INTERNATIONAL HEALTH CONFERENCE<br>PROPOSAL FOR THE COMPOSITION OF THE WORKING COMMITMEES OF THE INTERNATIONAL HEALTE CONFHEENCE SURMITTED TO THE GRNERAL COMMITTEE BY THE DELEGATION OF LEBANON

At present each of the five working comittees is composed of the whole membership of the Conference. This method of procedure is very cumbersome and time-consuming. If sufficient opportunity is to be given to the delegates to express their views on all sections of the proposed constitution of the World Healith Organization, in each of the working committees as at present constituted, it will take an unnecessarily long time to finish the business of the Conference.

With a view to expediting the business of the Conference and to securing. greater efficiency in its work, the Lebanese delegation proposes that each of the five working committees be composed of a smaller group than the full membership of the Conference. It submits the following concrete proposal to the General Committee of the Conference.

1. Each of the five working committees shall be composed of twenty-five members.
2. These members shall be proposэd to the plenary session for
election by the General Committe日. In proposing the list of
Twenty-five members for each working committee, the General Committoe
shell attempt to secure the proper representation of the different
delegations taking into account the different points of view, and
the different regions.
3. Delegations of the Conference which are not represented on a particular comittee may submit written proposala for amendments to the Coumittee.

4. Each working committee shall elect a drafting committee. After
full discussion by the working committoe of the articles of the constitutions assigned to it, a draft is prepared by the drafting committee which will be approved by the working committee to be submitted to the plenary session for adoption.
5. The delegations attending the Conference as observers shall
be distributed among the five working committees by the General
Committea.
If the above proposal is followed, it will be possible to distribute the fifty-one delegations among the five working comittees in such a way as to have twenty of them represented on three of the five committees and thirty-one of them represented on two of the five working committees. This will secure sufficient representation of all the delegations on the five working committees.
