SEIZURES OF 2.89 GRAMES OF CPTUM AND O.38 CRAPME OF CODEINE AT VAN-COUVER, B.C. ON 15 JULY AND 6 SEPTEMBER 1946

## Note by the Secretary General

In accordance with Article 23 of the Convention for Limiting the Manufacture and Regulating the Distribution of Narcotic Drugs of 13 July 1931, as amended by the Protocol of 11 December 1946, the Secretary-General has the honour to communicate the following report on the above mentioned seizures to the Members of the United Nations and to the other parties to the Convention.

## 7. Remarks:

From information received early in July, 1956, it was learned that Foster was selling opium by the deck. It was believed he was obtaining his supplies from a well known criminal addict named William A. Redmond (subject of a separate report, No. 27). As a

result of surveillance he was picked up on July 15, 1946 and searched, a paper package containing nine decks of o ium (45 grains)(2.89 grammes) being found behind the waist band of his trousers. He was arrested, charged and duly warned. He refused to say where he was getting his Opium supplies. It was while out on bail avaiting trial that he was suspected of grain trafficking in narcotics and as a result of a search of his room at 2.30 a.m. on the 6th Sept. 1946, six tablets of Codeine (6 grains) (0.38 gramme) were found in a dresser drawer. He was re-arrested and charged with illegal possession of Codeine. Result of trial as shown above.

Subject has proviously been convicted for B. and E., also for theft.

The origin of the drugs seized is still under enquiry.
