OTHER MATTERS: VOLUNTARY FUND FOR INDIGENOUS POPULATIONS

Note by the secretariat

The present note contains the recommendations adopted by the Board of Trustees of the United Nations Voluntary Fund for Indigenous Populations at its twelfth session, held in Geneva from 12 to 14 April 1999. These recommendations were approved by the High Commissioner for Human Rights on behalf of the Secretary-General on 22 April 1999.

Annex I

RECOMMENDATIONS ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF
THE UNITED NATIONS VOLUNTARY FUND FOR INDIGENOUS
POPULATIONS AT ITS TWELFTH SESSION

(Geneva, 12-14 April 1999)

1. At its twelfth session, held in Geneva from 12 to 14 April 1999, the Board of Trustees of the United Nations Voluntary Fund for Indigenous Populations examined, during six meetings, information prepared by the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) concerning applications for new travel grants, the financial situation of the Fund, contributions paid by Governments, NGOs and individuals and the implementation by the secretariat of the Board and Fund of the recommendations adopted in 1998 and approved by the United Nations Secretariat.

Mandate of the Fund

2. Convinced that the establishment of a voluntary trust fund would constitute a significant development for the future promotion and protection of the human rights of indigenous populations, the General Assembly decided to establish the United Nations Voluntary Fund for Indigenous Populations by resolution 40/131 of 13 December 1985. The purpose of the Fund is to assist representatives of indigenous communities and organizations to participate in the deliberations of the Working Group on Indigenous Populations of the Sub-Commission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities by providing them with financial assistance, funded by means of voluntary contributions from Governments, non-governmental organizations and other private or public entities.

3. The General Assembly broadened the mandate of the Fund by resolution 50/156 of 21 December 1995 by deciding that the Fund should also be used to assist representatives of indigenous communities and organizations to participate in the deliberations of the open-ended inter-sessional Working Group of the Commission on Human Rights established by the Commission in its resolution 1995/32, as endorsed by the Economic and Social Council on 25 July 1995.

4. The General Assembly further broadened the mandate of the Fund by resolution 53/130 of 9 December 1998 by deciding that the Fund should also be used to assist representatives of indigenous communities and organizations to participate in the deliberations of the open-ended inter-sessional ad hoc working group of the Commission on Human Rights established by the Commission in its resolution 1998/20, as endorsed by the Economic and Social Council in its decision 1998/247 of 30 July 1998.

Board of Trustees

5. The Fund is administered in accordance with the Financial Regulations and Rules of the United Nations by the Secretary-General assisted by a Board of Trustees. The mandate of the Board is to advise the Secretary-General on

the administration of the Fund, through the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights. The Board is composed of five persons with relevant experience on issues affecting indigenous populations, who serve in their personal capacity. The Board members are appointed by the Secretary-General for a three-year term renewable in consultation with the current Chairman of the Sub-Commission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities. At least one member shall be a representative of a widely recognized organization of indigenous populations.

6. The five members who have been appointed by the Secretary-General, with due regard to equitable geographical distribution, are themselves indigenous people: Mr. Michael Dodson (Australia), Ms. Naomi N. Kipuri (Kenya), Mr. José Carlos Morales Morales (Costa Rica), Ms. Tove S. Petersen (Greenland/Denmark) and Ms. Victoria Tauli-Corpuz (Philippines) who serves as Board's Chairperson for the term.

Beneficiaries from the Fund

7. According to the General Assembly, the only beneficiaries of assistance from the Fund shall be representatives of indigenous populations' organizations and communities:

(a) Who are so considered by the Board of Trustees;

(b) Who would not, in the opinion of the Board, be able to attend the sessions of the Working Groups without the assistance provided by the Fund;

(c) Who would be able to contribute to a deeper knowledge on the part of the Working Groups of the problems affecting indigenous populations and who would secure a broad geographical representation.

8. In addition, the Board has developed the following practice and guidelines:

(a) The Board encourages the former beneficiaries of the OHCHR Indigenous Fellowship Programme to apply for grants to represent their indigenous organization or community at sessions of the working groups by sending duly filled in application forms and meeting all the criteria for selection;

(b) The Board encourages indigenous organizations and communities to consider gender balance and, if possible, to present one female and one male candidate;

(c) The Board selects both representatives who have never participated in a session of a working group and representatives who have already participated and could develop specialized capacity and strengthen the core group of participants in a working group;

(d) The Board only considers a maximum of two applicants per organization;

(e) The Board does not consider indigenous applicants who do not provide a letter of support signed by an executive of their indigenous organization nor an applicant who is not an indigenous person himself/herself;

(f) Applicants are requested to submit application forms in one of the working languages of the Board's secretariat (English, French, Spanish). Exceptionally, at the twelfth session the Board considered five applications received in Russian.

Twelfth session of the Board of Trustees

9. The twelfth session of the Board of Trustees of the Voluntary Fund for Indigenous Populations was held at the Palais des Nations in Geneva from 12 to 14 April 1999. The Board held six private meetings.

10. The Board noted with satisfaction that all recommendations adopted at its eleventh session had been implemented (see the report of the Secretary-General to the General Assembly on the status of the United Nations Voluntary Fund for Indigenous Populations (A/53/282) and the report of the High Commissioner for Human Rights to the Commission on Human Rights on the implementation of the programme of activities for the International Decade of the World's Indigenous People (E/CN.4/1999/81)).

11. The Board considered at its twelfth session:

(a) 220 applications for grants to cover travel and per diem expenses for indigenous representatives to attend the seventeenth session of the Sub-Commission's Working Group on Indigenous Populations (WGIP) from 26 to 30 July 1999; and

(b) 20 applications for grants to cover travel and per diem expenses for indigenous representatives to attend the fifth session of the working group established by the Commission on Human Rights on the draft United Nations declaration on the rights of indigenous peoples (WGDD), in October 1999.

12. The Board noted with satisfaction the substantial increase in the number of applications received, as reflected in the following table:

Recommendations for grants

13. After having examined the applications in light of the above-mentioned selection criteria, the Board recommended:

(a) Travel grants for 62 representatives of indigenous communities and organizations to allow them to attend the Working Group on Indigenous Populations, for a total amount of about US\$ 192,640 (see annex II);

(b) Travel grants to allow 14 representatives to attend the working group on the draft United Nations declaration on the rights of indigenous peoples, for a total amount of about US\$ 56,000 (see annex III);

(c) That sufficient funds be allocated for grants to up to 30 indigenous representatives to attend the second session of the working group on a permanent forum for Indigenous Peoples in February 2000, pending adoption of the relevant resolutions by the Commission on Human Rights and the Economic and Social Council; applicants must comply with the criteria adopted by the Board. Priority should be given to the 13 beneficiaries who participated in the first session of the working group in February 1999, provided that they are accredited by an authorized organization; application forms for the working group on a permanent forum should be sent to the organizations authorized by ECOSOC to participate in the sessions of the working groups of the Commission; the members of the Board who will be in Geneva in October 1999 will meet briefly to consider applications for the working group and adopt recommendations.

Fund-raising

14. The Board met with representatives of donor Governments. The members expressed their gratitude for the donors' generous contributions, recommended a sustained effort and, if possible, an increase in the contributions. The Board was encouraged by even symbolic contributions as an expression of interest in the participation of indigenous populations.

15. The Board members would appreciate very much if the High Commissioner for Human Rights would send a letter of appeal to donors for additional contributions to be paid by the end of this year, in order to allow the Board to increase further the number of grants and the representation of indigenous communities and organizations next year.

16. The Board recommended that the Bureau of the Commission on Human Rights at its next session in the year 2000 should invite the Chairperson or any other member of the Board who could be in Geneva during the session of the Commission to deliver a statement introducing the report on the Board's twelfth session, the implementation of the Board's recommendations and the needs of the Fund, and to make an appeal for new contributions.
