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REPORT OF THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON CAMBODIA

Addendum

INTRODUCTION

1. In paragraph 2 of my report to the Security Council on Cambodia 1/ I indicated my intention to issue as soon as possible an addendum to the report covering indicative administrative and financial aspects of the proposed plan. Given the complexity, size and scope of the United Nations Transitional Authority in Cambodia (UNTAC) the formulation of a detailed estimation of costs as requested by the Council in its resolution 718 (1991) of 31 October 1991 would necessarily be a time-consuming process. It was for this reason inter alia that I informed the Council of my intention to seek an initial appropriation of some US\$ 300 million, which the General Assembly approved on 14 February 1992, so as to facilitate the timely deployment of UNTAC.

2. The estimates provided in the present addendum are preliminary and solely indicative of the order of magnitude of the eventual budget of UNTAC. These are subject to variations in the light of the ongoing collection and analysis of relevant data. It is my hope that these preliminary estimates would enable the Security Council to proceed with its consideration of the proposed implementation plan and authorize the establishment of UNTAC as soon as possible.

I. PRELIMINARY COST ESTIMATES

3. The preliminary indicative costs of UNTAC, inclusive of the initial appropriation of US\$ 200 million, are estimated at approximately \$1,900 million gross (\$1,876 million net). The costs of the repatriation programme are excluded from these estimates. I intend to launch a separate appeal for the further financing of this operation. I may, however, recommend alternative arrangements if there was to be a shortfall in funding the repatriation component. The annex to the present document contains a breakdown by major objects of expenditure.

General considerations and assumptions

4. The transitional period is defined in article I of the Agreement. 2/ Paragraph 1 of annex III to the Agreement foresees the creation of a new Cambodian Government within three months of the date of the election scheduled for late April/early May 1993, i.e. by 31 July 1993. Consequently, the estimates cover a period of approximately 15 months.

5. Based on the implementation plan and the reports of the survey missions, the structure and personnel requirements of UNTAC are as follows:

(a) UNTAC will be headed by the Special Representative of the Secretary-General, assisted by a deputy, an executive management, coordination and liaison team, human rights, political, legal and economic advisers and an information service. The number of international personnel required is estimated at 76, including support staff. In addition, UNTAC will have an administrative support division of some 450 international staff;

(b) The human rights and civil administration components, consisting of some 224 specialists, assisted by 84 international support staff, will exercise the functions outlined in sections II A and D of the implementation plan. They will operate at the central levels, from offices to be established at the 21 provincial and municipal centres and, particularly as regards dissemination of information and civic education, from offices at all of the estimated 200 districts in the country;

(c) The military component, headed by a Force Commander, will have a strength of about 15,900 all ranks, consisting of a force headquarters and sector headquarters staff, a military observer group of 485, an infantry element of 10,200 all ranks, a naval element of 376 and logistics and specialized support elements of about 4,500. The infantry element and the observer group will be reduced from 10,200 and 485 to 5,100 and 300 respectively by 30 September 1992 (see para. 89 of the implementation plan). A further gradual reduction would take place shortly after the elections;

(d) The police component will consist of some 3,600 civilian police monitors operating throughout the territory from offices to be established in 21 provincial/municipal centres and in some 200 district offices;

(e) The electoral component will consist of 72 international personnel operating from headquarters and 126 personnel at 21 provincial and municipal centres. Under the supervision of headquarters and provincial electoral personnel, 400 United Nations Volunteers will operate from each of the 200 districts. Electoral personnel will be supplemented by 800 Cambodian teams (4,000 personnel) during the three- to four-month period of registration of voters and, for the polling process, by 1,000 international supervisors and 8,000 Cambodian polling teams (56,000 personnel). The electoral component will be phased out shortly after the certification of the results of the election to be held late April/early May 1993.

6. All UNTAC components will be assisted by an estimated 7,000 locally recruited support personnel, including some 2,500 interpreters and by additional temporary staff as may be required for the conduct of the electoral process and other tasks.

II. CONCLUDING REMARKS

7. It is my intention to ensure optimum efficiency in resource utilization. Accordingly, the activities of the support elements of UNTAC will be coordinated and integrated to the fullest extent possible. A coordination mechanism will be established to ensure a proper pooling of resources and planning of tasks on the basis of priority requirements of the whole mission.
