Implementation of the Convention on the Rights of the Child

The General Assembly,

<u>Recalling</u> its resolution 44/25 of 20 November 1989, by which it adopted the Convention on the Rights of the Child,

<u>Recalling also</u> its resolution 47/112 of 16 December 1992 and Commission on Human Rights resolution 1994/91 of 9 March 1994, $\underline{1}/$

<u>Taking note</u> of the report of the Committee on the Rights of the Child on its sessions, 2/ and the meeting of the States parties to the Convention on the Rights of the Child, held in New York on 10 October 1994,

<u>Reaffirming</u> that the rights of children require special protection and call for continuous improvement of the situation of children all over the world, as well as for their development and education in conditions of peace and security,

<u>Profoundly concerned</u> that the situation of children in many parts of the world remains critical as a result of inadequate social and economic conditions, natural disasters, armed conflicts, exploitation, illiteracy, hunger and disability, and convinced that urgent and effective national and international action is called for,

<u>Mindful</u> of the important role of the United Nations and of the United Nations Children's Fund in promoting the well-being of children and their development,

<u>Encouraged</u> by the fact that an unprecedented number of States have to date become signatories and parties to the Convention on the Rights of the Child, thereby demonstrating the widespread political commitment that exists to strive for the promotion and protection of the rights of the child,

<u>Convinced</u> that the Convention on the Rights of the Child, as a standardsetting accomplishment of the United Nations in the field of human rights, makes a positive contribution to protecting the rights of children and ensuring their well-being,

<u>Recalling</u> the recommendation in the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action, $\underline{3}$ / adopted by the World Conference on Human Rights, held at Vienna in 1993, that measures be taken to achieve by 1995, universal ratification of the Convention on the Rights of the Child, and the universal signing of the World Declaration on the Survival, Protection and Development of Children and Plan of Action, $\underline{4}$ / adopted by the World Summit for Children, held in New York on 29 and 30 September 1990, as well as their effective implementation,

<u>Seriously concerned</u> about those reservations to the Convention on the Rights of the Child which are contrary to the object and purpose of the Convention or otherwise contrary to international treaty law, and recalling that the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action urges States to withdraw such reservations,

<u>Having considered</u> the report of the Secretary-General on the status of the Convention, $\underline{5}/$

1. <u>Takes note with appreciation</u> of the report of the Secretary-General on the status of the Convention on the Rights of the Child;

2. <u>Recalls with deep satisfaction</u> the entry into force of the Convention on 2 September 1990 as a major step in international efforts to promote universal respect for and observance of human rights and fundamental freedoms;

3. <u>Expresses its satisfaction</u> at the number of States that have signed, ratified or acceded to the Convention since it was opened for signature, ratification and accession on 26 January 1990;

4. <u>Urges</u> all States that have not done so to sign, ratify or accede to the Convention as a matter of priority, with a view to reaching universal ratification by 1995;

5. <u>Emphasizes</u> the importance of the full implementation by States parties of the provisions of the Convention;

6. <u>Urges</u> States parties to the Convention that have made reservations to review the compatibility of their reservations with article 51 of the Convention and other relevant rules of international law, with the aim of withdrawing them;

7. <u>Calls upon</u> States parties to submit their reports to the Committee on the Rights of the Child on time, in accordance with the guidelines elaborated for that purpose;

8. <u>Welcomes</u> the constructive and useful results achieved by the Committee on the Rights of the Child during its first seven sessions;

9. <u>Welcomes</u> the consideration by the Committee of the reservations and declarations entered by States parties to the Convention as a part of its important functions in overseeing the effective implementation of the Convention;

10. <u>Notes with appreciation</u> the elaboration by the Committee of a preliminary draft optional protocol to the Convention on the Rights of the Child on involvement of children in armed conflicts;

11. <u>Requests</u> the Committee, in accordance with article 45 (a) of the Convention on the Rights of the Child, to invite the United Nations Children's Fund, in collaboration with the Centre for Human Rights of the Secretariat, to submit reports on specific issues related to, <u>inter alia</u>, the exploitation and abuse of children, in order to increase awareness of the provisions of the Convention and their implementation, and in order to support concrete action at national and international levels;

12. <u>Expresses</u> concern at the increasingly heavy workload of the Committee on the Rights of the Child and the resulting difficulties it faces in the fulfilment of its functions;

13. <u>Approves</u> the recommendation contained in the resolution adopted by consensus at the meeting of the States parties to the Convention on the Rights of the Child on 10 October 1994, in which the States parties reaffirmed the recommendation made by the Committee on the Rights of the Child regarding the

increase to three of the number of annual sessions of the Committee as from 1995, as well as the number of sessions of the pre-sessional working group;

14. Authorizes the Secretary-General to implement that recommendation;

15. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to ensure the provision of appropriate staff and facilities, within the overall existing budget framework, for the effective and expeditious performance of the functions of the Committee on the Rights of the Child;

16. <u>Requests</u> bodies and organizations of the United Nations, within the scope of their respective mandates, to intensify their efforts to disseminate information on the Convention on the Rights of the Child, promote understanding of it and assist Governments in its implementation;

17. <u>Invites</u> intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations to intensify their efforts with a view to disseminating information on the Convention to adults and children alike and promoting understanding of it;

18. <u>Takes note</u> of the establishment by the Economic and Social Council of two open-ended working groups to elaborate respectively, (a) a draft optional protocol to the Convention on the involvement of children in armed conflicts; and (b) guidelines for a possible draft optional protocol to the Convention on the sale of children, child prostitution and child pornography, as well as the basic measures needed for their prevention and eradication;

19. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its fifty-first session a report on the status of the Convention on the Rights of the Child;

20. <u>Decides</u> to consider the report of the Secretary-General at its fiftyfirst session under the item entitled "Human rights questions".
