Standards of accommodation for air travel

Report of the Secretary-General

INTRODUCTION

- 1. The present report is presented in accordance with General Assembly decision 44/442 of 21 December 1989, in which the Assembly requested the Secretary-General to continue to submit to it annual reports on standards of accommodation for air travel. It covers the period from 1 July 1990 to 30 June 1991. As also requested by the Assembly in its decision 40/455 of 18 December 1985 and its resolution 45/248 A, section XIII, of 21 December 1990, respectively, information is included on all expenditures by the United Nations for first-class travel and on the meetings attended by eminent persons for whom exceptions have been made for first-class air travel.
- 2. During that period, standards of accommodation for air travel were governed by General Assembly resolution 42/214 of 21 December 1987, in which the Assembly provided that all individuals, with the exception of the Secretary-General and the heads of delegations of the least developed countries to the regular and special sessions of the General Assembly, whose travel was financed by United Nations organizations and programmes and who had been previously entitled to first-class accommodation, would be required to travel at the class immediately below first class. In the same resolution, the Assembly also authorized the Secretary-General to exercise his discretion in making exceptions to allow first-class travel on a case-by-case basis.

I. DELEGATION TRAVEL

3. As indicated in paragraph 2, General Assembly resolution 42/214 limits the payment of first-class accommodation by air to one representative of each Member State designated as a least developed country attending regular, special or emergency sessions of the Assembly. Table 1 sets out the expenditures arising from payment of such travel.

II. EXCEPTIONS AUTHORIZED BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL

- 4. As previously stated, General Assembly resolution 42/214 authorized the Secretary-General to exercise his discretion in making exceptions to allow first-class travel on a case-by-case basis. In addition, business-class travel may be authorized by the Secretary-General in special circumstances, in accordance with administrative instruction ST/AI/249/Rev.3 of 29 March 1989.
- 5. Generally, in reviewing cases that may warrant an exception, the Secretary-General takes into consideration the following circumstances:
- (a) A medical condition may exist necessitating a level of comfort not available in the normal standard of accommodation to which the traveller is entitled. Such cases are referred to the United Nations Medical Director for recommendation. Exceptions may also be granted when a traveller is of an advanced age and the normal standard of travel would have a detrimental effect on the traveller's health;
- (b) The normal standard of accommodation is not available, and owing to exigencies of the service, the traveller is required to travel on a particular date. Cases also arise where accommodation at the normal entitlement is not available and the cost of the daily subsistence allowance, whilst waiting for the next available seat, would be greater than the higher standard of travel;
- (c) Where the traveller is considered an eminent person such as a former head of State or prominent personality who is donating his or her services free of charge to the Organization, and, in some cases, at a loss of personal

income, such individuals may be accorded the standard of accommodation to which they have become accustomed;

- (d) A staff member, after completing a full day of work, is required to travel through the night in order to resume work, attend meetings or present a paper at another location on the collowing morning or immediately upon arrival. Where such cases involve arduous journeys, it has been deemed reasonable that the standard of accommodation accorded to the traveller provides the best rest possible while travelling, or provides conditions most conducive to work while flying, or both.
- 6. In respect of the exceptions to air travel authorized during the period from 1 July 1990 to 30 June 1991, owing to the circumstances referred to in paragraph 5 above, the present report provides detailed information as to the additional cost of, and reasons for, such exceptions in annexes I-V.
- 7. For travel during the period from 1 July 1990 to 30 June 1991, the Secretary-General exercised his discretion by authorizing, as an exception, 65 cases of first-class travel. In addition, during the same period, the Secretary-General authorized business-class travel as an exception to the standards of accommodation in 35 cases.
- 8. It should be noted that, during the period under review, the Secretary-General was accompanied on all his trips by a personal aide/security officer who travelled with him in first class.
- 9. As a comparison, tables 2 and 3 provide a summary, by category, of all the exceptions granted during the present and previous reporting period.
- 10. The total additional cost incurred by the Organization as a result of exceptions to the applicable provisions during the period from 1 July 1990 to 30 June 1991 was \$100,477. This compares with a total additional cost of \$95,956 for the previous reporting period.
- 11. In the context of monitoring adherence to the standards of accommodation for air travel, cases were identified in which a higher standard of air travel was undertaken than the normal entitlement, for which no exception had been sought or granted. In a number of these cases, subsequent ex post facto approval was sought for an exception to the standards of accommodation. In this regard, details of the exceptions authorized by the Secretary-General relating to the previous reporting periods are outlined in annex V to the present report.
