B. SEIZURES 2/

1, Raw Opium

(a) ALGERIA

No. 361 Seizure at Colomb-Bechar on 28 March 1955. Report communicated by the Government of France on 29 June 1955. $(5031)^{3/2}$

l(a) Opium: 295 g

2 Mohamed Ben Salem and Ahmed Ben Mohamed Ben Tayeb were arrested and placed under orders of detention. The first accused was in possession of 285 g of opium at the time of his arrest. He stated that he had bought the quantity of the drug from the second accused, who stated, however, that he had sold 1 kg of the drug to the first accused for frs. 45,000 (\$ 129.15). The first accused then admitted that he had sold the missing opium to a third person whose name he could not give.

No. 362 Seizure at Colomb-Bechar on 30 March 1955. Report communicated by the Government of France on 29 June 1955. (5032)

l(a) Opium: 3.915 kg

2. The drug was found in the possession of Hamadi Tayeb who told the police that he had been given it by one Akacem Abdelaziz. The latter stated that the contraband had been given to him by his brother, Akacem Amar Ben Hadj Mohamed, who had left the country.

(b) AUSTRALIA

No. 363 Seizure at Melbourne on 11 May 1955. Report communicated by the Government of Australia on 11 July 1955. (5034)

1(a) Raw Opium: 680.4 g

2. Leung Hun, Chinese greaser on the British tanker <u>Naticina</u> (Anglo Saxon Petroleum Co.) was arrested for possession of the drug which was found in a taxicab.

3. On 17 May 1955, Leung Hun was fined £A.20 (\$44.80)\$ and costs.
 (c) CHINA

No. 364 Seizures in 1954. Report communicated by the Government of China in the advance Chapter V of the Annual Report for 1954. (5009) This report gives five seizures, two of which involve raw opium totalling: Raw opium: 3.624 kg

A. Seizure at Keelung in August and October 1954

1(a) Raw Opium: 2.722 kg (Diacetylmorphine: 737.1 g)

2. Kuo Hsien-ts'ai, a member of the crew of the Norwegian motor ship <u>Hai Meng</u>, was asked by Chou Shou-chih, and agent in Hong Kong, to take the diacetylmorphine to Taiwan. The information was relayed by Chang Hsun-keng, a member of the crew of the steamship <u>Shengking</u>, to Wu Yung-yo, who secured the co-operation of the quarantine officer Li Ching-ch'uan through Yang Hsuan-yu. Li delivered the drugs to Yang Hsuan-yu at the Yung-an Customs Brokerage Agency; they were then handed over to Wu Yung-yo, who sold them to a woman named Lien Ch'en Chin-yu.

On 13 October the <u>Hai Meng</u> again left Hong Kong for Taiwan and Chou Shou-chih entrusted to Kuo Hsien-ts'ai more diacetylmorphine and other narcotic drugs together with the opium; the latter asked Chang Kuei-k'un, another member of the crew, to

keep them. Li Ching-ch'uan was arrested as he took the drugs off the ship; Lien Ch'en Chin-yu, who was waiting to buy them, was also arrested.

B. Seizure at Taiwan in March 1954.

l(b) Raw opium: 902.2 g (Diacetylmorphine: 510.3 g)

2. Lao Jen, a member of the crew of the Norwegian motor ship <u>Hermalin</u>, had the drugs in his possession when he arrived from Hong Kong; they had been entrusted to him by Chou Shou-chih $\frac{5}{}$, an agent at Hong Kong. Chou has previously asked Chang Hsun-keng, $\frac{5}{}$ a member of the crew of the Hong Kong-Taiwan liner <u>Shengking</u> to arrange for Wu Yung-yo to enlist the co-operation of Yang Hsuan-yu, $\frac{5}{}$ a superintendent of construction at the Keelung Harbour Administration and Li Ching-ch'uan, $\frac{5}{}$ quarantine officer, to receive the drugs. Li took the drugs to Yang Hsuan-yu at the Yung-an Customs Brokerage Agency and through Wu Yung-yo $\frac{5}{}$ they were distributed to Ch'en Tung-ts'un, Chang Chung-hsin and others for sale

(d) EGYPT

- No. 405^a Seizure on the Eastern Bank of the Suez Canal on 22 November 1954. Report communicated by the Government of Egypt on 13 June 1955. (5042)
 - 1(a) Opium: 1.21 kg (Hashish: 20.315 kg)

- No. 365 Seizures effected during May 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 13 July 1955. (5043) This report gives eleven seizures, four of which involve raw opium totalling: Raw opium: 4.821 kg

1(a) Raw opium: 136.1 g

2. Wee Boom Peng was arreated.

D. Seizure at Malacca on 27 May 1955.

1(a) Raw opium: 148.9 g (Chandu dross: 212.4 g)

(f) FRANCE

No. 366 Seizure at Paris on 14 May 1955. Report communicated by the Government of France on 29 June 1955. (5030)

1(a) Opium: 3.25 kg

2. A Vietnamese sailor, Ta Van Muu, was arrested while attempting to sell opium in cafes. Three pieces of opium belonging to him were found in a suit-ease consigned to him at a cafe.

(g) HONG KONG

No. 367 Seizure at Hong Kong on 29 March 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 1 July 1955. (5021)

1(a) Raw opium: 472.5 g

2. Wong Ying, a maid servant, was sentenced to a fine of HK\$250 (\$ 43.75), or, in default, to imprisonment for two months, for possession of this drug.

No. 368 Seizure at Hong Kong on 10 April 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 15 July 1955. (5048)

1(a) Raw opium: 8 kg

2. The above-mentioned drug was found on board the steamship <u>Tjikampek</u> (Royal Interocean Lines) coming from Japan.

No. 383^H Seizure at Shek Kip Mei on 5 January 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 1 July 1955. (5020)

l(a) Raw opium: 907.2 g (Prepared opium: 793.8 g) (Opium dross: 85.1 g) (Opium water: 4.394 kg)

2. For further details, see Case No. 383

(h) MAURITIUS

No. 369 Seizure at Port Louis on 24 March 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the United Mingdom on 30 June 1955. (5019) 1(a). Raw opium: quantity not stated.

2. Some raw opium as well as opium smoking peraphernalia were found in the home of Ng Ohig Hee.

(1) NETHERLANDS

No. 370 Seizure at Rotterdam on 25 May 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the Netherlands on 19 July 1955. (5050)

1(a). Raw opium: 4 kg.

2. The above-mentioned drug of unknown origin was found in the possession of Henri Fiala, crow-member of the French steamship <u>Akela</u> (Cie. de Transports Oceanique).

3. The accused was sentenced to imprisonment for three months.

No. 371 Seizure at Rotterdam on 6 June 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the Netherlands on 19 July 1955. (5051)

1(a). Raw opium: 1.1625 kg.

2. The above-mentioned drug, probably of Indian origin, was found on top of the conduits in a corridor on the <u>Atlantic Dragon</u> (Island Navigation Corporation, Tokyo). The owner, Ah Hong Tsang, a Chinese messboy, stated that the opium had been given to him in Bombay.

3. The accused was sentenced to imprisonment for seven days.

(j) SINGAPORE

No. 372 Seizure at Singapore on 15 March 1955. Report No.1012 communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 13 July 1955. (5041)

1(a). Raw opium: 2.726 kg

(Norphine hydrochloride: 7.1 g)

2. These drugs were found following a search by Customs officials of the house of Khoo Thoi Koo, a street vendor. They had been hidden inside the loudspeaker cabinet of a rediffusion set. The origin of the contraband was unknown.

3. On 22 April 1955, the accused was acquitted.

No. 373 Seizure at Singapore on 28 March 1955. Report No. 1011 communicated by the Government of the United Mingdom on 13 July 1955. (5040) 1(a). Raw opium: 6.3504 kg

2. The drug, which was suspected to be of Persian origin, was found by Gustoms searchers in bales of hay on board the Dutch motor vessel <u>Van Heutsz</u> (Koninkligjke Paketvaart Haatschappij N.V.) plying between East African ports, the Seychelles, Singapore, Hong Kong and Japan. Ownership could not be established, but unidentified crewmembers were suspected.

No. 374 Seizure at Singapore on 13 April 1955. Report No. 1009 communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 13 July 1955 (5038).

1(a). Raw opium: 9.1853 kg (morphine content: 6%)

2. The drug was found hidden in the house of a female joss-stick maker, Quek Hoon Kheng.

No. 375 Seizure at Singapore on 14 April 1955. Report No.,1010 communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 13 July 1955. (5039)

1(a). Rew opium: 2.7287 kg

2. Customs officials found this drug in a locked dressing table in a house in Fisher Street. The origin of the drug was unknown.

No. 376 Seizure at Singapore on 18 April 1955. Report No. 1007 communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 13 July 1955 (5036) 1(<u>a</u>). Raw opium: 907.2 g

2. Customs officials found this drug during a search of the British steamship <u>Pentakota</u> (British India Steam Navigation Co. Ltd.) upon her arrival from Indian ports and Rangoon, Burma. The origin of the drug was unknown.

No. 377 Seizure at Singapore on 27 April 1955. Report No. 1008 communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 13 July 1955. (5037) 1(a). Raw opium: 59.8742 kg (morphine content: 8.9%)

2. This opium of Yunnaness origin and believed to have been imported via Thailand and the Federation of Malay, was found in a lorry containing a fish basket filled with live crabs; the contraband had been hidden underneath the crabs. The driver, Tan Poh Chuan, was arrested.

(k) UNITED KINGDOM

No. 378 Seizure at Ellesmere port on 6 February 1955. Report No. 379 communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 5 July 1955. (5025)

 $l(\underline{a})$. Raw opium: 1.0206 kg

2. When Lee Choon Hen, 25-year-old Chinese quartermaster of the British motor vessel Limatula (Shell Oil Co. Ltd.) coming from Singapore and Norway, came on to the landing stage of the Lanchester Ship Canal he dropped two parcels into the canal when hailed by a customs officer. The opium, alleged to have come from Singapore, was in stick form.

3. On 7 February 1955, the accused was fined ±25 (\$70) plus costs.

(1) UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

No. 379 Seizure at San Francisco, California, on 13 April 1955. Report No. 1403 communicated by the Government of the United States of America on 24 June 1955. (5007)

1(a). Crude opium: 2.2778 kg

2. The drug was found hidden in Hong Kong newspapers which had been addressed to Jesus Vong Soo, 306 Maracaibo, Venezuela, and which bore the return address of No. 1 Spring Garden, Manchei, Hong Kong. (See E/NS.1955/ Summary 4, Case 204).

No. 380 Seizure at Seattle, Washington, on 24 January 1955. Report No. 1408 communicated by the Government of the United States of America on 29 July 1955.(5017)

1(a). Crude opium: 1.8002 kg

2. When Shong Wong arrived via Northwest Airlines from Hong Kong, he was searched on suspicion, when the drug was found in the pockets of a special jacket of thin cloth worn underneath his clothing.

2. Prepared Opium

(a) FEDERATION OF MALAYA

No. 381 Seizures effected during Nay 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 13 July 1955. (5043)

This report gives eleven seizures, nine of which involve prepared opium totalling:

A. Seizure at Seremban on 6 May 1955.

2. Kon Wei was arrested.

B. Seizure at Kuala Lumpur on 12 May 1955.

(Raw opium: 756 g)

3. Kuar Chong Swee was sentenced under Sec. 9(1)b of Ordinance 30/52 to a fine of Malayan 5500 (165) or, in default, to imprisonment for three months; under Sec. 9(1)c of the same ordinance to a similar sentence, and under Sec. 10(2)a to a fine of Malayan 250 (82.50) or, in default, to imprisonment for six weeks.

C. Seizure on 13 May 1955 (place not specified).

 $1(\underline{a})$. Prepared opium: 1.9656 kg

3. Kong Yu Kwee was sentenced to a fine of Malayan \$500 (\$495) or, in default, to imprisonment for six months. The fine was paid.

D. Seizure at New Village on 17 May 1955.

1(a). Prepared opium: 113.4 g

3. A woman named Ng Ah Hong was fined Malayan \$500 (\$165).

E. Seizure at Bhau on 19 May 1955.

1(<u>c</u>). Prepared opium: 3.4 g Chandu dross: 38.9 g

2. Fah Kim was arrested.

F. Seizure on 20 May 1955 (place not specified).

 $1(\underline{a})$. Prepared optim: 162.5 g

3. Lau Ah Keh was fined halayan \$100 (\$33) for possession of opium and a further sum of Malayan \$75 (\$24.75) for possession of pipes.

G. Seizure at Simpang Ampat on 24 May 1955.

1(<u>c</u>). Prepared opium: 567 g

3. Tan Kan Yew was sentenced to a fine of Malayan \$4,000 (\$1,320) or, in default to imprisonment for four months. The fine was not paid.

- H. Seizure at Taiping on 27 May 1955.
 l(<u>a</u>). Prepared opium: 200 g
 2. Tay Leng Goh was arrested.
- I. Seizure at Malacca on 27 May 1955.
 - 1(<u>a</u>). Chandu dross: 212.4 g (Raw opium: 148.9 g)
 - 2. & woman named Lim Ah Chia was arrested,
- (b) HONG KONG
- No. 382 Seizure at Hong Kong on 28 April 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 16 July 1955. (5049)

 $1(\underline{a})$. Opium residue: 1.4364 kg

3. Lau Fong No was sentenced to a fine of Hong Kong \$250 (\$43.75) or, in default, to imprisonment for two months.

- No. 383 Seizure at Shek Kip Mei on 5 January 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the United Ringdom on 1 July 1955. (5020)
 - 1(a). Prepared opium: 793.8 g
 Opium dross: 85.1 g
 Opium water: 4.394 kg
 (Rew opium: 907.2 g)
 - 3. A woman named Tse Oi Lin was fined Hong Kong \$2,000 (\$350).

(c) SARAWAK

No. 384 Seizure at Pulau Kerto, Sibu, on 22 February 1955. Report communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 1 July 1955. (5057) 1(a). Prepared opium: 29.89 kg

2. The contraband was found in a package which, attached to floaters, had been passed out of the porthole of the steamship Buloh (Straits Steamship Co. Ltd.) coming from Bangkok, into a boat going up river. Tan Hong Pin <u>alias</u> Ah Too <u>alias</u> Tan Hah Ann, Lim Cho Beng and Chien Teng Tak were arrested in connection with this seizure. The opium was believed to have been forwarded from Theiland.

3. On 18 March 1955, the three accused were each sentenced to rigorous imprisonment for three years and to a fine of Straits \$10,000 (\$3,300) or, in default, to an additional year's imprisonment. Upon appeal, the fines were reduced to Straits \$5,000 (\$1,650).

(d) UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

No. 418a Seizure at Nogales, Arizona, on 1 April 1955. Report 1402 communicated by the Government of the United States of America on 24 June 1955. (5006)

No. 385 Seizure at Tucson, Arizona, on 11 May 1955. Report No. 1406 communicated by the Government of the United States of America on 29 June 1955. (5015)

1(a). Prepared opium: 14.2 g

2. Mike Carranza was arrested for snuggling the drug into the United States from Mexico through the port of Nogales, Arizona.

(e) VENEZUELA

No. 386 Seizure at Caracas in May 1954. Report communicated by the Government of Venezuela in the advance Chapter V of the Annual Report for 1954. (5010)

1(a). Prepared opium: 300 g

2. An opium-smoking den, the property of Jaime Hung, was discovered and the opium, in small insanitary packets, together with pipes, palettes and other apparatus, were seized. The drug was said to have been bought from seamen who acquired it in Curacao.

3. Jaime Hung, Juan Leo, Kwin Hing and Loo Look, were sentenced to confinement in a penal labour colony for two years. Say Fung Wong Lean, Jose Chung, Rafael Chang, Ah Fu, Jon Chang Hong, Win Chang, Chin Quin <u>alias</u> Quin Hen Vhen Chen, Jaime Houy Chin, Julio Guillermo Fung and Francisco Hung were each fined 2,000 bolivers (\$598) for smoking opium, the fines to be paid pertly in cash and partly by detention at the rate of 15 bolivars (\$0.49) per day.

3. Morphine

- No. 372a Seizure at Singapore on 15 March 1955. Report No. 1012 communicated by the Government of the United Kingdom on 13 July 1955. (5041)

Foruvian, Serpio Martínez and Luis Enrique Monteil were each sentenced to confinement in a penal labour colony for three years, the first for cultivating, trafficking in and using the drug, and the remainder for trafficking in and using the drug. Santiago Vilera, Ramón Antonio Nacero Chavez, Martin Cruz Molina, Spanish, Julio Ramón Padilla Dorta, Spanish, Erio Silva Atencio, Ismael Enrique Anez Faz, Colombian, Felipe Huanchin Ramia Yumblat, Antonio José Chirinos, Edsel Rodriquez Navas, Hector Alberto Gómaz, Santos Francesqui Benedetti,

Jesús Rafael Medina, Arturo Alvarez, Emilio Antonio Sánchez and Ernesto Manuel Valencia were convicted of using the drug and sentenced to fines of 1,350 bolivars (\$403.65) or its equivalent in detention at the rate of 15 bolivars (\$0.49) per day.

2. Various poppy plantations were found being cultivated in the regions of Adrar and Timimoun and examination of the plants showed clearly that juice was being extracted for making opium. The plants were torn up and destroyed. Boudjma Ben El Hadj and Mohamed Ben Mohamed were arrested.

Keeling's criminal record includes a previous conviction for narcotics offence. Three American seamen, Fred Remont, John Ternullo and Eugene Gastinell, in Keeling's hotel room, were also arrested.

3. On 21 April 1955, Keeling was sentenced to imprisonment for one year, and Remont and Ternullo to six months each; Gastinell was dismissed.
