> QUESTION OF SOUTHERN RHODESIA Report of the Fourth Committee (part I) Rapporteur: Mr. Yilma TADESSE (Ethiopia)

At its 1939th plenary meeting, on 25 September 1971, the General Assembly, 1. on the recommendation of the General Committee (A/8500), decided to include in the agenda of its twenty-sixth session and to allocate to the Fourth Committee for consideration and report an item entitled "Question of Southern Rhodesia:, report of the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples". 2. At its 1921st meeting, on 7 October, the Fourth Committee decided to give priority to the present item (item 68), together with the two other items on its agenda, namely, the question of Namibia (item 66) and the question of Territories under Portuguese administration (item 67). At the same meeting, it decided further that a general debate should be held covering these three items, it being understood that members would be given an opportunity to make more than one statement, if they so desired, and that individual draft resolutions on matters covered by the items would be considered separately after the conclusion of the general debate.

3. The Fourth Committee considered this question at its 1923rd to 1926th, 1928th to 1936th and 1938th to 1948th meetings, between 11 October and 11 November.

4. At the 1923rd meeting, on 11 October, the Rapporteur of the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples introduced the chapters of the report of that Committee relating to Southern Rhodesia (A/8423/Add.1 and Add.2 (parts I and II).

5. In connexion with its consideration of the item, the Fourth Committee decided to grant the following requests for hearing:

6. At its 1939th meeting, on 2 November, the Fourth Committee heard a statement by the Reverend G. Michael Scott. At the 1946th meeting, on 8 November, statements were made by Mr. Romesh Chandra, Mr. Lucio Luzzatto, Mr. Emilson Randriamihasinoro and Mr. Nicolai Voshinin, of the World Peace Council. At the same meeting, Mr. Romesh Chandra and Mr. Lucio Luzzatto replied to questions put to them by a member of the Committee.

7. At the same meeting, the Fourth Committee, on the proposal of the representatives of Somalia, Zambia and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, decided, without objection, that the information furnished by the representatives of the World Peace Council (A/C.4/SR.1946) should be disseminated in the publications of the Office of Public Information entitled <u>The United Nations and</u> Southern Africa and Objective: Justice.

8. The general debate covering the present item, together with the two other items referred to in paragraph 2 above, took place at the 1923rd and 1926th, 1928th to 1936th and 1938th to 1945th meetings, between 11 October and 5 November.
9. At the 1947th meeting, on 10 November, the representatives of the Upper Volta and India introduced a draft resolution (A/AC.109/L.988) relating to a specific aspect of the question, which was finally sponsored by the following

10. At the same meeting, the representative of Ghana, on behalf of the sponsors, submitted a revised draft resolution (A/C.4/L.988/Rev.1), by which the fifth preambular paragraph, which read:

"Expressing its grave concern at the recent decision taken by the Congress of the United States of America which, if confirmed, would permit the importation of chrome into the United States from Southern Rhodesia and thus would constitute a serious violation of the above-mentioned Security Council resolutions imposing sanctions against the illegal régime in Southern Rhodesia,"

was replaced by the following:

"Expressing its grave concern at the recent legislative moves in the Congress of the United States of America which, if carried through and confirmed, would permit the importantion of chrome into the United States from Southern Rhodesia and thus would constitute a serious violation of the above-mentioned Security Council resolutions imposing sanctions against the illegal régime in Southern Rhodesia,".

11. At the 1948th meeting, on 11 November, the representative of Egypt submitted oral amendments to the revised draft resolution, by which the fifth preambular paragraph would be replaced by the following:

"<u>Expressing its grave concern</u> at the impending decision of the United States Congress to allow the importantion of chrome from Southern Rhodesia which, if implemented, would constitute a serious violation of the abovementioned Security Council resolutions imposing sanctions against the illegal régime in Southern Rhodesia,".

12. At the same meeting, the representative of Mauritania also submitted oral amendments to the revised draft resolution, by which:

(a) Operative paragraph 1 would be replaced by the following:

"1. <u>Calls upon</u> the Government of the United States of America to conform with the relevant provisions of Security Council resolutions 253 (1968) of 29 May 1968, 277 (1970) of 18 March 1970 and 288 (1970) of 17 November 1970, and to take the necessary measures, bearing in mind its obligations under Article 25 of the Charter of the United Nations, to prevent the importation of chrome into the United States from Southern Rhodesia"; A/8518 English Page 4

(b) The following new paragraph would be added as operative paragraph 6:

"6. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to keep Member States informed of the treatment accorded to this resolution by the Government of the United States of America."

13. At the same meeting, the representative of Guinea also submitted oral amendments to the revised draft resolution, by which the fifth preambular paragraph would be replaced by the following:

"Expressing its grave concern at any decision which would permit the importation of chrome into the United States from Southern Rhodesia and which would constitute a serious violation of the above-mentioned Security Council resolutions imposing sanctions against the illegal régime in Southern Rhodesia."

14. Following an exchange of views, the representatives of Egypt and Mauritania withdrew their oral amendments. The proposal by the representative of Guinea was not pressed to a vote.

15. At its 1948th meeting, on 11 November, the Fourth Committee adopted the revised draft resolution (A/C.4/L.988/Rev.1) by a roll-call vote 93 to 2, with 12 abstentions (see paragraph 17 below). The result of the voting was as follows:

#### RECOMMENDATION OF THE FOURTH COMMITTEE

17. The Fourth Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following draft resolution:

### Question of Southern Rhodesia

The General Assembly,

Having considered the question of Southern Rhodesia,

<u>Recalling</u> its resolution 1514 (XV) of 14 December 1960, containing the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples, and resolution 2621 (XXV) of 12 October 1970, containing the programme of action for the full implementation of the Declaration,

<u>Recalling also</u> the relevant resolutions of the Security Council, particularly its resolutions 232 (1966) of 16 December 1966, 253 (1968) of 29 May 1968, 277 (1970) of 18 March 1970 and 288 (1970) of 17 November 1970,

<u>Recalling further</u> all previous resolutions concerning the question of Southern Rhodesia adopted by the General Assembly and the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples, and also the consensus adopted by the Special Committee at its 828th meeting, on 6 October 1971,  $\frac{1}{}$ 

<u>Expressing its grave concern</u> at the recent legislative moves in the Congress of the United States of America which, if carried through and confirmed, would permit the importation of chrome into the United States from Southern Rhodesia and thus would constitute a serious violation of the above-mentioned Security Council resolutions imposing sanctions against the illegal régime in Southern Rhodesia,

1. <u>Calls upon</u> the Government of the United States of America to take the necessary measures, in compliance with the relevant provisions of Security Council resolutions 253 (1968) of 29 May 1968, 277 (1970) of 18 March 1970 and 288 (1970) of 17 November 1970, and bearing in mind its obligations under Article 25 of the

Charter of the United Nations, to prevent the importation of chrome into the United States from Southern Rhodesia;

2. <u>Requests</u> the Government of the United States to inform the General Assembly at its present session of the action taken or envisaged in the implementation of the present resolution;

3. <u>Requests</u> the President of the General Assembly to draw the attention of the Government of the United States to the urgent need for the implementation of the present resolution;

4. <u>Reminds</u> all Member States of their obligations under the Charter to comply fully with the decisions of the Security Council on mandatory sanctions against the illegal régime in Southern Rhodesia;

5. <u>Decides</u> to keep this and other aspects of the question under continuous review.
