INTRODUCTION

The report of the Governing Council of the United Nations Development Programme on its organizational meeting for 1993, its special session and its fortieth session is presented to the Economic and Social Council in accordance with paragraph 4 of General Assembly resolution 2029 (XX) of 22 November 1965.

<u>Decides</u> to waive for its meetings in 1993 rule 22 of its rules of procedure, in so far as that rule refers to the requirement of a quorum of one third of the members of the Governing Council present to open a meeting or to proceed with a debate;

<u>Approves</u> the provisional agenda and tentative schedule of work for its special session from 16 to 19 February 1993 (DP/1993/L.1);

V

Approves the provisional agenda and the tentative schedule of work for its fortieth session (DP/1993/L.2 as orally amended) and on the understanding that the Bureau of the Council be entrusted with the task of adjusting the schedule of meetings within the overall allocation of services to ensure a smooth and proper conduct of the Council;

Agrees that the Standing Committee for Programme Matters shall deal with the following subjects at the fortieth session:

- (a) Implementation of country programmes in various regions;
- (b) All country and intercountry programmes;
- (c) Global and interregional projects;
- (d) Country and intercountry programmes of the United Nations Population Fund;

- 1. <u>Decides</u> to allocate the following items of the provisional agenda for the fortieth session to the Budgetary and Finance Committee:
 - 5. United Nations Population Fund: financial, budgetary and administrative matters;
 - 7. Other funds and programmes: financial and administrative questions;
 - 8. Financial, administrative and budgetary matters. Under this item the Governing Council will consider the following subjects:
 - (a) Annual review of the financial situation, 1992 (including trust funds);
 - (b) Budget estimates for 1994-1995 and revised budget estimates for 1992-1993;
 - (c) Audit reports and other matters;
 - (d) Financial Regulations: matters on which consensus has not yet been achieved;
 - (e) Procurement from developing countries;
- 2. <u>Further decides</u> that the Budgetary and Finance Committee shall also review the financial implications of draft decisions before the Governing Council takes action thereon;

<u>Reaffirms</u> the principles contained in section III, paragraph 4, of Governing Council decision 83/1 of 14 February 1983, which shall guide the deliberations of the Drafting Group;

 $\underline{\text{Agrees}}$ to waive the 10-week rule for the submission of documents to be considered by the Governing Council at its fortieth session, as specified in section VI of document DP/1993/L.2.

Approves the fifth country programme for Rwanda with the provision that the Administrator shall present an interim report to the Council at its fortieth session on the implementation of the country programme as well as the impact which the evolution of the general context of the country may have on the implementation of the programme;

The Governing Council

Approves an increase in the authority granted to the Administrator to approve preparatory assistance to global projects from the present level of \$125,000 to \$250,000, pending final approval by the Governing Council at its fortieth session (1993).

93/6. Sectoral support programme: Country Director programme of the United Nations Industrial Development Organization

The Governing Council,

<u>Having considered</u> the need for and possibility of increasing the annual allocation for the Country Director programme of the United Nations Industrial Development Organization on the basis of decision 11 of the Industrial Development Board at its tenth session, adopted on 6 November 1992 in Vienna, and the report of the Administrator (DP/1992/61),

<u>Calling upon</u> the Governments concerned to assume, whenever possible, local costs accruing from the posting of Country Directors to their countries,

- 1. <u>Authorizes</u> an amount of up to \$10.2 million for the Country Director programme of the United Nations Industrial Development Organization for 1992 and 1993, from the total of \$19 million earmarked for funding the Programme in the fifth programming cycle under the Sectoral Support Programme;
- 2. <u>Invites</u> the United Nations Industrial Development Organization to manage the Country Director programme within the overall allocation made within the fifth programming cycle and to organize its activities to sustain the Programme as far as possible through its own resources, it being understood that this matter will be reviewed by the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994);
- 3. <u>Underlines</u> that the reallocation authorized above leads to a corresponding reduction of yearly allocations for the last three years of the cycle.

93/7. United Nations technical cooperation activities

The Governing Council,

Recalling its decisions 91/38 of 25 June 1991 and 92/34 of 26 May 1992,

Bearing in mind the Secretary-General's intention to have the new Department for Development Support and Management Services serve as a focal point for the provision of management services for technical cooperation, combining the relevant core functions of the Office for Project Services and the former Department of Technical Cooperation for Development,

<u>Stressing</u> its role in providing governance on the technical cooperation activities of the United Nations Development Programme,

Requests the President of the Governing Council to bring the present decision expressing the following concerns to the attention of the General Assembly at its resumed forty-seventh session and, as appropriate, to the Fifth Committee:

- (a) The need to consider the continuing role of the Governing Council in relation to the Office for Project Services;
- (b) The need to maintain, as a minimum, the current degree of autonomy of the Office for Project Services, including its self-financing principle, and to improve further its effectiveness and efficiency and the delivery of United Nations Development Programme-financed technical cooperation;
- (c) The fact that the Governing Council will review the financial, administrative and personnel implications for the budget of the United Nations Development Programme at its fortieth session (1993);
- (d) Bearing in mind paragraphs 24, 25 and 27 of General Assembly resolution 47/199 of 22 December 1992, the need to ensure to the maximum extent possible the delegation of authority to the Resident Coordinator for the implementation of activities of the Office for Project Services.

Acknowledging the dynamism, commitment and unrelenting efforts of Mr. Draper to alleviate poverty, to promote sustainable development and to improve the economic and social conditions of people in developing countries by putting them at the centre of the development process and by giving priority to the contributions of women, to the promotion of entrepreneurship to the private sector and to grass-roots and non-governmental organizations in the programmes of the United Nations Development Programme and the special funds under his administration;

- 1. Expresses its sincere appreciation and gratitude to Mr. William H. Draper III for his effective management of the United Nations Development Programme from 1986 to 1993;
- 2. <u>Extends its best wishes</u> to Mr. Draper and his family for a long and happy life and for continued success in all his future endeavours.

The Governing Council,

 $\underline{\text{Approves}}$ the agenda and organization of work for its fortieth session (DP/1993/L.8 and Corr.1).

9th meeting 1 June 1993

93/11. <u>Humanitarian Programme</u>

The Governing Council,

Recalling General Assembly resolution 46/182 of 19 December 1991 and Governing Council decisions 91/17 of 25 June 1991 and 92/20 of 26 May 1992,

- 1. $\underline{\text{Welcomes}}$ the progress already made in implementing Governing Council decision 92/20 and requests the Administrator to continue efforts to ensure its full implementation;
- 2. <u>Commends</u> the United Nations Development Programme and the Department of Humanitarian Affairs for the work of the Disaster Management Training Programme in promoting capacity-building in the field of disaster mitigation and in training United Nations system staff at the country level and encourages those in a position to do so to contribute financially to the programme;

- 3. <u>Requests</u> the United Nations Development Programme to work closely with the International Decade for Natural Disaster Reduction in disaster prevention and mitigation activities and urges the Programme to participate actively in the World Conference on Natural Disaster Reduction to be convened from 23 to 27 May 1994 in Yokohama, Japan;
- 4. <u>Welcomes</u> the written provisions for a more structured working relationship between the United Nations Development Programme and the Department of Humanitarian Affairs, as contained in annex I of document DP/1993/HP/CRP.3, which provide a sound basis for future cooperation and urges that these provisions be put into effect as soon as possible;
- 5. Reaffirms, in the context of paragraph 7 of Governing Council decision 92/20, the need to develop an operational framework, under the overall authority of the Department of Humanitarian Affairs, identifying the roles and responsibilities of all the system's operational entities at the various phases of the relief-to-development continuum bearing in mind the overlapping mandates and unidentified areas of responsibilities and requests the Administrator to support actively Department of Humanitarian Affairs initiatives in this direction;
- 6. <u>Emphasizes</u> the need for close cooperation among the United Nations Development Programme, the Department of Humanitarian Affairs and resident coordinators to ensure that resident coordinators are in a position to execute their emergency coordination functions effectively and to contribute to promoting the transition from relief through rehabilitation to sustainable development, particularly through the promotion and use of national capacity;
- 7. <u>Stresses</u> the need for the United Nations Development Programme to continue to develop its substantive and technical capacity to support the transition process from relief through rehabilitation to sustainable development and to support resident coordinators in their emergency coordination function in close cooperation with the Department of Humanitarian Affairs;
- 8. $\underline{\text{Decides}}$ to maintain the Humanitarian Programme for the 1994-1995 biennium and to continue to fund one L-4 and one L-5 post from Special Programme Resources during this period;
- 9. Requests the Administrator to report on the implementation of the present decision to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994).

93/12. <u>Follow-up to the United Nations Conference on</u> <u>Environment and Development</u>

The Governing Council,

<u>Recalling</u> the role assigned to the United Nations Development Programme in the area of capacity-building for sustainable development under Agenda 21, adopted by the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, particularly in organizing United Nations system efforts towards capacity-building in support of sustainable development,

Also recalling the important role the United Nations Development Programme is expected to play as an implementing partner of the Global Environment

Facility in collaboration with the World Bank and the United Nations Environment Programme,

<u>Taking account</u> of decision 93/2 of 19 February 1993 approving the launching of Capacity 21,

<u>Recalling</u> paragraph 5 of its decision 92/16 of 26 May 1992 in which the Governing Council urged the Administrator to take measures to ensure that environmental concerns are taken into account in all programmes and projects of the United Nations Development Programme, to the maximum extent possible,

Noting the efforts of the United Nations Development Programme to deliver training in its Environment Management Guidelines,

- 1. <u>Notes</u> the efforts of the United Nations Development Programme in the follow-up to the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development and recognizes the need for closer cooperation between the United Nations Development Programme, the United Nations Environment Programme and other United Nations agencies in the field of environment;
- 2. <u>Also notes</u> the establishment of a sustainable development network by the United Nations Development Programme and requests the Administrator to ensure that this network takes into consideration other networks of a similar nature to avoid duplication of efforts and to provide the possibility of linkage between them;
- 3. <u>Also notes</u> that the current level of resources for Capacity 21 are still limited and therefore calls upon the developed countries and those in a position to do so to contribute generously to this initiative;
- 4. <u>Welcomes</u> the report of the Administrator (DP/1993/11), and requests him to take full account of the views expressed by delegations on Capacity 21 at the fortieth session of the Governing Council (1994);
- 5. Requests the Administrator, on this basis, to proceed with the implementation of Capacity 21 based on the criteria presented in paragraph 30 of document DP/1991/11 and, in so doing, to elaborate further on the application of these criteria, taking fully into account: (a) the Rio Declaration on Environment and Development and Agenda 21; (b) the catalytic role and complementary character of Capacity 21; (c) General Assembly resolution 47/199, in particular the role of the recipient countries; (d) the specific role of the United Nations Development Programme in providing technical cooperation for development in the United Nations system; and (e) the indicative types of activities as outlined in paragraph 28 and in the annex;
- 6. <u>Decides</u> that the distribution of the Capacity 21 resources will follow the criteria applied to Special Programme Resources, with particular attention given to the needs of least developed countries and, in this context, supports the intention of the Administrator to devote 40 per cent of the overall budget of Capacity 21 to the least developed countries;
- 7. <u>Endorses</u> the proposal to undertake an evaluation of Capacity 21 at the end of the fifth programming cycle with a view to incorporating capacity-building activities in the field of sustainable development into the regular programming of the United Nations Development Programme;
- 8. <u>Requests</u> the Administrator to report to the Governing Council initially on an annual basis on the follow-up to the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development and the activities of the United Nations

- 2. <u>Supports</u> fully World Health Assembly resolution 46.37 of 14 May 1993, in which the Director-General of the World Health Organization is requested to study, in close consultation with all organizations and bodies concerned within the United Nations development system, the feasibility and practicability of establishing a joint and co-sponsored United Nations Programme on HIV and AIDS and to develop options for such a programme;
- 3. <u>Requests</u> the Administrator to cooperate fully in the consultative process established in World Health Assembly resolution 46.37 to carry out the study.

<u>Noting</u> the decline of United Nations Development Programme core resources, about half of which support African programmes, at a time when net resource flows to the region are declining,

- 1. <u>Takes note</u> of the report of the Administrator on the development situation in Africa and the proposals contained therein (DP/1993/17);
- 2. Requests the Administrator to contribute fully to the implementation of the United Nations New Agenda for the Development of Africa in the 1990s and in this context to strengthen coordination with the whole United Nations system,

particularly with the Office of Special Coordinator for Africa and Least Developed Countries;

- 3. <u>Calls upon</u> African countries to pursue vigorously their responsibility and commitment under the New Agenda to achieve sustained and sustainable growth and development, to promote cooperation and regional and subregional integration, to intensify the process of democratization, to encourage investment and to integrate population issues into the development process;
- 4. Also calls upon the international community to assist African countries in their efforts to achieve accelerated growth and human-centred development on a sustainable basis through seeking to find durable solutions to the African debt crisis, providing adequate resource flows, diversification of African economies, enhanced market access, and support of African regional integration;
- 5. Renews its appeal to the international community to consider increasing contributions to the United Nations Development Programme to cover the projected shortfall in resources available in the fifth programming cycle, taking into account the needs of Africa;

- 8. <u>Welcomes</u> the decision of the Government of Japan to host the International Conference for the Development of Africa in October 1993 and encourages the participation and support of the international community;
- 9. <u>Welcomes</u> also the establishment of Capacity 21 and calls upon the Administrator to continue the efforts with African Governments and institutions at national and regional levels to implement Agenda 21, <u>inter alia</u>, in the context of the elaboration of the International Convention on Drought and Desertification, as appropriate;

- 5. <u>Urges</u> the Administrator, through, <u>inter alia</u>, the Joint Consultative Group on Policy and the Inter-Agency Working Group on Evaluation and the participation of the United Nations Development Programme in the Consultative Committee for Programme and Operational Questions to continue to support coordinated action towards a common system of reporting the degree and rate of success or failure in the achievement of programme and project objectives;
- 6. <u>Requests</u> that a list of evaluations, when completed, be distributed to members and observers of the Governing Council.

The Governing Council,

Reaffirming the mandate of the United Nations Population Fund as contained in Economic and Social Council resolution 1763 (LIV) of 18 May 1973, and taking into account the views expressed at the fortieth session (1993) of the Governing Council during consideration of matters concerning the United Nations Population Fund,

<u>Emphasizing</u> the sovereignty of nations in the formulation, adoption and implementation of their population policies, in full integration with their general development policies and consistent with basic human rights and with the responsibilities of individuals, couples and families,

- 1. <u>Takes note</u> of the report of the Executive Director on the activities of the Fund in 1992 (DP/1993/29, parts I and II) and, while welcoming the revised format of the report and noting the improvement in its analytical quality and transparency, requests the Executive Director to include, in future reports, analyses of problems encountered and lessons learned through the Fund's programming activities;
- 2. Expresses concern that projected voluntary contributions to the United Nations Population Fund in 1993 are essentially the same as in 1992, especially in view of ever-increasing demands for assistance from the United Nations Population Fund and the urgency of addressing population issues in the 1990s, and, in this regard, encourages the United Nations Population Fund to heighten the strategic focus of its programmes so as to maximize the efficiency of the delivery of its assistance and the effectiveness of its programmatic activities in recipient countries;
- 3. Recognizes that expenditure on all programme areas should reflect the actual needs of recipient countries; welcomes the increase in the proportion of the Fund's expenditures devoted to maternal and child health and family planning services, as reflected in table E on page 8 of the work plan for 1994-1997 and request for programme expenditure authority (DP/1993/30); urges the United Nations Population Fund to continue to respond positively to requests from recipient countries for assistance in this area; and recognizes the important work of the United Nations Population Fund in the field of information, education, and communication and calls upon the Fund to strengthen further its

information, education and communication activities, taking into account, inter alia, the special needs of adolescents;

- 4. <u>Notes</u> the status report on the implementation of the strategy for UNFPA assistance to sub-Saharan Africa contained in part III of the report of the Executive Director for 1992 (DP/1993/29); takes note of progress made in the main areas of the strategy; expresses concern over the loss of momentum in implementing important population activities in 1992; underscores that much more needs to be done in the region to implement fully the strategy, with special emphasis on gender issues; and requests the Executive Director to strengthen further United Nations Population Fund activities in Africa and to report to the Governing Council at its forty-second session (1995) on the continued implementation of the strategy;
- 5. Also notes the status report on the implementation strategy to strengthen the capacity of the Fund to deal with issues concerning women, population and development contained in part III of the report of the Executive Director for 1992 (DP/1993/29); takes note of the progress that has been made in the area of women, population and development; encourages the United Nations Population Fund to monitor the impact, at the country level, of its activities in women, population and development; welcomes the initiatives to strengthen the capacity of the Fund to deal with such issues, inter alia, through links with women's organizations and urges that such links be pursued at the country and intercountry levels, in particular in connection with the upcoming International Conference on Population and Development and its follow up;
- 6. <u>Acknowledges</u> that the Fund's Programme Review and Strategy Development (PRSD) exercise is an innovative process that ensures a programme approach to the resolution of population and development issues in countries; notes the experience gained by UNFPA in undertaking such exercises in a number of countries; underlines the need to strengthen further the capacity of the recipient countries in the formulation of a programme that is well coordinated and efficiently monitored and evaluated;
- 7. Recognizes the important role that non-governmental organizations play in the implementation of population programme activities at the field level, and appreciates the pioneering role of the United Nations Population Fund within the United Nations system in this regard and encourages the Fund to involve them, whenever appropriate, in the implementation of such activities;
- Welcomes the status report on United Nations Population Fund implementation of General Assembly resolution 47/199 contained in part III of the report of the Executive Director for 1992 (DP/1993/29); notes that the programming experience gained through the Fund's Programme Review and Strategy Development (PRSD) exercise places the United Nations Population Fund in a position to contribute to the formulation of the country strategy note and towards the development of a common programme approach; agrees that the Fund's new successor support-cost arrangements are an integral component of strategic programming and should contribute to national execution and decentralization; welcomes the efforts of the United Nations Population Fund, working through the Joint Consultative Group on Policy (JCGP), to harmonize its programme cycles with those of its partner organizations in the Joint Consultative Group on Policy and to adapt these cycles to national development plans; and requests the Executive Director to report to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994) on the progress made in the further implementation of General Assembly resolution 47/199;
- 9. <u>Welcomes</u> the continuing progress being made in the Global Initiative on Contraceptive Requirements and Logistics Management Needs in developing

countries, in particular the cooperative efforts of the United Nations
Population Fund, interested Governments, non-governmental organizations and
other international agencies in organizing and conducting in-depth country
studies on contraceptive requirements and logistics management needs; commends
the United Nations Population Fund for the prompt publication and dissemination
of the results of these country studies; notes with appreciation the increasing
donor support for the procurement and distribution of contraceptive commodities;
and reiterates its request that the United Nations Population Fund submit to the
Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994) a report on the Global
Initiative on Contraceptive Requirements and Logistics Management Needs;

- 10. Requests the Executive Director to continue the Global Initiative beyond 1994 and to seek funding on an interim basis and to include in her report to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994) proposals on its future funding;
- 11. Takes note of the progress report on UNFPA successor support-cost arrangements (DP/1993/32); also takes note of the progress made in implementing the technical support services arrangements, in particular the establishment of the United Nations Population Fund country support teams; welcomes the Executive Director's proposals contained in document DP/1993/32 to improve the implementation of the technical support services arrangements; and authorizes the Executive Director to make appropriate arrangements to further improve the implementation of the technical support services arrangements, and requests the Executive Director to submit a report to the Governing Council at its forty-second session (1995), as noted in paragraph 14 of decision 91/37;
- 12. Requests the Executive Director, mindful of paragraph A 6 of decision 92/32, to submit to the forty-first session of the Governing Council (1994) a report updating the review and assessment study of the Fund and synthesizing the UNFPA experience over the last 25 years, and to present, at the forty-second session of the Council, the Executive Director's proposals on programme priorities and future direction of UNFPA, taking into account the views of the Governing Council on the report to be submitted to the forty-first session, as well as the recommendations of the International Conference on Population and Development, to be held in Cairo, in September 1994;
- 13. <u>Encourages</u> the Executive Director to continue her efforts to improve the evaluation activities of the United Nations Population Fund, <u>inter alia</u>, through the provisions of paragraph A 7 of decision 92/32 and paragraph A 12 of the present decision;
- 14. Encourages further the Executive Director to continue her efforts to decentralize decision making to the field, including project approval authority, and, taking account of paragraph A 12 of this decision, requests her to include in her annual report to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994) information on progress made and on anticipated efforts for further decentralization, including related field-level training and the requisite accountability structure;
- 15. <u>Takes note</u> of the report of the Executive Director reviewing the Fund's experience in implementing the priority-country system (DP/1993/33); reaffirms the continued use of existing criteria and their threshold levels; takes note of the most recent (January 1992) updating of the list of priority countries; and requests the Executive Director to report to the Governing Council at appropriate intervals on further progress made in implementing the priority-country system;

- 16. Requests the Executive Director to study and to report to the Governing Council at its forty-second session (1995) on the feasibility of the inclusion of maternal mortality rate as a criterion while recognizing the relevance of its inclusion as a criterion;
- 17. Takes note of the report on collaboration of the United Nations Population Fund with the World Bank and the regional development banks (DP/1993/34); agrees that collaboration between the World Bank, the regional development banks and the United Nations Population Fund is an integral part of the wider effort of the international development assistance community to assist countries in achieving sustainable development; recognizes that the cooperation should be based on the comparative advantages of the two organizations; and endorses the actions called for in the report to strengthen collaboration between the United Nations Population Fund and the World Bank and between the United Nations Population Fund and the regional development banks;
- 18. Supports fully World Health Assembly resolution 46.37, which, inter alia, calls for the Director General of the World Health Organization to consider the economic and organizational benefits of a joint and co-sponsored United Nations Programme on HIV and AIDS, and notes with appreciation the Executive Director's intent to cooperate fully in the consultative process established in World Health Assembly resolution 46.37;

The Governing Council,

<u>Having considered</u> the biennial budget estimates for the administrative and programme support services for the biennium 1994-1995 (DP/1993/35), the annual financial review, 1992 (DP/1993/36), the audit reports (DP/1993/37) and the report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (DP/1993/38),

- 1. <u>Takes note</u> of the annual financial review, 1992 (DP/1993/36) and, in the context of Governing Council decision 93/29, requests the Executive Director to include in future annual financial reviews an overview of the cost-sharing contributions and their distribution among programme areas;
- 2. Also takes note of the comments of the Executive Director in document DP/1993/37 concerning the report of the United Nations Board of Auditors on the United Nations Population Fund for the biennium ended 31 December 1991 (A/47/5/Add.7);
- 3. Notes the detailed progress as reported in document DP/1993/37 on measures taken to implement the recommendations of the Board of Auditors on management issues, in accordance with General Assembly resolution 47/211 of 23 December 1992, as summarized in part II of the Official Records of the Forty-seventh General Assembly (A/47/5/Add.7, para. 6);

- 4. <u>Calls upon</u> the Executive Director to continue consultations with executing agencies and Governments, with a view to expediting their submission of audited financial statements on activities they execute on behalf of the United Nations Population Fund and urges that consideration be given to the increased use of mutually acceptable commercial audit firms to facilitate this process;
- 5. <u>Requests</u> the Executive Director to provide the Governing Council with a summary of the significant observations of the external auditors of the United Nations Population Fund executing agencies, together with corrective action taken by the agencies;
- 6. <u>Urges</u> the Executive Director to continue to pay close attention to the need for avoiding duplication of procurement capacities that already exist in the United Nations system and to continue to act in line with the announcement of the Secretary-General of December 1990 encouraging coordinated procurement among the agencies and organizations of the United Nations system;
- 7. Expresses concern at the increased ratio of administrative costs to programme delivery that has occurred so far in the current biennium, while recognizing the efforts of the Executive Director to curtail administrative costs by realizing savings in the amount of \$7 million in the 1992-1993 administrative and programme support services budget;
- 8. <u>Encourages</u> the Executive Director to take the necessary measures to keep to a minimum the level of administrative expenditure, particularly in the event that forecast levels of income are not realized;
- 9. Requests the Executive Director to include in the annual financial review a progress report on relevant aspects of the implementation of the administrative and programme support services budget, including any measures taken to reduce it;
- 10. <u>Urges</u> the Executive Director to issue and implement comprehensive and specific guidelines in order to delineate appropriately programme, programme-support and administrative expenditures;
- 11. <u>Takes note</u> of the progress being made in the implementation of the strategy of office automation, as described in the report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions, and requests the Executive Director to report to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994) on further administrative cost savings achieved;
- 12. <u>Requests</u> the Executive Director, while continuing the implementation of the strategy of office automation, to take into account the need for other automation systems to be compatible with those used elsewhere in the United Nations system, particularly with those being developed by the United Nations Integrated Management Information System project, as well as at the field level;
- 13. Reconfirms paragraph 19 of decision 91/36 of 21 June 1991 to maintain the level of the operational reserve at 20 per cent of general resources income;

- 15. <u>Authorizes</u> the Executive Director to transfer credits between programmes within reasonable limits, with the concurrence of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions, for the biennium 1994-1995 and requests her to report thereon to the Governing Council;
- 16. <u>Endorses</u> the proposals of the Executive Director with regard to the downgrading of the post of the Deputy Executive Director (Policy and Administration) from the Assistant Secretary-General to the D-2 level; that of Director of the Division for Arab States and Europe from the D-2 to the D-1 level; and that of Chief of the Resource Development Unit from the D-1 to the P-5 level, which are in line with the restructuring process of the Secretary-General, and requests the Executive Director to ensure that the downgrading of the post of the Director of the Division for Arab States and Europe will not negatively affect the size and implementation of the programmes in that region;

- (a) The establishment of an office in Eritrea in 1995 to be staffed by one Country Director at the P-5 level and four national staff one National Programme Officer, one National Programme/Finance Assistant, one secretary and one driver which should also contribute to the efforts of the Secretary-General to bring about a unified United Nations presence in that country;
- (b) The establishment of 31 additional local posts in the field, comprising 11 National Programme Officers and 20 General Service posts;

- (c) The upgrading of six International Programme Officer posts from the P-3 to the P-4 level;
- 19. Also approves, taking into account paragraph 24 of document DP/1993/35 as well as the need to keep administrative expenditure to a minimum, in accordance with paragraph 8 of the present decision, the upgrading of up to four Country Director posts from the P-5 to the D-1 level, based on the following minimum criteria:
- (a) All D-1-level posts will be in countries which either have one of the 20 largest country programmes or in countries where exceptional circumstances justify a D-1-level appointment;
- (b) Account will be taken of the number of staff members in the office, the degree of national execution, the complexity of the population programme in specific countries and the need to be consistent with paragraphs 38 and 39 of General Assembly resolution 47/199 of 22 December 1992;

93/29. United Nations Population Fund: Financial Regulations

The Governing Council,

<u>Having considered</u> the report of the Executive Director on the proposed revisions to the Financial Regulations of UNFPA (DP/1993/63);

Approves the following Financial Regulations:

Article V - TRUST FUNDS

Regulation 5.4: Funds received by UNFPA under Regulation 14.6 for procurement of supplies, equipment and services on behalf and at the request of Governments, specialized agencies or other intergovernmental or non-governmental organizations shall be treated as trust funds.

Article XIV - INTERNAL CONTROL

Regulation 14.6: Supplies, equipment and services may be provided by UNFPA under procurement arrangements on behalf and at the request of Governments, specialized agencies or other inter-governmental or non-governmental organizations, where such supplies, equipment and services are required for purposes related to UNFPA activities and are consistent with the aims and policies of UNFPA, on the basis of full payment in advance of the procurement activities, to cover all costs, including insurance and service fees, connected with the procurement of such supplies, equipment and services.

Article II - DEFINITIONS

Regulation 2.2 C (vi): "Cost-sharing" shall mean an arrangement by which the costs of projects that are normally charged to UNFPA regular resources, including the reimbursement of the related administrative and operational service costs paid to executing agencies, are covered in full or in part by a contribution or contributions from the recipient Government, or from one or more Governments other than the recipient Government, or from an organization or organizations of the United Nations system, or from intergovernmental institutions or agencies not part of the United Nations system. Such arrangement may be made on the following basis:

- Project cost-sharing whereby the contribution relates to a specific project;
- Programme cost-sharing whereby the contribution relates not to a specific project but to all or several projects in a recipient country or region; and
- Third-party cost-sharing, which can be either project or programme cost-sharing, whereby the contribution is paid by one or more entities other than the recipient Government.

Article IV - UNFPA FUNDS

<u>Regulation 4.12</u>: The Executive Director is authorized to enter into project, programme and/or third-party cost-sharing agreements, provided that such cost-sharing arrangements have been accepted by the recipient country or countries, subject to such principles as the Governing Council may establish.

<u>Regulation 4.13</u>: Cost-sharing agreements and contributions thereunder shall be subject to the following conditions:

- (a) Contributions would be denominated for accounting purposes in United States dollars; however, UNFPA would accept payment in the local currency of a recipient Government to the extent that such currency could be used to meet project expenditure requirements;
- (b) Contributions would be paid pursuant to a written agreement made between the contributor and UNFPA. Such agreement would specify that the contributions should be paid in advance of the implementation of planned activities. All third-party contributions would be accepted subject to the agreement of the recipient Government;
- (c) In case of default in making the payments required under subparagraph (b) above, UNFPA would be under no obligation to provide funds from its regular programmable resources for any of the activities planned under the cost-sharing agreement.

The Governing Council,

Recalling General Assembly resolutions 46/232 of 3 March 1991, 47/199 of 22 December 1992 and 47/212 B of 6 May 1993,

<u>Also recalling</u> its decisions 90/37 of 22 June 1990, 91/38 of 25 June 1991 and 92/34 of 26 May 1992,

- 1. <u>Takes note</u> of the report of the Secretary-General on United Nations technical cooperation activities (DP/1993/39 and Add.1-3);
- 2. <u>Stresses</u> the need to improve further the technical focus of the Department for Development Support and Management Services, especially through the United Nations regular programme of technical cooperation;
- 3. <u>Takes note</u> of the Thirteenth Biennial Meeting of National Recruitment Services held at Cairo in March-April 1993 and organized by the Department for Development Support and Management Services, in close cooperation with the Government of the Arab Republic of Egypt, and of the Cairo Plan of Action embodying the recommendations of that meeting;
- 4. <u>Encourages</u> the Department for Development Support and Management Services to help to strengthen national capacities for programme management and project execution and implementation, in responding to the needs of developing countries;
- 5. <u>Requests</u> the Department for Development Support and Management Services to pay particular attention to improving its preparation and appraisal of projects and its capacity-building techniques within its area of competence;
- 6. Requests the Department for Development Support and Management Services to ensure that its technical cooperation activities are undertaken with full attention to General Assembly resolution 47/199 of 22 December 1992 and in particular to the respective functions and responsibilities of recipient Governments and the resident coordinators;
- 7. <u>Stresses</u> the importance of the clarification of an effective and efficient division of labour between the Department for Development Support and Management Services and other United Nations organs dealing with technical cooperation, especially the United Nations Development Programme, with particular attention to coordination issues, taking full account of the relevant provisions of its decision 92/34 and General Assembly resolution 47/212 B and requests the Administrator to include information on progress made in his report to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994);
- 8. <u>Invites</u> the Secretary-General to provide a more analytical review of the technical cooperation activities of the Department for Development Support and Management Services to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994).

93/31. United Nations Development Fund for Women

The Governing Council,

Recalling the mandate of the United Nations Development Fund for Women as set out in the annex to General Assembly resolution 39/125 of 14 December 1984,

<u>Recognizing</u> the contribution of the United Nations Development Fund for Women to the identification and the pursuit of strategies to integrate women into the mainstream development agenda, and the Fund's innovative and catalytic activities to promote women's own contributions to national economies,

Acknowledging the role played by the United Nations Development Fund for Women in placing women's concerns on the international agenda for the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, as well as the Fund's commitment to strengthening its advocacy role to accelerate positive change in the status of women world wide,

- 1. <u>Takes note</u> of the report of the Administrator on the United Nations Development Fund for Women (DP/1993/41);
- 2. <u>Also takes note</u> of the continuing policy advice given to the Administrator by the Consultative Committee on the United Nations Development Fund for Women;
- 3. Recognizes the importance of the contribution of the United Nations Development Fund for Women to international preparations for the Fourth World Conference on Women to be held in Beijing in September 1995, including facilitating the participation of women's organizations in it, fostering of cooperation among groups, between Governments and non-governmental organizations, and between men and women, for a more gender-responsive development agenda, as well as efforts to raise public awareness of the objectives of the Conference;
- 4. <u>Calls upon</u> the United Nations Development Fund for Women to continue its active support to the United Nations Development Programme and the other members of the Joint Consultative Group on Policy in gender-related programme areas and to further a positive working relationship with other United Nations bodies in order to integrate gender concerns and women in their development activities;
- 5. Renews its appeal for increased voluntary financial support to the United Nations Development Fund for Women, bearing in mind its important responsibilities in the coming years as outlined in the present decision.

93/32. <u>United Nations Capital Development Fund</u>

The Governing Council,

Recalling its decision 91/39 of 25 June 1991,

Recalling also the Final Act of the Eighth United Nations Conference on Trade and Development and more particularly the call in section F, paragraph 218 thereof, for more funding to the United Nations Capital Development Fund in light of the increased number of least developed countries,

<u>Mindful</u> of the relevant provisions of Agenda 21 of the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development which advocate poverty reduction and participatory development strategies to promote sustainable development,

<u>Noting with concern</u> that voluntary contributions to the United Nations Capital Development Fund declined in 1991 and 1992,

- 1. <u>Takes note</u> of the biennial report of the Administrator on the United Nations Capital Development Fund (DP/1993/42);
- 2. <u>Notes</u> that the implementation of the present partial funding formula has allowed for the highest level ever of programming in 1991 and a record level of programme expenditure in 1992;
- 3. <u>Notes with concern</u> that the commitment capacity of the Fund through the decade will be seriously impaired by current funding trends, including the continuation of the decline in voluntary contributions to the Fund;
- 4. <u>Invites</u> the Administrator to explore all possible options and modalities for mobilizing additional resources as well as to look into ways and means for closer cooperation with other multilateral financing institutions and to submit his findings and recommendations to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994);
- 5. <u>Notes</u> that the use of the loan facility within the United Nations Capital Development Fund is proceeding satisfactorily; and in this context endorses the Administrator's proposal for the continuation of the loan facility, as contained in paragraph 37 of the report of the Administrator;
- 6. <u>Takes note</u> of the area-based programme approach of the United Nations Capital Development Fund, with its emphasis on decentralization and increased collaboration with local government institutions and grass-roots organizations in the various stages of United Nations Capital Development Fund-financed development activities, as described in paragraph 55 and further of the Administrator's report;
- 7. <u>Notes</u> that following its thematic review on participatory eco-development, and because of its presence in the most remote and often environmentally fragile regions of least developed countries, the United Nations Capital Development Fund is well placed to direct its support to programmes that promote community participation and balance the economic and environmental imperatives of beneficiary populations;
- 8. <u>Invites</u> the Administrator to outline his plans for the future of the United Nations Capital Development Fund for presentation to the Governing Council at its forty-second session (1995) with a view to identifying any potential reorientation of the Fund's original mandate as well as to preserving its autonomy and identity as a United Nations Development Programme-administered fund in light of new requirements and priorities of recipient countries and increasing demands on the international community;
- 9. <u>Renews</u> its appeal for increased voluntary financial support to the United Nations Capital Development Fund as the main multilateral small-scale grant investment fund for the least developed countries, in order for the Fund to continue to respond to the rapidly growing needs of its recipient countries.

- 1. <u>Recognizes</u> the important role of the United Nations Sudano-Sahelian Office in the implementation of follow-up activities to the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development;
- 2. <u>Encourages</u> the Administrator to strengthen the substantive role and maintain the identity of the United Nations Sudano-Sahelian Office as focal point within the United Nations Development Programme for all matters related to drought and desertification control, in accordance with the ongoing process of its integration into the core programme of the United Nations Development Programme;
- 3. <u>Decides</u> that the experience and technical expertise of the United Nations Sudano-Sahelian Office in drought and desertification control should be made available to all affected countries, in particular those in Africa;
- 4. <u>Encourages</u> the United Nations Sudano-Sahelian Office to assist the affected countries, in particular in the framework of the negotiations regarding an international convention on desertification, in line with General Assembly resolution 47/188;
- 5. Renews its appeal to Governments and organizations to contribute to the general resources of the United Nations Sudano-Sahelian Office as well as to the account established by the Office for assistance in preparation for the international convention on desertification and, in this context, requests the Administrator to report to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994) on alternative ways and means of financing the work of the United Nations Sudano-Sahelian Office;
- 6. <u>Reconfirms</u> its support to the United Nations Development Programme-United Nations Sudano-Sahelian Office/United Nations Environment Programme joint venture for the implementation of chapter 12 of Agenda 21 in the countries affected by drought and desertification, particularly in Africa;

- 2. <u>Takes note</u> of the Administrator's analysis of field office workload, as contained in paragraphs 163 to 177 of document DP/1993/45, and the estimate that 29 per cent of that workload relates to support to the operational activities of the United Nations as a whole;

"Meanwhile, entities headquartered in a net donor country which has contributed in a non-convertible currency shall be reimbursed for services and equipment purchased under the Programme only in the currency of that country where such a currency is accumulated and until such accumulation is used; conversely, if, when utilizing a non-convertible contribution, costs are incurred in other currencies, these shall be reimbursed to UNDP in a convertible currency."

3. $\underline{\text{Notes}}$ that in accordance with the above, the Financial Regulation currently numbered 4.7 will be renumbered 4.8.

93/38. Procurement from developing countries

The Governing Council,

Recalling its decision 91/48 of 21 June 1991,

Also recalling paragraphs 21 and 22 of General Assembly resolution 44/211 of 22 December 1989, and paragraphs 26 and 27 of resolution 47/199 of 22 December 1992 relating to procurement from developing and major underutilized donor countries,

- 1. <u>Takes note</u> of the report of the Administrator on procurement from developing countries (DP/1993/50), the 1992 Annual Statistical Report prepared by the Inter-Agency Procurement Services Office and the observations and comments made thereon by delegations;
- 2. <u>Takes note</u> of the measures taken and improvements made by the United Nations system to increase further procurement from developing countries as well as of the constraints and limitations identified in paragraph 20 of the Administrator's report;
- 3. <u>Encourages</u>, in this context, Governments to address the constraints and limitations, including attitudinal barriers, in order to promote further procurement from developing countries;
- 4. <u>Commends</u>, in particular, the progress made by the United Nations Development Programme in increasing procurement from developing countries, as well as the facilitating research and development role and activities of the Inter-Agency Procurement Services Office;
- 5. <u>Recognizes</u> that the recent increase in government cost-sharing and the increased use of the national execution modality have been major factors contributing to the significant progress made in increasing procurement from developing countries;
- 6. <u>Takes note</u> that, under national implementation, the recipient Governments' rules and procedures for procurement apply and reiterates that such procurement should be compatible with the Financial Regulations and Rules of the United Nations Development Programme in order to promote accountability, transparency and cost-effectiveness, in particular through international competitive bidding;
- 7. <u>Urges</u> the United Nations Development Programme, through the Inter-Agency Procurement Working Group, to encourage the United Nations, its funds, programmes and its specialized agencies to expand further their efforts to increase procurement from developing and underutilized major donor countries;
- 8. <u>Supports</u> the efforts of the Inter-Agency Procurement Working Group to define further and improve the accuracy of the data being provided to the Inter-Agency Procurement Services Office for its annual reporting to the Governing Council and to the Economic and Social Council;
- 9. <u>Requests</u> the United Nations Development Programme, through the Inter-Agency Procurement Working Group, to work on improving existing procurement or supplier databases to include greater product and skill specification;
- 10. <u>Stresses</u> the need for the United Nations system to improve its rostering and shortlisting systems and procedures with a view to ensuring greater geographical representation from suppliers of goods and services from developing and underutilized major donor countries.

93/39. Technical cooperation among developing countries

The Governing Council,

<u>Recalling</u> Economic and Social Council decision 1992/41 of 30 July 1992, in which all parties were called upon in the development effort to make concerted, planned and vigorous endeavours to benefit from the utilization of the capacities of developing countries by giving their full support and first consideration to the use of the modality of technical cooperation among developing countries,

 $\underline{\text{Noting with appreciation}}$ the report of the High-level Committee on the Review of Technical Cooperation among Developing Countries at its eighth session as contained in document DP/1993/L.9,

Requests the Administrator, in cooperation with other organizations of the United Nations development system, to facilitate the implementation of decisions 8/1 and 8/2 of 4 June 1993 of the High-level Committee on the review of Technical Cooperation among Developing Countries as contained in annex I of document DP/1993/L.9.

The Governing Council,

<u>Decides</u> to defer further consideration of this subject pending the outcome of the restructuring of the economic and social sectors of the United Nations.

93/41. Proposal concerning the location of the United Nations Development Programme and United Nations Population Fund headquarters

The Governing Council

- 1. <u>Recalls</u> with appreciation the proposal submitted by Germany to the Governing Council at its thirty-ninth session to host the headquarters of the United Nations Development Programme, of its affiliated funds and of the United Nations Population Fund in Bonn from 1996 onwards;
- 2. Takes note with appreciation of the Administrator's report (DP/1993/55 and Add.1-3) submitted to the Council in accordance with its decision 92/44;
- 3. <u>Recognizes</u> the ongoing process of the restructuring and revitalization of the United Nations system in the economic, social and related fields, especially in the light of increasing responsibilities for the United Nations in these fields;
- 4. <u>Invites</u>, in the context of the restructuring and revitalization of the United Nations system in the economic, social and related fields:

- (a) Those Member States that have not yet transmitted their views, in accordance with Council decision 92/44, to do so prior to its next session; and
 - (b) All Member States to continue to review the Administrator's report;
 - 5. Decides to consult further on this matter at its forty-first session.

93/42. Office for Project Services

The Governing Council,

Recalling General Assembly resolutions 47/199 of 22 December 1992 and 47/212 B of 6 May 1993,

Bearing in mind that the strengthening of the role of the United Nations Development Programme as a central funding and coordinating agency is an integral part of the restructuring proposals of the Secretary-General,

Also bearing in mind that the activities of the Office for Project Services should be part of a coordinated approach to development by the United Nations system,

<u>Concerned</u> to ensure that the Office for Project Services is able further to improve its existing levels of efficiency, flexibility and cost-effectiveness,

- 1. Takes note of Governing Council documents DP/1993/20 and DP/1993/70;
- 2. <u>Also takes note</u> of the fact that the present supervisory responsibilities for the Office for Project Services of the Governing Council, the Economic and Social Council and the General Assembly, including the responsibility of the Governing Council for approving the administrative budget of the Office for Project Services, will remain unchanged;
- 3. <u>Underlines</u> the continuing need for transparent reporting on the activities of the Office for Project Services, including through the timely provision of annual financial statements and audit reports;
- 4. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to report to the Governing Council at its forty-first session (1994) on the steps taken to integrate functions and eliminate duplication between the Department for Development Support and Management Services and the Office for Project Services;
- 5. Accepts the outlined modalities for the transfer of the Office for Project Services as set out in document DP/1993/70, subject to the following requirements and on the understanding that the modalities will be clarified further and solutions reached prior to the transfer taking place and that the date of 1 January 1994 should be regarded as a target date pending review by the General Assembly, taking into account the views expressed by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions in its report (DP/1993/46):
- (a) The Office for Project Services must have the maximum possible degree of autonomy;
- (b) The Office for Project Services must continue to work in close collaboration with the United Nations Development Programme and, in particular,

should ensure that the present close links with resident representatives in the field are maintained, including through the fullest appropriate use of the services of United Nations Development Programme field offices on a reimbursable basis with adequate accountability;

- (c) The Office for Project Services must develop further its collaboration with other parts of the United Nations system including, in particular, with the specialized agencies;
- (d) The Office for Project Services must have the ability to maintain its high level of expertise and staff commitment by being able to retain, develop and recruit high quality staff, including through the maintenance of the present rotation mechanism with the United Nations Development Programme, the retention of its existing practices and procedures relating to staff development and mobility and by the establishment of appropriate arrangements with the United Nations Secretariat;
- (e) The Office for Project Services must remain fully self-financing with the capacity to adapt operational processes as necessary, and, in order to meet contingencies, it must have a reserve fund, the volume and maintenance of which is to be determined by the Council, based on proposals submitted by the Office for Project Services Management Board;
- (f) The Office for Project Services must have the freedom to utilize the most cost-effective central services, including those of the United Nations Secretariat or the United Nations Development Programme;
- (g) The Office for Project Services must retain and improve further its present Rules of Procurement;
- (h) The Office for Project Services must have the power to negotiate and conclude agreements for its implementation services with recipient Governments, United Nations departments, the United Nations Development Programme, bilateral donors and international financing institutions with due regard to the principles of multilateral assistance;
- 6. <u>Supports</u> the continuing role to be played by the United Nations Development Programme in the development of, and as signatories to, Management Services Agreements, as specified in paragraph 7 of the report of the Administrator (DP/1993/20);
- 7. <u>Stresses</u> that the Office for Project Services should not develop fundraising capacities;
- 8. Requests the Administrator, together with the Department for Development Support and Management Services and other relevant bodies, to prepare a timetable for the transfer of the Office for Project Services, indicating when implementation arrangements are to be in place and what they are to be;
- 9. Requests the Secretary-General, in collaboration with the Administrator, to address the concerns of the Governing Council expressed in the present decision and, in particular, those in paragraph 5 (a)-(h), in the context of preparing and submitting the proposed programme budget for 1994-1995;
- 10. <u>Also requests</u> the Secretary-General, in close cooperation with the Administrator, to present detailed information regarding the arrangements to give effect to the principles in paragraph 5 (d) by 1 September 1993;

- 11. <u>Further requests</u> the Administrator, in collaboration with the Secretary-General, to convene informal consultations on the modalities, as detailed in the proposed programme budget for 1994-1995, prior to their consideration by the General Assembly, which should be held at the earliest convenient date, taking into account the timing of their review by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions;
- 12. <u>Decides</u> to reconvene, if necessary, for a one-day special session to make any appropriate recommendations on the modalities detailed in the proposed programme budget for 1994-1995 and commented upon by the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions and on the information provided by the Secretary-General on staffing arrangements, prior to consideration of the issue by the General Assembly at its forty-eighth session (1993);
- 13. <u>Decides</u> to review the impact of the transfer of the Office for Project Services on the activities and functions of the United Nations Development Programme at its forty-first session (1994) on the basis of a report by the Administrator;
- 14. <u>Decides</u> to review the implementation of the staffing arrangements of the Office for Project Services at its forty-second session (1995) on the basis of a report by the Secretary-General.
