

These measures shall not apply with respect to:

- (i) Coal that the procuring State confirms on the basis of credible information has originated outside DPRK and was transported through DPRK solely for export from the Port of Rajin (Rason), provided that the State notifies the Committee in advance, and such transactions are unrelated to generating revenue for the nuclear or ballistic missile programmes of DPRK or other activities prohibited by the resolutions:
- (ii) Total exports to all Member States of coal originating in DPRK that in the aggregate do not exceed 53,495,894 US dollars or 1,000,866 metric tons, whichever is lower, between the date of adoption of resolution 2321 (2016) (30 November 2016) and 31 December 2016, and total exports to all Member States of coal originating in DPRK that in the aggregate do not exceed 400,870,018 US dollars or 7,500,000 metric tons per year, whichever is lower, beginning 1 January 2017, provided that the procurements:
- a. Involve no individuals or entities that are associated with the nuclear or ballistic missile programmes of DPRK or other activities prohibited by the resolutions, including designated individuals or entities, individuals or entities acting on their behalf or at their direction, entities owned or controlled by them, directly or indirectly, and individuals or entities assisting in the evasion of sanctions;
- b. Are exclusively for livelihood purposes of DPRK nationals and are unrelated to generating revenue for the nuclear or ballistic missile programmes of DPRK or other activities prohibited by the resolutions, and that each Member State that procures coal from DPRK notifies the Committee of the aggregate amount of the volume of such procurement for each month no later than 30 days after the conclusion of that month using the form contained in annex V to resolution 2321 (2016).

1. Individuals are listed in the "stop list" of the border control management system.

The border control management system is also interfaced with the I-24/7 system of INTERPOL.

3. All DPRK passport holders require a visa to enter Namibia. Visa applications are scrutinized to ensure that individuals are not on the list of designated individuals.

Anyone found to be on the list of designated individuals will be expelled.

5. Prevent (restrict) the entry or transit of designated individuals and their family members, any individual acting on behalf of or at the direction of a designated individual or entity, any individual violating the sanctions or assisting in their evasion, members of the Government of DPRK, officials of that Government, and members of the DPRK armed forces if the State determines that such members or officials are associated with the nuclear or ballistic missile programmes of DPRK or other activities prohibited by resolutions?

The travel ban does not apply to such individuals and entities when the Committee determines, on a case-by-case basis, that such travel is justified on the grounds of humanitarian need, including religious obligations, or the Committee concludes that an exemption would further the objectives of the resolutions. States can submit requests for exemptions from the travel ban for designated individuals and entities following the instructions set out in the Committee's guidelines.

Such an individual should be expelled for the purpose of repatriation to DPRK or to the individual's State of nationality, consistent with applicable national and international law, provided that these measures shall not impede the transit of the representative of the Government of DPRK to United Nations Headquarters or other United Nations facilities to conduct United Nations business. These measures shall not apply with respect to a particular individual if:

- The presence of the individual is required for fulfilment of judicial process;
- The presence of the individual is required exclusively for medical, safety or other humanitarian purposes;
- The Committee has determined on a case-by-case basis that the expulsion of the individual would be contrary to the objectives of the resolutions.

## 10. Prevent the specialized teaching or training of DPRK nationals within their territories or by their nationals of disciplines that could contribute to the prohibited programmes or activities of DPRK?

Suspend scientific and technical cooperation involving persons or groups officially sponsored by or representing DPRK, except for medical exchanges, unless:

- (i) In the case of scientific or technical cooperation in the fields of nuclear science and technology, aerospace and aeronautical engineering and technology, or advanced manufacturing production techniques and methods, the Committee has determined on a case-by-case basis that a particular activity will not contribute to the proliferation-sensitive nuclear activities or ballistic missile-related programmes of DPRK;
- (ii) In the case of all other scientific or technical cooperation, the State engaging in scientific or technical cooperation determines that the particular activity will not contribute to the proliferation-sensitive nuclear activities or ballistic missile-related programmes of DPRK and notifies the Committee in advance.
