REPORT OF THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON THE QUESTION
CONCERNING HAITI

Addendum

1. In reference to paragraphs 66, 87 and 90 of my main report dated 17 January 1995 (S/1995/46), I wish to inform the Security Council that the estimated cost of the take-over of the mission from the multinational force by the United Nations Mission in Haiti (UNMIH) would amount to \$178,317,000 for the first six months. This estimate provides for 6,000 military contingent personnel, 900 civilian police, 227 international civilian staff, 193 local staff and 29 United Nations Volunteers.
2. A breakdown of the estimated costs indicated in paragraph 1 above is provided by main categories of expenditure, for information purposes, in the annex to the present addendum.
3. Should the Security Council decide to authorize the take-over of the mission from the multinational force by UNMIH, it would be my recommendation to the General Assembly that the costs relating thereto should be considered an expense of the Organization to be borne by Member States in accordance with Article 17, paragraph 2, of the Charter of the United Nations and that the assessments to be levied on Member States should be credited to the UNMIH special account.
