a/ Reporting of military expenditure by force groups and expenditure items is carried out in accordance with the schedule adopted in the USSR for the armed forces and the classification of income and expenditure in the USSR budget and the budgets of the Union Republics.

Since strategic forces do not have a clearly designated structure, falling as they do within various branches of the armed forces, there are no figures in column 1.

Column 2 gives the figures for land forces, and column 3 those for naval forces. Column 4 indicates air forces and column 5 strategic missile forces, anti-aircraft defence forces and other armed forces which are not part of the land, naval and air forces.

- b/ Column 6 gives the figures for central support for the armed forces as a whole, and column 7 those for command, including the main and central administrative departments of the USSR Ministry of Defence and support units.
- c/ Column 8 gives the figures for paramilitary forces, which are not part of the USSR armed forces; these figures are submitted by the frontier troops of the USSR State Security Committee, the territorial troops of the USSR Ministry of the Interior and the instruction centres of the All-Union Voluntary Society for co-operation with the Army, Navy and Air Force (DOSAAF) for training conscripts for service in the armed forces.
- d/ Column 10 gives the figures for non-reimbursable military assistance to foreign countries.
- g/ Column 14 gives the figures for maintaining the civil-defence headquarters staff at the Republic, <u>krai</u> (territorial), and <u>oblast</u> (regional) level. Answer: none (conscription has not been in practice since 1973).

The amount should be given in the same denomination and currency as used in the matrix, preferably converted from foreign currencies to national currency at average annual market or par value exchange rate as reported by the International Monetary Fund.

5. If a regularly published exchange rate is unavailable, or considered unsuitable for converting military expenditures, respondents are requested to comment on other possible ways for comparing the military expenditures of the responding country with those of other countries.

Comment: Official or market exchange rates can be very unsuitable, particularly where voluntary versus conscription personnel compensation is involved. Purchasing power parities, where available, should be more accurate. They should be calculated specifically for the military sector, particularly for personnel pay.
