of the United Kingdom, on the Islas Malvinas (Falkland Islands), the South Sandwich Islands, the South Georgia Islands and the land included in the Antarctic sector of the Argentine Republic, which, he stated, formed an integral part of the national territory of Argentina. The representative of Chile reserved the rights of his country over Chilean Antarctic Territory. The representative of the United Kingdom stated that his Government had no doubts concerning its sovereignty over the Falkland Islands (Islas Malvinas) and the Falkland Islands Dependencies and added that his Government reserved its rights in the matter.

8. At the same meeting the representatives of Guatemala and the United Kingdom respectively reserved the position of their Governments in respect of British Honduras (Belize). The representative of Mexico restated the position of his Government that, if the status of British Honduras (Belize) were changed, the right

of his Government over part of that Territory would have to be taken into account. The representative of Guatemala restated the position of his Government in connexion with the statement by the representative of Mexico.

9. At the 1415th meeting the representative of Morocco stated his Government's reservations with regard to sovereignty over Ifni, Sakia-al Hamra, Rio de Oro and the towns of Ceuta and Melilla, and any information that might be transmitted by the Government of Spain on these territories. The representative of Spain affirmed the position of his Government as to its sovereignty over these Territories.

10. At the 1417th meeting the representative of Mauritania stated the position of his Government on Rio de Oro. The representative of Spain restated the reservations he had made at the 1415th meeting that there could be no doubt as to his country's sovereignty over Rio de Oro.

11. At the 1420th meeting the representative of the Philippines reserved the position of his Government on the transmission of information by the Government of the United Kingdom on North Borneo. The representative of the United Kingdom stated that his Government had no doubt concerning its sovereignty over North Borneo and reserved the position of his Government.

12. From its 1420th meeting to its 1424th meeting the Committee heard statements in the general debate on items 49, 50, 51, 52, 53 and 55. About thirty delegations participated in the debate. At the 1421st meeting the representative of UNESCO made a statement concerning the observations of the Executive Board of his organization on the working party which it had set up to examine certain studies prepared by UNESCO in connexion with Article 73 e of the Charter.

13. The Committee considered five draft resolutions on these items:

(a) A draft resolution (A/C.4/L.766) submitted at the 1422nd meeting, on the report of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories and relating to item 49, sponsored by Afghanistan, Algeria, Bolivia, Cameroon, Central African Republic, Ceylon, Chad, Congo (Leopoldville), Dahomey, Ethiopia, Federation of Malaya, Gabon, Ghana, Guinea, India, Indonesia, Iran, Jordan, Liberia, Mali, Morocco, Nepal, Niger, Nigeria, Pakistan, Philippines, Sierra Leone, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, Tanganyika, Togo, Uganda and the United Arab Republic;

(b) A draft resolution (A/C.4/L.767) submitted at the 1422nd meeting, on the dissemination of information on the United Nations Declaration regarding the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples and relating to item 50,

sponsored by Afghanistan, Algeria, Bolivia, Cambodia, Cameroon, Central African Republic, Ceylon, Chad, Congo (Leopoldville), Dahomey, Ethiopia, Federation of Malaya, Gabon, Ghana, Guinea, India, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Liberia, Mali, Morocco, Nepal, Niger, Nigeria, Pakistan, Philippines, Sierra Leone, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, Tanganyika, Togo, Uganda, the United Arab Republic and Yugoslavia;

(c) A draft resolution (A/C.4/L.768) submitted at the 1422nd meeting, on offers by Member States of study and training facilities for inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories and relating to item 51, sponsored by Afghanistan, Algeria, Bolivia, Cambodia, Cameroon, Ceylon, Central African Republic, Chad, Congo (Leopoldville), Czechoslovakia, Dahomey, Ethiopia, Federation of Malaya, Gabon, Ghana, Guinea, Hungary, India, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Liberia, Mali, Mongolia, Morocco, Nepal, Niger, Nigeria, Pakistan, Sierra Leone, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, Tanganyika, Togo, Uganda, the United Arab Republic and Yugoslavia;

(d) A draft resolution (A/C.4/L.769) submitted at the 1423rd meeting, on the abolition of racial discrimination in the Non-Self-Governing Territories, and relating to item 53, jointly sponsored by Bolivia, Brazil, Bulgaria, Burma, Ghana, Guinea, Mali, Mauritania, Mexico, Niger, Poland and the United Arab Republic;

(e) A draft resolution (A/C.4/L.771) submitted at the 1425th meeting, on the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories, relating to item 49, jointly sponsored by Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Ceylon, Chad, Dahomey, Ethiopia, Federation of Malaya, Gabon, Ghana, India, Ivory Coast, Liberia, Mali, Nepal, Niger, Nigeria, Pakistan, Sierra Leone, Somalia, Syria, Tanganyika and Togo.

14. At the 1423rd meeting Jamaica and Senegal, and at the 1424th meeting the Ivory Coast, joined as sponsors of draft resolutions (a), (b) and (c) above.

15. At the 1423rd meeting Gabon, Cambodia, Jamaica, India, Nigeria, Senegal, Sudan and Tunisia joined as sponsors of draft resolution (d) and Afghanistan, Cameroon, Dahomey, Ivory Coast, Liberia, Syria and Togo joined as sponsors of that resolution at the 1424th meeting.

16. For the sake of convenience, the consideration by the Committee of the draft resolutions is set out below according to agenda item 3.

ITEM 49: INFORMATION FROM NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES

17. At the 1423rd meeting Cambodia submitted an amendment (A/C.4/L.770) to draft resolution (a) on the report of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories (A/C.4/L.766) to add an additional operative paragraph 4 as follows:

"Requests the Secretary-General to transmit that political and constitutional information, as soon as it reaches him, to the Special Committee on the situation with regard to the implementation of the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples;"

The amendment would also move operative paragraph 5 to follow either operative paragraph 1 or operative paragraph 2.

18. In the course of the discussion it was pointed out that, as resolution 1700 (XVI) already invited the full co-operation of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories with the Special Committee on the situation with regard to the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples, there appeared to be no need for a special request such as that contained in the Cambodian amendment. At the 1424th meeting the representative of Cambodia withdrew his amendment.

19. At the 1424th meeting, the sponsors accepted a suggestion by the representative of the United States of America to replace, in operative paragraph 2, the words "under Article 73 e of the Charter" by the words "within the spirit of Article 73 of the Charter". The sponsors also accepted a suggestion by the representative of the United Kingdom to replace the word "requests" by the word "invites" in the paragraphs addressed to the Administering Members in both draft resolutions A/C.4/L.766 and A/C.4/L.767.

20. At the 1424th meeting the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.4/L.766 as revised by the sponsors, by 80 votes to none, with 3 abstentions.

21. The text of the draft resolution as approved by the Committee is set forth in paragraph 35 as draft resolution I.

22. In the course of the discussion on the above draft resolution, several views were expressed on the continuation of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories. Some members considered that as the General Assembly had already established the Special Committee on the situation with regard to the implementation of the Declaration of independence of colonial countries and

peoples, there was no need for another committee to deal with Non-Self-Governing Territories. Other Members considered that the United Nations had special responsibilities under Chapter XI of the Charter, for the discharge of which the General Assembly had established the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories. Hence, the Committee on Information, with its special functions, was in a position to give valuable assistance to the Special Committee in its work. Another view was also expressed that it might be useful for the General Assembly to make an over-all review at its eighteenth session and then decide whether or not the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories should continue in existence.

23. Arising from the above discussion, some Members felt that it would be useful to set out their views on this question for the record. Consequently, at the 1425th meeting, a draft resolution (A/C.4/L.771) was submitted by Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Ceylon, Chad, Dahomey, Ethiopia, Federation of Malaya, Gabon, Ghana, India, Ivory Coast, Liberia, Mali, Nepal, Niger, Nigeria, Pakistan, Sierra Leone, Somalia, Syria, Tanganyika and Togo. Under the terms of this draft resolution, the General Assembly, while continuing the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories, would review the situation at the eighteenth session with a view to taking a decision at that time on the future of the Committee.

24. At the 1425th meeting, the Fourth Committee adopted the draft resolution by 72 votes to none, with 5 abstentions.

25. The text of the resolution as approved by the Fourth Committee is set forth in paragraph 35 as draft resolution II.

ITEM 50: DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION ON THE UNITED NATIONS

ITEM 51: OFFERS BY MEMBER STATES OF STUDY AND TRAINING FACILITIES FOR INHABITANTS OF NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES

26. At the 1424th meeting, the Fourth Committee voted on the draft resolution on the dissemination of information on the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples (A/C.4/L.767), incorporating the change suggested by the representative of the United Kingdom referred to in paragraph 19 above to change the word "requests" to "invites", and adopted it by 82 votes to 1, with no abstentions.

27. The text of the draft resolution as approved by the Committee is set forth in paragraph 35 as draft resolution III.

28. At the same meeting, the Committee also voted on the draft resolution on the offers by Member States of study and training facilities for inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories (A/C.4/L.768) and adopted it unanimously.

29. The text of the draft resolution as approved by the Committee is set forth in paragraph 35 as draft resolution IV.

ITEM 53: RACIAL DISCRIMINATION IN NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES

30. At the 1424th meeting, the Committee voted on the draft resolution on racial discrimination in Non-Self-Governing Territories (A/C.4/L.769) and adopted it.

31. The text of the draft resolution as approved by the Committee is set forth in paragraph 35 as draft resolution V.

ITEM 52: PREPARATION AND TRAINING OF INDIGENOUS CIVIL AND TECHNICAL CADRES

32. The Committee took note of the report of the Secretary-General^{7/} and of the observations of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories on the preparation and training of indigenous civil and technical cadres.^{8/}

ITEM 55: ELECTION TO FILL VACANCIES IN THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE COMMITTEE ON INFORMATION FROM NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES

33. In 1962, the membership of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories consisted of Australia, France, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Portugal, Spain, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the United States of America as Administering Members, and Argentina, Ceylon, Ecuador, Liberia, Mexico, Pakistan, the Philippines and Upper Volta as non-administering members. Owing to the fact that the terms of Argentina and Ceylon had expired

but that one of the Administering Members, i.e., the Netherlands, had withdrawn from the membership of the Committee as a result of the agreement reached between the Governments of Indonesia and the Netherlands, the Committee was required to elect only one member to fill the vacancy.

34. At the 1425th meeting, acting on behalf of the General Assembly, the Fourth Committee elected Honduras to serve as a member of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories.

Recommendations of the Fourth Committee

35. The Fourth Committee therefore recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of draft resolutions I to V below.

Draft resolution I

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INFORMATION FROM
NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES

The General Assembly,

Recalling that, by resolution 1700 (XVI) of 19 December 1961, it decided that the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories should examine the political and constitutional information transmitted by the Administering Members as well as information relating to functional fields,

Recalling further that the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories was instructed to undertake intensive studies of political, educational, economic and social conditions and problems of Territories located in the same area or region, except where circumstances require individual consideration,

Considering that, by resolution 1654 (XVI) of 27 November 1961, the General Assembly established a Special Committee on the situation with regard to the implementation of the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples,

Having received the report of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories prepared in 1962,^{1/}

1. Takes note of the report of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories on the work of its 1962 session;
2. Notes with satisfaction that the Committee examined the political and constitutional information transmitted by the Administering Members within the spirit of Article 73 of the Charter;
3. Notes that the information transmitted on political and constitutional developments has not been so far detailed enough to allow the Committee and the General Assembly to evaluate fully such developments;
4. Invites the Administering Members to continue to transmit the fullest possible information on political and constitutional developments, especially concerning the activities of the political parties and groups in these Territories,

as well as information showing the extent to which the political, administrative and judiciary machinery in the Territories is in the hands of the indigenous people;

5. Notes that the report of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories was formally transmitted to the Special Committee on the situation with regard to the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples;^{2/}

6. Requests the Secretary-General to transmit the report to the Members of the United Nations responsible for the administration of the Non-Self-Governing Territories, to the Economic and Social Council, to the regional economic commissions, to the Trusteeship Council and to the specialized agencies concerned, for their consideration.

Draft resolution II

CONTINUATION OF THE COMMITTEE ON INFORMATION FROM
NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolution 1700 (XVI) of 19 December 1961,

Considering that, by resolution 1654 (XVI) of 27 November 1961, it established a Special Committee of seventeen members to examine the application of the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples,

Considering further that, in paragraph 8 of that resolution, the General Assembly requested the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories to assist the Special Committee in its work,

Keeping in mind the principles and purposes contained in its resolution 1514 (XV) of 14 December 1960 entitled "Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples",

Recognizing that the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories continues to play a useful role in the attainment of the principles set forth in Chapter XI of the Charter and in the implementation of the mandates incumbent upon the Special Committee on the situation with regard to the implementation of the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples,

1. Decides to continue the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories on the same basis as that established by resolution 1700 (XVI), particularly operative paragraphs 2, 3, 4 and 5 of that resolution;

2. Decides, in the light of the rapid progress required for the accession to independence of Non-Self-Governing Territories, to review the situation at its eighteenth session with a view to taking a decision on the further continuation of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories.

Draft resolution III

DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION IN THE NON-SELF-GOVERNING
TERRITORIES ON THE DECLARATION ON THE GRANTING OF
INDEPENDENCE TO COLONIAL COUNTRIES AND PEOPLES

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolution 1695 (XVI) of 19 December 1961,

Reiterating the view that it is essential that the peoples of the Non-Self-Governing Territories should be widely acquainted with the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples contained in resolution 1514 (XV) of 14 December 1960,

1. Notes with satisfaction the information contained in the Secretary-General's report on this subject^{1/} to the effect that a number of leaflets, wallsheets and radio talks on the aforesaid Declaration have been disseminated in many local languages spoken in the Non-Self-Governing Territories as well as in the languages of the Administering Members;

2. Notes with appreciation that certain Administering Members have extended to the Secretary-General, in accordance with resolution 1695 (XVI), their co-operation in the circulation and dissemination of the Declaration in many Territories;

3. Notes with regret that the Government of Portugal has not extended such co-operation and invites it to co-operate with the Secretary-General in the dissemination of the Declaration in the Territories under Portuguese Administration;

4. Invites all the other Administering Members to continue to co-operate with the Secretary-General in the circulation and dissemination of the Declaration in all Non-Self-Governing Territories under their administration;

5. Further invites the Administering Members to include the Declaration in the curricular of all educational institutions in all Non-Self-Governing Territories;

6. Requests the Secretary-General to continue his efforts towards large-scale circulation and dissemination of the Declaration through all the appropriate media of mass communication in all the Non-Self-Governing Territories, and to prepare a report on further progress on this subject for the General Assembly at its eighteenth session.

Draft resolution IV

OFFERS BY MEMBER STATES OF STUDY AND TRAINING FACILITIES
FOR INHABITANTS OF NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolution 1514 (XV) of 14 December 1960 containing the

Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples,

Recognizing the importance of rendering assistance to colonial countries and peoples in the field of general and specialized education,

Having examined the report of the Secretary-General on offers by Member States of study and training facilities for inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories under General Assembly resolution 845 (IX) of 22 November 1954,^{1/}

Expressing regret that, despite the increased interest among inhabitants of the Non-Self-Governing Territories in such offers, a number of the scholarships offered by Member States remain unutilized,

Further expressing regret that in several instances students who have been granted scholarships have not been accorded facilities to leave the Non-Self-Governing Territories in order to take advantage of such scholarships,

1. Takes note of the report of the Secretary-General on offers of study and training facilities under General Assembly resolution 845 (IX);
2. Reaffirms its resolution 1696 (XVI) of 19 December 1961;
3. Urges Member States to continue to offer scholarships;
4. Requests the Member States offering scholarships to take into account the necessity of furnishing complete information about the scholarships offered, and, whenever possible, the need to provide travel funds to prospective students;
5. Invites once again the Administering Members concerned to take all necessary measures to ensure that all scholarships and training facilities

offered by Member States are utilized by the inhabitants of the Non-Self-Governing Territories and to render effective assistance to those persons who have applied for, or have been granted, scholarships or fellowships, particularly with regard to facilitating their travel formalities;

6. Requests the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its eighteenth session a report on the implementation of the present resolution;

7. Draws the attention of the Special Committee on the situation with regard to the implementation of the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples to the present resolution.

Draft resolution V

RACIAL DISCRIMINATION IN THE NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolution 1698 (XVI) of 19 December 1961, whereby it has, inter alia, urged the Administering Members to include, among the measures that would contribute to the implementation of the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples, steps to ensure:

(a) The immediate rescinding or revocation of all laws and regulations which tend to encourage or sanction, directly or indirectly, discriminatory policies and practices based on racial considerations;

(b) The adoption of legislative measures making racial discrimination and segregation punishable by law;

(c) The discouragement of such practices based on racial considerations by all means possible, including administrative measures;

(d) The immediate extension to all inhabitants of the full exercise of basic political rights, in particular the right to vote, and the establishment of equality among the inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories;

Having examined the report of the Secretary-General on the implementation of the said resolution^{1/} and the report of the Committee on Information from Non-Self-Governing Territories,^{2/}

Noting with deep concern that racial discrimination, in law and in practice, which is utterly repugnant to humanity, has not been eradicated in the Non-Self-Governing Territories,

Reiterating its view that racial discrimination and segregation in the Non-Self-Governing Territories can be eradicated fully and with the greatest speed by the faithful implementation of the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples,

1. Solemnly reaffirms its resolute condemnation of the policy and practice of racial discrimination in the Non-Self-Governing Territories;

2. Urges the Administering Members to give immediate effect to the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples in the Territories under their administration so that an end would be put to racial discrimination in all forms and in all fields;

3. Decides to refer the report of the Secretary-General on racial discrimination in the Non-Self-Governing Territories and the summary records of the discussion on that report to the attention of the Special Committee on the situation with regard to the implementation of the Declaration on the granting of independence to colonial countries and peoples.
