Note by the Secretary-General

1. As indicated in document A/41/103 of 18 February 1986, it will be necessary for the General Assembly, during its current session, to appoint the Auditor-General (or officer holding the equivalent title) of a Member State to fill the vacancy that will arise on 1 July 1987 in the membership of the United Nations Board of Auditors as a consequence of the expiration, on 30 June 1987, of the term of office of the Chairman of the Commission of Audit of the Philippines.
2. The following have been nominated by their respective Governments for appointment to the United Nations Board of Auditors for a term of office beginning on 1 July 1987 and ending on 30 June 1990:
 - The Comptroller and Auditor-General of Bangladesh
 - The Auditor-General of Pakistan
 - The Chairman of the Commission of Audit of the Philippines

Arnold Wilfred Geoffrey Kean

Born in Salford, Lancashire, on 29 September 1914, Mr. Kean was educated at Blackpool Grammar School and Queens' College Cambridge (entrance scholar). He obtained a B.A. in 1935, and an M.A. in 1939. First class first division Law Tripos Parts I and II. He won the Wallenberg (Scandinavian Essay) Prize in 1935 and was President of the Cambridge Union.

Commonwealth Fund Fellow at the Harvard Law School in 1936-1938.

Barrister of the Inner Temple (studentship and certificate of honour).

During the Second World War, Mr. Kean did legal service with the British Purchasing Commission and the United Kingdom Treasury Delegation in North America. He was awarded the King Christian X Liberation Medal (Denmark).

His United Kingdom Government legal service included work in the Treasury Solicitor's Department and as the Board of Trade's Principal Assistant Solicitor until 1972.

From 1972 to 1979, he was Secretary and Legal Adviser of the United Kingdom Civil Aviation Authority, and managing trustee of their pension fund.

Since 1953, he has been a United Kingdom member of the Legal Committee of the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO), and Chairman of the Committee from 1978 to 1983. He is a member of the list of arbitrators under Article 85 of the Chicago Convention of 1944.

He was engaged in technical assistance in air law to Libya in 1965-1966 and recently in Antigua, Lesotho, Sierra Leone, Botswana and Seychelles.

He was visiting lecturer in air law at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1979, at Auckland University in 1980 and at the University of Sydney in 1982.

He has served as a member of the United Nations Administrative Tribunal since 1981.

He was appointed Commander of the Order of the British Empire in 1977.

Mr. Kean has been a fellow of the Royal Aeronautical Society since 1976 and was elected Honorary Research Fellow of University College, London, 1983.
