NOTE BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL -- In accordance with Article 21 of the Convention of 13 July 1931 for Limiting the Manufacture and Regulating the Distribution of Narcotic Drugs, as amended by the Protocol of 11 December 1946, the Secretary-General has the honour to communicate the following legislative text.

DANGEROUS DRUGS ORDINANCE.
(Cap. 33 of the Revised Edition, 1950).

ORDER.

In exercise of the powers conferred upon the Governor by subsection (3) of Section 9 of the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance it is hereby declared that Part III of the Ordinance shall apply to the drugs specified in the Schedule to this Order in the same manner as the said Part III applies to the drugs mentioned in subsection (1) of Section 9 of the Ordinance.

SCHEDULE.

Methyldesomorphine (6-methyl- Δ^6 -desoxymorphine), its salts and any preparation, admixture, extract or other substance containing any proportion of methyldesomorphine or its salts.

3-Dimethylamino-1: 1-di-(2-thienyl)-1-butene, its salts and any preparation, admixture, extract or other substance containing any proportion of 3-dimethylamino-1: 1-di-(2-thienyl)-1-butene.

3-Ethylmethylamino-1: 1-di-(2-thienyl)-1-butene, its salts and any preparation, admixture, extract or other substance containing any proportion of 3-Ethylmethylamino-1: 1-di-(2-thienyl)-1-butene.

6-Piperidino-4: 4-diphenylheptan-3-one, its salts and any preparation, admixture, extract or other substance containing any proportion of 6-piperidino-4: 4-diphenylheptan-3-one.
