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REPORT OF THE PREPARATORY COMMITTEE FOR THE WORLD SUMMIT FOR
SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT ON ITS SECOND SESSION*

(22 August-2 September 1994)

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I. ORGANIZATIONAL MATTERS

A. Opening and duration of the session

1. The Preparatory Committee held its second session at United Nations Headquarters from 22 August to 2 September 1994. The Preparatory Committee held 16 plenary meetings (1st to 16th) and a number of informal meetings, as well as 5 meetings of the Working Group on agenda items 3 and 5.
2. The session was opened by the Chairman of the Preparatory Committee.
3. At the 1st meeting, on 22 August, the Secretary-General addressed the Preparatory Committee.

II. STATUS OF THE PREPARATIONS FOR THE WORLD SUMMIT
FOR SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

19. The Preparatory Committee considered agenda item 3 at its 1st, 9th and 16th meetings, on 22 and 26 August and on 2 September 1994. It had before it a note by the Secretariat on the status of the preparations for the World Summit for Social Development (A/CONF.166/PC/15).

20. At the 1st meeting, on 22 August, the Under-Secretary-General for Policy Coordination and Sustainable Development made an introductory statement.

At the 6th meeting, on 24 August, statements were made on chapter V of the draft programme of action by the representatives of Germany (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), Italy, Finland (on behalf also of Denmark, Iceland, Norway and Sweden), Algeria (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China), India, Côte d'Ivoire, Egypt, France, the Russian Federation, Bangladesh, Romania, Nigeria, Nepal, Zimbabwe, Senegal, Morocco, Saudi Arabia, Niger, Austria, Pakistan, China, Malaysia, Indonesia, Chile, Mexico, Japan, the Philippines, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Papua New Guinea, Sierra Leone, Ukraine, Malawi, Benin, the United States of America, Angola, Mali, Nicaragua, Guinea and the Republic of Korea.

48. The observer for Switzerland also made a statement.

49. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of IMF and UNIDO.

50. The representative of the Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights also made a statement.

51. At the same meeting, statements were made by the observers for the following non-governmental organizations: Women's Environment and Development Organization, International Federation of Agricultural Producers, OXFAM, International Organization of Consumers Unions, Global Alliance for Women's Health, American Association of Jurists, International Federation of Settlements and Neighbourhood Centres and Centre for Youth and Social Development, as well as a caucus of women's non-governmental organizations.

52. Also at the 6th meeting, the Preparatory Committee heard statements on chapter IV by the representatives of New Zealand, Guinea, Malaysia, the Republic of Korea, Latvia and Malta.

53. The observer for the Holy See also made a statement.

54. A statement was made by the representative of the United Nations International Drug Control Programme.

55. At the same meeting, statements were made by the observers for the following non-governmental organizations: International Indian Treaty Council, Cordilera Women's Education and Resource Center, Inc. and Groupe de recherche, d'études et de formation "Femmes-action", as well as a caucus of non-governmental organizations for children.

56. At its 7th meeting, on 25 August, the Preparatory Committee began consideration of the draft declaration contained in document A/CONF.166/PC/L.13.

57. Statements were made by the representatives of Australia, the United States of America, Algeria (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China), Mexico, Chile, Germany (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), China, Senegal, Poland, Croatia, Benin, Cuba, Canada, Burkina Faso, Slovenia, Pakistan, Tunisia, the Russian Federation, Lebanon, Bangladesh, India, Viet Nam, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Belarus and Kenya.

58. Statements were also made by the observers for the following non-governmental organizations: Instituto del Tercer Mundo (on behalf of a development caucus), Education International and International Confederation of Free Trade Unions, as well as a caucus of women's non-governmental organizations.

59. Also at the 7th meeting, a statement was made by an observer for a Commission on Global Governance.

60. At the 8th meeting, on 25 August, statements were made on the draft declaration by the representatives of Japan, New Zealand, Malaysia, the Philippines, Jamaica, Bulgaria, Indonesia, Brazil, the Republic of Korea, the Sudan, Kuwait and Sweden.

61. The observers for the Holy See and Switzerland also made statements.

62. At the same meeting, the representative of the United Nations Volunteers programme made a statement.

63. Statements were also made by the observers for the following non-governmental organizations: International Institute for Sustainable Development, International Association of Gerontology, People to People Aid Movement and International Council on Social Welfare.

64. At the 9th meeting, on 26 August, the Under-Secretary-General for Policy Coordination and Sustainable Development introduced a working paper on the draft programme of action (A/CONF.166/PC/CRP.2).
65. Statements were made by the representatives of Benin and the Sudan.
66. At the 10th meeting, on 29 August, statements were made on document A/CONF.166/PC/CRP.2 by the observers for a women's caucus and a development caucus of non-governmental organizations.
67. At the 11th meeting, on 30 August, statements were made on document A/CONF.166/PC/CRP.2 by the observers for an African caucus and a rights of the child caucus of non-governmental organizations.
68. At the 12th meeting, on 30 August, statements were made on document A/CONF.166/PC/CRP.2 by the observers for a South Asia caucus and a youth caucus of non-governmental organizations.
69. At the 13th meeting, on 31 August, statements were made on document A/CONF.166/PC/CRP.2 by the observers for the following non-governmental organizations: International Confederation of Free Trade Unions, as well as an Asia-Pacific caucus of non-governmental organizations.
70. At the 14th meeting, on 31 August, statements were made on document A/CONF.166/PC/CRP.2 by the observers for the following non-governmental organizations: American Association of Retired Persons and International Council on Social Welfare.
71. At the 15th meeting, on 1 September, the Preparatory Committee heard an oral report by the Vice-Chairman, Mr. Koos Richelle (Netherlands), on the work of the Committee of the Whole on the draft programme of action, which he had chaired (see annex II). During the course of his statement, the Vice-Chairman withdrew the report on the work of the Committee of the Whole contained in document A/CONF.166/PC/L.17.
72. Statements were made by the representatives of Canada, Algeria (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China), Germany (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), the Russian Federation, the United States of America, Morocco, Indonesia, Benin and Bangladesh.
73. Statements were also made by the observers for the following non-governmental organizations: International Council on Social Welfare and International Federation of Journalists, as well as a development caucus, a women's caucus and a South Asia caucus of non-governmental organizations.
74. At the 16th meeting, on 2 September, the Chairman of the Preparatory Committee introduced document A/CONF.166/PC/L.18, which contained his progress report on the draft declaration.
75. Statements were made, and amendments proposed to the document, by the representatives of Indonesia, Guinea, Uruguay, Cuba, Belarus, Austria, Germany (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), the Islamic Republic of Iran, Pakistan, the Sudan, Ecuador, Colombia, Canada, Nepal, Mauritius, Morocco and the Russian Federation.
76. The observer for Switzerland also made a statement.

77. At the same meeting, the observer for a human rights caucus of non-governmental organizations made a statement.

78. Following statements by the representatives of Germany (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the European Union), Algeria (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China), Bangladesh, Slovenia, Indonesia, the Sudan and Benin, the Preparatory Committee decided (see annex I, decision 2/3) to:

(a) Request the Chairman and the Bureau to organize inter-sessional informal consultations, with the participation of all States, during the week of 24 October, in New York, in the framework of the General Assembly. Full interpretation and documentation services are to be provided within the resources allocated to the General Assembly. The subjects of these informal consultations will be the declaration and the programme of action;

(b) Request the Secretariat to prepare an informal document, by 30 September 1994, based on the documents and discussions held on the draft programme of action during the second session of the Preparatory Committee;

(c) Request the Secretariat to prepare, by 30 November 1994, a revised draft programme of action for the third session of the Preparatory Committee in January 1995, drawn from the inter-sessional consultations and from the discussions held during the second session of the Preparatory Committee and the documents which served as a basis for those discussions;

(d) Request the Chairman to continue consultations with all interested States and regional organizations on the draft declaration and prepare a progress report to the inter-sessional consultations. On the basis of these consultations, a draft declaration will be submitted by the Chairman for negotiations during the third session of the Preparatory Committee.

IV. DRAFT PROVISIONAL RULES OF PROCEDURE OF THE SUMMIT

79. The Preparatory Committee considered agenda item 5 at its 16th meeting, on 2 September 1994. It had before it a note by the Secretariat on the draft provisional rules of procedure (A/CONF.166/PC/L.6).

80. At the same meeting, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Zbigniew Wlosowicz (Poland), who served as the chairman of the Working Group on agenda items 3 and 5, read out the following agreed amendments to the draft provisional rules of procedure:

Rule 1

The words "The delegations of each State participating in the Summit" were replaced by the words "Each State participating in the Summit and the European Community";

Rule 3

The words "or, in the case of the European Community, by the President of the European Commission" were inserted after the words "Minister for Foreign Affairs";

Rule 4

The words "forty-eighth session" were replaced by the words "forty-ninth session";

Rule 6

The words "and an ex officio Vice-President from the host country" were inserted after the word "Vice-Presidents" and the words "composed in accordance with rule 11" were inserted after the words "General Committee";

Rule 24

Paragraph 1

The words "or of the European Community" were inserted after the word "Summit";

Paragraph 3

The words "or of the European Community" were inserted after the word "State";

Rule 47

The words "and the European Community" were inserted after the word "Summit";

Rule 57 bis

A new rule was inserted after rule 57, reading as follows:

Associate members of regional commissions

"Representatives designated by associate members of regional commissions may participate as observers, without the right to vote, in the deliberations of the Summit, the main committee and, as appropriate, any other committee or working group."

Rule 60

The words "Save where otherwise specifically provided with respect to the European Community in these rules of procedure" were inserted at the beginning of the rule.

Rule 62

The existing rule was replaced by the following new text:

"1. Non-governmental organizations accredited to participate in the Summit may designate representatives to sit as observers at public meetings of the Summit and the main committee.

"2. Upon the invitation of the presiding officer of the body concerned and subject to the approval of that body, such observers may make oral statements on questions in which they have special competence. If the number of requests to speak is too large, the non-governmental organizations shall be requested to form themselves into constituencies, such constituencies to speak through spokespersons."

81. During the course of his statement, the Vice-Chairman proposed that further consultations be held on rule 6, in order to finalize the number of vice-presidents.

82. At the same meeting, the Preparatory Committee decided to transmit the draft provisional rules of procedure, as orally amended, to the General Assembly for approval, on the understanding that consultations on rule 6 would continue (see annex I, decision 2/4).

V. PROVISIONAL AGENDA FOR THE THIRD SESSION
OF THE PREPARATORY COMMITTEE

83. At its 16th meeting, on 2 September, the Preparatory Committee adopted the draft provisional agenda for its third session, as contained in document A/CONF.166/PC/L.19 (see annex I, decision 2/5).

84. The representative of Mexico made a statement.

VI. ADOPTION OF THE REPORT OF THE PREPARATORY COMMITTEE

85. At its 16th meeting, on 2 September, the Preparatory Committee adopted its draft report (A/CONF.166/PC/L.19) and agreed to incorporate the decisions taken at its 16th meeting into the final report.

2/2. Status of the preparations for the World Summit for Social Development

A

Trust Fund for the World Summit for Social Development

1. The Preparatory Committee for the World Summit for Social Development:

(a) Recalls General Assembly resolution 47/92 of 16 December 1992, in which the Assembly invited the Secretary-General to establish a trust fund for the World Summit for Social Development in order to mobilize voluntary contributions from public and private sources for the financing of the additional activities required by the preparations for and the holding of the Summit, including the regional preparatory meetings, and for the financing of the participation of the least developed countries in the Summit and its preparatory process;

(b) Also recalls General Assembly resolution 48/100 of 20 December 1993, in which the Assembly invited all States to contribute generously to the Trust Fund;

(c) Notes that contributions to the Trust Fund have been received from twelve States and expresses its appreciation to them for their generosity and support;

(d) Reiterates the importance of participation from the least developed countries in the preparatory process of the Summit and in the Summit itself;

(e) Urges all States, public and private organizations and individuals to contribute generously to the Trust Fund to support preparatory activities for the Summit, and, in particular, to facilitate the fullest participation from the least developed countries in the preparatory process and the Summit itself, including through payments, to the extent that resources in the Trust Fund are available, of a subsistence allowance to their representatives.

B

Activities undertaken since the first session of the Preparatory Committee

Cooperation with the host Government

2. The Preparatory Committee for the World Summit for Social Development expresses its deep appreciation to the Government of Denmark for its preparations for the Summit, and notes with satisfaction the signing of the host government agreement between the United Nations and the Government of Denmark.

National level

3. The Preparatory Committee for the World Summit for Social Development:

(a) Expresses its gratitude to the States that submitted national reports, notes that, including the reports submitted at the first session of the Preparatory Committee, the Secretariat has received a total of twenty-six national reports, and invites the Secretariat to explore the possibility of a larger diffusion and use of those reports;

(b) Invites Governments that have not yet done so to establish national committees for the preparation for the Summit, and also invites Governments to inform the Secretariat, to the extent possible, of the establishment of such committees;

(c) Requests the Secretariat to inform the Preparatory Committee at its third session, in an appropriate manner, of activities at the national level related to the preparations for the Summit.

Symposia, seminars and workshops

4. The Preparatory Committee for the World Summit for Social Development:

(a) Notes the activities undertaken by the Secretariat in preparation for the Summit, including, inter alia, the organization of symposia, seminars and workshops on issues of direct relevance to the Summit;

(b) Takes note of the content of the summary of discussions of the expert group meeting on poverty organized by the Secretariat and the World Bank, held at Lusaka in June 1994; a/

(c) Expresses its thanks to the Government of Zambia for its assistance and cooperation in the organization of the meeting, and to the Government of the Netherlands for the financial contribution that it made towards the convening of the meeting;

(d) Notes the symposia, seminars and workshops organized by other entities of the United Nations system, Governments, non-governmental organizations and other public and private organizations, and expresses its appreciation for their contributions to the overall process of preparation for and follow-up to the Summit;

(e) Notes with appreciation the supportive activities undertaken at the regional level, notably by the regional commissions;

(f) Encourages the United Nations, the United Nations system, Governments, non-governmental and intergovernmental organizations and institutes to continue their initiatives to support the preparation for the Summit, including seminars, workshops and symposia.

C

Non-governmental organizations

5. The Preparatory Committee for the World Summit for Social Development:

(a) Notes with satisfaction that a large number of non-governmental organizations have been accredited to the Preparatory Committee;

(b) Expresses its appreciation for the contributions that non-governmental organizations are making to the preparatory process of the Summit;

(c) Encourages national and international non-governmental organizations to continue to extend their active participation to the preparatory process and follow-up of the Summit.

Public information programme

6. The Preparatory Committee for the World Summit for Social Development:

(a) Notes with appreciation the activities undertaken by the Department of Public Information of the Secretariat in disseminating information on the Summit and its objectives and issues, and the media strategy proposed by the Department;

(b) Also notes the active involvement of the United Nations information centres in undertaking special promotional activities and the implementation of the information programme and media strategy;

(c) Encourages the Department of Public Information of the Secretariat to continue its efforts in bringing the Summit to the attention of the widest possible audience;

(d) Encourages all organizations and agencies of the United Nations system to include the Summit and its objectives in their public information activities.

2/3. Draft declaration and draft programme of action

At its 16th meeting, on 2 September 1994, the Preparatory Committee decided:

(a) To request the Chairman and the Bureau to organize inter-sessional informal consultations, with the participation of all States, during the week of 24 October 1994, in New York, in the framework of the General Assembly. Full interpretation and documentation services are to be provided within the resources allocated to the General Assembly. The subjects of these informal consultations will be the declaration and programme of action;

(b) To request the Secretariat to prepare an informal document, by 30 September 1994, based on the documents and discussions held on the draft programme of action during the second session of the Preparatory Committee;

(c) To request the Secretariat to prepare, by 30 November 1994, a revised draft programme of action for the third session of the Preparatory Committee, in January 1995, drawn from the inter-sessional consultations and from the discussions held during the second session of the Preparatory Committee and the documents which served as a basis for those discussions;

(d) To request the Chairman to continue consultations with all interested States and regional organizations on the draft declaration and prepare a progress report to the inter-sessional consultations. On the basis of those consultations, a draft declaration will be submitted by the Chairman for negotiations during the third session of the Preparatory Committee.

2/4. Draft provisional rules of procedure of the World Summit for Social Development

At its 16th meeting, on 2 September 1994, the Preparatory Committee decided to transmit the draft provisional rules of procedure of the World Summit for Social Development, contained in document A/CONF.166/PC/L.6, as orally amended, to the General Assembly at its forty-ninth session for approval.

2/5. Provisional agenda for the third session of the Preparatory Committee

1. Adoption of the agenda and other organizational matters.
2. Accreditation of non-governmental organizations in accordance with the rules for their participation set out in decision 2 of the Preparatory Committee.
3. Status of the preparations for the World Summit for Social Development:
 - (a) Trust Fund;
 - (b) Public information programmes.
4. Draft outcome of the World Summit for Social Development: draft declaration and draft programme of action.
5. Provisional agenda and organization of work for the World Summit for Social Development.
6. Adoption of the report of the Preparatory Committee.

ANNEX II

Oral report by the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole
on the draft programme of action

1. The Committee of the Whole met to consider the revised draft programme of action contained in document A/CONF.166/PC/CRP.2. The secretariat for the World Summit recorded the numerous suggestions and contributions made by the delegations during the discussion.

2. Views were expressed on a range of substantive issues relating to social development. There were several substantive points, both of a practical and of a conceptual nature, that required further discussion and negotiation before the Committee could reach consensus. The following were some of the points raised, but these do not represent an exhaustive list:

- (a) The movement of people across borders (the right to migrate);
- (b) External debt situation;
- (c) (Cost of) Structural adjustment programmes;
- (d) Official development assistance (target of 0.7 per cent of gross national product);
- (e) 20-20 concept;
- (f) Concept of human security;
- (g) Concept of sustainable social/human development;
- (h) Concept of social security;
- (i) Concept of the informal sector (broadening the understanding of work to include informal activities);
- (j) The role of the family (in relation to social protection);
- (k) Concept of poverty (definition of extreme poverty, widespread poverty, absolute poverty and relative poverty);
- (l) Question of monitoring the concepts contained in (f), (g), (h), (i) and (k) above;
- (m) Funding derived from taxes on trade;
- (n) Role of the Security Council.

3. The Committee of the Whole pointed to the need to maintain the five-chapter structure contained in the current draft of the programme of action. Within each subsection, and contingent upon the final format of the declaration of the Summit, however, it was proposed to adopt a three-part structure for the text: rationale; goals or objectives; and action.

4. The Committee recognized that it would be necessary to request the Chairman and the Bureau to organize inter-sessional consultations with the participation of all States. The subject should be both the declaration and programme of action. There should be an informal document prepared by the Secretariat.
