Letter dated 14 November 1985 from the Acting President
of the United Nations Council for Namibia addressed to
the President of the General Assembly

Resolution on Namibia adopted by the 30th Plenary Assembly of the World Federation of United Nations Associations

<u>Namibia</u>

THE 30th PLENARY ASSEMBLY OF WFUNA,

RECALLING Resolution 1.13 on Namibia adopted by the 29th Plenary Assembly of WFUNA.

FURTHER RECALLING the Declaration of the 4th Regional Conference of African UNAs and the Seminar on African Public Opinion in Mobilising Support for the Struggle against Apartheid and Racism, held in Freetown, Sierra Leone, in February 1985,

NOTING that this 30th Plenary Assembly is taking place on the eve of the 40th anniversary of the United Nations and in particular the 25th Anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples.

REGRETTING that in spite of numerous United Nations resolutions and countless international efforts to promote genuine self-determination. Namibia's independence still remains an illusion.

ATTACHING paramount importance to defending and upholding the role and the authority of the United Nations in bringing independence to Namibia.

DEPLORING the intransigence and sinister designs of the racist South African regime and the collaboration of certain foreign interests in the exploitation of Namibia's natural resources,

- 1. STRONGLY CONDEMNS South Africa's bogus "solutions" outside the framework of the United Nations as exemplified by its recent installation of a pupper administration in Namibia;
- 2. FURTHER OPPOSES any attempt to put forward artificial conditions and linkages to delay the earliest possible independence for Namibia;
- 3. URGES the international community to secure the immediate independence for Namibia within the framework of United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 (1978) and General Assembly Resolution 1514 (1960);
- 4. CALLS ON all governments to ensure full enforcement of Decree No. 1 of the United Nations Council for Namibia, the legal administrative nuthority of Namibia;

- 5. CONDEMNS UNRESERVEDLY the persistent forays of South Africa into neighbouring States, especially Angola;
- 6. INVITES all United Nations Associations, especially those in the western world to inexorably increase their efforts to secure the adoption by their governments of immediate further steps towards total sanctions against South Africa so as to achieve the independence of Namibia;
- 7. REITERATES WFUNA's support of the recognition by the United Nations General Assembly of the South West Africa People's Organization (SWAPO) as the sole and authentic representative of the Namibian people;
- 8. CALLS UPON all governments and non-governmental organizations, including United Nations Associations, to increase material support for SWAPO;
- 9. COMMENDS the United Nations Council for Namibia for its active co-operation with non-governmental organizations and representatives of public opinion and APPEALS for increased allocations to the work of the Council from the United Nations General Assembly.
