ANNEX

Declaration by the twelve States members of the European Community, concerning the outcome of the Guatemala summit, held on 6 and 7 August 1987

The Twelve have taken note with great satisfaction that the five Central American Presidents at their recent meeting in Gualemala have reached agreement on a plan for peace and democracy in Central America, in accordance with the aims of the Contadora-process.

They believe that the outcome of the summit meeting constitutes a very important step towards establishment or a climate of mutual trust necessary for a peaceful development of that region, with respect for political freedom and social justice.

The Twelve fully support these efforts in conformity with their long-standing objectives of the political dialogue, in which they participated at San José, Li kembourg and Guatemala City.

The Twelve urge the five Central American countries, as well as all countries with links and interests in the region, to co-operate constructively in translating the agreement reached into lasting peace and true democracy in Central America.
