**Election of the judges of the International Criminal Tribunal for the Prosecution of Persons Responsible for Genocide and Other Serious Violations of International Humanitarian Law Committed in the Territory of Rwanda and Rwandan Citizens Responsible for Genocide and Other Such Violations Committed in the Territory of Neighbouring States between 1 January and 31 December 1994****Letter dated 23 April 1999 from the Secretary-General addressed to the President of the General Assembly**

I have the honour to refer to your letter of 15 April 1999 concurring with my proposal to appoint Mr. Asoka de Zoysa Gunawardana as a judge of the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda (see annex). I have received a corresponding letter from the President of the Security Council. Accordingly, I have appointed Mr. Gunawardana as a judge of the International Tribunal, effective 31 May 1999, for the remainder of the term of office of Judge Kondylis.

### **Letter dated 15 April 1999 from the President of the General Assembly addressed to the Secretary-General**

I have the honour to refer to your letter of 12 April 1999 concerning the candidature of Mr. Asoka de Zoysa Gunawardana for the remainder of the term of office of Mr. Dionysius Kondylis, member of the International Criminal Tribunal for the Prosecution of Persons Responsible for Genocide and Other Serious Violations of International Humanitarian Law Committed in the Territory of Rwanda and Rwandan Citizens Responsible for Genocide and Other Such Violations Committed in the Territory of Neighbouring States between 1 January and 31 December 1994, whose resignation was effective on 22 March 1999 (see appendix).

In accordance with article 12, paragraph 4, of the statute of the International Tribunal, I have reviewed the qualifications of Mr. Gunawardana and am pleased to inform you that I concur with the proposed appointment.

## Appendix

### Letter dated 12 April 1999 from the Secretary-General addressed to the President of the General Assembly

I have the honour to refer to article 12, paragraph 4, of the statute of the International Criminal Tribunal for the Prosecution of Persons Responsible for Genocide and Other Serious Violations of International Humanitarian Law Committed in the Territory of Rwanda and Rwandan Citizens Responsible for Genocide and Other Such Violations Committed in the Territory of Neighbouring States between 1 January and 31 December 1994, which reads as follows:

“In the event of a vacancy in the Trial Chambers, after consultation with the Presidents of the Security Council and of the General Assembly, the Secretary-General shall appoint a person meeting the qualifications of paragraph 1 above, for the remainder of the term of office concerned.”

In this connection, I should like to inform you that Judge Dionysius Kondylis, a national of Greece, has resigned as a judge of the Trial Chambers of the International Tribunal, effective 22 March 1999.

With a view to replacing Judge Kondylis, I have reviewed the list of candidates for election to the Trial Chambers of the International Tribunal which was established by the Security Council in its resolution 1200 (1998) of 30 September 1998 and which was transmitted to the General Assembly in connection with the elections which took place on 3 November 1998, and have come to the view that Judge Kondylis should be replaced by Mr. Asoka de Zoysa Gunawardana, a national of Sri Lanka, whose name was included in that list. Please find his curriculum vitae attached.

It is my view that Mr. Gunawardana meets the qualifications which are prescribed in article 12, paragraph 1, of the statute of the International Tribunal. I also consider that his appointment would be well calculated to ensure adequate representation on the Tribunal of the principal legal systems of the world, as contemplated in article 12 (3) (c) of the Tribunal's statute, and would, moreover, ensure the representation of all geographical regions on the bench. I would also note that, discounting the nine candidates who were successful in the elections of 3 November 1998, Mr. Gunawardana obtained the highest number of votes in the first, second and third rounds of the five rounds of balloting.

I should therefore like to proceed to consultation with you on the appointment of Mr. Gunawardana, in accordance with article 12, paragraph 4, of the statute of the International Tribunal.

I look forward to receiving your views on this matter at the earliest available opportunity, since I am eager that Judge Kondylis's replacement should take up office as soon as possible, and in any event by 31 May 1999, when it is planned that the two newly elected judges of the International Tribunal who have yet to commence their terms of office will make the solemn declaration required by the Tribunal's Rules of Procedure and Evidence and so enter upon their duties.

#### **Professional experience**

Called to the Sri Lanka Bar in June 1967. After practising at the private Bar until January 1972, joined the Attorney-General's Department as a Crown Counsel. Functioned in both civil and criminal branches of the Department. Appeared for the Crown and later for the State in both civil and criminal cases, in the Primary as well as in the Appellate Courts. Appearance in criminal cases included the framing of indictments and the conduct of prosecutions in more than 1,500 cases, in the High Court, in capital offences such as murder, attempted murder, rape and robbery. Giving legal advice to the government departments and agencies in both civil and criminal matters was also part of the functions.

Led the prosecution team in the *Chandrasekera Dias* murder trial before the High Court, involving the death of a Sri Lankan United Nations expert.

Promoted to Senior State Counsel in 1978. The additional duties of this office included supervision of work of several State Counsel.

Appointed Deputy Solicitor-General in February 1986. In 1986, conducted prosecutions before the Special Presidential Commission, appointed to inquire into corruption, misuse and abuse of power by ministers, members of Parliament and other high-ranking public officers.

Appointed Judge of the Court of Appeal of Sri Lanka on 21 March 1988. The work of this Court involves the hearing of appeals from all original Courts and Tribunals, such as the High Court, District Court, Magistrate's Court, Primary Court, Labour Tribunal, Agricultural Tribunal and such other institutions. It also exercises writ jurisdiction in the nature of *habeas corpus*, *Certiorari*, prohibition, *mandamus* and *quo warranto*.
