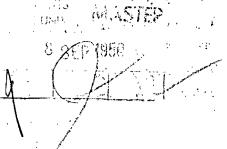

UNIVERSAL POSTAL UNION

1951 Budget

(Report by the Secretary-General)



- 1. The Budget Estimates of the Universal Postal Union for 1951 were forwarded to the Secretary-General on 4 July 1950. The total estimated expenditure for 1951 is established at Swiss Francs 1 246 786 (US\$ 291 305) as compared with Swiss Francs 1 382 286 (US\$ 332 964) approved for 1950.
- 2. The annual ordinary expenditures of the UFU are subject to limits established by the UFU Congress which meets every five years (at present the limit for ordinary expenditure is set at 600 000 gold francs or approximately Swiss Francs 857 142). In addition to ordinary expenditure, however, the UFU budget estimates provide for extraordinary expenditures, which are defined as those connected with the Congress, Conferences and special work. For such extraordinary expenditures, approval is given by the Executive and Liaison Committee or by the Supervisory Authority (the Swiss Government).
- 3. The 1951 estimates have been prepared on the basis of the Standard Budget Summary approved by the Consultative Committee on Administrative Questions and this format makes it possible for the first time to compare the estimates for the UFU with those of other agencies.
- 4. Given the size of the Bureau of the UFU and the relatively small amounts required to finance its work, this note will be limited to highlighting some aspects of the 1951 estimates. For an explanation of the administrative and financial arrangements of the Bureau, the Advisory Committee is referred to the Secretary-General's report on the 1950 Budget for the UFU (document A/CN.1/W.118 of 8 September 1949).

5. The total for the 1951 estimates of expenditure is established at Swiss Francs 1 246 786 (US\$ 291 305). This compares with an approved budget of Swiss Francs 1 382 286 (US\$ 322 964) for 1950. The decrease of Swiss Francs 135 500 (US\$ 31 695) results mainly from a reduction in estimates for Special Projects (printing, preparation of the Directory of Post Offices, etc.) from Swiss Francs 436 840 (US\$ 102 065) to Swiss Francs 248 000 (US\$ 57 943). A reduction in printing estimates is also to be noted from Swiss Francs 182 700 (US\$ 42 686) to Swiss Francs 124 700 (US\$ 29 135).

There are no especially large increases in the estimates for 1951 as compared with those for 1950. The following items may be singled out for examination:

Travel of members of the Executive and Liaison Committee. - An increase of 100 per cent is registered in this account because the Committee is meeting twice in 1951 as against once in 1950.

Organization of meetings. - An increase from Swiss Francs 5 000 (US\$ 1 168) to Swiss Francs 30 000 (US\$ 7 009) is registered in this account because of the increase in the number of meetings of the Executive and Liaison Committee and also because the amount approved for 1950 has proved to be insufficient to meet actual costs.

Salaries for established posts. - The number of established posts approved for 1951 is 18, compared with 17 for 1950 and 16 for 1949. Thus, an increase from Swiss Francs 339 792 (US\$ 79 390) to Swiss Francs 360 763 (US\$ 84 290) is registered, which also covers expenses for automatic increments.

Allowance for length of service with the Bureau. - In accordance with the Bureau's regulations, an allowance is payable to staff members with 25 years' service in the Bureau. Provision for a payment of Swiss Francs 4 300 (US\$ 1 004) is made in the estimates for 1951. None existed in 1950.

The UFU has made reservations as to the adoption of the recommendations of the Committee of Experts on Salary, Allowance and Leave Systems. It is argued that the organization is very small (18 staff members), that the staff is recruited from postal offices in accordance with existing agreements between the UFU and Member Governments, and that a study was made of the UFU's Statute

in 1948 and new personnel regulations adopted. Thus, it is the UPU's feeling that some time in the future the question may be reopened but that at present it does not seem likely that the recommendations of the Committee of Experts would be adopted by the Union.

The estimates for the Technical Transit Commission have been established at Swiss France 100 000, which corresponds to the total expenses incurred with the meetings of the same body in 1949. It is not scheduled to meet in 1950.
