## INTRODUCTION

1. The present report describes an increase in net requirements of $\$ 38,691,800$, or 2.0 per cent, of the initial appropriation approved by the General Assembly in its resolution $46 / 186$ of 20 December 1991 as follows:

2. The requested increase reflects (i) the actual experience in 1992 as regards salary costs, inflation and rates of exchange, (ii) projections for 1903 in terms of inflation and on the basis of the recommendations of the International Civil Service Commission (ICSC) to the General Assembly at its fortymseventh session, (iii) additional provisions in connection with the implementation of decisions of policy-making organs which could not be
deferred to the 1994-1995 biennium, or unforeseen and extraordinary expenses, and (iv) the net effect of transfers between sections in relation to the restructuring of the Secretariat (A/C.5/47/2 and Corr.1). For the sections which were discontinued as of 30 June 1992, the present report reflects the actual level of expenditure recorded during the first six months of 1992.
3. With regard to the impact of the first phase of the restructuring, it has been assumed in the present report that the General.Assembly will approve the transfers between sections proposed by the Secretary-General in his revised estimates (A/C.5/47/2 and Corr.1) but will postpone action on the question of high-level posts addressed therein as proposed in the note by the Secretary-General on the restructuring and revitalization of the United Nations in the economic, social and related fields (A/47/753). It will be recalled that these transfers were proposed in connection with the establishment of five new sections of the budget (sects. 37 to 41 ) which corresponded to five newly created or expanded Departments. The proposed redeployment of resources to these new sections represents 75 per cent of the biennial appropriations released under 14 of the initial sections following their discontinuation as of 30 June 1992. This operation required a comparatively small increase, in the amount of $\$ 134,500$, to reflect transfers of posts between duty stations, resulting in an adjusted appropriation of \$2,389,369,400.
4. In order to allow for a review of past and projected performance under all sections of the programme budget, projected increases and decreases attributable to factors (i), (ii) and (iii) in paragraph 2 above have been set against the "adjusted appropriation" referred to above. For those sections which have been discontinued following the restructuring, some variances have been recorded in relation to the level of adjusted appropriations. Increases and decreases have been offset through corresponding transfers to and from the related new sections.
5. The impact of (i) decisions of policy-making organs; (ii) other changes including unforeseen and extraordinary expenses; (iii) changes in the operational rates of exchange and rates of inflation; and (iv) adjustments to standard costs are detailed below:

## I. EXPENDITURE SECTIONS

## A. Decisions of policy-making organs

6. Additional requirements of $\$ 1,577,800$ under sections 2 and 37 relate to the implementation of decisions of policy-making organs taken during 1992 after the initial 1992-1993 appropriations were approved by the General Assembly at its forty-sixth session and for which no provision was therefore included. Commitments were approved by the Secretary-General under the authority granted by the General Assembly in its resolution $46 / 187$ of 20 December 1991 on unforeseen and extraordinary expenses for the biennium 1992-1993.

## B. other changes

7. There is an overall increase of $\$ 3,350,200$ under this heading which reflects the net of added requirements in sections $2,8,34$ and 35 relating to unforeseen requirements provided for in the context of resolution $46 / 187$, unforeseen and extraordinary expenses for the biennium 1992-1993, offset by a reduction under section 1 . Also reported under this heading are transfers between sections which were discontinued as a result of the first phase of restructuring and newly created sections. These transfers have no overall financial impact.

Section 1. overall policy-making, direction and coordination
(Decrease: \$1,410.900)

This reduction relates to the provision for repairs and refurbishment of the Secretary-General's residence.

Section 2. Peace-keeping operations and special missions
(Increase: $\$ 579,100$ )

#### Abstract

In order to undertake alterations and improvements in the General Assembly Hall and the Security Council Chamber, the rehabilitation of the structures above the FDR Drive and repair of the dividing wall in the service drive area, the Secretary-General requested concurrence of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (ACABQ) to enter into commitments under the terms of General Assembly resolution $46 / 187$ on unforeseen and extraordinary expenses for the biennium 1992-1993. ACABQ concurred in the Secretary-General's request .......................................... $\$ 3,438,500$


## C. Effects of changes in the operational rates of exchange and rates of inflation

8. An increase of $\$ 29.2$ million is requested under this heading to account for inflationary increases totalling $\$ 36.9$ million partly offset by savings in the order of $\$ 7.7 \mathrm{milli}$ ion due to fluctuations in the operational rates of exchange. Of the $\$ 29.2$ million, an amount of $\$ 22.7$ million relates to staff assessment and is explained in paragraph 15 below. The remainder ( $\$ 6.5$ million) reflects the net effects of revised inflation and exchange rate parameters on salaries and non-post objects ( $\$ 3.7 \mathrm{million}$ ) and the financial implications of the ICSC recommendations to the General Assembly at its forty-seventh session ( $\$ 2.8$ million).
9. Actual United Nations operational rates of exchange during 1992 and the most recent reports on the consumer price indices at all duty stations have been examined and compared with the rates of exchange and inflation that were assumed in the initial appropriations. Likewise, the actual changes in compensation as this relates to the post adjustment multipliers for the Professional category and cost-of-living adjustments for the General Service and related categories have been considered in the calculation of new standard salary costs. Schedules 1 and 2 below contain the revised assumptions for exchange and inflation rates in 1992-1993. Schedules 3 and 4 below contain the revised assumptions for post adjustment multipliers in respect of Professional-level compensation, and cost-of-living adjustments for compensation in the General Service and related categories.
10. The actual decrease of $\$ 7,724,100$ resulting from variations in rates of exchange reflects generally a strengthening during the second half of the year in the exchange rate of the United States dollar with most other currencies. In accordance with established practice, the December 1992 rates are projected to the end of 1993. The movement in foreign exchange rates of the United States dollar throughout 1993 will be monitored and the necessary adjustments in the 1992-1993 appropriation will be proposed in the context of the final

performance report. The operational rates of exchange shown for the present performance report in schedule 1 have been applied to all sections of the programme budget.
11. Budgeted inflation rates in schedule 1 for non-salary objects of expenditure have been reviewed in the light of experience. The initial projections for inflation in 1992 and 1993, published in the report dated 18 December 1991 on the effect of changes in rates of exchange and inflation ( $A / C .5 / 46 / 82$ ) relating to the 1992-1993 biennium, were based on the assumption that the inflation rates for 1991 would continue in 1992 and beyond. New inflation rates are recommended where deemed necessary in the present report. These assumptions will be revised also in the context of the final performance report for the biennium 1992-1993.
12. Exceptions to the general rates of inflation have been identified in instances where the cost of certain services or commodities reflects price increases at significantly different rates. One major exception in this respect relates to after-service health insurance.
13. Although favourable rates of exchange to the United States dollar and lower rates of inflation combine to produce a relatively small decrease ( $\$ 200,000$ ) under non-post objects, an increase is registered under salary and common staff costs in the order of $\$ 3.9$ million. This is due to the fact that projections for post adjustment multipliers assumed last year (A/C.5/46/82) proved in most instances to be lower than actuals (see schedule 3).
14. In his report on the financial implications of ICSC recommendations (A/C.5/47/37), the Secretary-General estimated financial implications in the order of $\$ 3.6$ million. The actual calculation yields $\$ 3.3$ million, of which $\$ 2.8$ million relate to common staff costs. Taking into account the recommendation of $A C A B Q$ in its report in $A / 47 / 7 / A d d .6$, the provisions in respect of higher net salaries and representation allowance of Under-Secretaries-General and Assistant Secretaries-General have been excluded. Therefore, only $\$ 2.8$ million is included for this item.
15. The total increase ( $\$ 22.7 \mathrm{million}$ ) under section 36 , Staff assessment, reflects mainly (i) consolidation of six post adjustment points into base salary, effective 1 March 1992 and (ii) the projected impact of another consolidation, of 6.9 post adjustment points, effective 1 March 1993. The first item was approved by the Assembly at its forty-sixth session and the second is under consideration at its current session, under recommendations of ICSC.

## D. Adjustments to standard costs

16. This category of adjustments relates to two factors, namely the variance of actual payroll costs in 1992 against budgeted salary costs and the effects of new rates of common staff costs contained in schedule 5 of the present report. Requested provisions for salary costs are based on actual payroll
costs in the first nine months of 1992. In some cases, data for 10 months was available. The total increase, in the amount of $\$ 24.1$ million, is broken down as follows:

17. It should be noted that, based on the latest information available, a reduction of some $\$ 5.1$ million is recorded in section 27 , reflecting mainly the difference in standard salary costs between Baghdad and Amman. Based on information provided by the secretariat of the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA) in Amman, no savings are foreseen at this stage under non-post objects.
18. In summary, the table below shows in millions of United States dollars the combined effect of all the factors mentioned above in respect of salaries, common staff costs and non-post items:

## II. INCOME SECTIONS

Section 1. Income from staff assessment (Increase: $\$ 25,904,600$ )
20. The increase in staff assessment is due mainly to the consolidation of six multiplier points into the base salary of staff in the professional category and above effective 1 March 1992 and the projected consolidation of 6.9 post adjustment points effective 1 March 1993. As with other staff costs, exchange rates, unanticipated inflation and changes in standards are also significant factors.

Section 2. General income (Decrease: $\$ 3,149,600$ )
21. The net decrease is attributable basically to a decrease in rental income relating to the estimated income ( $\$ 2,678,400$ ) from rental of premises at the United Nations office at Nairobi in the programme budget for the 1992-1993 biennium.
22. Subsequent to the preparation of the proposed programme budget for 1992-1993, plans for the construction of additional office space at an estimated cost of $\$ 6$ million at the United Nations office at Nairobi were finalized. Following its review of the Secretary-General's report on the United Nations office accommodation at Nairobi (A/CN.1/R.1139). ACABQ concurred, in its letter dated 11 July 1991, with the proposal of the Secretary-General to enter into contractual arrangements for the construction of four buildings at the United Nations office at Nairobi to be financed by an advance from the United Nations Environment Fund. ACABQ approved the Secretary-General's proposal to repay the advance from rental income earned under the regular budget of the United Nations chargeable to the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and other tenants for space at Gigiri. Repayment by the United Nations to the Environment Fund, estimated at $\$ 6,390,000$, includes interest to the Fund estimated at $\$ 390,000$ based on current interest rates and the estimated cost of construction of $\$ 6$ million. Accordingly, income estimated at $\$ 5,083,093$, representing the total remission of rent on space chargeable to UNEP $(\$ 3,455,390)$, and rental income from other tenants at Gigiri ( $\$ 1,628,593$ ) will not be reported under this heading for the biennium 1992-1993 but would be applied as repayment for the loan from the Environment Fund. It is also estimated that the balance of the loan ( $\$ 1,306,017$ ) would be repaid from income expected to be earned in 1994-1995 from rental of premises at Gigiri.
23. Other decreases under this heading $(\$ 471,200)$ are attributable to the application of revised exchange rates and inflation factors.

Section 3. Services to the public (Decrease: $\$ 3,125,200$ )
24. The decrease in net revenue by $\$ 3,125,200$ is due mostly to revisions in the gross revenue expected to be earned from the sale of philatelic items as a

result of the continuing decline in the traditional philatelic customer base ( $\$ 2,773,600$ ). The remaining reduction of $\$ 351,600$ results from recosting by the application of revised exchange rates and inflation factors to both income and expenditure estimates under this heading.
