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LETTER DATED 19 APRIL 1991 FROM THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE
OF KUWAIT TO THE UNITED NATIONS ADDRESSED TO THE PRESIDENT
OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL

Further to my letter of 14 March 1991, I should like to forward additional information on the Kuwait Airways Corporation properties seized by Iraq since 2 August 1990:

- (a) Simulators (see annex I);
- (b) Cars - 400 cars;
- (c) Computers (see annex II);
- (d) Kitchen (see annex III);
- (e) Losses of documentation - Revenue (see annex IV).

I should appreciate it if you would arrange for this letter to be circulated as a document of the Security Council.

Annex III

Kitchen

The flight kitchen, where meals for all airlines operating to/from Kuwait International Airport were catered for, plus outside catering, produced up to 20,000 meals per day and of the best standards.

It was equipped with the latest equipment used in the industry for food preparation:

(a) Bakeries, ovens, deep freezers, vast chillers, meal holding rooms, bread cello wrapping machine, cutlery cello wrapping machine, two dish washing machines, trolley washing machine, equipment and food preparation tables and counters, three conveyor belts, etc.;

(b) Mini experimental kitchen;

(c) Fully equipped laboratory;

(d) Trolleys and utensils;

(e) Office furnitures;

(f) Stores with shelf facilities fully airconditioned and temperature control;

(g) One generator, for use in the event of electricity failure.

Passenger documents

Passenger tickets	- Kuwait Airways and other airlines

The above includes:

(a) Other airline documents uplifted, exchanged or refunded by Kuwait Airways and not billed to other airlines; sales made by agents and Kuwait Airways Offices to passengers, local companies and ministries for which payment was not received; and Kuwait Airways blank documents lying in storage in Kuwait;

(b) Other airlines documents refunded by us and not billed for the months of April/May/June 1990;

(c) Sales made by agents during the month of July 1990 (peak season) but payment not received by Kuwait Airlines and most of the unused tickets were refunded by us;

(d) Owing to the suspension of Kuwait Airways flights, partly used tickets were endorsed to other airlines, resulting in revenue losses for Kuwait Airways.
