## ANNEX

## Press release issued by the Government of Botswana on 4 February 1991

The Government of Botswana has made a careful study of this year's speech by President de Klerk opening the South African Parliament on 1 February.

The speech contains some positive elements as well as some elements that show little or no progress.

On the positive side, the Government welcomes the intention of the South African Government to put before Parliament legislation aimed at the abolition of the Group Areas Act, the Land Acts of 1913 and 1936, the Development of Black Communities Act of 1984 and the Population Registration Act.

In certain areas, however, the speech has not shown much progress from the previous policies of the South African Government. For instance, the speech has given prominence to such concepts as community rights - but is silent on the question of violence and the release of political prisoners.

Overall, however, the Government of Botswana is encouraged by the continuing commitment on the part of Mr. de Klerk to keep South Africa on the path of reform and the complete abolition of apartheid.

We look forward to the release of the "Manifesto for the new South Africa", which we learn will define common values for all South Africans. Botswana urges the South Africa Government to accelerate the pace of reform.
