The Commission to Study the Organization of Peace was founded in November 1939, after the outbreak of war in Europe. Some 50 scholars and other civic leaders were prompted to create a permanent research body to consider the reorganization or replacement of the League of Nations. Since that time, the Commission has published 23 reports and 20 special recommendations. These studies deal with such issues as the pacific settlement of disputes, maintenance of international peace and security, disarmament, trusteeship, human rights, the sea-bed and outer space. In 1975-1976, the Commission plans to publish four studies of critical issues: human rights, disarmament, peace-keeping and the new international economic order.

The membership of the Commission, ranging between 90 and 100, comprises scholars, lawyers, businessmen and civic leaders throughout the United States.
