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## PLKOPOSED PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1988-1989

Revised estimates resulting from resolution 1987/94 of the Economic. and Social Council on broad representation in the Committee for Programme and Co-ordination

## Report of the Secretary-General

## Addendum

1. At the 41 st meeting of its resumed second regular session, on 4 December 1987, the Economic and Social Council adopted resolution 19ci/94 on broad representation in the Committee for Programme and Co-ordination, the implementation of which would involve additional expenditure by the United Nations in the biennium 1988-1989. In accordance with paragraph 3 of rule 31 of the rules of procedure of the Council, the secretary-General submitted a cost estimate in respect of the resolution prior to its adoption.
2. By paragraph 1 of the resolution the Econcmic and social Council recommended to the General Assembly that from 1988 onward, the committee for programe and Co-ordination be composed of 34 States Members of the United Nations, elected for a threeyear term on the basis of equitable geographical distribution, as follows: Nine seats for African States; seven seats for Astan States; seven seats for Latin American and Caribbean States; seven seats for Western European and other States; and four seats for Eastern European States. Also, by paragraph 2 , the Economic and Social Council recommended to the General Assembly that it elect the new members of the Committee at its forty-second session.
3. The Council was informed that, at present, the Committee for Programme and Co-ordination consists of representatives of 21 Member States. By paragraph 12 of its resolution $31 / 93$ of 14 December 1976, the General Assembly decided that the

Orqanization should bear the cost of tra;el (on the basis of economy class) and subsistence expenses (at standard rates applicable to officials of the secretariat plus 15 per cent) of one representative of each Member state of the Cominitee as a special exception to the basic principles set out in paragraph 2 of General Assembly resolution 1798 (XVII) of 11 December 1.962. The arrangement was decided upon for an experimental period and wes to have been reviewed by the General Astiembly at it: thisty-fourth session. The review was not undertaken by the Assembly and, in paragraph 5 of its resulution $1981 / 1$, the Economir and Social Council decided to recommend to the Geneial Assembly the continuation of the current application of paragraph 12 of Assembly resoluton $31 / 93$. It was therefore ussumed that enlargement of the membership of the Committee would entail additional expenditure for travel of representatives based on continuation during the biennium 1988-1989 of the arrangements initialiy authorized by the General Assembly in resolution 31/93.
4. By paragraph 10 of its resolution $31 / 93$, the General Assembly approved the extension of the duration of sessions of the Committee to six weeks in the plar. years and four weeks in the budget year. The secretary-General's initial estimate for the biennium 1988-1989 under section 1 of the proposed programme budget was therefore based on the Committee meeting fox six weeks in 1988 and four weeks in 1989. Subject to any decision the General Assembly might take at its forty-second session with reqard to the Committee': programme of work in those two years, it was assumed that the committee would meet for six weeks in 1988 and four weeks in 1989. It was recalled, however, that it had sometimes proved necessary for the Assembly to authorize resumed sessions of the Committee, most recently in 1987 , and that, should this prove necessary during the $1988-1989$ biennium, it would have financial implications.
5. Should the General Assembly accept the Council's recommendations, it was estimated that the additional rost of travel and subsistence expenses for 13 additional states Memors elected to the Committee would be $\$ 214,500$ during the hiennium 1988-1989 on a full-cost hasis. travel costs were estimated on the basis of an average figure, and actual coses would vary depending on which states Members were elected to the Committee. Past experience indicated that not all members of the Committee would avail themselves oi the provisions of paragraph 12 of General Assembly resolution 31/93. On the basis of that experience, it was assumed that 9 of the 13 new members would avall themaelves of the above provisions. It was thus estimated that the additional cost of travel and subsistence expen.ess would bre $\$ 148,500$.
6. Dn that basis, should the General Assumbly decide that from 1988 onward, the Comintee for Programme and Co-ordination shall be composed of 34 members, ali additional appropriation of $\$ 148,500$ would be reouited under Section l, overall policy-making, direction and co-ordination, of the proposed programme hudget for the wiennium 1988-1989.
