Sir,

In reply to your convocation dated 7 February 1957,^{1/} I received it on the 25 March 1957 with so much trouble in the Cameroon.

We protest for the Southern Cameroon election to the House of Assembly. the election was not a true election.

After the election the polling officer did not allow the polling agent to know which party have won. The polling officer kept the bilot boxes in his car and off he went. The result could only be heard after seven days; which was not a true result.

You should know that the British or French Government will not support the party, which has got the Freely Expressed Aspiration of the Population. Bilot Boxes of U.P.C. could not be found in some station of election.

The population protest at LIKOMBA vehemently against the BRITISH GOVERNMENT, supporting the party which has not got the freely expressed aspiration of the population.
