## INTRODUCTION

1. The present report is submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with operative paragraph 8 of General Assembly resolution 2234 (XXI) of 20 December 1966.
2. By resolution 845 (IX), adopted by the General Assembly on 22 November 1954, Member States were invited to extend to the inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories their offers of facilities not only for study and training of university standard but, in the first place, for study at the post-primary level as well as technical and vocational training of immediate practical value.
3. Under the terms of resolution 845 (IX) and other resolutions relating to scholarships which were adopted in subsequent years,<sup>1/</sup> the Secretary-General submitted to the General Assembly reports containing information on offers of scholarships made by Member States to inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories. The present report is the twelfth of its kind and covers the period from October 1966 to October 1967.

### I. SCHOLARSHIPS OFFERED AND AWARDED

#### Offering States

4. Up to October 1967, twenty-six Member States had made scholarships available for the use of inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories in response to the General Assembly resolutions mentioned above. These Member States are: Brazil, Bulgaria, Burma, Ceylon, Cyprus, Czechoslovakia, Ghana, Greece, Hungary, India, Iran, Israel, Italy, Mexico, Pakistan, Philippines, Poland, Romania, Sierra Leone, Tunisia, Turkey, United Arab Republic, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United States of America, Venezuela and Yugoslavia.

#### Offers and awards

5. Information regarding the scholarships offered by Member States up to October 1966 and the extent to which they were utilized is contained in the previous reports submitted to the General Assembly.

6. Up-to-date information concerning offers of scholarships and awards granted by Member States following the submission of the previous report was requested by the Secretary-General in a note dated 24 July 1967, addressed to the Member States that had offered scholarships in previous years.

7. The information received by the Secretary-General since the previous report is noted below:

#### CYPRUS

In a note dated 29 August 1967, the Permanent Representative of Cyprus informed the Secretary-General that his Government's offer of a scholarship to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories at the Forestry College in Cyprus had not yet been utilized and was still available.

#### GREECE

The Permanent Mission of Greece, in a note dated 7 September 1967, informed the Secretary-General that no students from Non-Self-Governing Territories had applied to the Greek Government for scholarships during the current year. The offer of two scholarships a year made to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories by the Greek Institute of Government Scholarships remained open.

#### HUNGARY

The Chargé d'affaires a.i. of the Permanent Mission of the Hungarian People's Republic informed the Secretary-General in a note dated 24 August 1967, that the five scholarships offered by his Government in 1967 to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories had been utilized.

#### INDIA

In a note dated 19 September 1967, the Permanent Representative of India informed the Secretary-General that the Government of India had allocated twenty-four scholarships to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories for the academic year 1967-1968, of which seventeen had been utilized. The scholarship included round-trip second-class sea passage and rail fare in Africa and in India. The

scholarship amount had been raised to Rs. 300/- per month and a clothing allowance of Rs. 300/- was given initially to all new scholars. Other details concerning the scholarship remained the same.

#### PAKISTAN

In a note dated 7 July 1967, the Permanent Representative of Pakistan informed the Secretary-General that Pakistan had made available one scholarship to a student from Trust and Non-Self-Governing Territories and one scholarship to a student from South West Africa during the year 1967-1968.

#### POLAND

The Permanent Mission of the Polish People's Republic informed the Secretary-General, in a note dated 2 August 1967, that in the course of the 1966-1967 academic year the Polish Government had granted two full expense scholarships to students from Oman. Thus, all ten scholarships offered by the Polish Government in 1956 to students from Non-Self-Governing Territories were already used. Apart from the above-mentioned offer, the Polish Government had made available in 1966 twelve full expense scholarships for secondary technical education to students from Oman. In June 1967, there were thirty-one students from Non-Self-Governing Territories studying in Poland. These students were from the following Territories: three students from Oman studying in the institutions of higher learning and twelve students attending secondary technical schools; nine students from Mauritius; and seven students from Guyana, to whom the scholarships had been granted prior to the independence of that country.

#### ROMANIA

The Permanent Representative of the Socialist Republic of Romania, in a note dated 1 September 1967, informed the Secretary-General that his Government had decided to offer ten scholarships to inhabitants from South West Africa, Non-Self-Governing Territories and the Non-Self-Governing Territories under Portuguese administration, as well as to refugees from those Territories. These were in addition to the scholarships which had been offered so far to inhabitants from Non-Self-Governing Territories and which had been partially utilized.

#### UNITED ARAB REPUBLIC

In a note dated 14 September 1967, the Permanent Representative of the United Arab Republic informed the Secretary-General that the scholarships for the school year 1966-1967 which remained unused were no longer available.

#### UNION OF SOVIET SOCIALIST REPUBLICS

The Permanent Mission of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, in a note dated 23 August 1967, informed the Secretary-General that in the academic year 1966-67, 23 students from Southern Rhodesia, 84 from the United Kingdom colonies in the Middle East (of whom 37 were from Aden), and 80 from other colonies were studying in the Soviet Union. The Permanent Mission reiterated previous communications to the effect that applications by inhabitants of colonial and dependent Territories for grants for study at Soviet educational institutions would receive favourable consideration.

#### UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

In a note dated 31 August 1967, the Representative of the United States of America informed the Secretary-General that a total of fifty-eight new grants were made to persons from Non-Self-Governing Territories under educational and cultural programmes of the United States Department of State for the fiscal year 1966. The Department's educational and cultural exchange programmes provided opportunities in more than 150 fields of specialization for university study, teacher and teaching development, research, practical experience and training, and observation and consultation.

In addition to these scholarship opportunities under the Department's programmes there were private scholarships available in the United States and elsewhere for students from Non-Self-Governing Territories. In the case of private scholarships, financial support varied with the terms of the grant. Most scholarships for foreign students at the secondary level were provided under private auspices. The most extensive of these was the American Field Service programme.

During the academic year 1965-1966 the total number of students from Non-Self-Governing Territories enrolled in institutions of higher learning in the United States of America was: Spanish Guinea - 2; Mauritius - 10; Seychelles - 23; Southern Rhodesia - 255; Fiji - 71; Hong Kong - 3,107; Macau - 18; Gibraltar - 1; Bahamas - 112; Bermuda - 96; British Honduras - 53. These students had been provided with financial support from government or private sources.

## II. APPLICATIONS MADE THROUGH THE UNITED NATIONS

8. In accordance with the procedure established in General Assembly resolution 1696 (XVI) of 19 December 1961, applications for scholarships received by the United Nations Secretariat from inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories were transmitted simultaneously to the offering States for consideration and to the administering Powers for information.

9. During the period under review, 285 students requested and received information and application forms from the Secretariat.

10. Ninety-two of these applications were duly completed and returned to the Secretariat during this period. Of this number, seventy-six were forwarded to the offering States concerned in accordance with established procedure. The remaining sixteen applications could not be forwarded since the applicants were ineligible, either because they were nationals of independent countries or because they did not meet the requirements established by the offering State.

11. Of the seventy-six applications forwarded to offering States, seventy-three came from Southern Rhodesia and three from Mauritius.

12. The applications were for scholarships offered by the following countries (the number of applications for each country is given in parentheses): Burma (15); Czechoslovakia (5); Iran (2); Pakistan (10); Philippines (1); Sierra Leone (26); Tunisia (1); United Arab Republic (1); United States of America (14); and Yugoslavia (1).

13. It should be noted that applicants who desire to study in Ghana, India, Poland, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the United Arab Republic or the United States of America are requested in the information sent to them to apply directly to the Governments concerned and that only a limited number of applications for study in these countries are received by the Secretariat. A

number of other offering States also receive applications directly from students from Non-Self-Governing Territories.

14. Offers extended under General Assembly resolution 845 (IX) are communicated to the administering Powers in accordance with resolution 1696 (XVI) to enable them to give appropriate publicity to the offers in the Territories under their administration. Information on the offers is also included in the handbook, Study Abroad, 1966-68, published by UNESCO.
