ORGANIZATION OF WORK

Note by the Secretariat

1. In order to assist the Sixth Committee in the organization of its work, the Secretarist finds it appropriate, in the light of General Assembly resolutions 1898 (XVIII) of 11 November 1963 and 32/71 of 9 December 1977 and of rule 99 (b) of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly, to draw the Sixth Committee's attention to the following.

I. ITEMS ALLOCATED TO THE SIXTH COMMITTEE

2. At its 3rd plenary meeting, on 20 September 1991, the General Assembly decided to allocate to the Sixth Committee 13 items. The titles of these items and their numbers are reproduced in the letter dated 20 September 1991 from the President of the General Assembly addressed to the Chairman of the Sixth Committee ($\lambda/C.6/46/1$).

11. DOCUMENTATION RELATING TO THE ITEMS ALLOCATED TO THE SIXTH COMMITTEE

3. The following table lists the documents of the forty-sixth session of the General Assembly relating to the items allocated to the Sixth Committee.* It includes references to the reports of commissions or committees and the reports which are to be submitted by the Secretary-General pursuant to resolutions or decisions of preceding sessions of the General Assembly, as

III. DATE FOR CONCLUDING THE WORK OF THE COMMITTEE, ORDER AND APPROXIMATE DATES OF CONSIDERATION OF ITEMS

4. Rule 99 (b) of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly provides that:

"Each Main Committee, taking into account the closing date for the session fixed by the General Assembly on the recommendation of the General Committee, shall adopt its own priorities and meet as may be necessary to complete the consideration of the items referred to it. It shall at the beginning of the session adopt a programme of work indicating, if possible, a target date for the conclusion of its work, the approximate dates of consideration of items and the number of meetings to be allocated to each item."

5. It is to be mentioned that the General Committee, at its 1st meeting, on 18 September 1991, decided to recommend that the forty-sixth session should

recess on 17 December 1991 and conclude on 14 September 1992. Under the circumstances, it appears advisable that the Sixth Committee should arrange its schedule of meetings in such a way that it will conclude its work not later than Wednesday, 27 November 1991.

6. Taking into account the pattern followed by the Committee in the order of consideration of items at recent sessions of the General Assembly, the Sixth Committee may wish to consider, for the purpose of adopting its programme of work, the following timetable, drawn on the basis of previous programmes of work adopted by the Committee, which indicates approximate dates of consideration of agenda items referred to it.

IV. ESTABLISHMENT OF SUBCOMMITTEES OR WORKING GROUPS AND HOLDING OF CONSULTATIONS

7. In connection with the establishment of subcommittees or working groups and the holding of consultations for the purpose of facilitating the work, it should be borne in mind that the General Assembly took the following decisions at its last session:

(a) As regards agenda item 127, the programme for the activities to be commenced during the first term (1990-1992) of the United Nations Decade of International Law designates the Sixth Committee, working primarily through the Working Group on the Decade, as the coordinating body of the programme (resolution 45/40 of 28 November 1990).

(b) With respect to agenda item 130, the General Assembly decided to resume informal consultations at its forty-sixth session to study the draft articles (on the status of the diplomatic courier and the diplomatic bag not accompanied by diplomatic courier) and the draft optional protocols thereto, as well as the question of how to deal further with these draft instruments with a view to facilitating the reaching of a generally acceptable decision in the latter respect (resolution 45/43 of 28 November 1990).

(c) On agenda item 135, it is to be recalled that the General Assembly decided to continue and to complete at its forty-fifth session the task of identifying and clarifying the elements of good-neighbourliness and to begin the elaboration of a suitable international document on the development and strengthening of good-neighbourliness between States within the framework of a subcommittee on good-neighbourliness (resolution 43/171 B of 9 December 1988). At the forty-fifth session, the item was deferred to the forty-sixth session (decision 45/402 of 21 September 1990).

5. Since the conference services to be provided for meetings of working groups and subcommittees and for the holding of consultations are those allocated to the Sixth Committee, it is important that such meetings and consultations be held in place of, rather than in addition to, meetings of the Committee.

V. DEADLINE FOR SUBMISSION OF DRAFT RESOLUTIONS WITH FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

9. According to rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly, "no resolution involving expenditure shall be recommended by a committee for approval by the General Assembly unless it is accompanied by an estimate of expenditures prepared by the Secretary-General". It is therefore imperative that the Main Committees allow sufficient time for the preparation of the estimates of expenditures by the Secretariat and for their consideration by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions and by the Fifth Committee. Under the circumstances, if Wednesday, 27 November 1991 is accepted as the concluding date for the work of the Sixth Committee (see

para. 5 above), Wednesday, 20 November 1991, would have to be considered as the mandatory deadline for submission to the Fifth Committee of draft resolutions with financial implications.

VI. CONFERENCE RESOURCES AVAILABLE

10. The available conference facilities will, in principle, enable the Committee to hold an average of seven plenary meetings per week; normally, morning meetings will be held from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and afternoon meetings from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m.

11. In order to avoid difficulties in the organization of services for the meetings of regional groups of the Committee, it is suggested that all requests for such meetings be channelled to the Planning and Meetings Services Section through the Secretary of the Committee.
