NORTHERN TERRITORY OF AUSTRALIA PROHIBITED DRUGS ORDINANCE 1963

No. 77 of 1963

To prohibit the manufacture, use, sale, distribution and possession of prohibited drugs

> (Reserved 16 September, 1963) (Assented to 6 December, 1963)

Be it ordained by the Legislative Council for the Northern Territory of Australia, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Northern Territory (Administration) Act 1910-1962, as follows:

This Ordinance may be cited as the Prohibited Drugs Ordinance 1963.

Short title

Definitions

2. In this Ordinance, unless the contrary intention appears

"prohibited drug" means a drug or a substance containing a drug which is specified in the Schedule to this Ordinance.

Prohibited drugs

3. The drugs specified in the Schedule to this Ordinance are prohibited drugs.

Amendment, etc., of Schedule

4. The Schedule may be amended, altered or added to by Regulations made under this Ordinance.

Manufacture, use, possession, etc., of prohibited drug 5. (1) A person shall not manufacture, prepare, use, sell, dispose of or have in his possession a prohibited drug.

Penalty: Four hundred pounds or imprisonment for two years, or both.

(2) A person who has in his possession a prohibited drug on the date on which it is declared to be a prohibited drug and delivers it to the Chief Medical Officer within seven days after that date shall not be guilty of an offence against the last preceding sub-section by reason only of the fact that he had the prohibited drug in his possession before it was so delivered.

Destruction of prohibited drugs delivered to Chief Medical Officer 6. A prohibited drug delivered to the Chief Medical Officer under this Ordinance shall be destroyed by a person authorized by the Chief Medical Officer in such manner as the Chief Medical Officer directs.

Regulations

7. The Administrator in Council may make regulations, not inconsistent with this Ordinance, prescribing all matters which by this Ordinance are required or permitted to be prescribed, or which are necessary or convenient to be prescribed for carrying out or giving effect to this Ordinance.

Regulations under the Prohibited Drugs Ordinance 19631

PROHIBITED DRUGS REGULATIONS

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Prohibited Drugs Regulations.

Citation

2. The Schedule to the Prohibited Drugs Ordinance 1963 is amended by omitting the words

Amendment to Schedule to Ordinance

"Thalidomide

Ketobemidone²

Diamorphine (heroin) and the salts of the drug Diamorphine (heroin)"

and inserting in their stead the words

"Allylisopropylacetyl urea

Amidopyrine (aminopyrine) and derivatives of the drug amidopyrine (aminopyrine), including dipyrone

Diamorphine (heroin) and the salts of the drug diamorphine (heroin)

Ketobemidone

Methyl cinchophen (methyl ester of phenylcinchoninic acid) Thalidomide".

3. Regulation 1964, No. 6, is repealed.

NORTHERN TERRITORY OF AUSTRALIA DANGEROUS DRUGS ORDINANCE 1964

No. 39 of 1964

To amend the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance 1928-1959

(Reserved 26 August, 1964)
(Assented to 3 September, 1964)

Be it ordained by the Legislative Council for the Northern Territory of Australia, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Northern Territory (Administration) Act 1910-1962, as follows:

Short title and citation

- 1. (1) This Ordinance may be cited as the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance 1964.
- (2) The Dangerous Drugs Ordinance 1928-1959 is in this Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.
- (3) The Principal Ordinance, as amended by this Ordinance, may be cited as the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance 1928-1964.

Commencement

2. This Ordinance shall come into operation on the date on which the Social Welfare Ordinance 1964 comes into operation.

Supplying opium to aboriginals or half-castes

3. Section 5B of the Principal Ordinance is repealed.

NORTHERN TERRITORY OF AUSTRALIA POISONS ORDINANCE 1964

No. 43 of 1964

To amend the Poisons Ordinance 1924-1959

(Reserved 26 August, 1964)
(Assented to 3 September 1964)

Be it ordained by the Legislative Council for the Northern Territory of Australia, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Northern Territory (Administration) Act 1910-1962, as follows:

1. (1) This Ordinance may be cited as the Poisons Ordinance 1964.

Short title and citation

- (2) The Poisons Ordinance 1924-1959 is in this Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.
- (3) The Principal Ordinance, as amended by this Ordinance, may be cited as the Poisons Ordinance 1924-1964.
- 2. This Ordinance shall come into operation on the date on which the Social Welfare Ordinance 1964 comes into operation.
- 3. Section eleven of the Principal Ordinance is amended by omitting paragraph (a).

Commencement

Poison not to be sold to aborigines, etc.
