Subject: FIRST DAY OF ISSUE: "UNIVERSAL DECLARATION
OF HUMAN RIGHTS" STAMPS

1. On 11 June 1993, the United Nations Postal Administration (UNPA) will issue the fifth and final set of stamps in its multiyear series commemorating the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Every year since its inception on 17 November 1989, UNPA has issued six stamps in six denominations. The stamp designs have been specially selected works of art representing each one of the Declaration's 30 Articles. Now, with the issuing of this final set, UNPA has completed one of its most important projects: reproducing the entire text of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in postage stamp format. Continuing the format utilized in the previous years of the series, the 1993 Human Rights stamps will be released in six separate mini-sheets. The special format of these sheets alternates rows of six stamps with rows of six tabs containing the full text of the Article reflected in the art on the stamp. On each sheet, the tabs will alternate in English, French and German.
2. The stamps were printed by Joh. Enschedé en Zonen (Netherlands) by offset. They were adapted as stamps by Robert Stein, a United Nations staff member.
3. The concept and sheet design were developed by Arleigh Gaines (U.S.A.).
4. The stamps measure 33 mm x 33 mm, perforation to perforation. Perforation: 13 1/2 x 13 1/2. A total of 2,502,000 stamps and labels were printed of each of the six denominations.

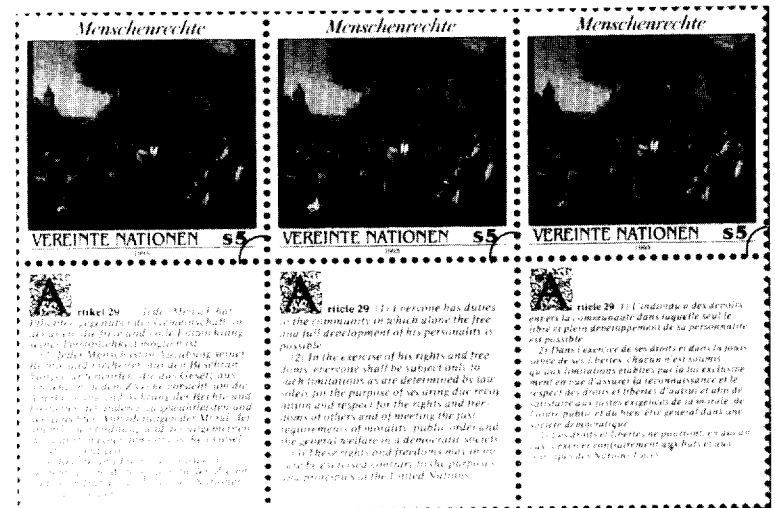

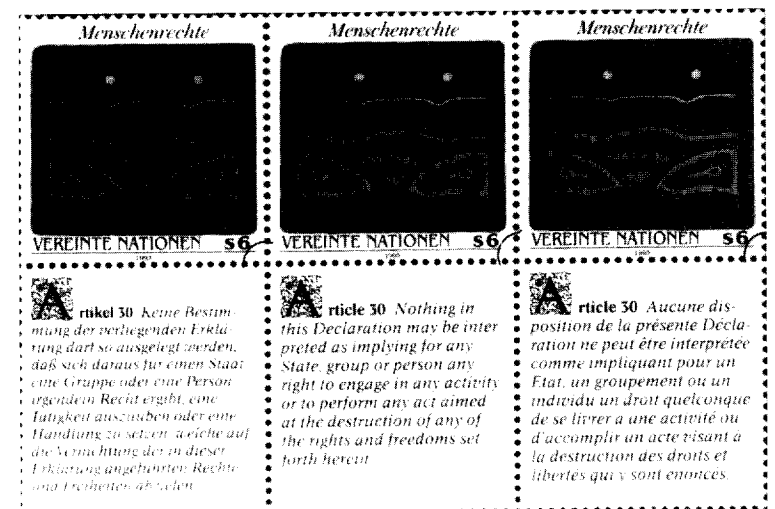

6. The stamps will be available in selling units of SINGLES and FULL SHEETS ONLY. Please note that a SINGLE unit will consist of a block of six images, i.e. three stamps with three labels on which the Article is printed in English, French and German.

7. For the convenience of collectors, UNPA at Headquarters will provide prepared New York, Geneva and Vienna cancelled first-day covers on the UNPA official first-day cachets ONLY. First-day covers will be available as M.I. Block of 6 (three stamps and three labels with marginal inscription) and combination (one of each stamp in one currency with attached label in either English, French or German and sold in sets of the three languages).

8. The 1993 Human Rights annual collection folders will also go on sale on 11 June:

(a) The fifth and final multi-denominational folder containing the six 1993 mint stamps and Articles in the Human Rights Series;

(b) A special triple-cancelled Human Rights annual collection folder with the stamps in all three denominations affixed and appropriately cancelled in New York, Geneva and Vienna.

9. For the convenience of members of delegations and the staff, the new stamps, folders and first-day cancellation will be available on Friday, 11 June, at the following locations:

(a) The UNPA sales counter in the concourse of the General Assembly Building: 9 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. Note: the entire Human Rights Series (all 30 Articles) will be available at this location. The 1988 Fortieth Anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights stamps and souvenir sheets will also be on sale. The stamps illustrate the Human Rights flame and the souvenir sheet contains the full text of the Preamble;

(b) The counter at the north end of the Secretariat lobby: 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. (1993 issue only).

10. Staff members are encouraged to use United Nations stamps on their personal mail. By doing so, these miniature messengers of peace can educate unseen thousands of people to the activities and goals of the United Nations.
