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NOTE VERBALE DATED 25 FEBRUARY 1993 FROM THE SECRETARY-GENERAL  
ADDRESSED TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL

The Secretary-General of the United Nations presents his compliments to the President of the Security Council and, in accordance with paragraph 4 of Security Council resolution 781 (1992), has the honour to bring to his attention further information received by the United Nations Protection Force (UNPROFOR) regarding apparent violations of the ban on military flights in the airspace of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Between 22 and 24 February 1993, there appear to have been three flights of fixed- or rotary-wing aircraft in the airspace of Bosnia and Herzegovina other than those exempted in accordance with paragraph 1 of resolution 781 (1992) or approved by UNPROFOR in accordance with paragraph 3 of that resolution. In addition there has been two flights on 21 February. Details as to the time and the itinerary of these flights are attached as annexes I and II to this note verbale.

All confirmed violations were immediately protested by UNPROFOR to the party concerned.

It was known to have flown from the town of Bileca (37 nautical miles south-east of Mostar). The aircraft was not detected by AWACS and flew in an area controlled by Bosnian Serbs. 455	21 Feb.	1404	Unknown	The same MI-8 returned to Bileca. UNMOs reported it taking off from Podgorica at 1404Z. The helicopter routed via the town of Niksic (25 nautical miles north-west of Titograd) and entered the "No Fly Zone" 10 nautical miles east of Bileca. The aircraft was not detected by AWACS and flew in an area controlled by Bosnian Serbs.	North-west Unknown Unknown
